WITH thirty-four years of continued striving behind it, Missouri Valley College, on December 17, 1923, came into a full realization of a Championship Football season by entertaining the squad and coach as guests of honor at a banquet in Morrison Gymnasium.

By defeating Central, Westminster, William Jewell and Drury, the Vikings won the clear title of M. C. A. U. Champions; then by tying Warrensburg and overcoming the Springfield Teachers, one of the great football teams of the state, they won the undisputed title of Champions in the M. I. A. A.

The banquet hall was the scene of many miniature football gridirons upon which games of the past season were played over and over during the evening. Above the speaker's table hung a huge football, the exact imitation of the gold balls awarded to members of the team winning letters.

The one strain that permeated all the talks was not the gloating over a victory, but a spirit of unity, a Viking Spirit, the spirit of giving all whether it was to result in a scored victory or a defeat. The haughty air of conqueror was not even expressed or intimated, but a sentiment of humble striving and more concerted effort for the greater seasons which are to be. In the talk of Mr. Godfriaux, he warned the student body, the team, and the town people against the follies of victory. Never before had the speeches at a Football Banquet of Missouri Valley College been so impressive.

After the talk of the Captain of 1924, Joe K. Swisher, Dr. Lowe presented the Tokens of Faith to the boys who had won their letter this year. They were Armentrout, Maddox, Johnson, Swisher, Durrett, Holliday, Lockridge, Limberg, Tegler, Garceau, Morgan and Porter. Because Eddie Purcell and Tommy McCutcheon had worked so diligently in previous years for the development of a winning team, altho they did not play in the games this year, the athletic department allowed a gold football to be given to each of these men.

And so ended the Championship Football Banquet of 1923, the greatest banquet Missouri Valley College has had in thirty-four years.

Summary of the Football Season of 1923

"ALL OVER Missouri football banquets are being held in honor of football teams and football games, but nowhere else in Missouri is there a banquet to an undefeated team that not only gained its championship in its own association, but sent the champions of a sister association tumbling to defeat."

These were the words of Boone Gregg at the banquet at the close of the season, and these were the thoughts that swelled with pride the heard of each Viking when the "last game was over and the final whistle blew."

It was a victory that was justified, too. For three years Coach Godfriaux had struggled with squads of more or less satisfactory material, trying to whip them into shape. No success the first year, little more the second, but in the third only two defeats, and in the fourth the climax in an undefeated team. All of which proves the value of a good coach, who, in spite of difficulties and discouragements, kept working until the goal was reached.

Nor was this an off year for contesting teams. Jewell lost its only game in the M. C. A. U. to the Vikings, and then brought down the hitherto undefeated team of the Missouri Wesleyan's to their own level in second place. Both of these were as strong or stronger than they had been in many years. When the Springfield Teachers fell before the onslaught of the Vikings, probably the greatest victory of them all was hung up, for all the dope and football tradition that had won fame in the making by the Bears for the last two years went on the rocks, and the team that had won fame in Missouri, Kentucky, and Arkansas, and had made Missouri University sweat for a 10 to 0 victory, went down to defeat to the tune of 14-0.

Owing to the new alignment of Missouri Colleges, the State Teachers' Colleges and Rolla remaining in the old M. I. A. A., the other colleges having withdrawn and formed the new College Union, it was deemed wise to select the 1923 all-star teams to be found elsewhere in this Sabiduria.

However, there have been so many games between teams of the two organizations that a team of stars from all of the colleges was selected and also may be found on the same page.

With pride, too, we point to the fact that the Vikings placed three men on this All-Missouri team, an honor only equaled by the redoubtable Bears. The following tabulation shows how the schools of the College Union placed men on the first and second teams.

Although the players for the All-Star teams were selected absolutely without regard to the final standings of the teams in the Missouri College Union—and as final proof of that let it be said that the teams were selected before the Thanksgiving day games were played—nevertheless, the selections give a good line on the final ratings of the teams, proving again perhaps the fairness of selecting these teams as a result of a careful study of the opinions of numerous coaches, officials and critics who have watched the players in action.

The Missouri Valley college team, winner of the Union championship, placed eight men on the two teams, four on each. William Jewell, which gave the Valley probably its hardest battle and surprised Union followers by upsetting the

powerful Missouri Wesleyan eleven on Thanksgiving day, copped six places, three on each team. Missouri Wesleyan landed four, and oddly enough, these four places also were evenly divided between the first and the second teams.

Durrett, Missouri Valley, and Lattin, Missouri Wesleyan, are a pair of tackles who would place on several teams in the Missouri Valley Conference. Durrett was an All-State man last year. The 1923 season was his fourth year in college football. He is 21 years old, weighs two hundred and towers three inches above the six-foot mark. He is 21 years old, weighs two hundred and towers three inches above the six-foot mark. Coach Godfriaux used Durrett in a tackle position on the offense and at center on the defense. Durrett always could be counted on to open a hole for a quick darting halfback and on the defense he frequently was thru the opposing line to break up plays before they could get under way.

In Leo Lattin, Durrett has a tackle mate who tops him in weight by eight pounds, and adds an inch to the sky line. Lattin has proved a fine pass receiver on shift plays and has been a bear defensively.

Southard, Jewell, and Maddox, Missouri Valley, make a pair of guards whose poundage alone would make them hard to jolt off the scrimmage line. Southard packs 240 and Maddox 180. There's 828 pounds in four men, two on each side of the center. Hefty little line, eh? Southard played his fourth year. He has been a powerful bulwark in the Jewell forward wall. Maddox, in line with other shifts Godfriaux has made, played a tackle on defense and a guard on offense. He was a four-year man, aged 22, five feet ten, a sterling fighter and always an urge to his teammates in the way of maintaining the "fight."

Joe Swisher, Missouri Valley's "fighting fool," won the center position. This boy is an excellent passer, possessing a cool, level head under the most trying conditions. On the defense Swisher played a tackle position in true tackle style.

In Sydenstricker, Valley, and Matthews, Drury, the team has a brace of halfbacks worthy to grace any college eleven. Sydenstricker is a three-year man, age 21, 154 pounds, 5 feet 9, a gainer on the Valley team, seldom failing to negotiate his distance when the call came. "The sweetest half in the State of Missouri" were the words of Boone Gregg as he handed Tommy Sydenstricker his football letter—and all who saw this demon half in action, agreed from the bottom of their hearts. Let us call to mind one of the nevertobeforgotten occasions in the Springyards for him that time. No, there he goes racing to the right. There was a crash of bodies, only five of five. No, wrong again, there he goes tearing off to the left, leaving them empty handed again! The third time he was really downed, after going fifteen yards where the ordinary back would have fallen at five, and would have been downed at least twice.

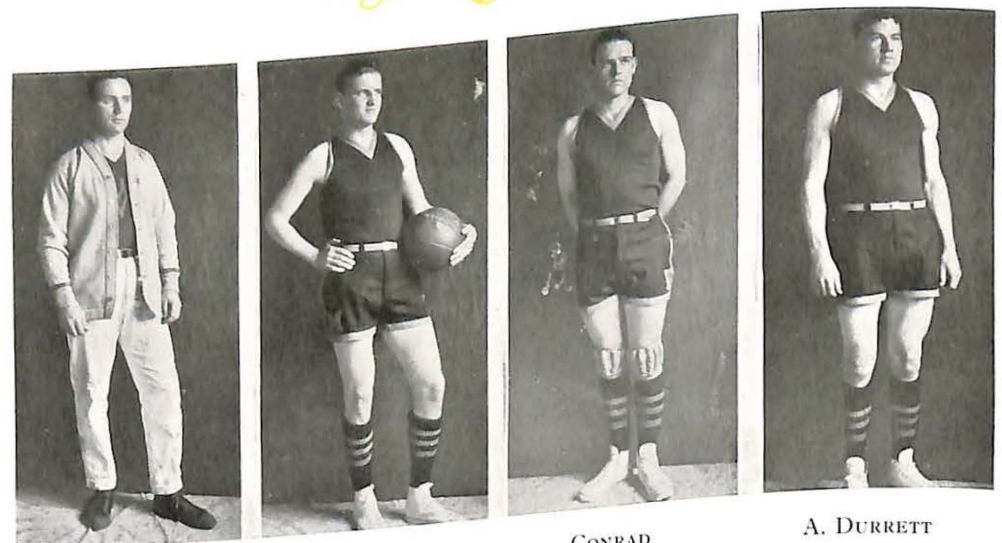
There are seven men on a football team who take up little space in the headlines, but who, unnoticed, must fight for all they are worth to pave the way for the ground gaining backfield. These seven men compose the line. The line of the Vikings for this season could be called a perfect machine, each part of which moved with smooth precision. Three of them gained berths on the all-star eleven, Durrett, Maddox, and Swisher; and the first two made the All-State. It was a line M. V. C. shall always remember.

One word to those who are going to carry on in the 1924 season. The Vikings of 1923 have laid down a record of clean, hard playing, of hard won and well deserved victories. May their spirit be transferred to you and may you carry the banners of the Vikings to as great honor as did they.
