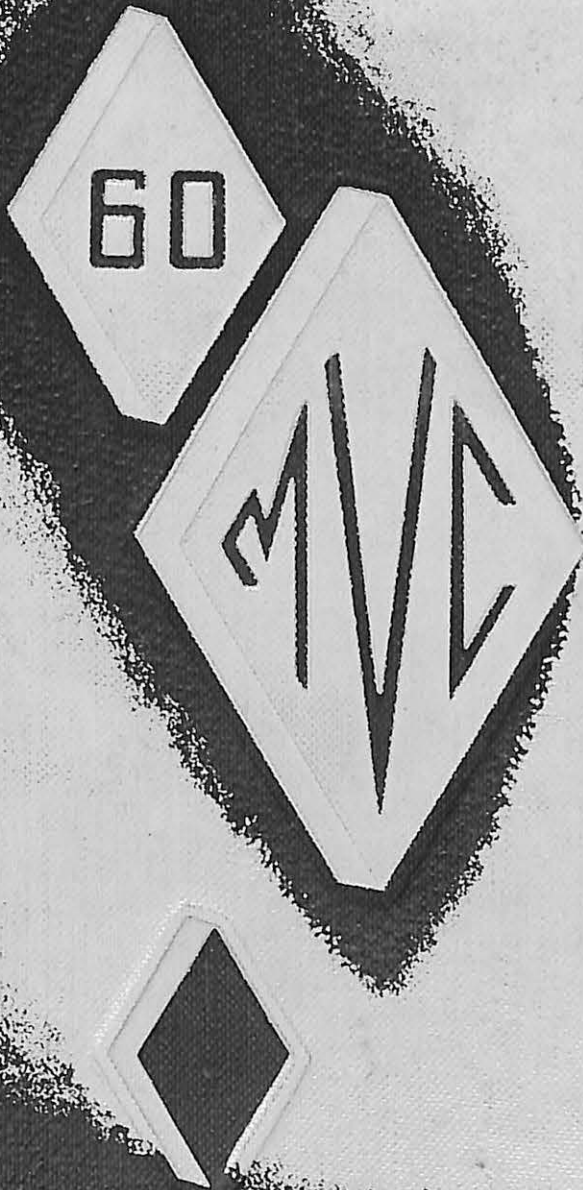

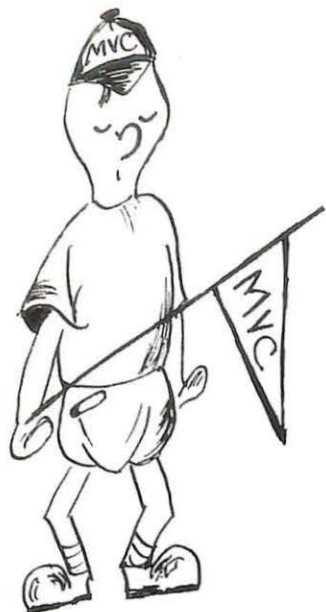

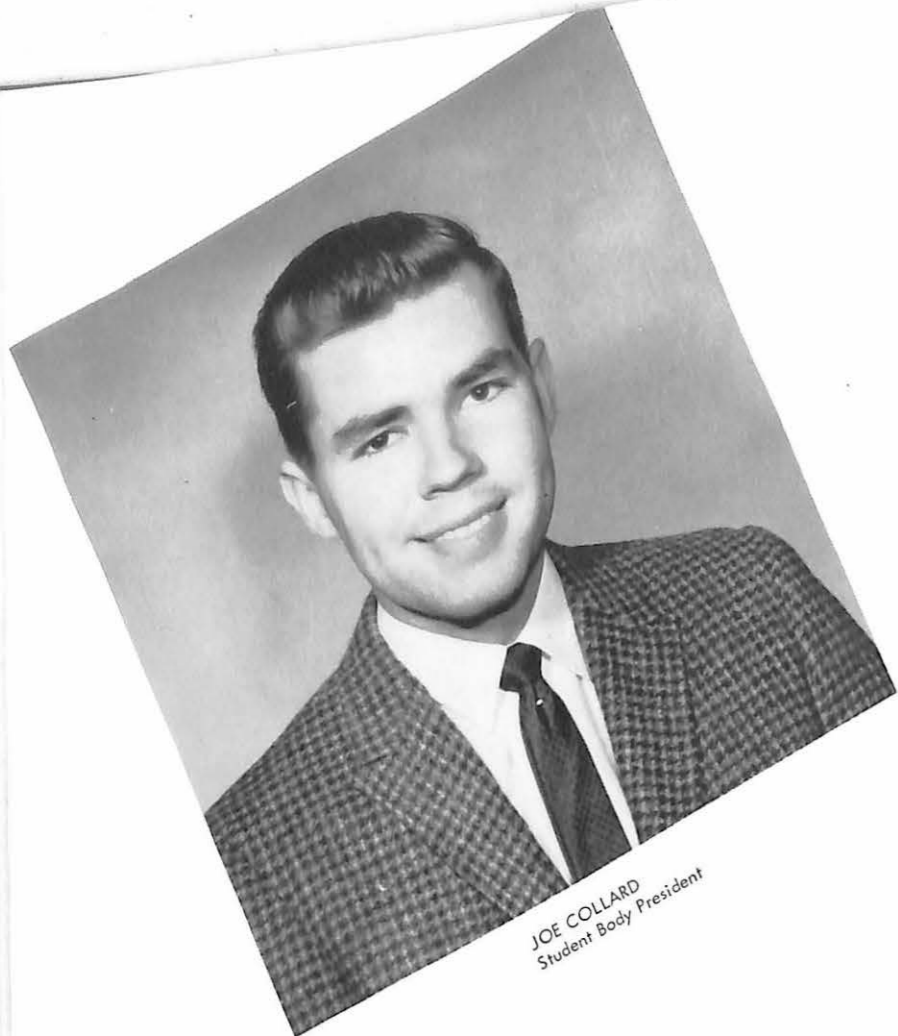

Mr. Ashford serves as vice-president supervising public relations and promotions and is director of athletics.

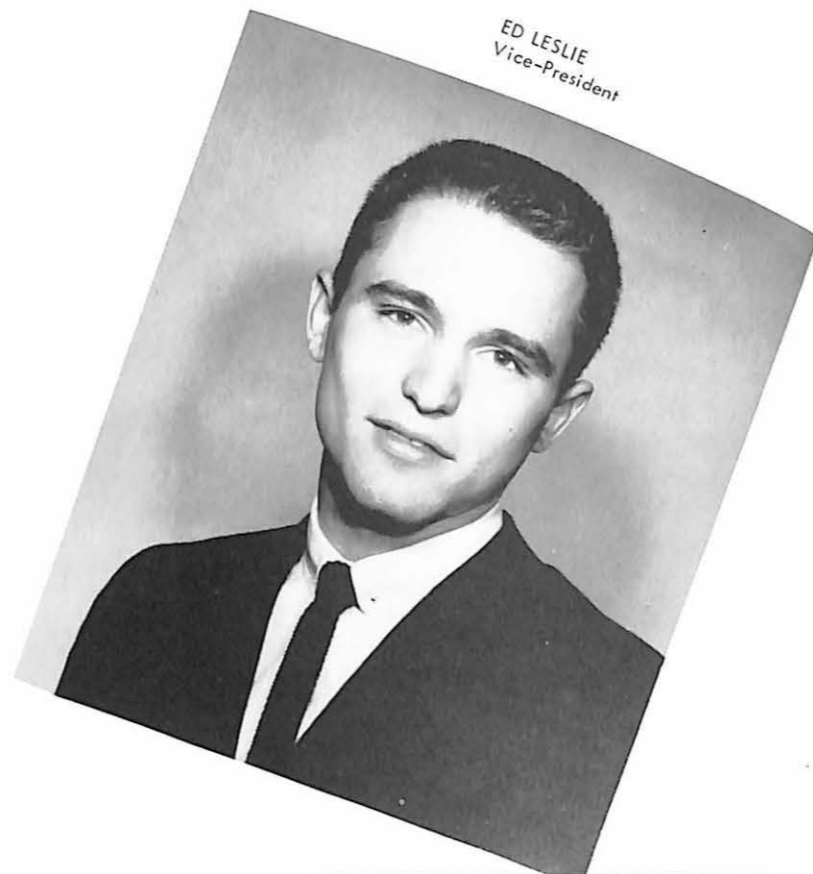
In the past academic year, Coach Ashford was recognized as "Coach of the Year" from the Football Writers Association of America.

This eager Viking squadron of 1959-60 let it be known that a Valley team had best not be underestimated in power, ability, and the zest "to play the game." Coming far along since the biting pre-season reports of the teams' being "inexperienced" and "incapable" of achieving a notable season record, this praiseworthy group of gridgers held true to Viking tradition by rolling to a 7-2 winning record for this past '59 season. In defeating College of Emporia's highly nationally rated "Presbies" 20-14 the last game of the season and in losing only four experienced players through graduation and ineligibility, predictions for 1960 are unlimited.

By losing a close 0-6 game with William Jewell the Vikes lost hopes for the M.C.A.U. Championship, but grabbed possession of a second place berth in conference play. The single other loss of the season was at the hands of Springfield State, who outscored Valley 13-6 in early season play.

The outstanding performances by many well groomed freshmen players have gained them the estimation of holding as powerful a future as any team in Missouri Valley history.

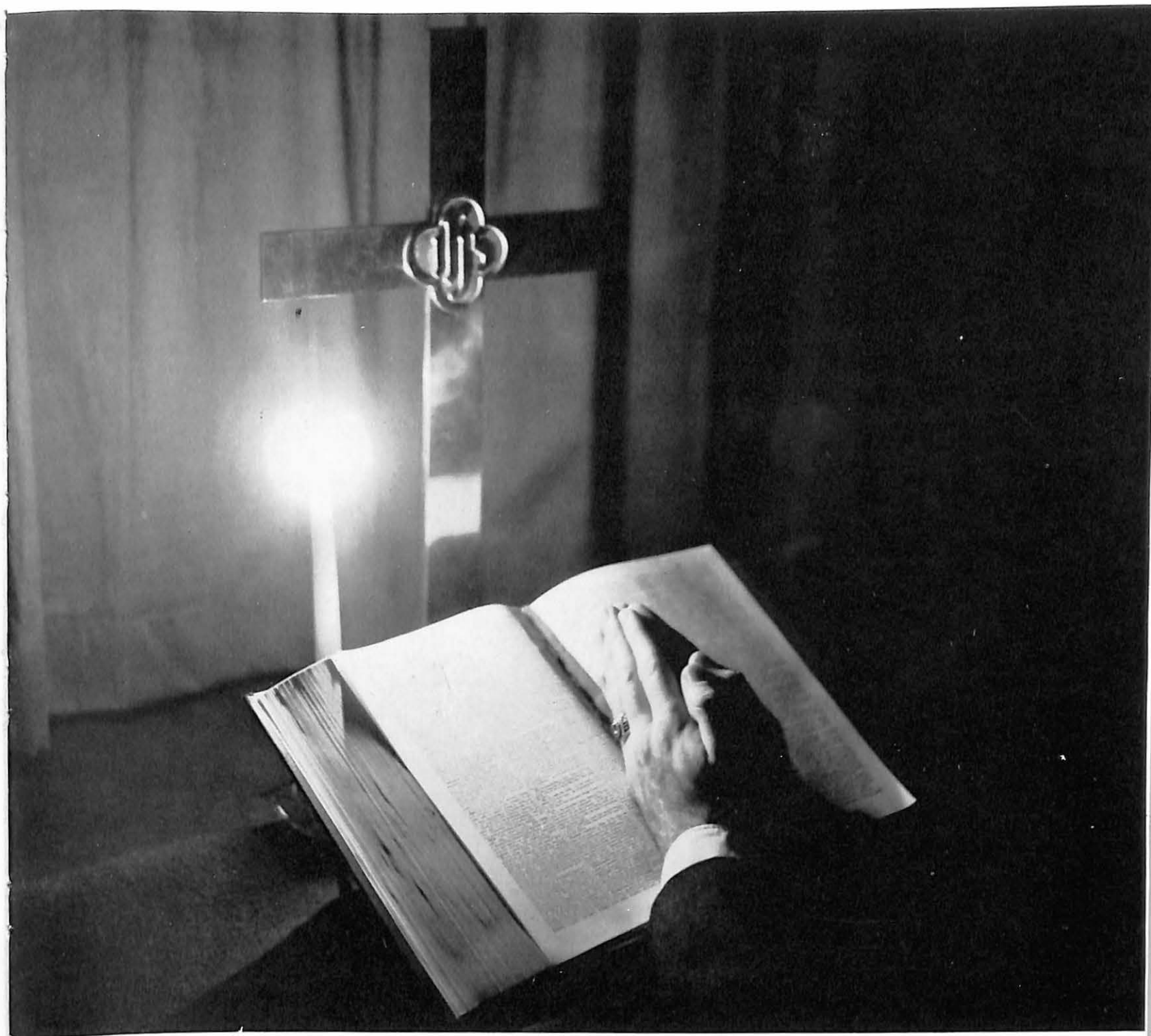
REV. WARREN NEAL

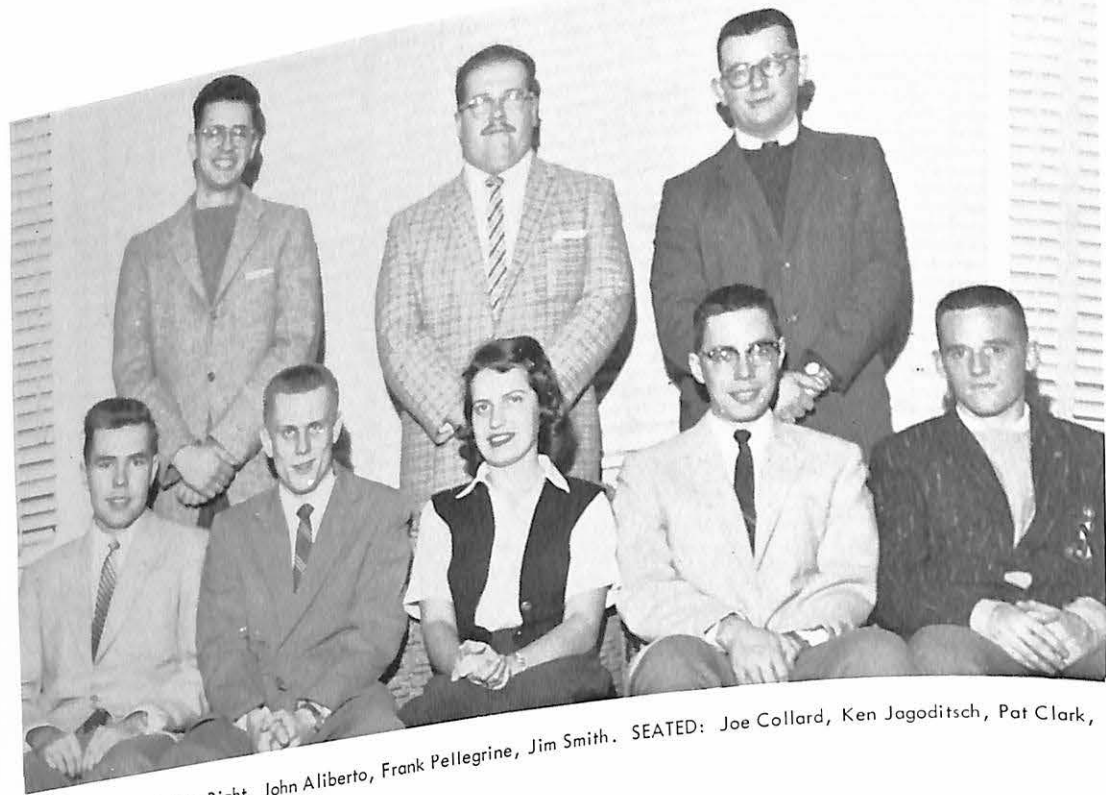
Religion----- an integral part of college life. Just as the college provides lectures for the mind, and dances for social life, it provides a religious atmosphere and religious organizations for the spirit.

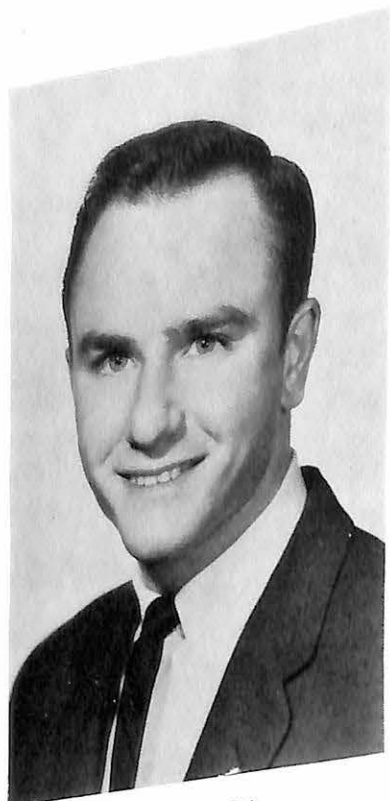

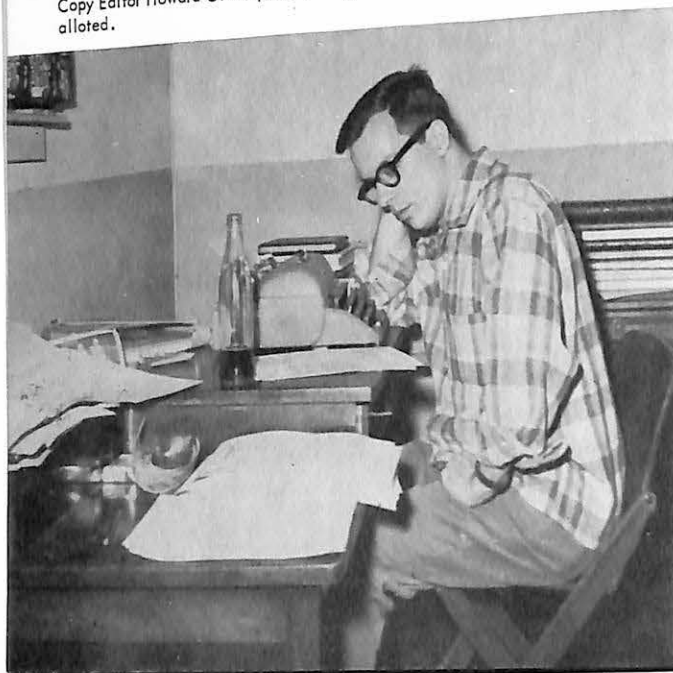

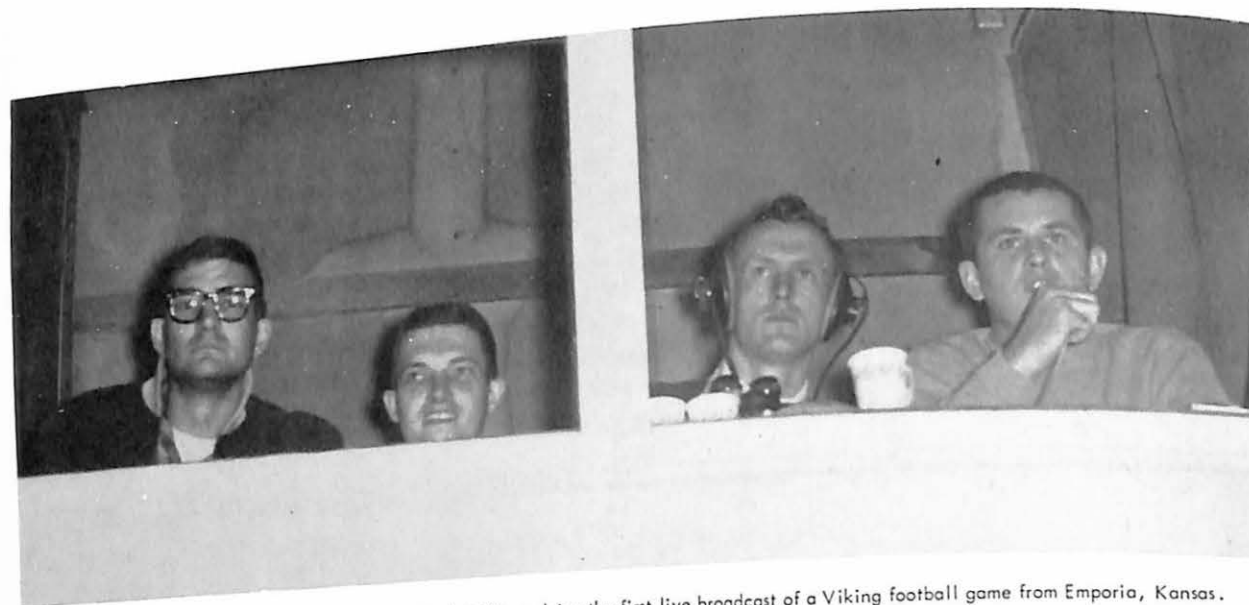
Presently, negotiations are under way to install a chapter of Pi Beta Epsilon, the national honorary and professional fraternity of radio on the Missouri Valley campus.

The station has a growing record library and is constantly endeavoring to improve the station facilities and caliber of programs. Immediate plans are in progress for acquiring services from the United Press International Wire Service for next fall.

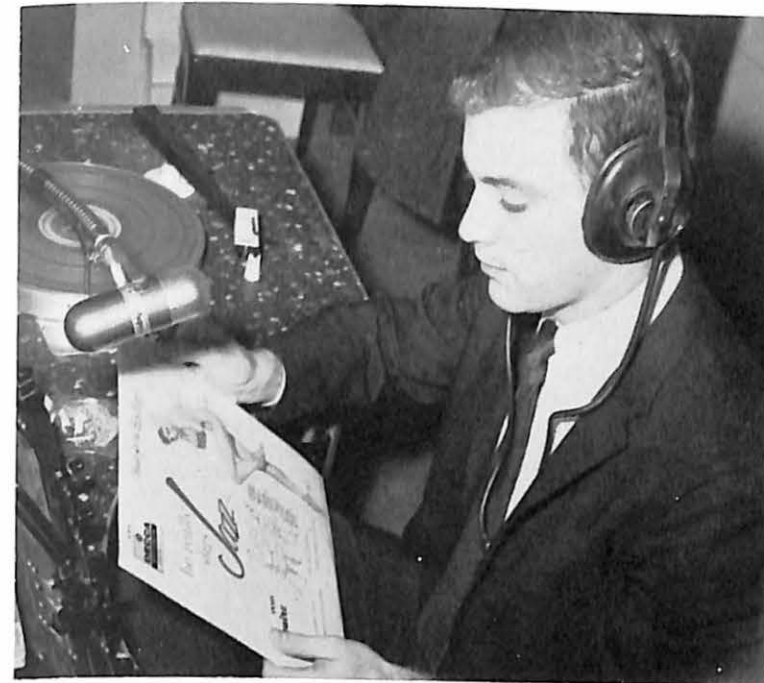

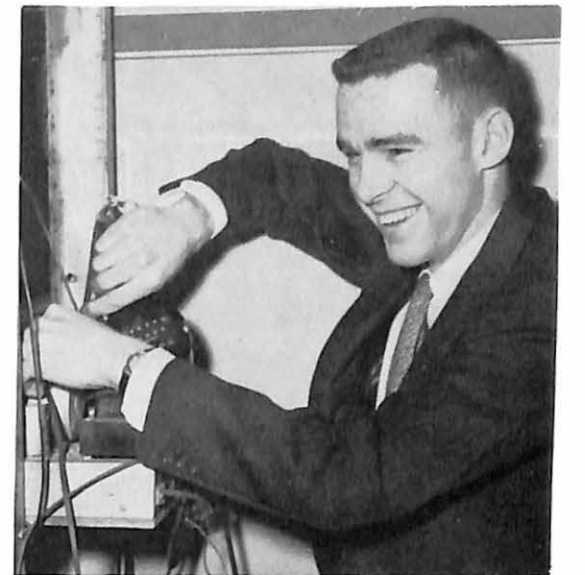

Alpha Xi Delta traces its history, on the campus of Missouri Valley College, to the spring of 1922, when a group of girls decided to form a type of pep club to support the athletic endeavors on the "forty acres." The following fall they adopted the name of Zoorizites.

When the name of the famous Norse warriors, Vikings, was chosen to represent the teams, the girls changed the name of their club to the Valkyrs. In the time of the Norsemen, the Valkyries were the maidens of Odin who conducted the souls of the slain heroes to Valhalla. To the Norsemen these maidens symbolized faithfulness and loyalty. These were the ideals which the Valkyries pledged to the student body of Missouri Valley.

In 1944, the administration ruled that all social groups should nationalize within one year after the war. After much careful deliberation, the Valkyrs chose the Alpha Xi Delta Fraternity. 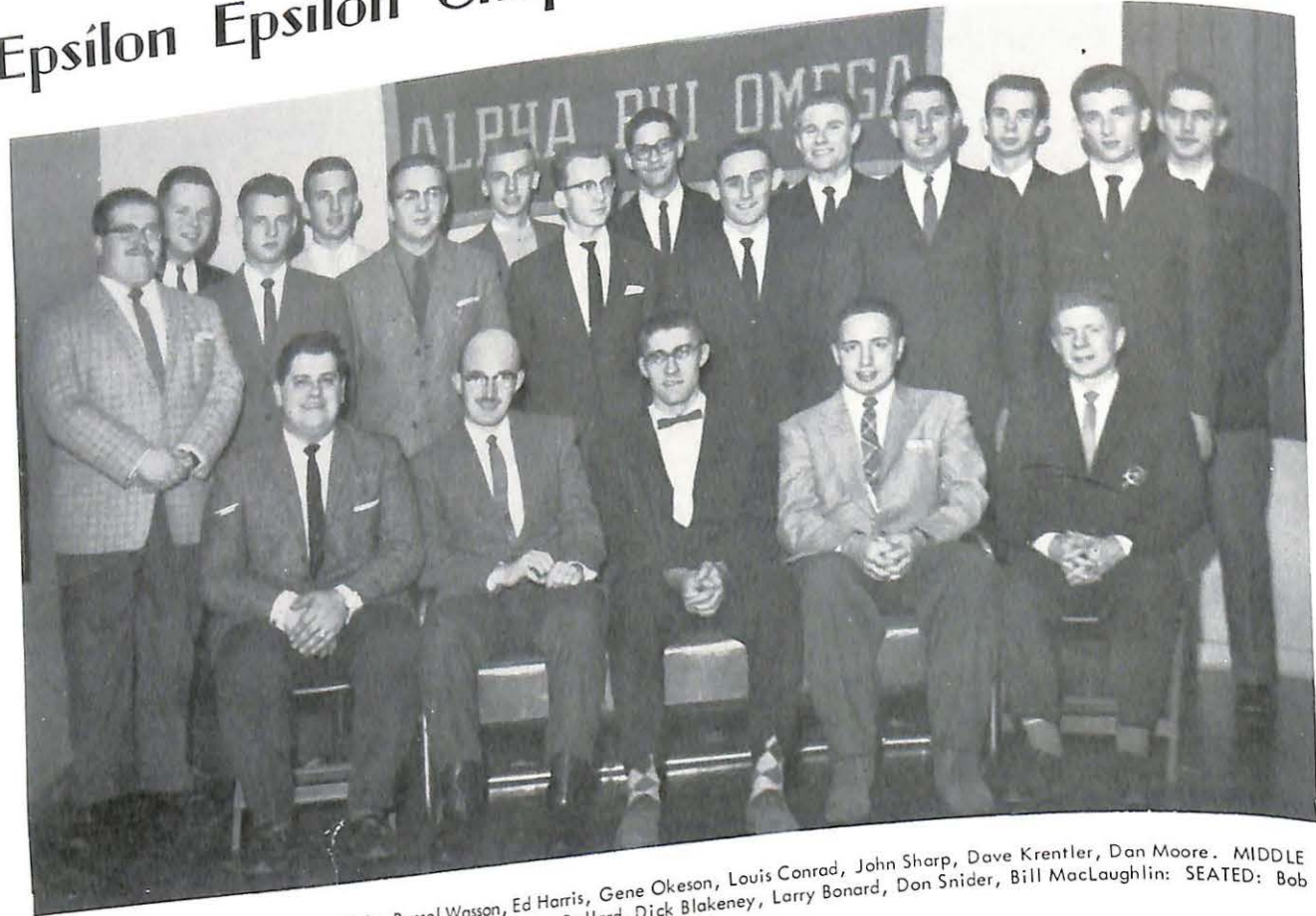

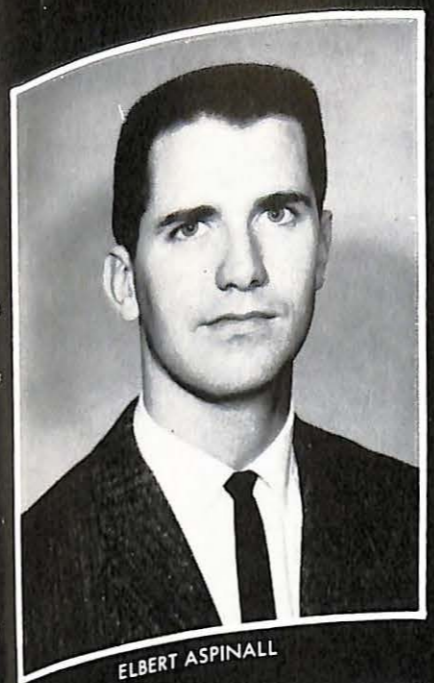
Honoraries

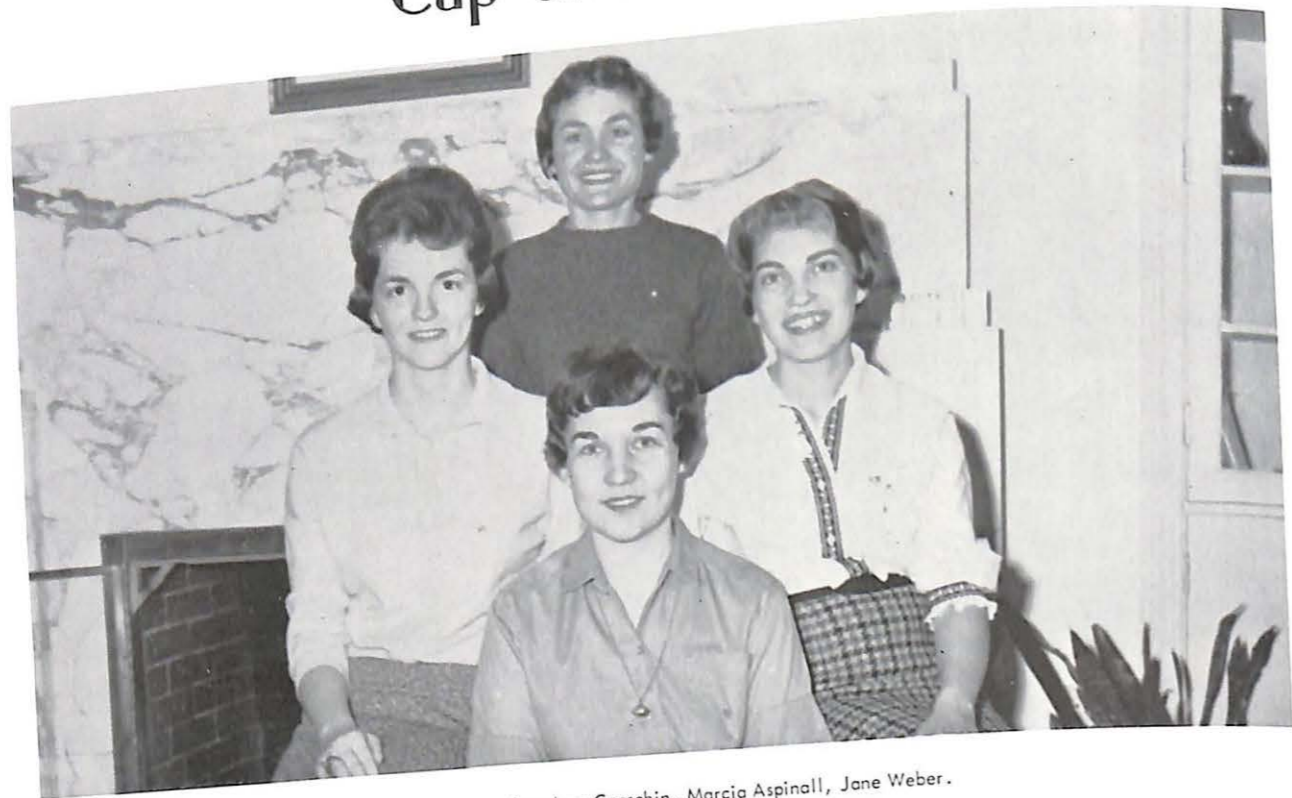

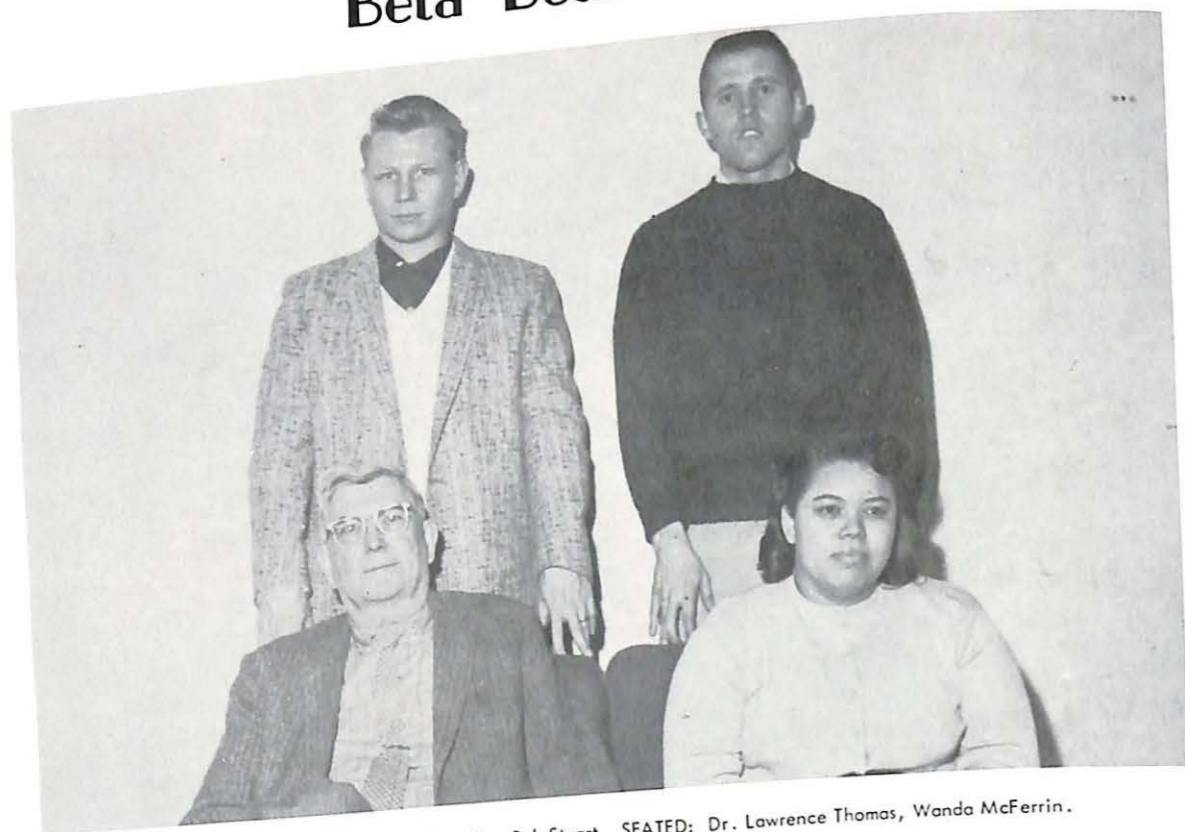

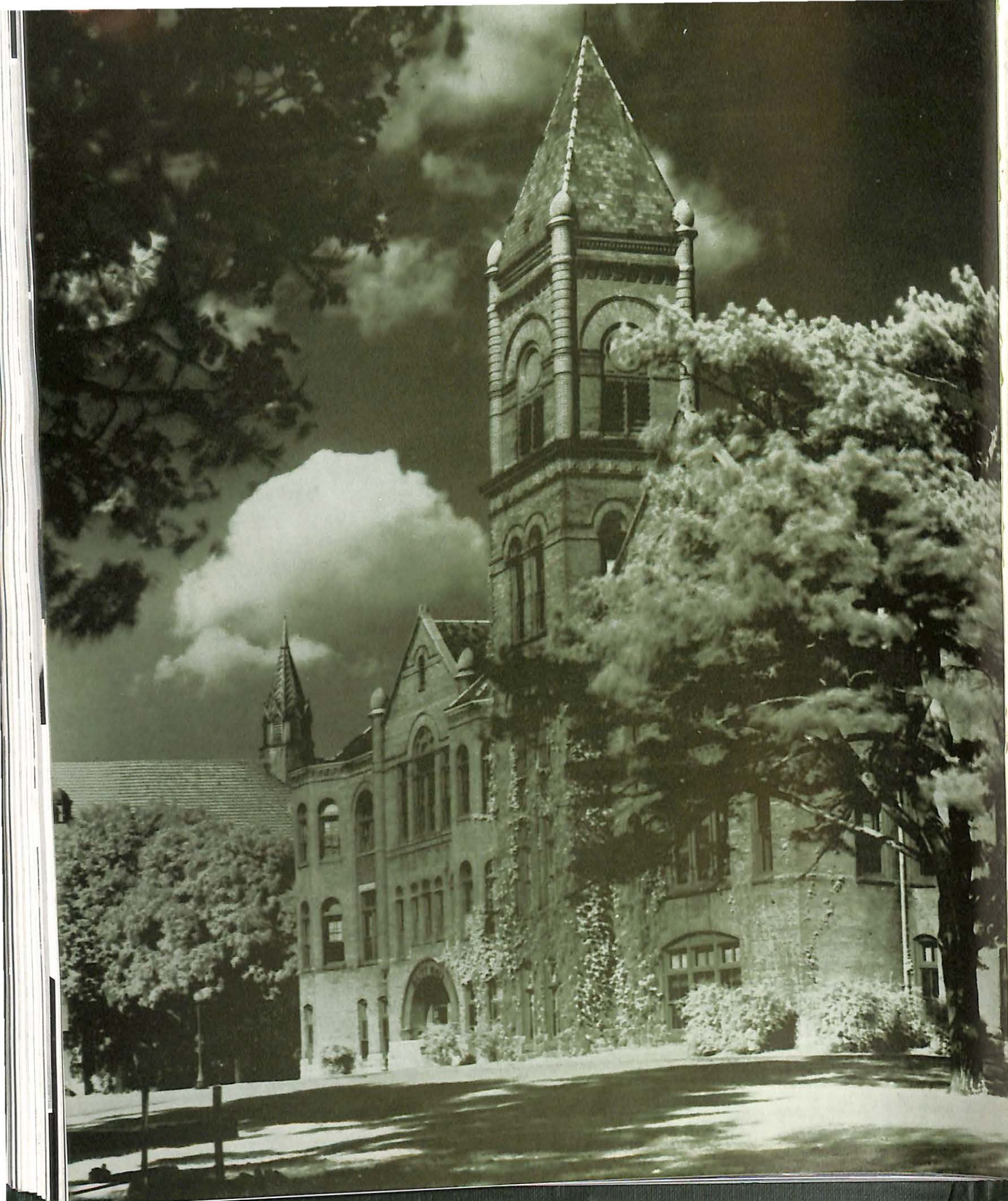
