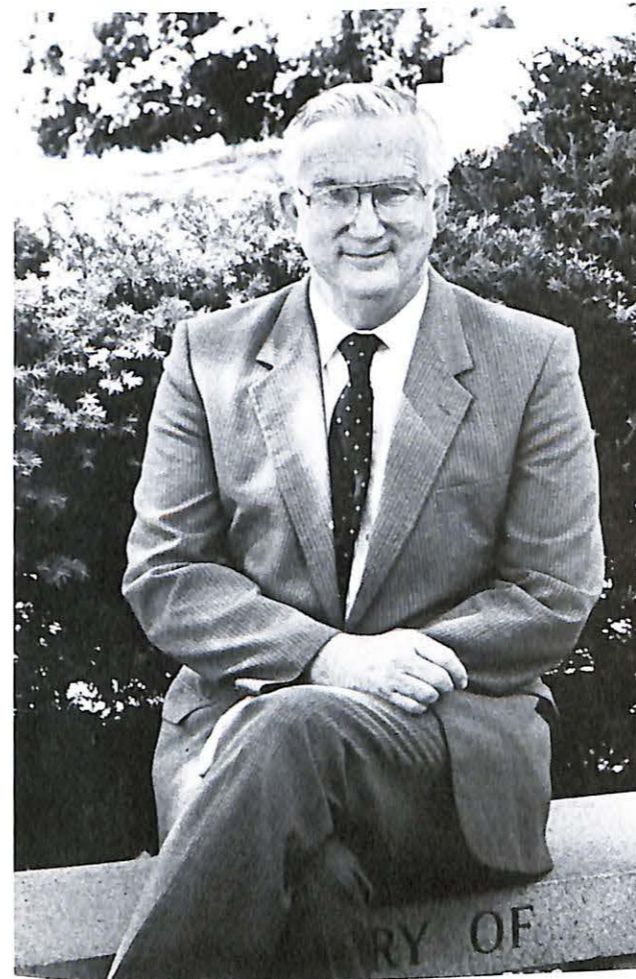

This has been an exciting year of accomplishments at Missouri Valley College. Our enrollment of 928 this fall was close to our all-time record and we are proud of the quality and accomplishments of our students. There are now 44 fulltime faculty members on campus and they have brought new strength to our academic programs. The return of the American Humanics program has made a major contribution to the life of the campus.

It has also been a year of expansion and renewal in our physical plant. A new honors dorm opened, the Casebolt building was remodeled to provide apartments and several houses have been purchased to provide additional housing for students. Significant renovation has been accomplished in the dormitories and Baity Hall and the college has purchased 40 acres south of the campus to provide space for a multi-purpose gymnasium and for outdoor recreation.

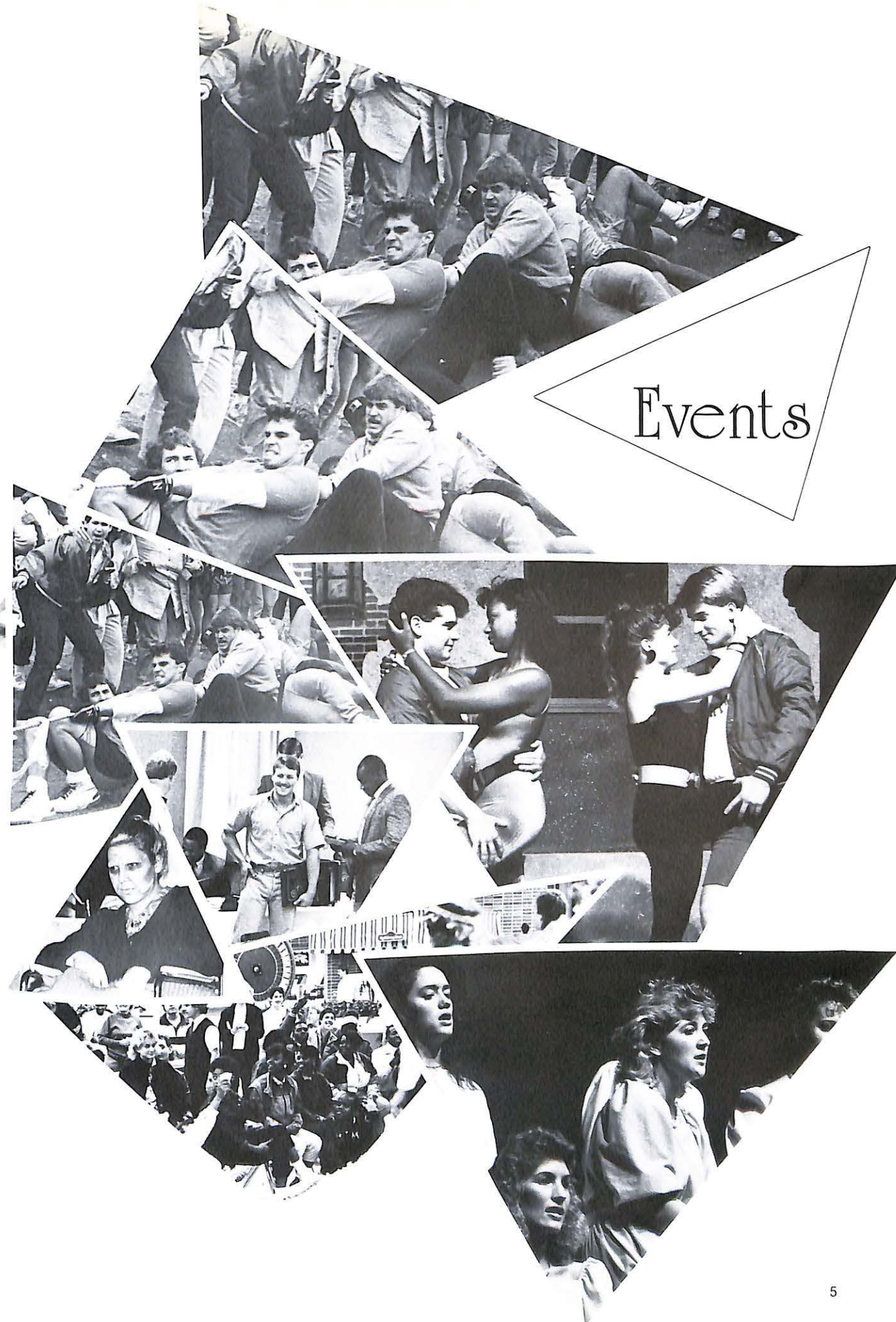
Thus the campus, the academic programs, and most of all the students, have all made great progress this year and we have laid the foundations for even greater years ahead.

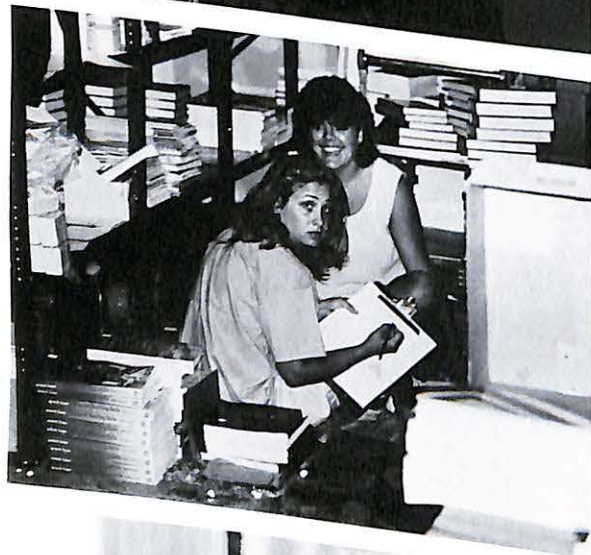
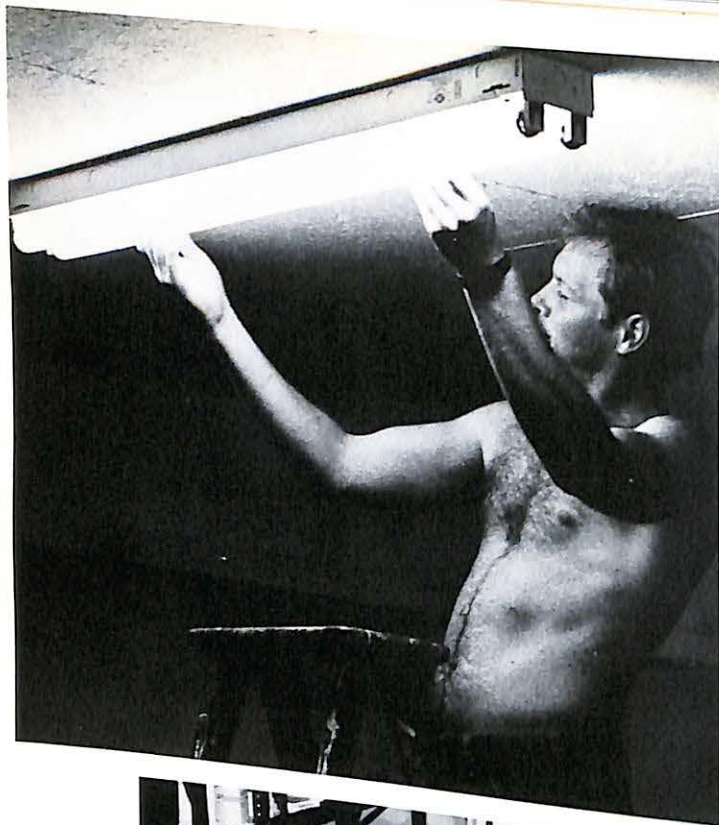

The celebration concluded that evening with the crowning of Queen Barbi Hartley and the MVC - Baker gridiron tilt.

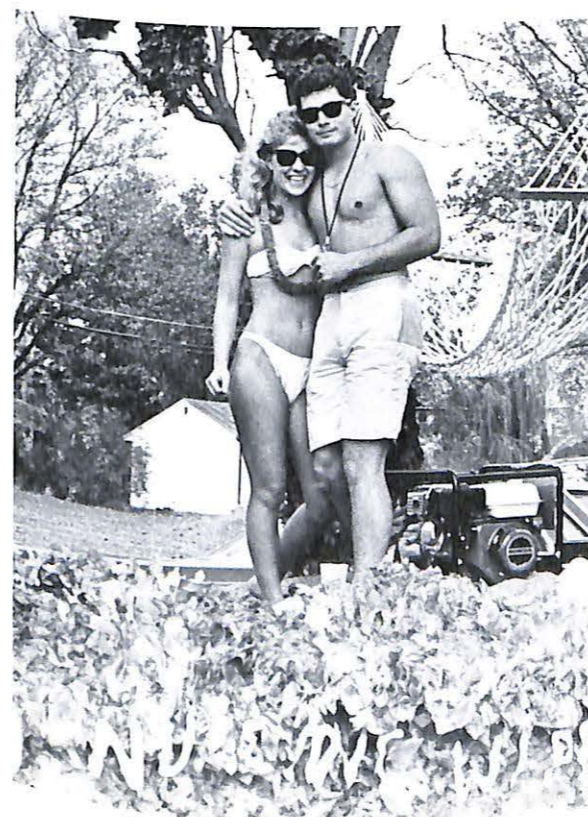
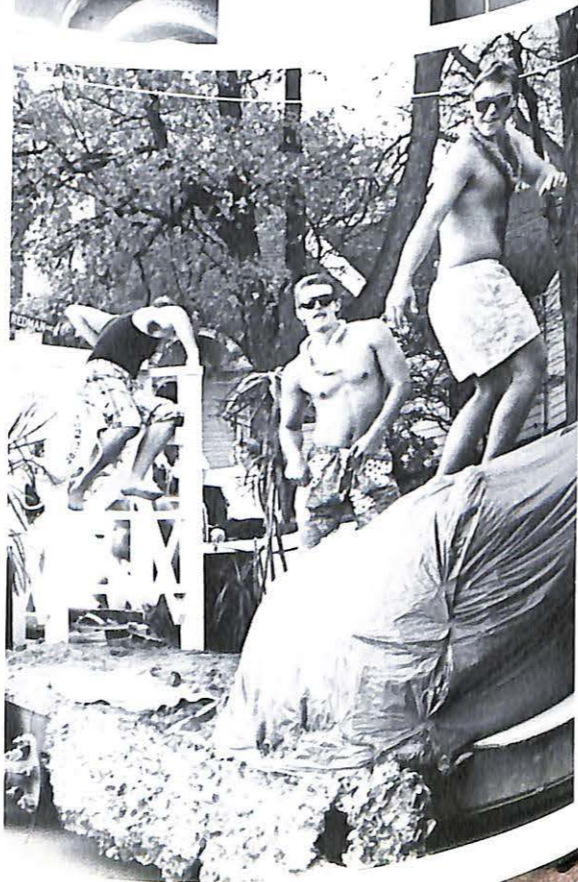
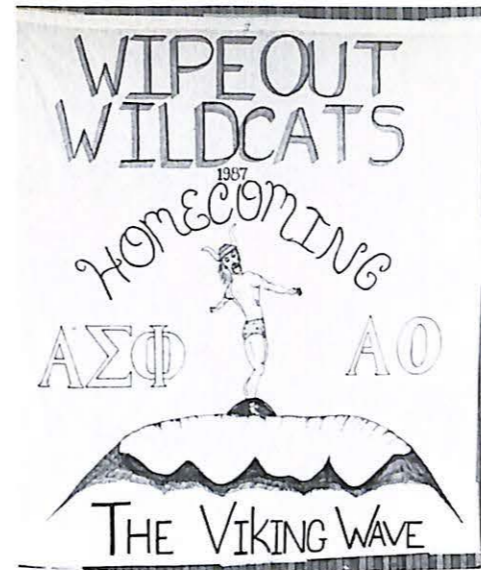

"Ow, it was just too fun," Senate Vice President Pam Workman said. "I knew it was fake, but I just couldn't stop yelling."

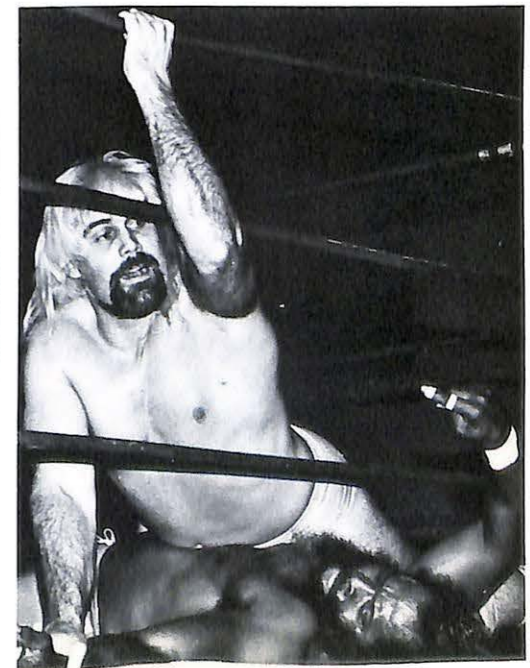
Student Senate made about \$200 on the night, before expenses, and V-Club pulled in another \$275 by running the concession stand.

MVC honors fall athletes

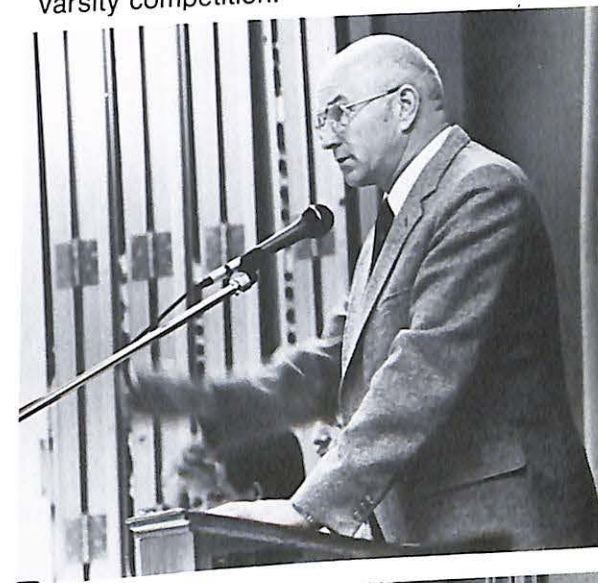

'Invalid' brings comedy to MVC stage



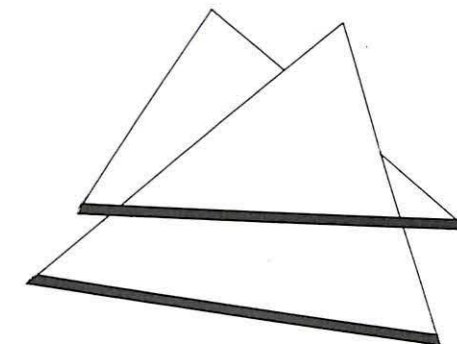
"The Imaginary Invalid," a three-act play by Moliere, brought laughter and farce to the MVC stage Nov. 21-23.

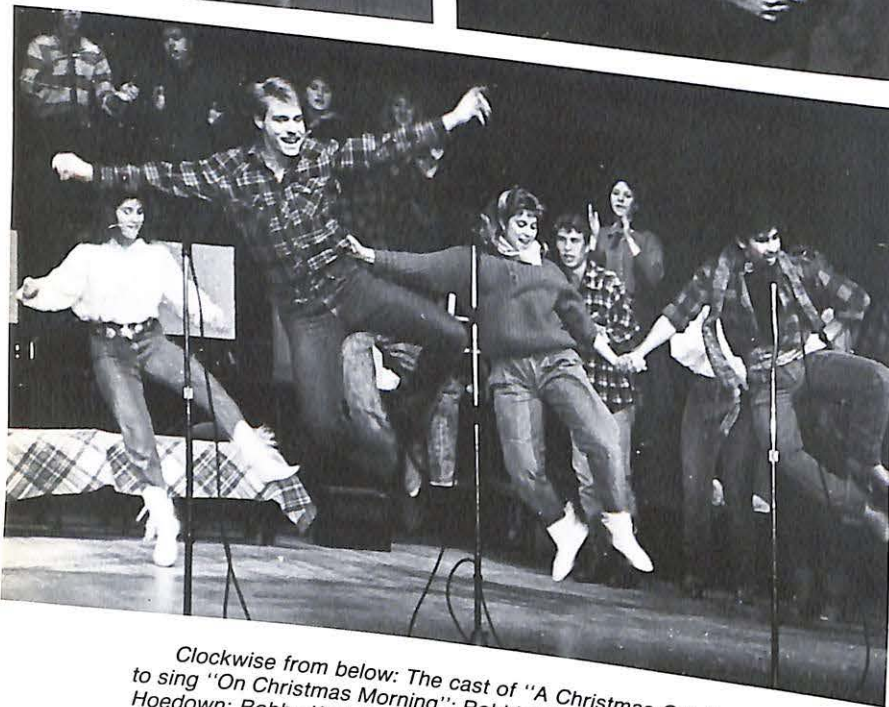
Christmas spirit grips MVC faculty

Following the banquet, carolers made their rounds of the campus, festively lit by luminarias, hanging wreaths on every campus building.

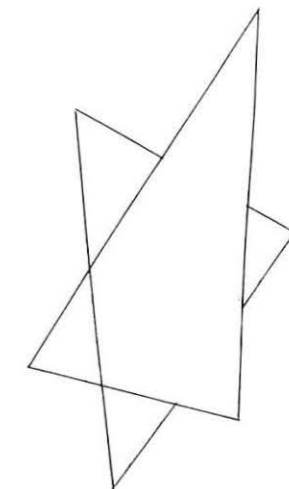
Bringing the evening to a close was the combined musical effort of the MVC Show Choir and Gospel Singers performing in Mabee Auditorium.

A sweet presentation of "Sugar" opened MVC's theater season Feb. 19.

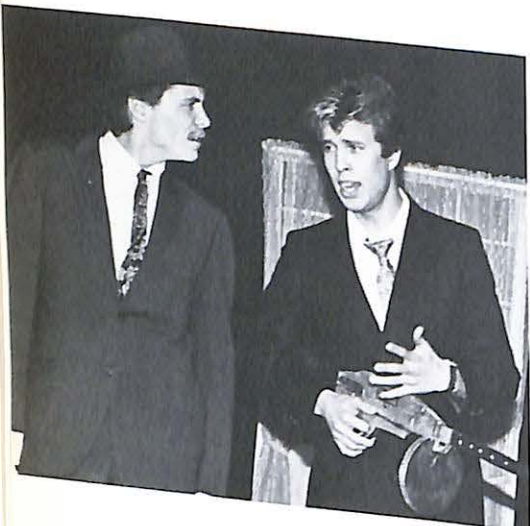

went well overall. "Just to see the kids finish is the most rewarding part. It doesn't matter to them where they finish, as long as they do. This is a special day for them."

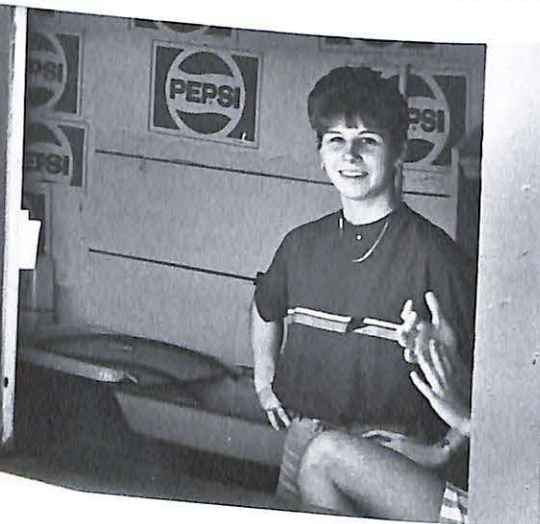
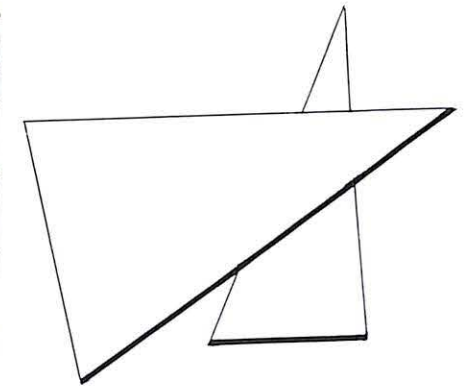
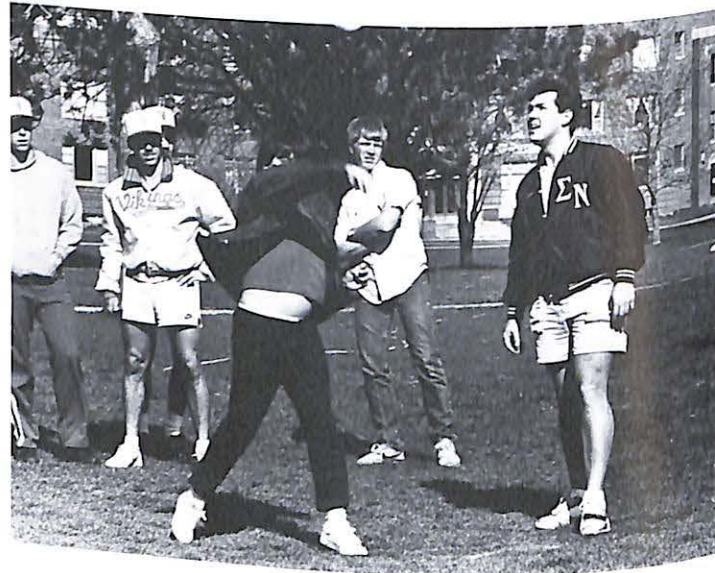

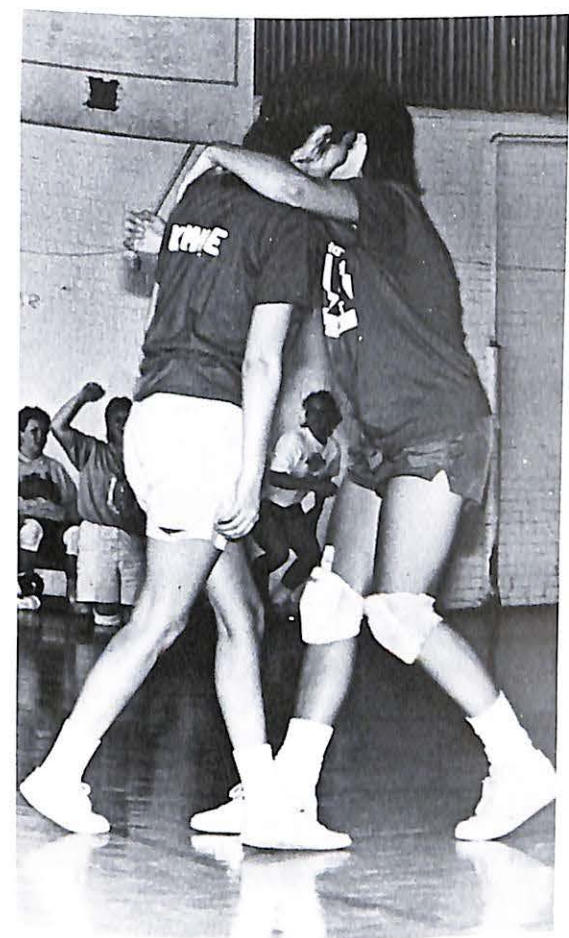
With its wins and places TKE amassed 35 points to Sigma Nu's 32 and Alpha Sig's 24.

In sorority competition, ASA won all the events but quiz bowl and volleyball.

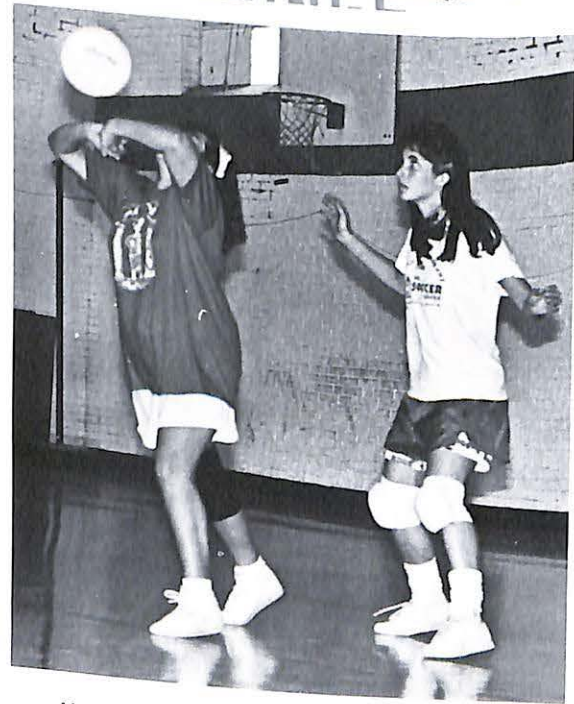

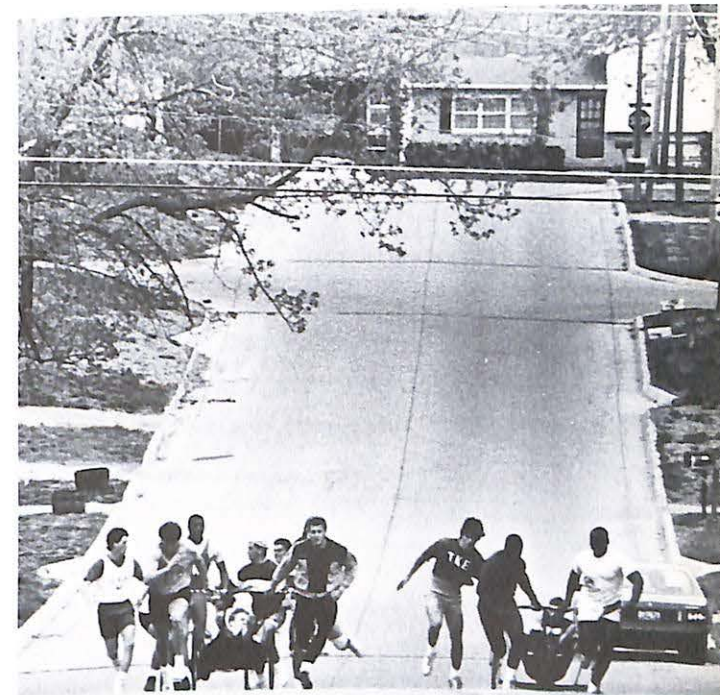
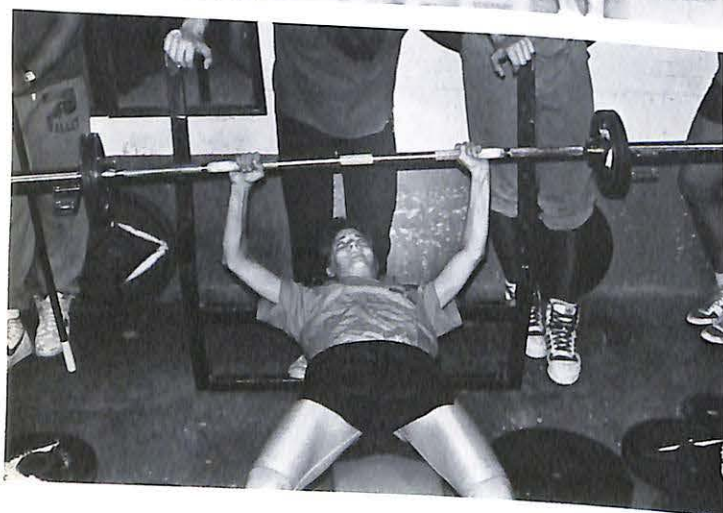

"Doing it this way created a worship atmosphere rather than an entertainment atmosphere. I thought it went well," Malan said.





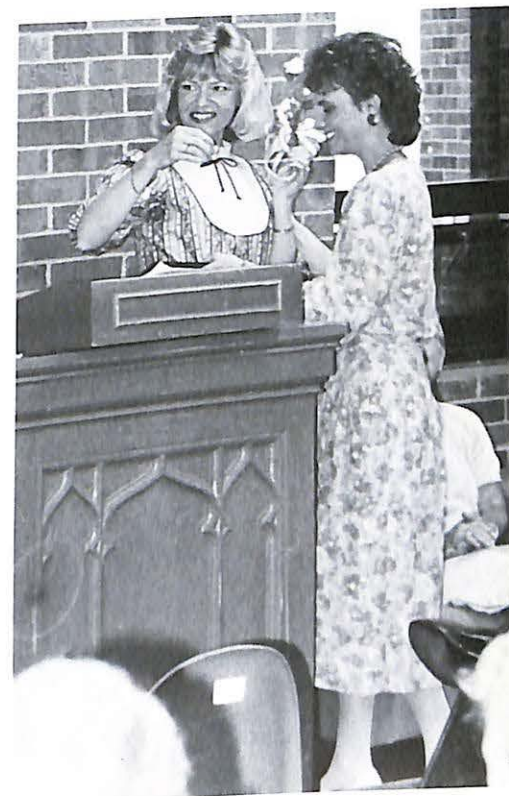
Student recognition

Intramurals: 3rd Moreland wins intramural title

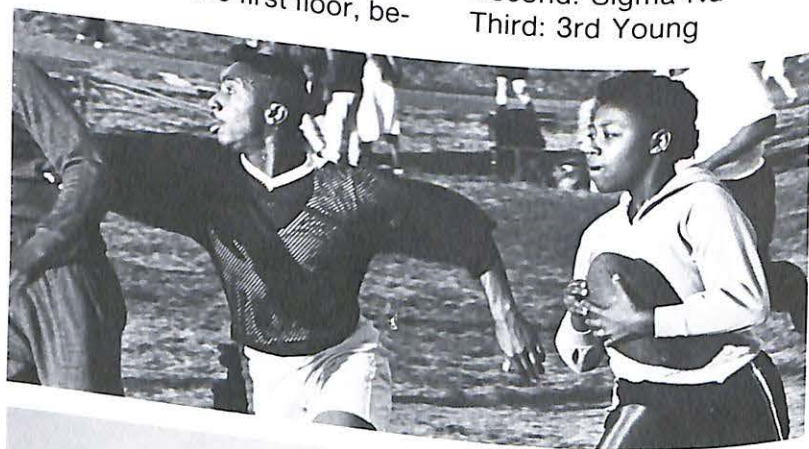
Third floor Moreland won the first overall team intramural championship under a new scoring system implemented by the Office of Student Life.

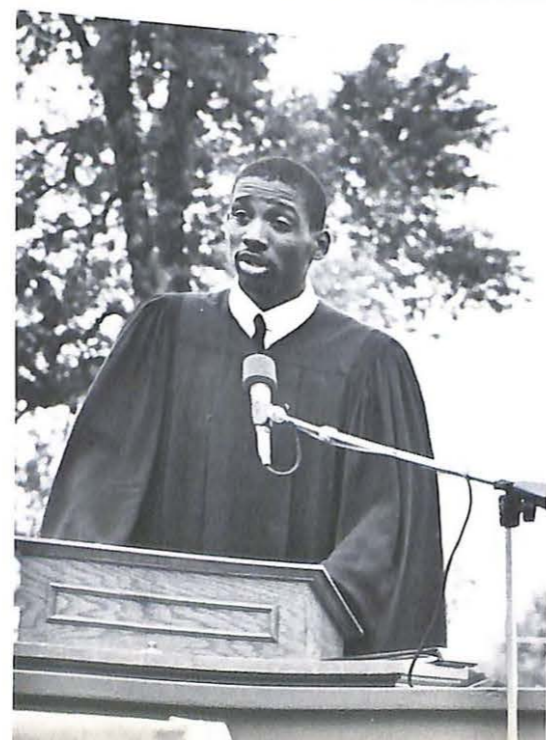
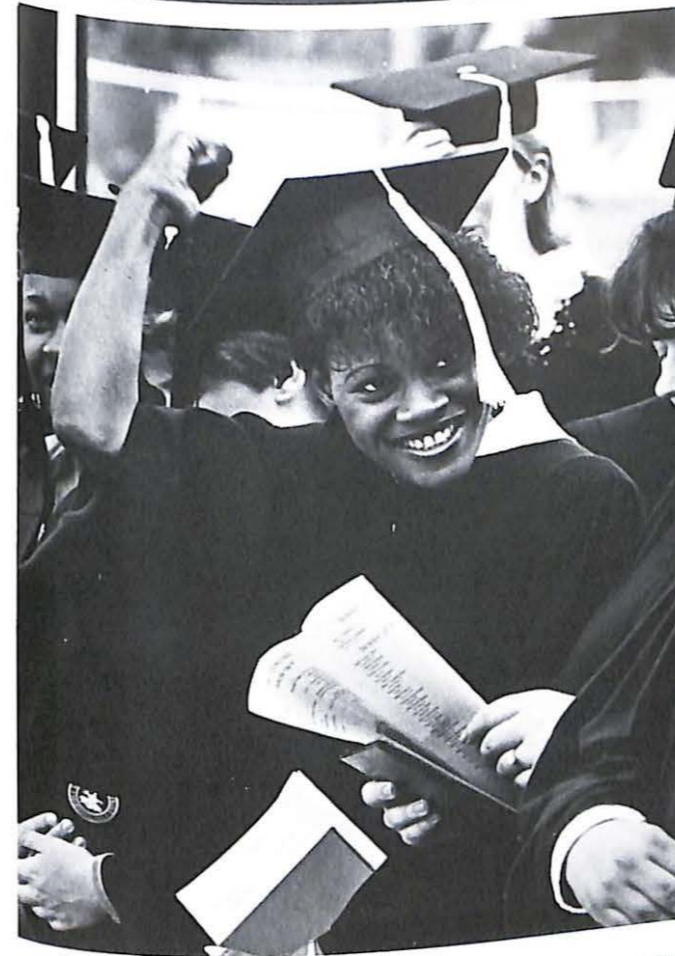
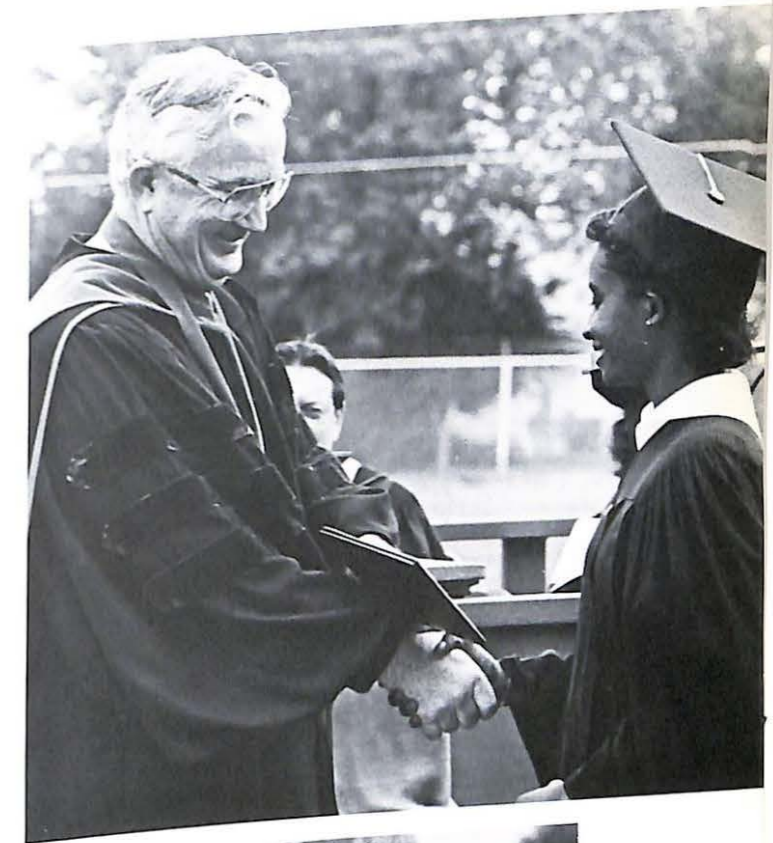
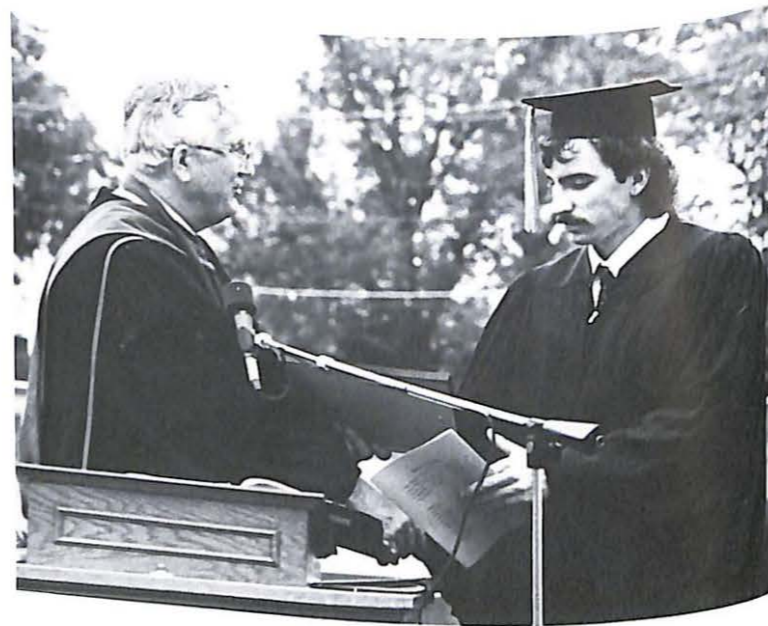
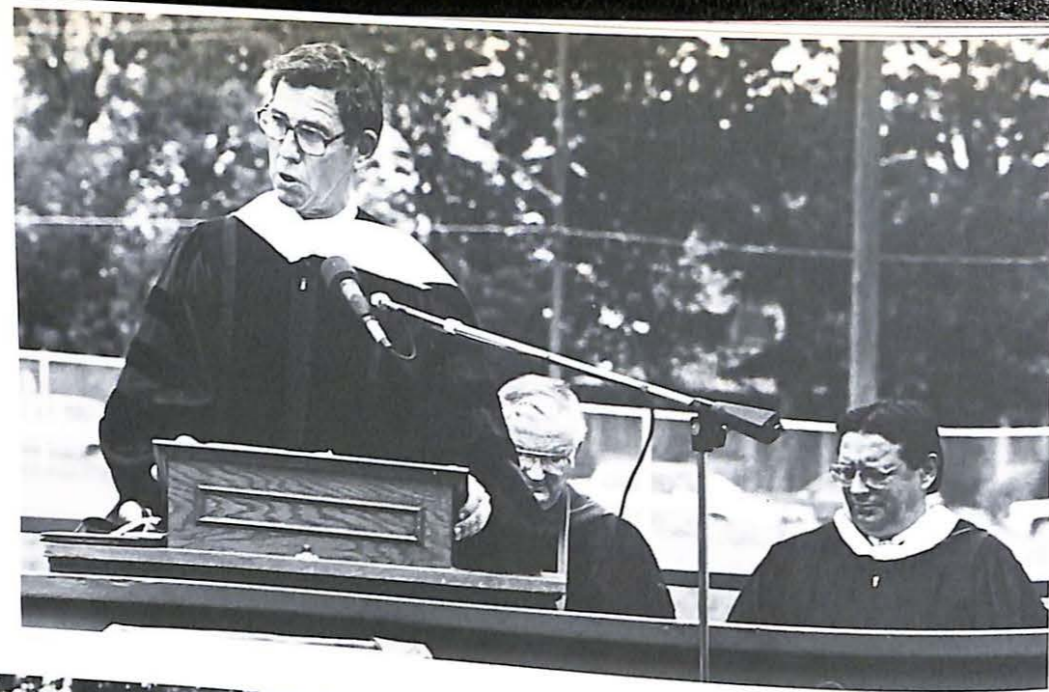


Ninety-ninth Commencement

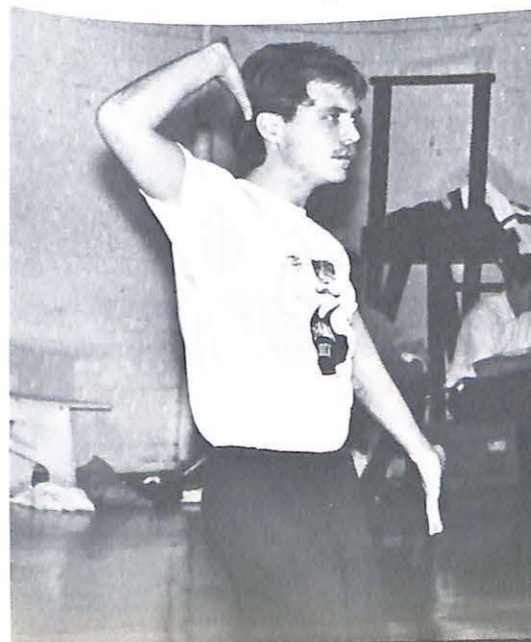

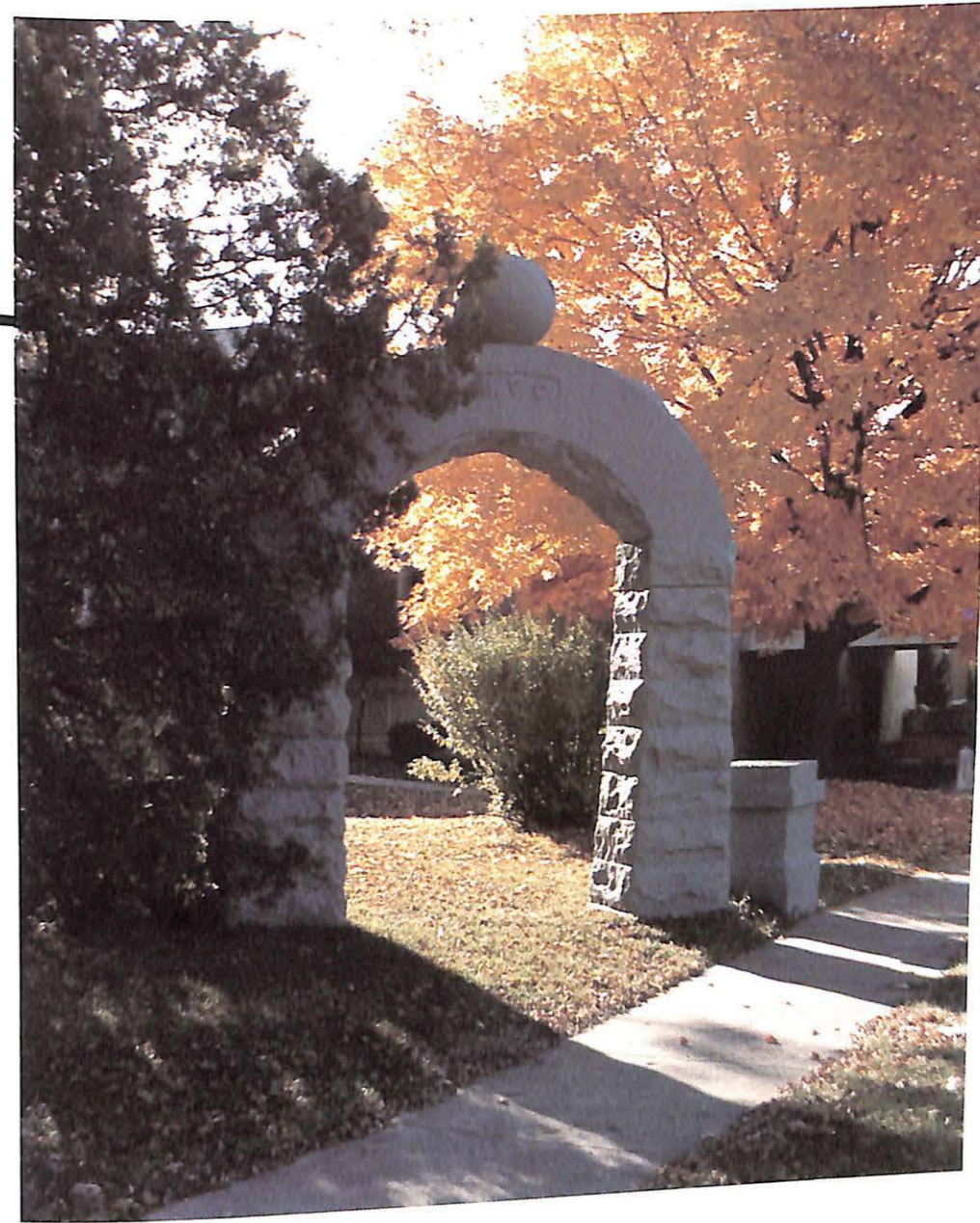

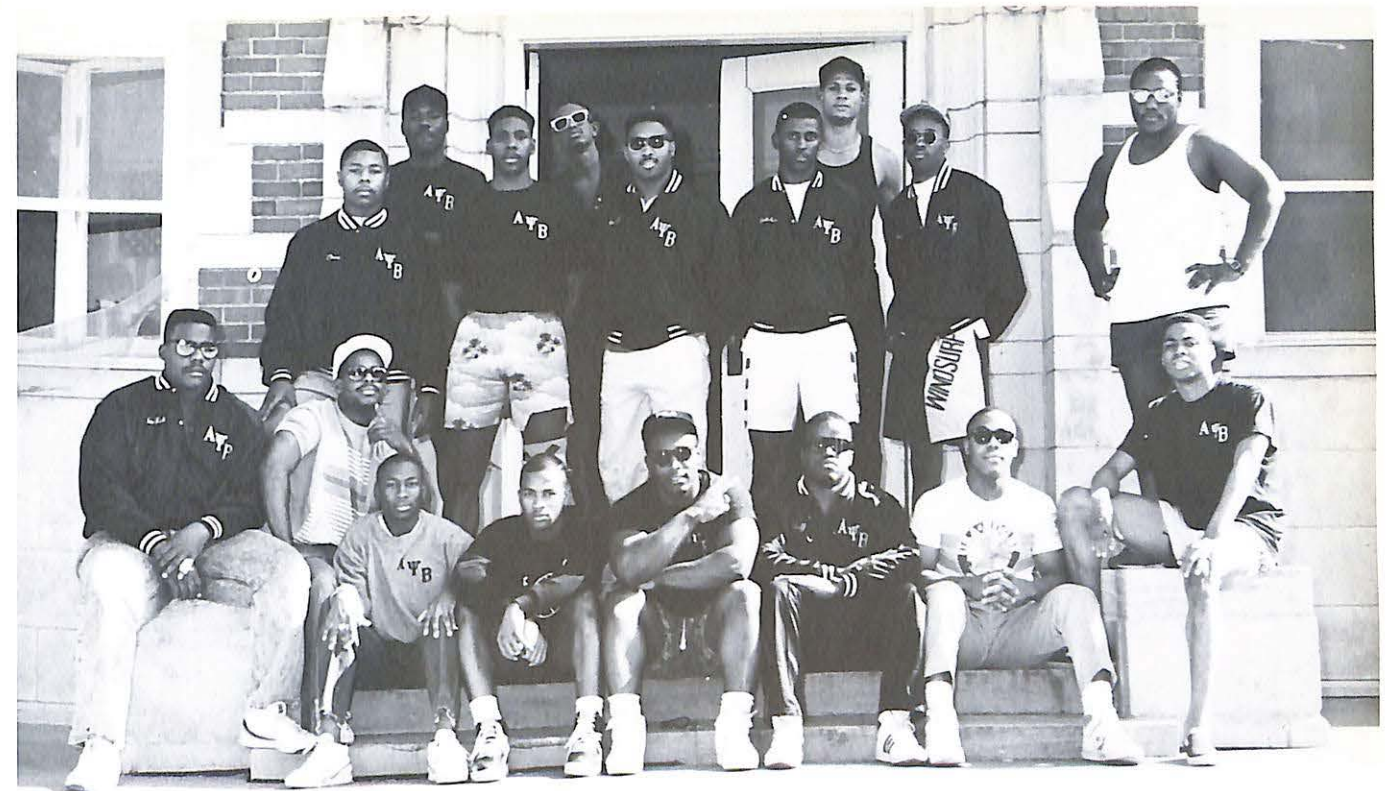

It was a season for the Missouri Valley football team to challenge for the title. In pre-season coaches polls



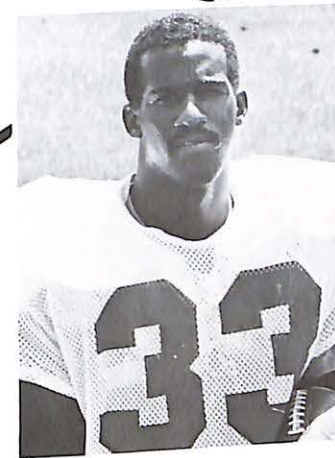

Missouri Valley finished the season with a 19-13 mark overall, 9-5 in the Heart of America

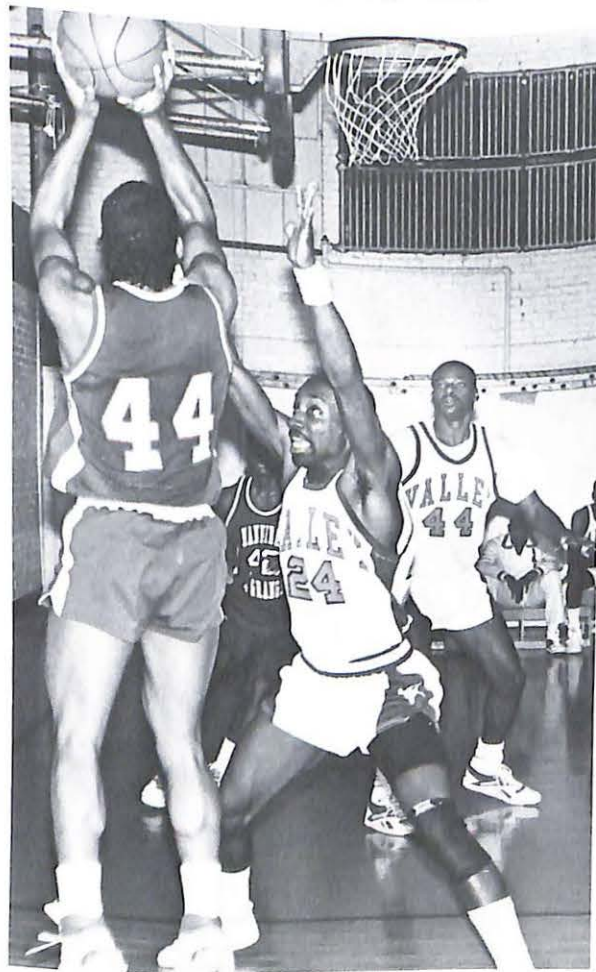
Conference. The Vikings weren't far behind William Jewell, which won the league with a 13-1 mark, and were in the race until late in the season.

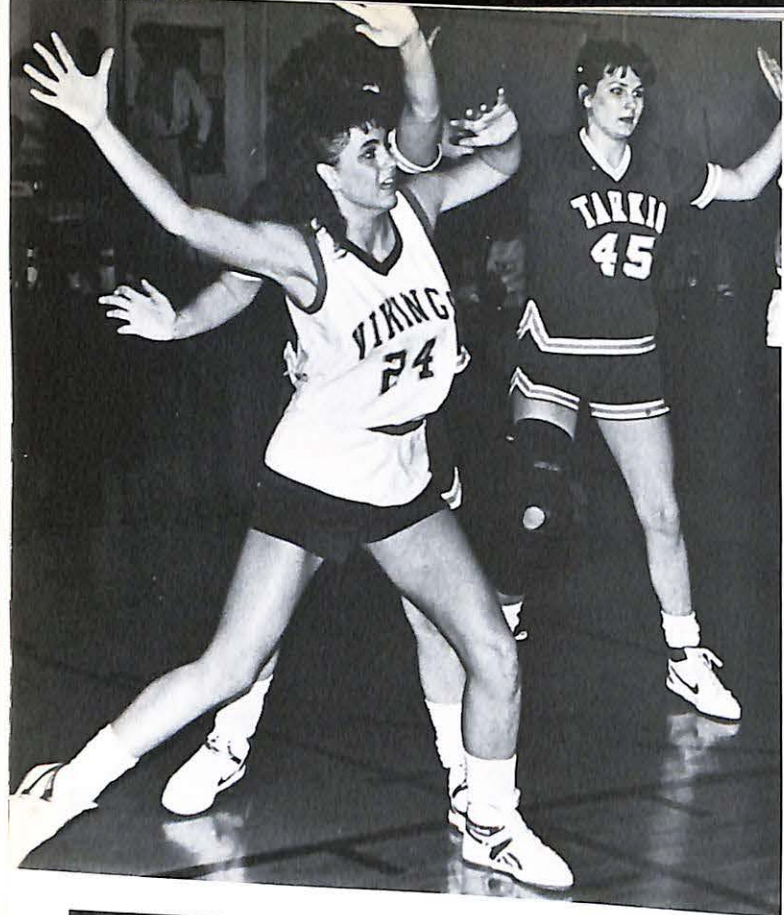


Lady Vikings take third in HAAC race

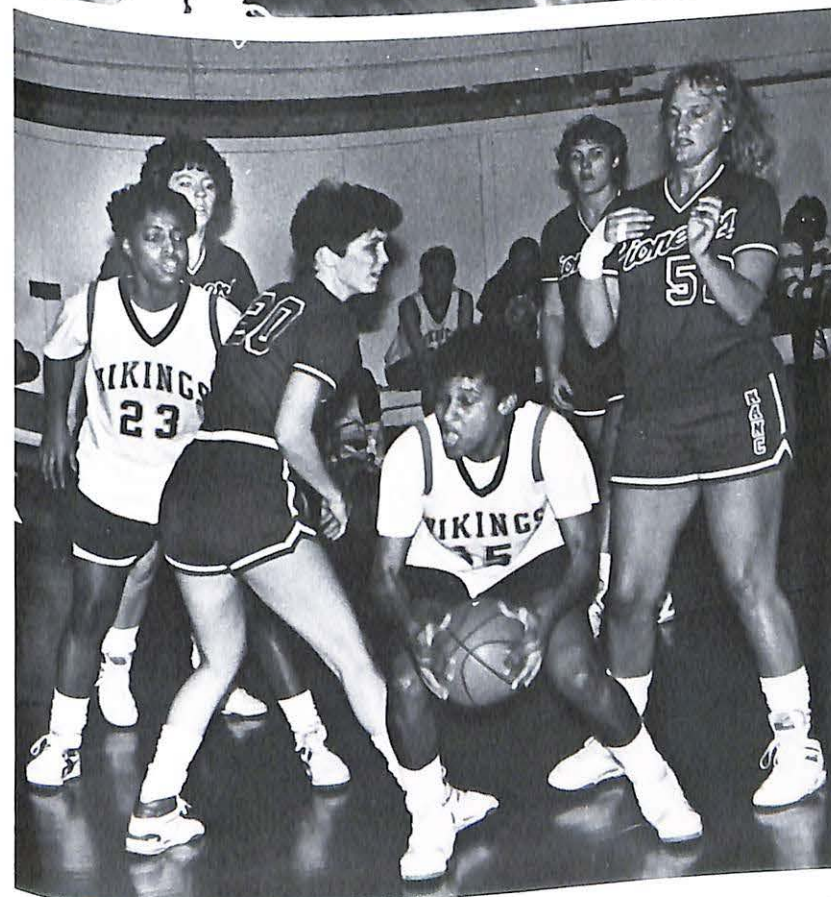

In the women's competition, Susan Artkras won the javelin and set a new school record of 125.3 yards.

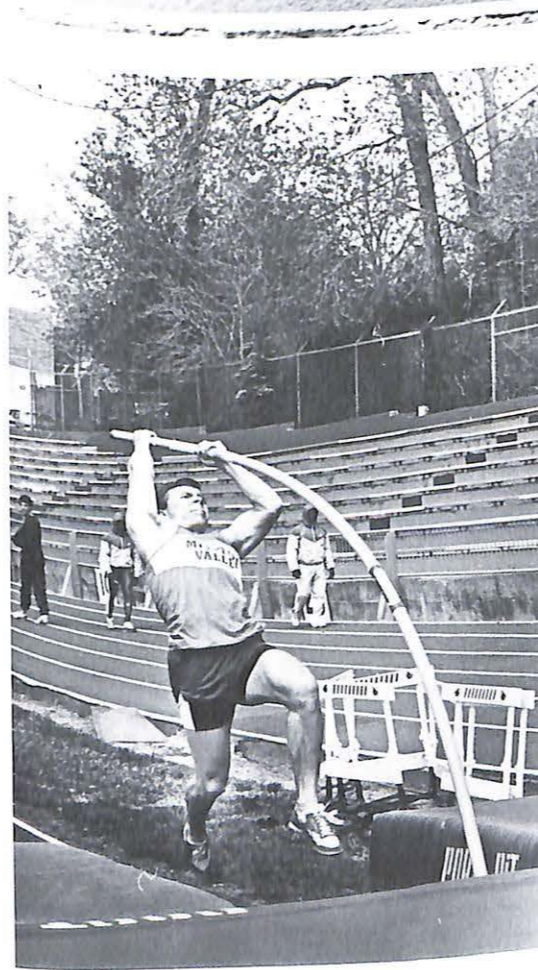

Washington finished fourth in the long jump, giving her 17 and three-fourths team points in six conference events. Hall took fourth in the triple jump.

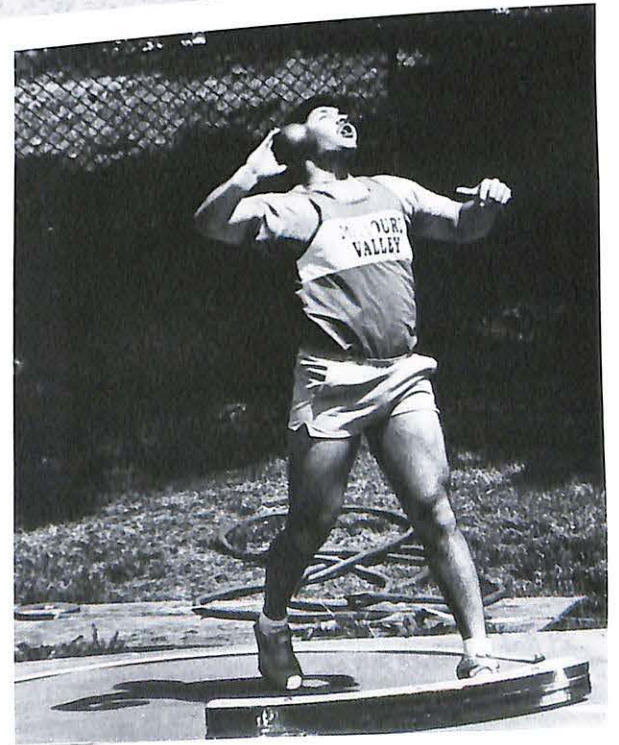
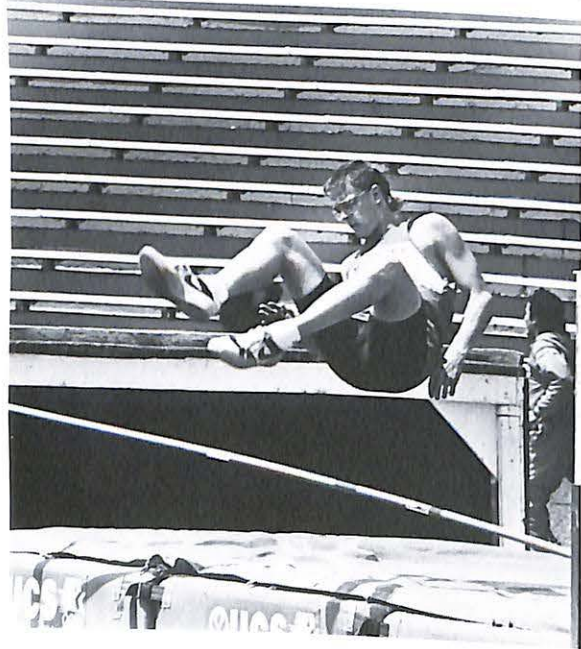

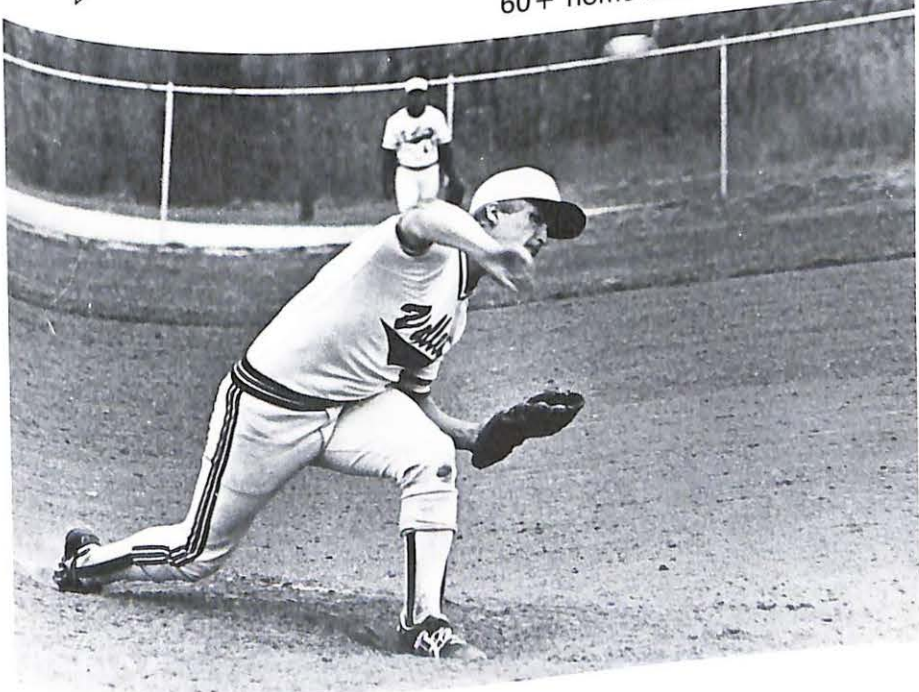
record. For the season, MVC finished third in Heart of America Athletic Conference play with an 8-6 mark. The Vikings were the only team to beat the league champ, William Jewell.

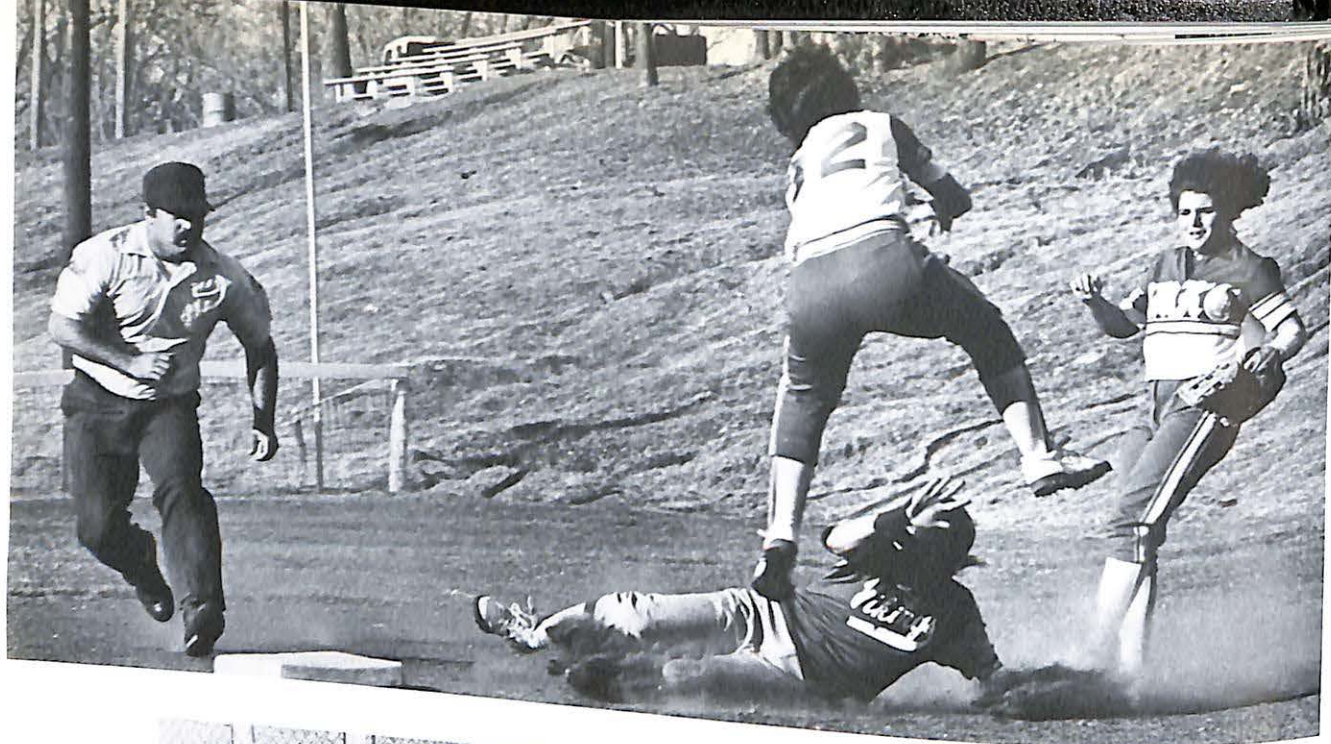
The Vikings finished sixth in District 16 play and advanced to the district tournament where they fell to School of the Ozarks in the first round.

The Vikings recorded wins over UMKC, Westminster and Hannibal-LaGrange.

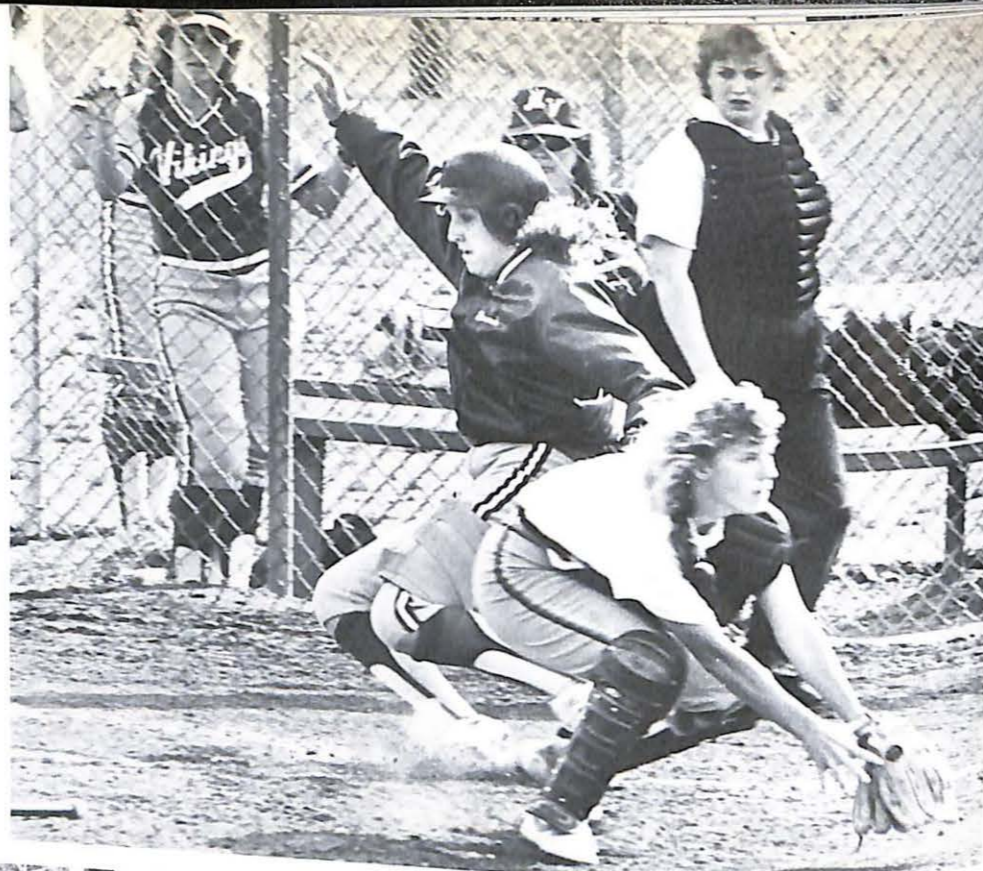
Sophomore Felicia Santana was named the team's most valuable player and honorary captain. She was also named as an honorable mention on the all-HAAC team.

ed or supported by the faculty include a planned London Theater Inter-term, off-campus extension programs, and a vigorous and popular theatrical performance schedule.

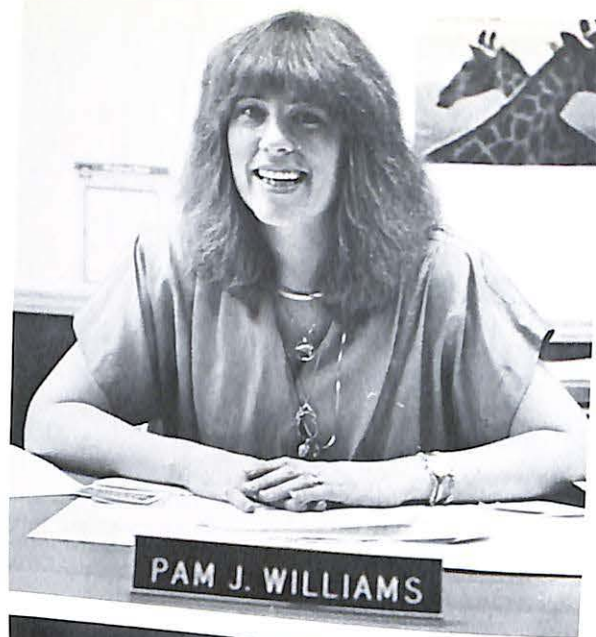

I've had and all the instructors that drilled me real hard, I think I'm ready to step forward and take whatever challenge is put before me.

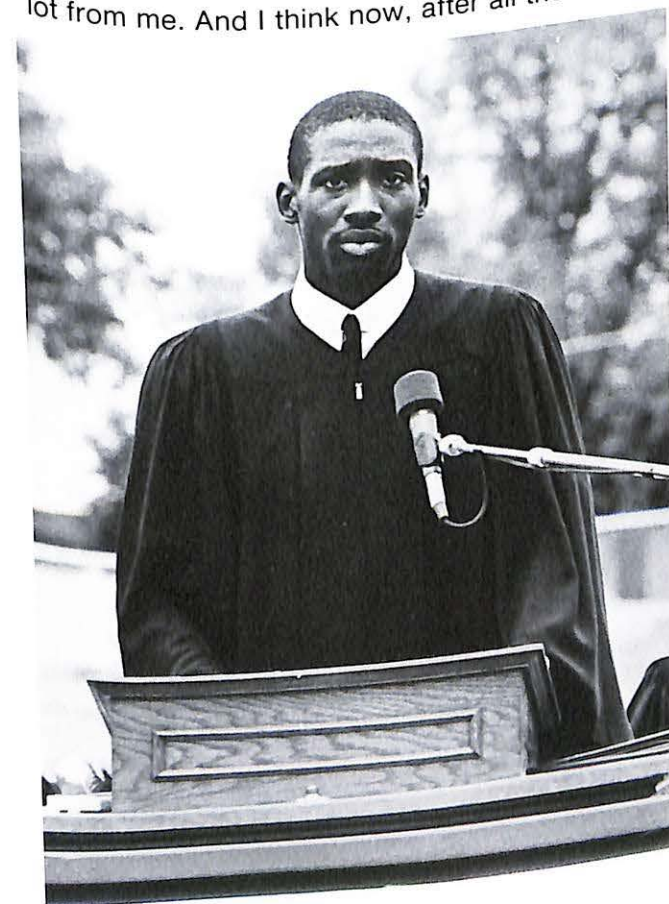

And there's one other person I'd like to thank, but he's not here today. I'd like to thank my grandfather because if it wasn't for him I don't think I would have been here at all today.

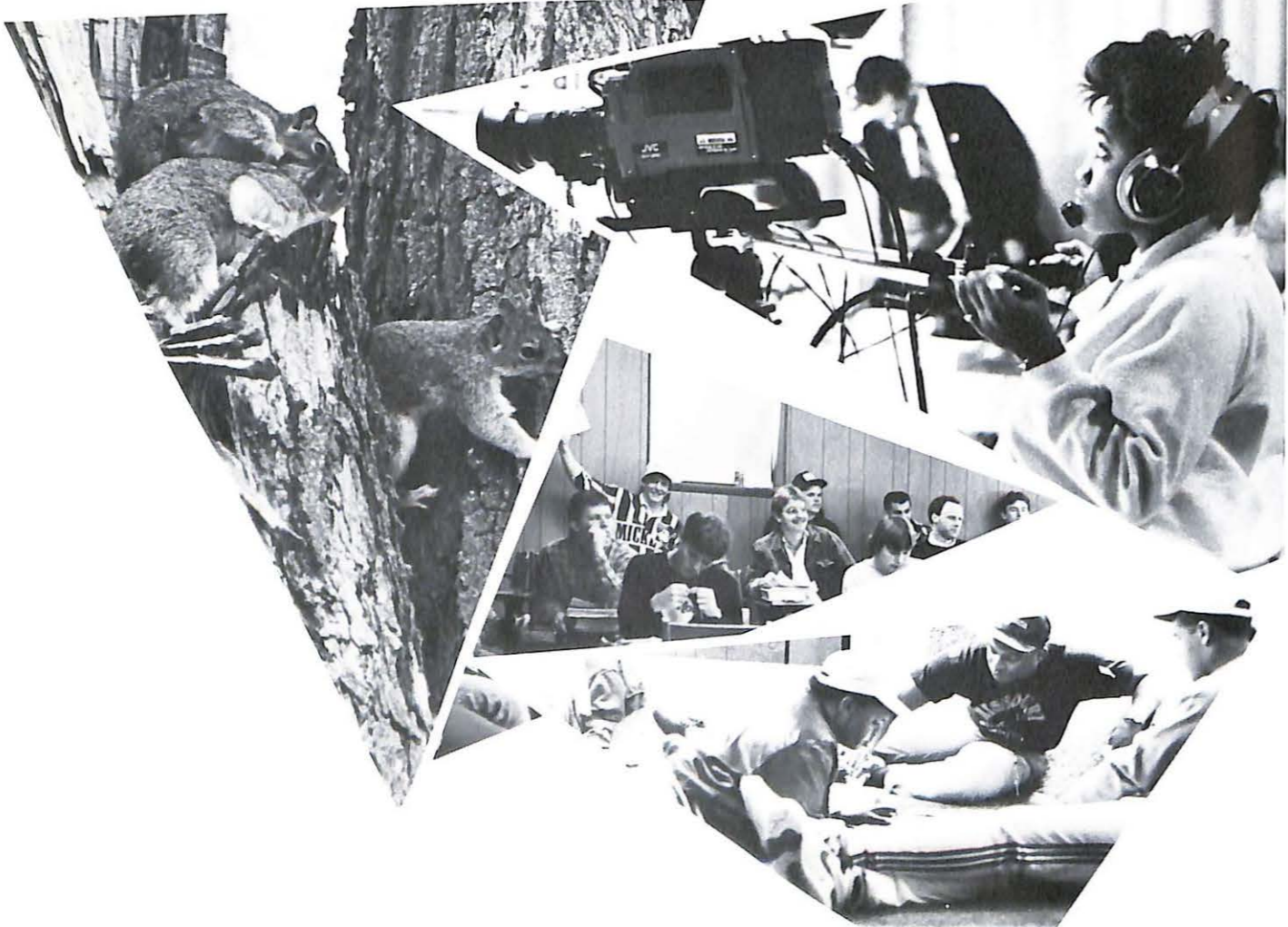
