Bill of Rights

begun and held at the City of New York on
Wednesday, the fifteenth of December, one thousand seven hundred
and Ninety One.

AMENDMENT I—FREEDOM OF RELIGION, SPEECH AND PRESS—
RIGHT OF ASSEMBLY AND PETITION.—Congress shall make no law
respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof;
or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, or the right of the people
peaceably to assemble, or to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

AMENDMENT II—RIGHT TO BEAR ARMS.—A well regulated Militia, being
necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear
arms shall not be infringed.

AMENDMENT III—SECURITY OF THE HOME AGAINST THE MILI-
TARY—No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without
the consent of the owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed
by law.

AMENDMENT IV—THE SECURITY OF PERSONAL PROPERTY IN THE
HOME.—The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers
and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated,
and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or
affirmation, and particularly describing the places to be searched and the persons
or things to be seized.

AMENDMENT V—PROPERTY AND DUE PROCESS OF LAW.—
No person shall be held to answer for a capital or otherwise infamous crime,
unless on indictment or information of a grand jury, except in cases arising
in the land or naval forces, or in the militia when actually in the service, in time
of war or public danger, when the subject may be subject for the same offense
to be tried by a court-martial. No person shall be compelled in any criminal
case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty or property
without due process of law, nor shall private property be taken for public use
without just compensation.

AMENDMENT VI—CRIMINAL PROSECUTION.—In all criminal
prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right of a speedy and public trial by
an impartial jury of the State and Territory where the crime shall have been
committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law; and to

AMENDMENT VII—THE RIGHT OF TRIAL BY JURY.—In suits at common
law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial
by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-
examined in any court in the United States than according to the rules of the
common law.

Foreword

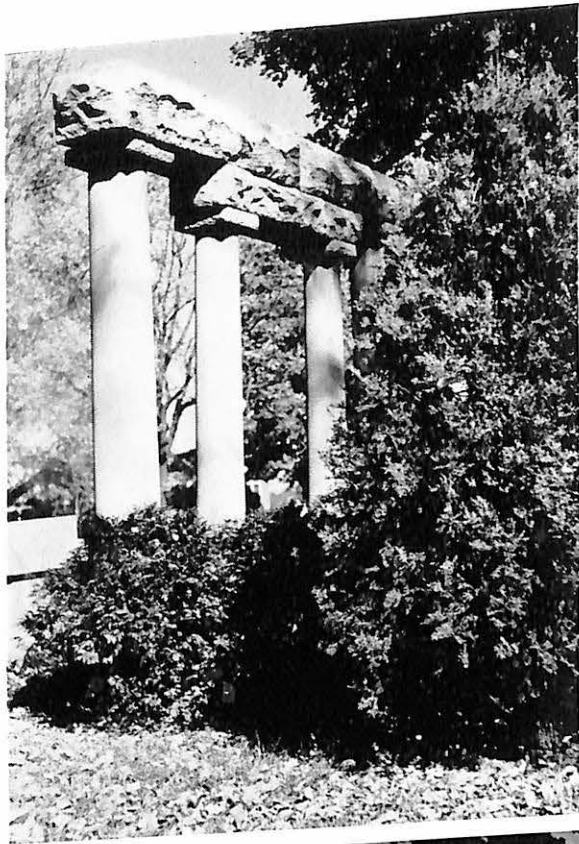

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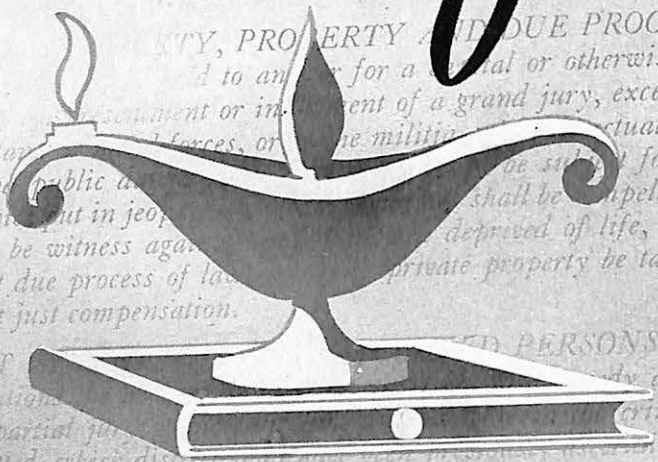
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AMENDMENT V—LIFE, LIBERTY AND DUE PROCESS OF LAW.—
No person shall be held to answer for a capital or otherwise infamous crime,
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in the land or naval forces, or in the militia when actually in service, in time of
war or public danger, when the rights of the accused shall be subject to the
provisions of the laws of war; nor shall he be compelled in any criminal
case to be witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty or property
without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use
without just compensation.

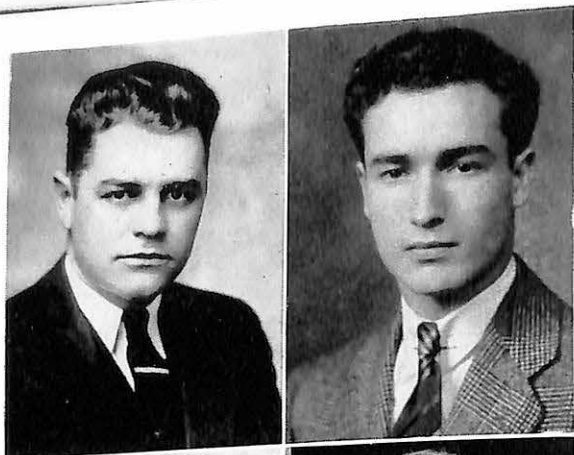
Dean of Women

prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right of a speedy and public trial by
an impartial jury of his peers, whose duty shall be to determine whether the crime
has been committed, which shall have been charged to him by indictment, or
presentment or information, and to return the verdict according to the law,
and to be confronted with the witnesses against him; and in all criminal prosecutions,
the accused shall enjoy the right to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses
in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

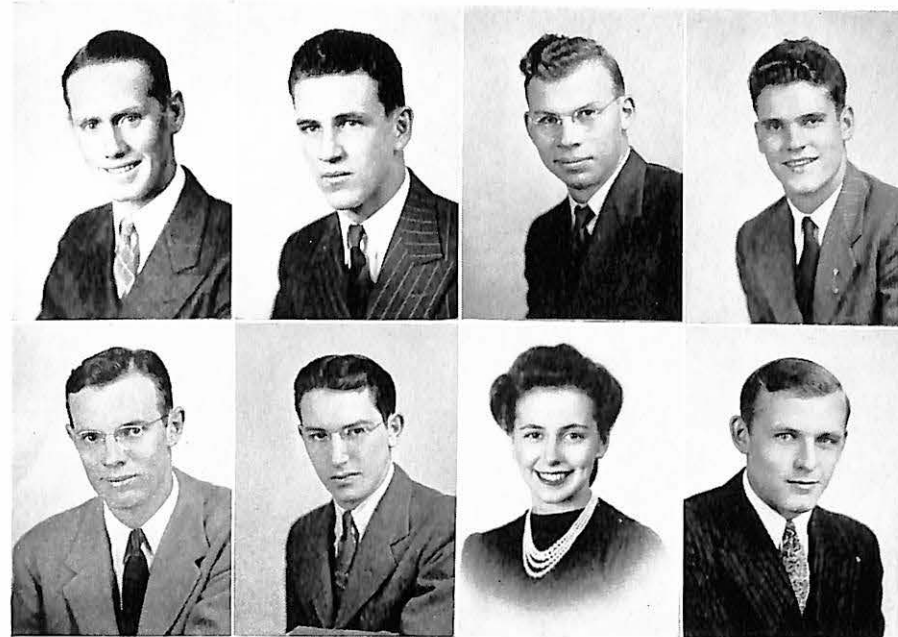

WHO'S WHO

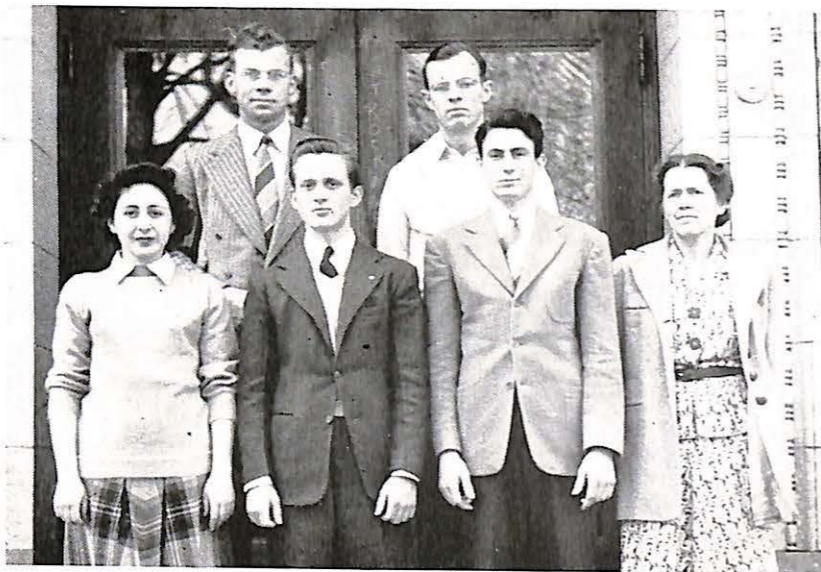

Bill of Rights

begun and held at the City of New York on
Wednesday, the fifteenth of December, one thousand seven hundred
and Ninety One.

AMENDMENT I—FREEDOM OF RELIGION, SPEECH AND PRESS—
RIGHT OF ASSEMBLY AND PETITION.—Congress shall make no law
respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof;
or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, or the right of the people
peaceably to assemble, or to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

AMENDMENT II—RIGHT TO BEAR ARMS.—A well regulated militia, being
necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear
arms shall not be infringed.

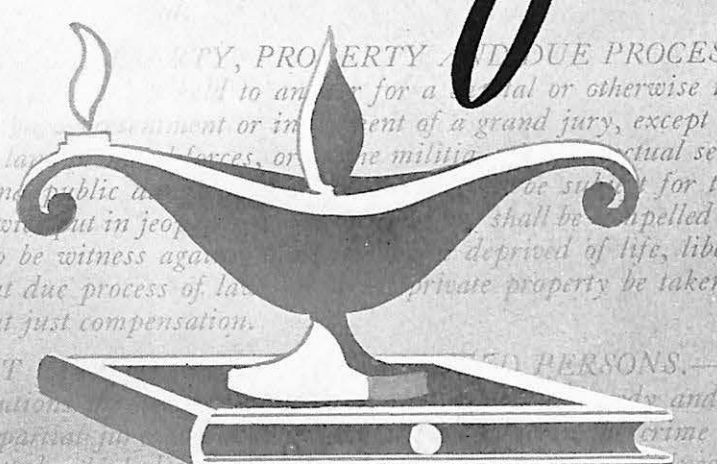
AMENDMENT III—SECURITY OF THE HOME AGAINST THE MILI-
TARY—No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without
the consent of the owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed
by law.

AMENDMENT IV—THE SECURITY OF PERSONAL PROPERTY IN THE
HOME.—The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers,
and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated,
and no Warrants shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or
affirmation, and particularly describing the places to be searched and the persons
or things to be seized.

AMENDMENT V—PROPERTY, PROTECTIVE PROCESS OF LAW.—
No person shall be held to answer for a capital or otherwise infamous crime,
without indictment or information of a grand jury, except in cases arising
in the land or naval forces, or in the militia when in actual service, in time of
war and public danger, when he may be subject for the same offense
to be tried by court-martial. No person shall be compelled in any criminal
case to be witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty or property
without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use
without just compensation.

AMENDMENT VI—TRIAL BY JURY.—In all criminal
prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right of a speedy and public trial by
an impartial jury of his country, where the crime shall have been
committed, which district shall have been determined by law, and to be

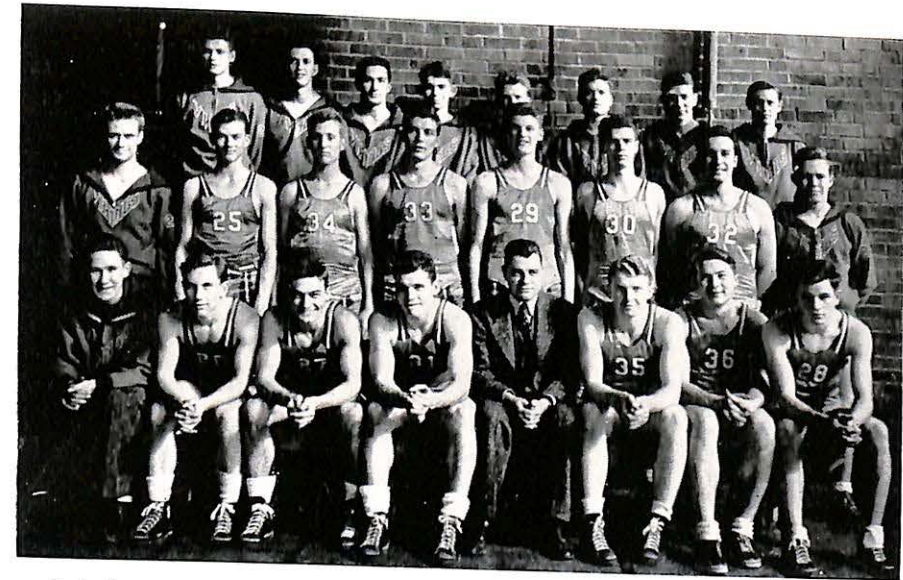
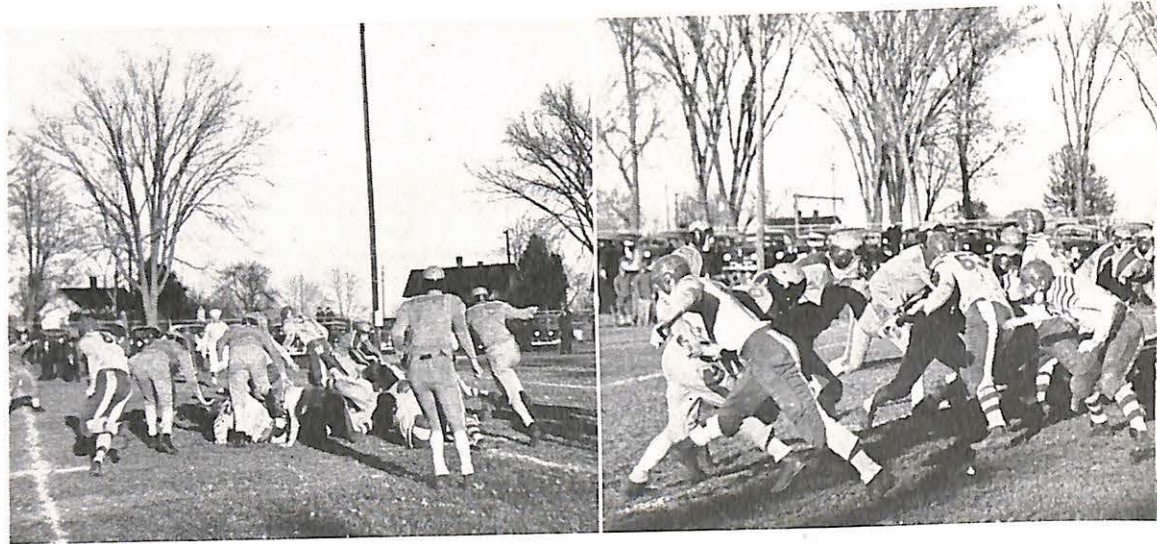

Kumpy, Harris, Horman, Baker, Chittwood, and Rymer turned in outstanding performances . . . In the Warrensburg game Valley scored 31 points in the first 25 minutes of play and held their opponents without even a first down . . . In playing William Jewell, Alva Baker, freshman halfback, opened the scoring with a brilliant 36 yard touchdown run. This was followed by four additional touchdowns in the blistering first half. The second half was no different, with Hugh Dunn carrying the brunt of the attack which gave the Vikings four more touchdowns . . . Valley took its touchdown scoring circus to Central's campus to help them celebrate their Homecoming. The Vikings unleashed their power on the third play of the game with Kumpy breaking through the middle of Central's line for a 70 yard touchdown run. The rest of the game was a simple job for the eager Vikings.

The Vikings played Rockhurst, their second game in one week. This team was rated by football critics as one of the best in the state. Defeat was prophesied for Valley—the first time in the season. Again the Vikings came through, 37-7 . . . On Thanksgiving Day, Valley celebrated by soundly trouncing the Central Eagles 62-0. The Viking season ended with a joyous climax when Ralph Jones scored the last and final touchdown for 1942-43.

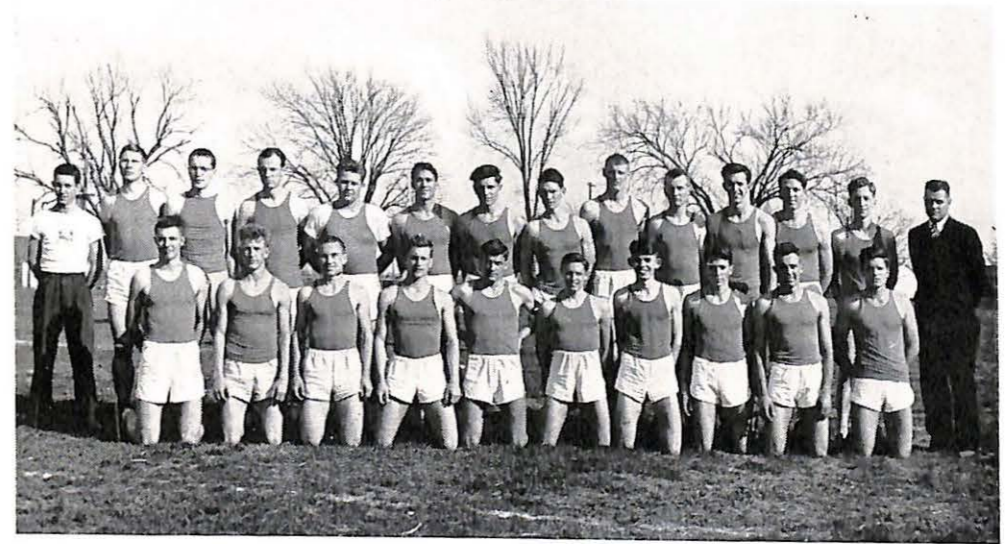
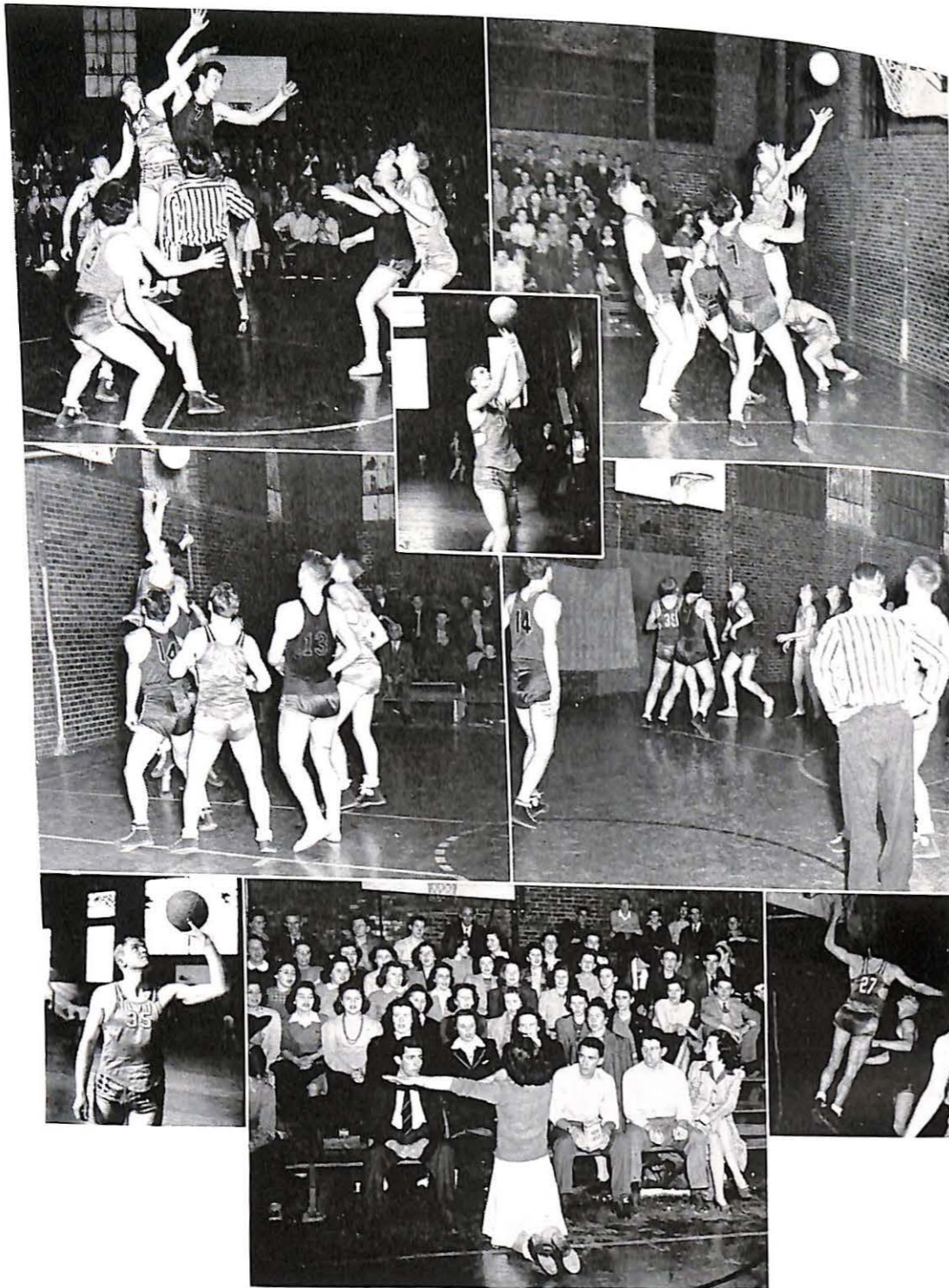
BASKETBALL

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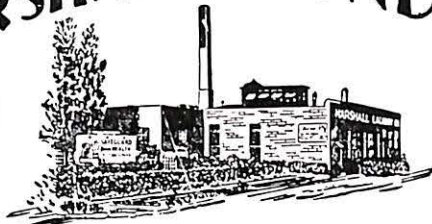
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
