The student plans the dance, and enjoys attending it; he selects his courses, and attends the classes; he scores a touchdown, and cheers at the championship game; all in all, the life on any college campus is made by the student and brought to a conclusion by him.

With this thought in mind, we present to the students, faculty, and friends of Missouri Valley College our interpretation of the typical college student as he wends his way through the maze of college activity. Our student bears the name Sabiduria, or in the informal Viking manner, "Sabbie" for short. As such, he will guide and direct you through this, the 1953 Sabiduria.

"Sabbie" is well versed in collegiate affairs, especially those of Valley. Knowing this, we are certain that he can adequately represent Valley to the students of today, to those who are now alumni, and to those destined to be Vikings in the future.

As you first meet "Sabbie", he enters the campus through the time-honored columns. The smile on his face tells everyone he meets that Valley is a friendly place. The determination in his walk, the lightness of his heart attest to the seriousness and good humor prevalent everywhere at M.V.C.

"Sabbie" is confident as he walks the well-trodden pathway toward Baity Hall, for he long ago learned that college and all its aspects are a cooperative endeavor. Could you read his mind, you would see there, deeply engraved the basic principle that the future years, the coming days will return to you what you have given to them.

There seems to be a song in the air, and if you listen you can hear the word . . . "Valley will roll . . .". This song too is a part of Valley, and as you hear it, you know it is "Sabbie" and the many true Vikings like him that have made Valley roll in the past. Now, it is for you, with him, to keep the Viking spirit strong.

But there is more for you to know of the background of "Sabbie", as you will then be better equipped to share this story of Valley with him. Through him you will know the reasoning behind this book, the origin of the Viking spirit, and the understanding of that which has come to be a way of life.

Clearly the objective of a college is to impart knowledge and wisdom, and in seeking a word to embody these principles, "Sabiduria" was adapted to meet the purpose. Sabiduria is a Spanish word meaning wisdom or knowledge. Thus the name was adopted for the first issue of the annual in 1907. Today, many years later, we bestow upon our Valley student a title which not only represents these principles, but also has a positive relation to this, the 1953 yearbook.

Influenced by many Valley traditions, "Sabbie" overflows with the Viking spirit. The winding red-brick walks, the buildings adorned with a green lace of ivy, the whitewashed Valley "V", the tolling of the Baity tower bell after a triumphant football game or the silence of this same bell following a loss, the informality of a candlelight dance, an organization picnic, a coke date in the union, an hour of spiritual reflection in Stewart Chapel, an old fashioned song fest around the piano, the gift of a pin, the gain of a partner, or the "engagement bench", the pigeons in the chapel tower, Dr. "Zum's" friendly greeting, or "Pop" Ferguson's raised thumb and the crumpled hat that goes with him to every game, or his words, "Valley is a way of life"; a culmination of these comprise the traditions of Valley. The Viking spirit embodied in "Sabbie" has come from some or all of these things, not all proclaimed, not all disclaimed.

With this introduction, we leave you with "Sabbie" on the time-worn steps of Baity Hall. We send you forth with him into the Viking world, adding this final thought—that the school year shall never begin, nor shall a commencement come to a close, but someone shall think of someone; old times, old days, old friends.

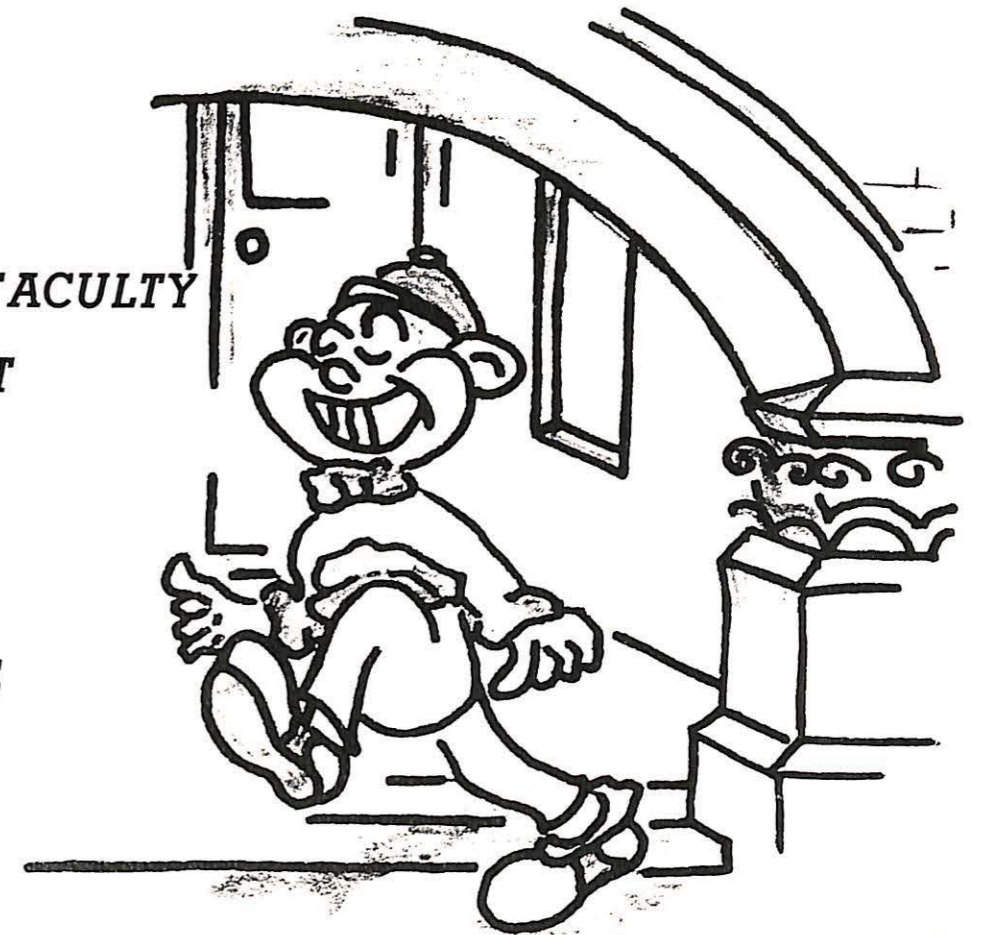

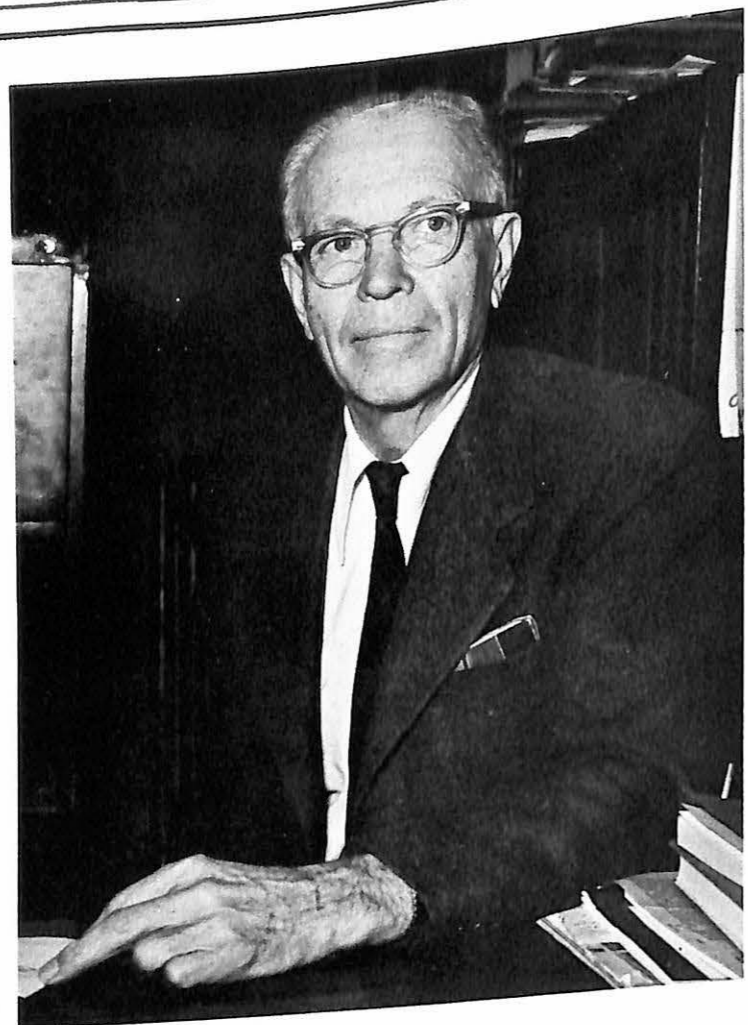

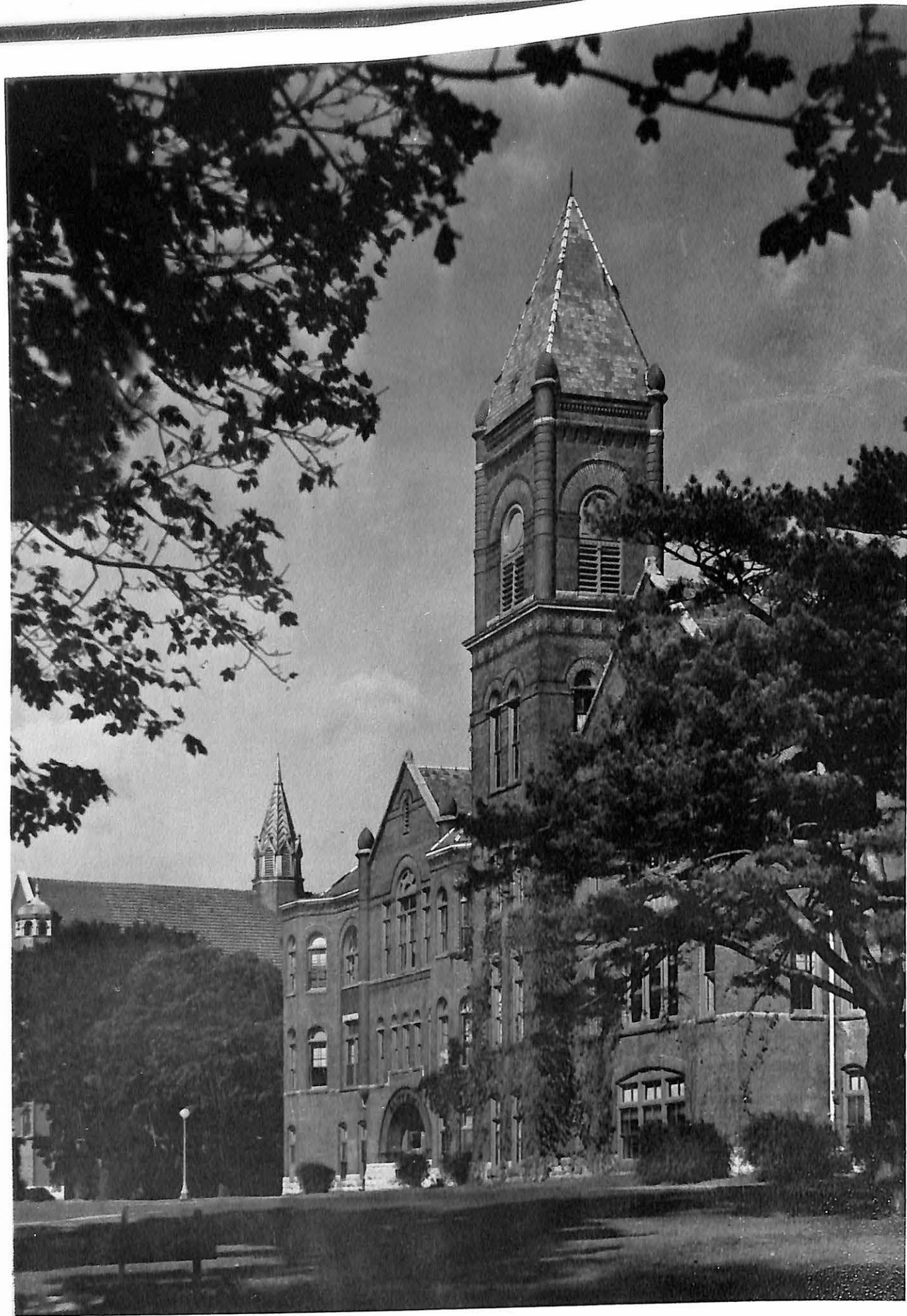
To Dr. "Zum", we then humbly dedicate this book as a symbol of that "greatest award" so greatly deserved.

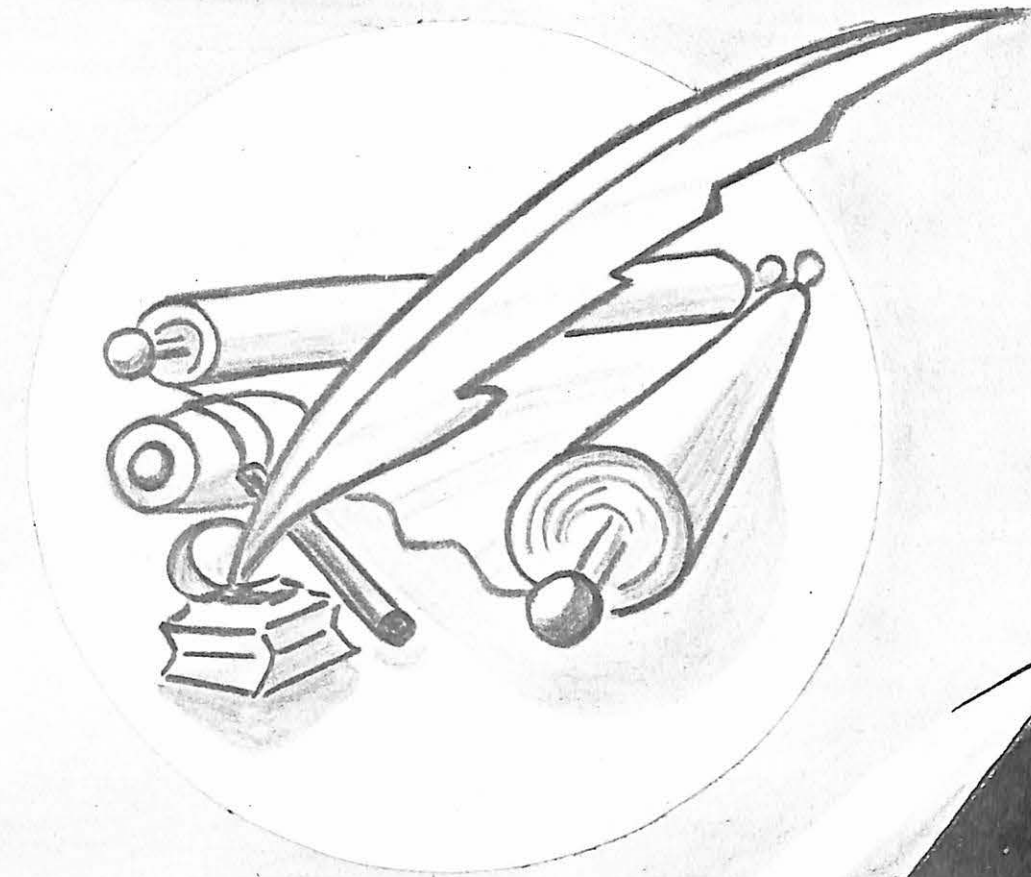

Since the Student Senate was first organized on this campus, it has taken an increasingly more important part in the life of Missouri Valley College. 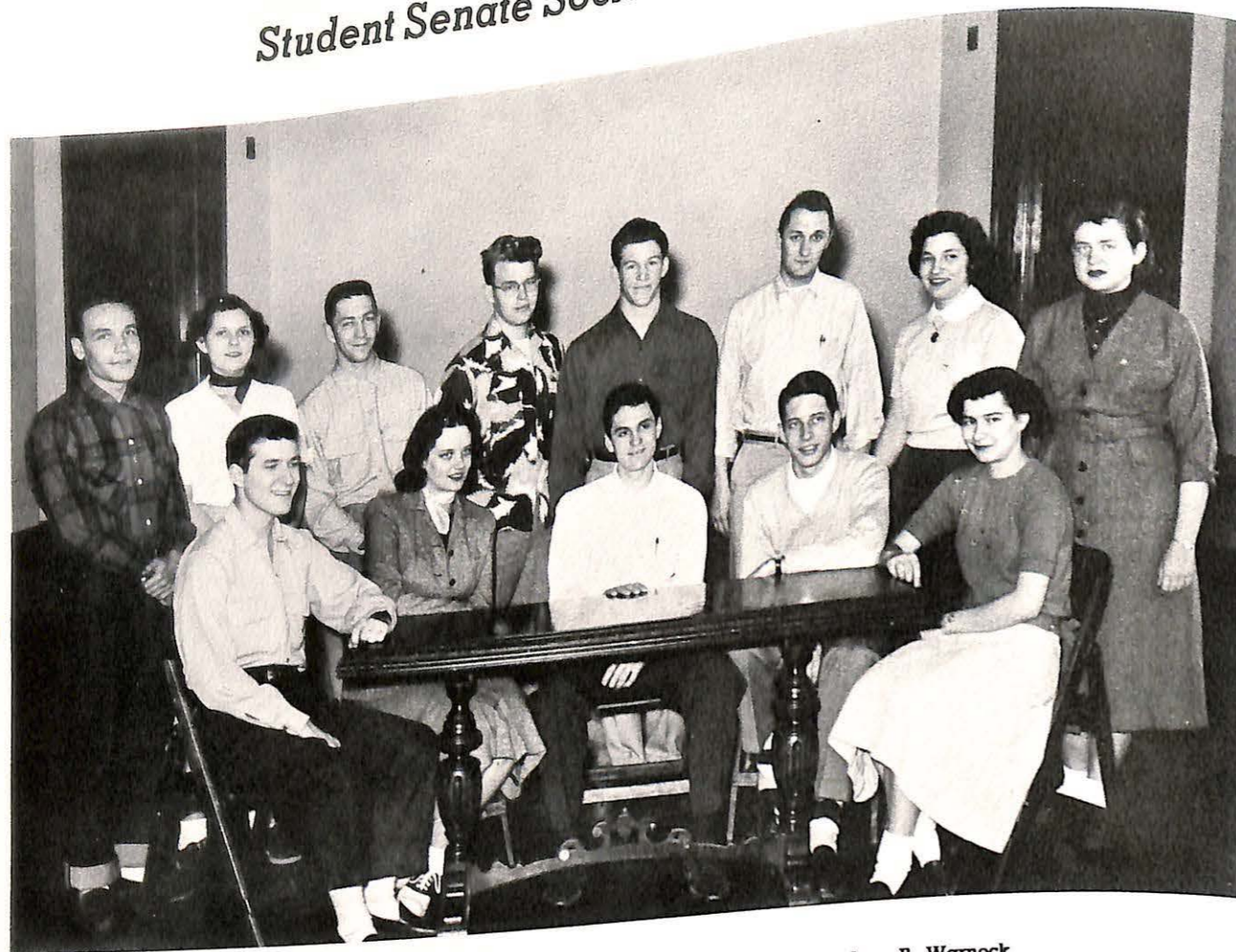

The honored name of Alpha Xi Delta is founded in all phases of college and community life, as is shown by the record of our activities during the '52-'53 college season.

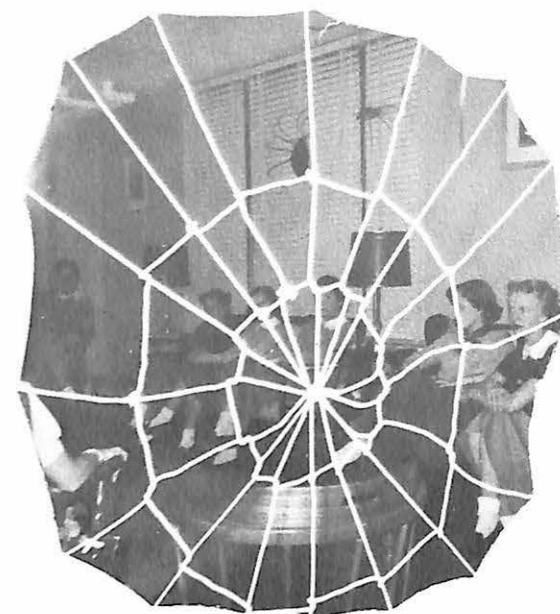
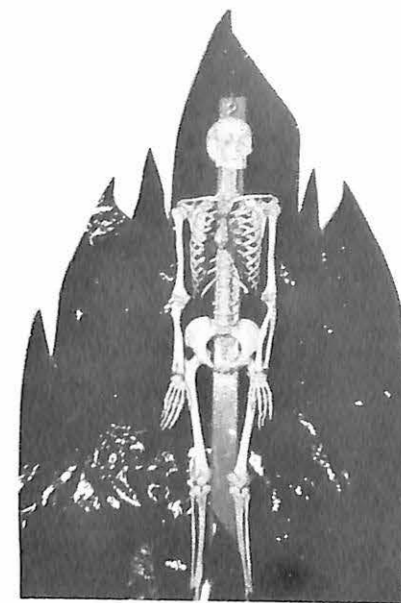

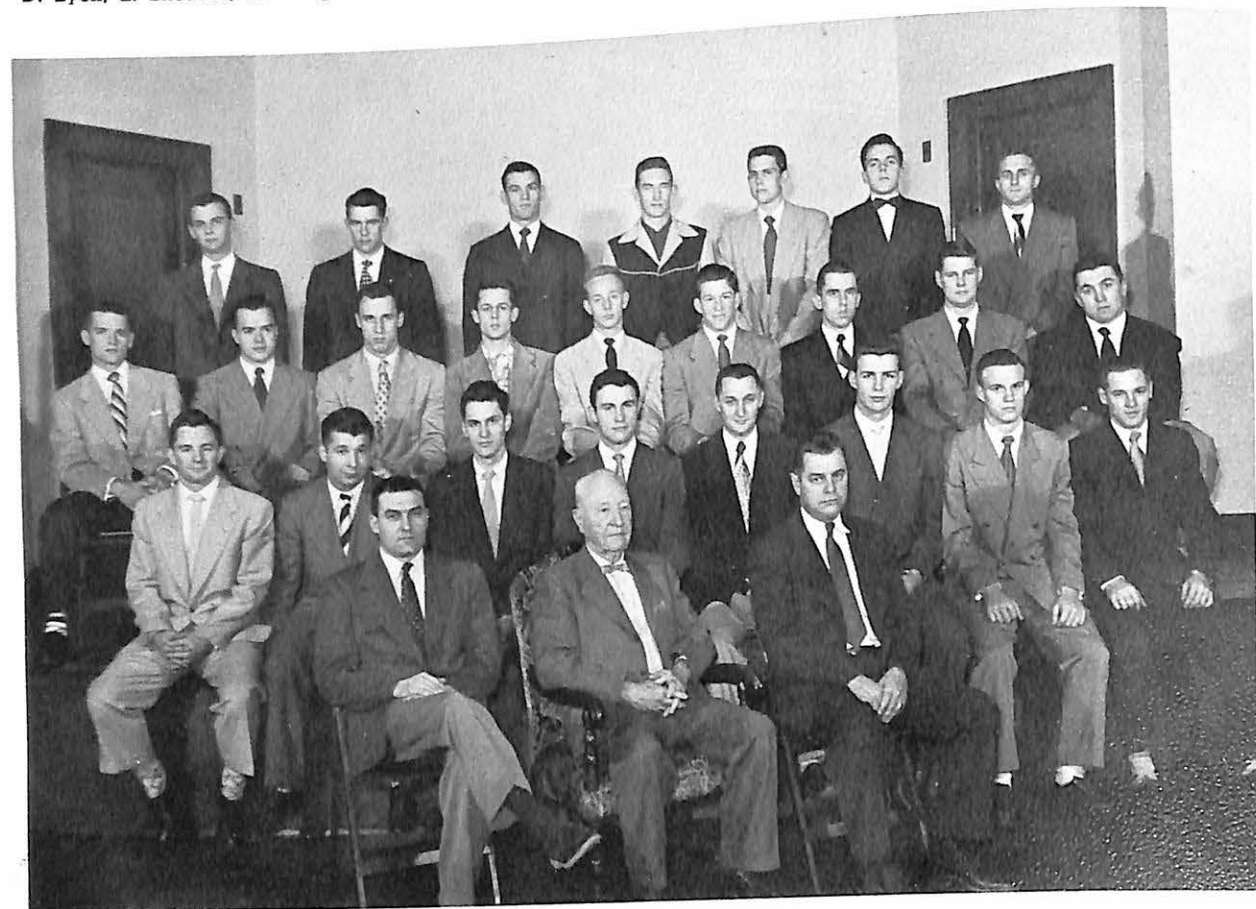
The purpose of the organization is to promote clean and wholesome athletics at Valley and to further the interest of the student body in sports activities.

The Science Club was organized on the campus of Missouri Valley College to promote interest in science on the campus.

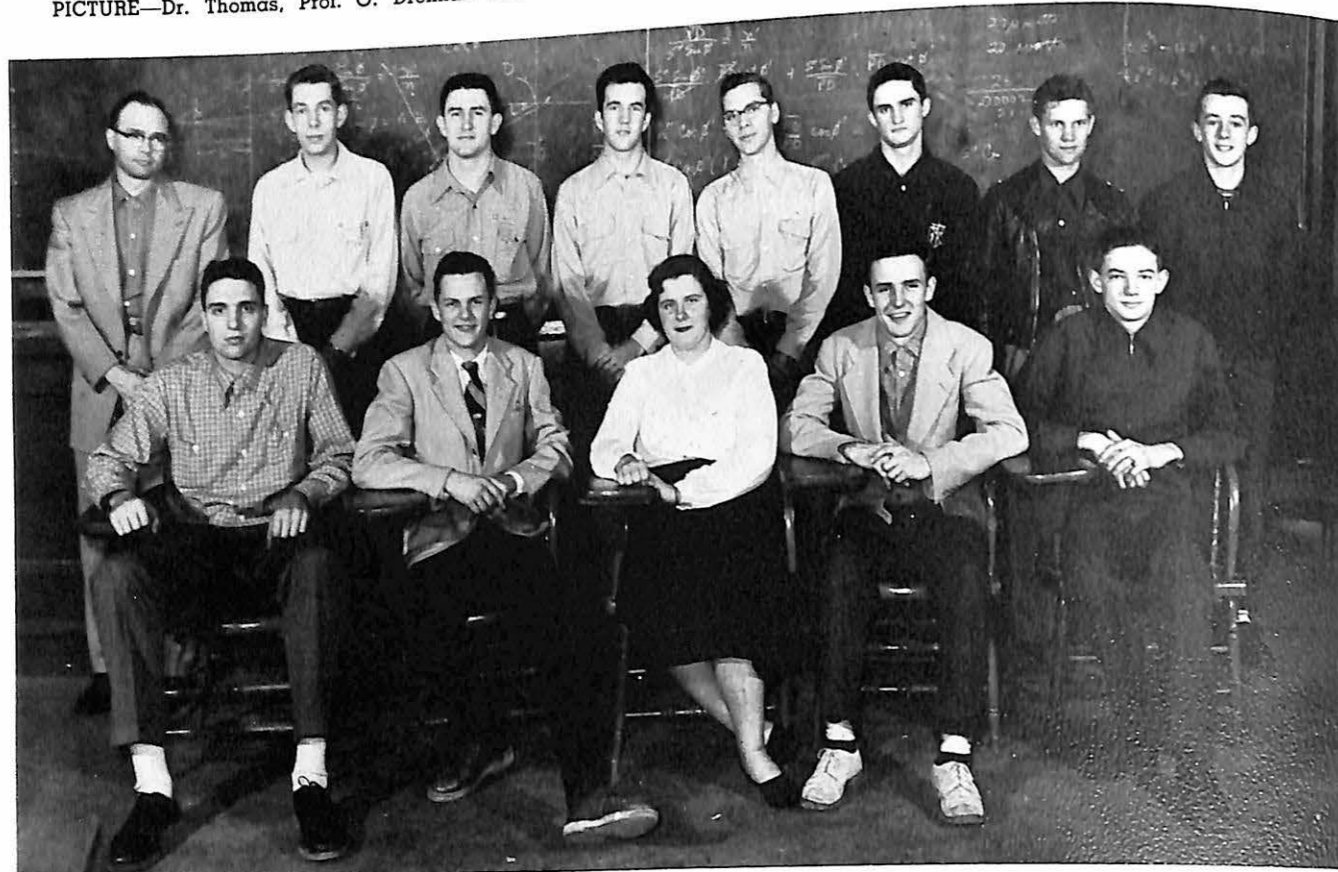

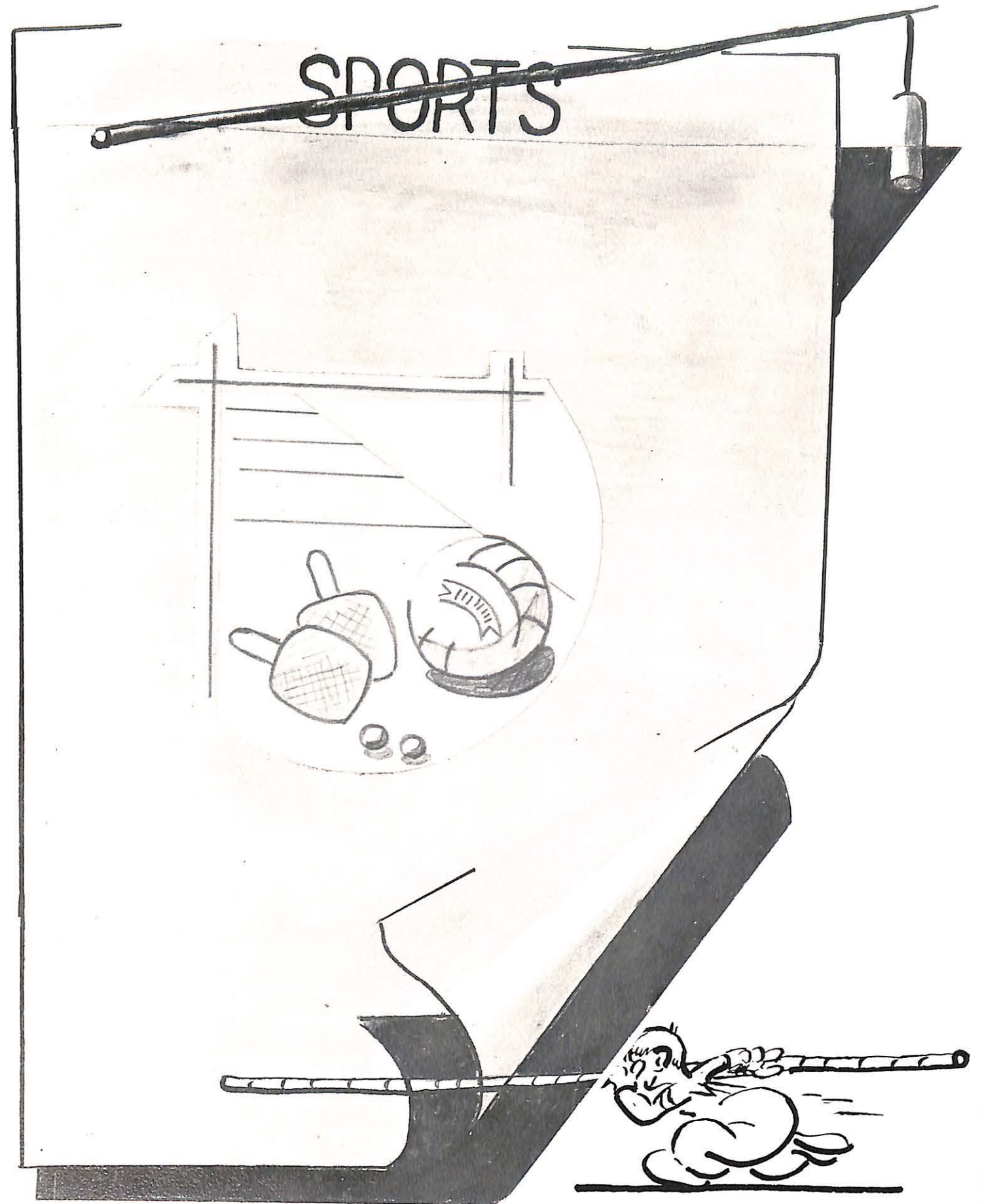
The band presented concerts for assemblies during both fall and spring semesters and for the Fine Arts Festival held in April.

Freshman or Senior, girl or boy, the all-inclusive year-round Valley sports program has an activity for each Viking student.

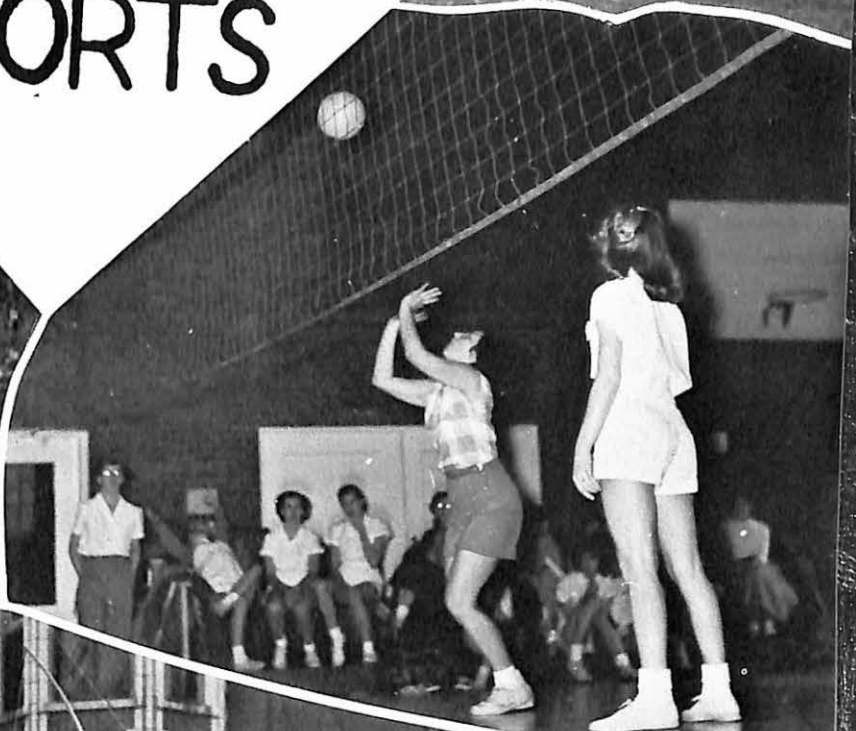
Of special interest to the girls, are such things as field hockey, volleyball, softball, basketball, badminton and archery.

## THE BEANIE BUNCH



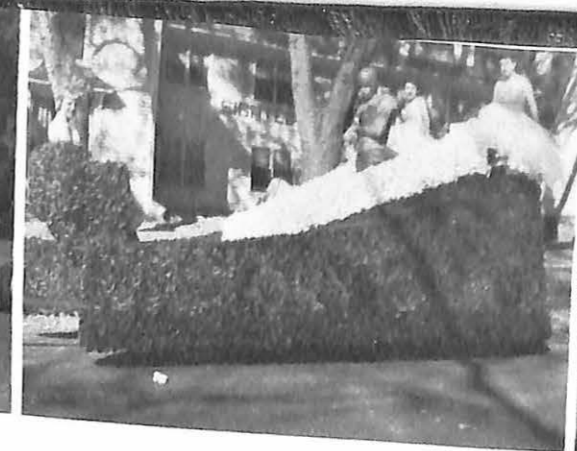

Climaxing the weekend festivities, was the Homecoming Dance featuring the Queen and her court.



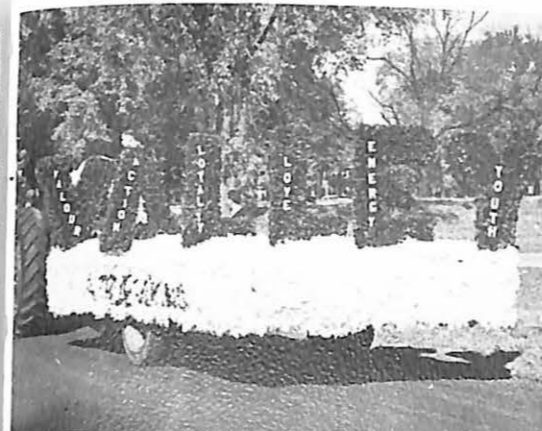

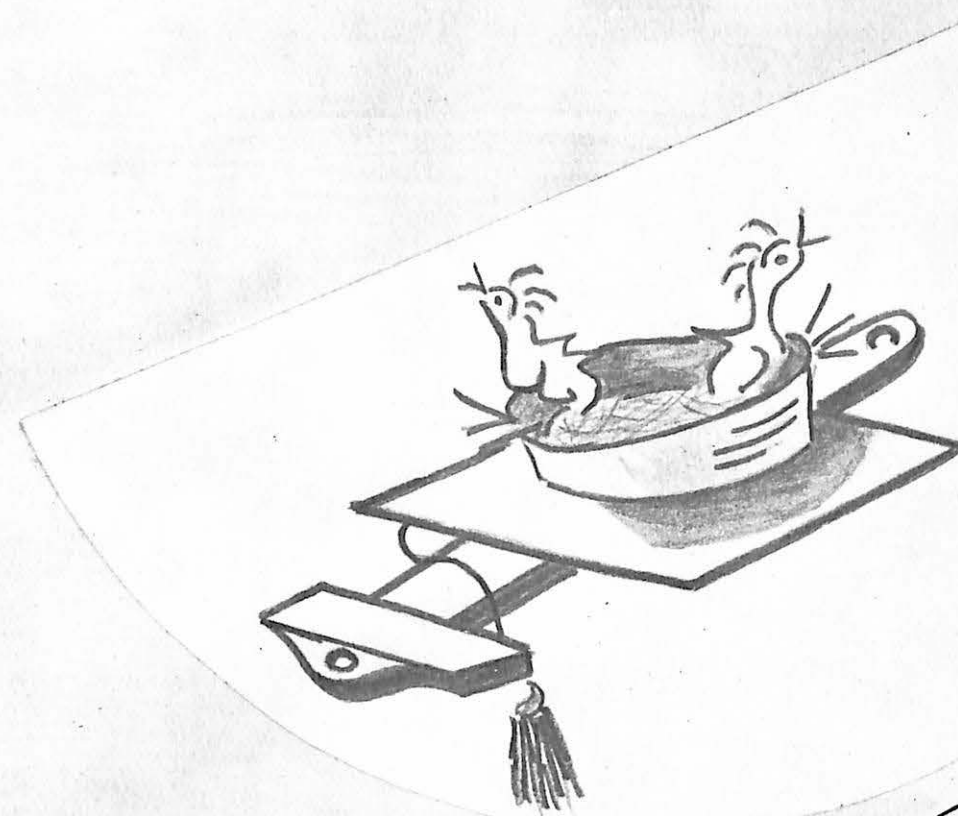


# HIGH SCHOOL DAY

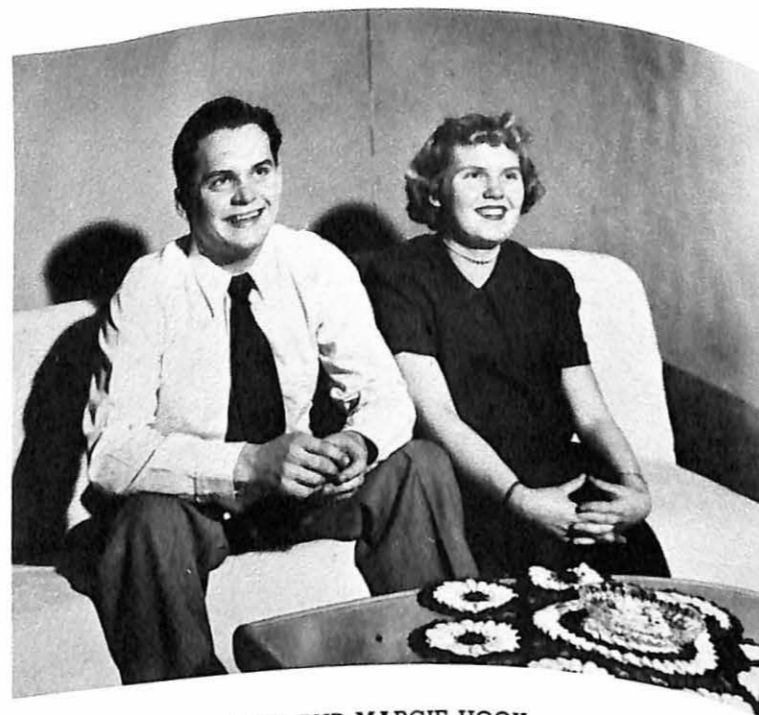
