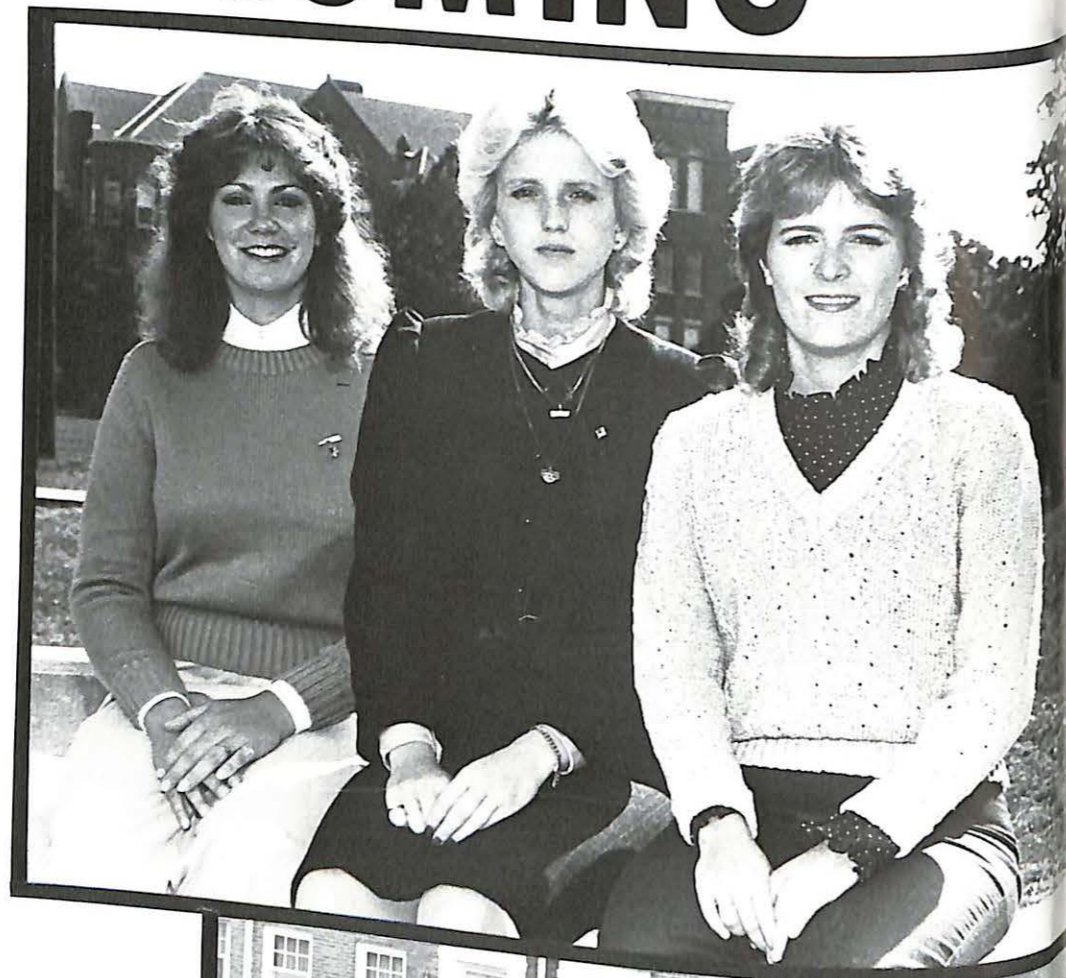

Despite the rain, Missouri Valley's 1983 Homecoming festivities elaborated to a fine celebration and a great success. This year's theme was OWLS ONLY FLY AT NIGHT, BUT VIKINGS ALWAYS SAIL HOMECOMING DAY. With this, our events first began by selecting three candidates for queen, junior Ginny Barber; senior, Jami Rosenbrock; and senior, Debbie Messer. Then a banquet on Thursday, October 20 continued the proceedings. On Friday, Stop Day allowed Valley to prepare for the torch marathon. Students of the various sororities, fraternities, and organizations on campus, along with some members of the faculty and administrative staff participated in the torch run. The run got underway at seven o'clock a.m. from the front of the state capitol building in Jefferson City and the time set for arrival in Marshall was about eight o'clock that night. The 91-mile run was mapped out along U.S. Highway 50 from Jefferson City to Sedalia and then north to Marshall on Highway 65. That night the torch runners lighted the bonfire, and all enjoyed the fireworks display. Saturday, the day everyone awaited for began early with a parade displaying five local high school bands and 15 past MVC Homecoming Queens in addition to the many decorative floats. Following the parade was a Bar-B-Q and also a luncheon for the 15th Annual Hall of Fame. Inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame were Jack Hearn '47, Cecil Naylor '56, and Bob Thomas '68. Kickoff was at 2 p.m. where the Vikings proved their power to the Tarkio Owls with a victory 42-3. At halftime the gitters began for our three candidates awaiting the announcement of the new selected queen. 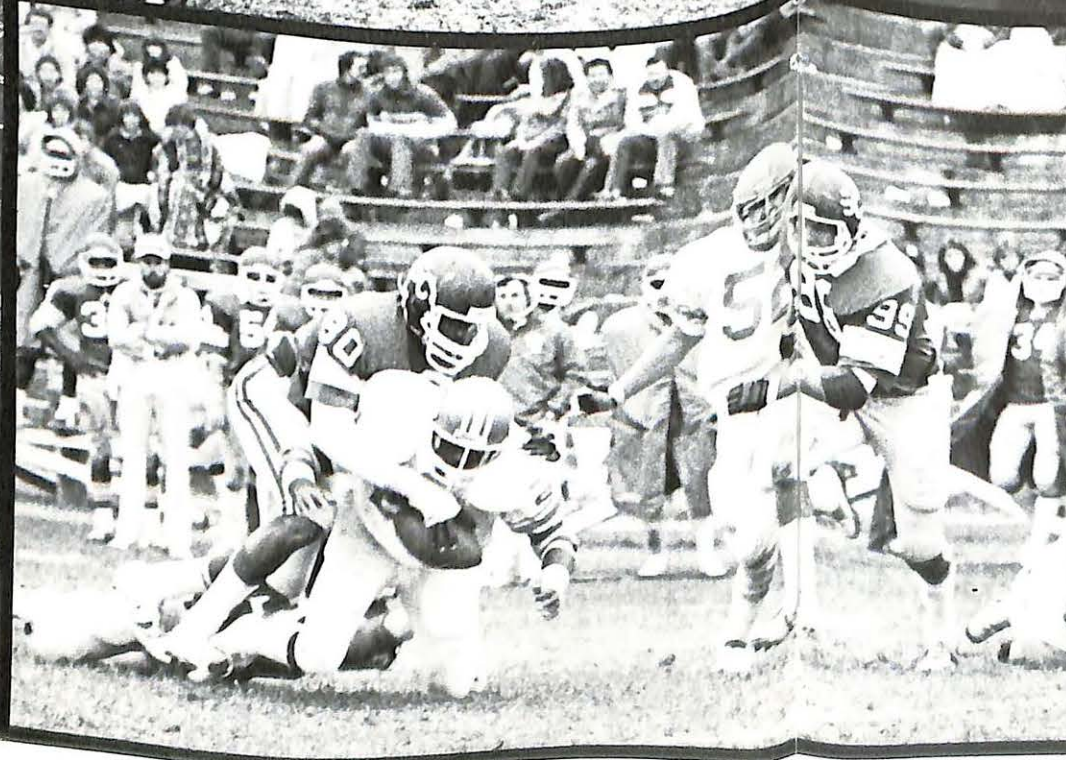

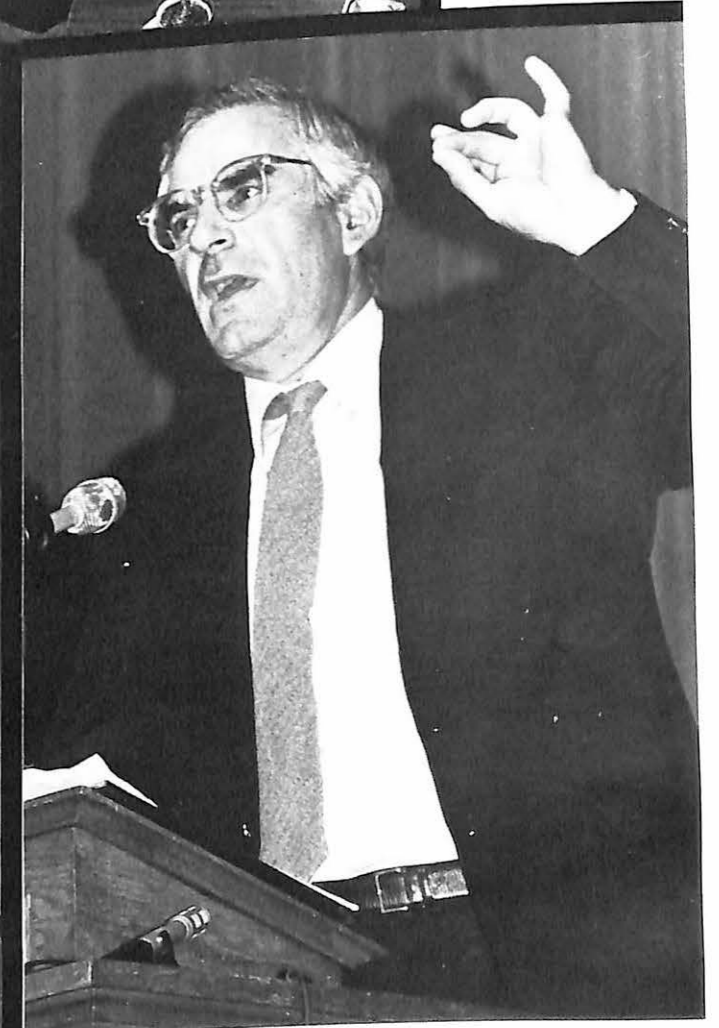
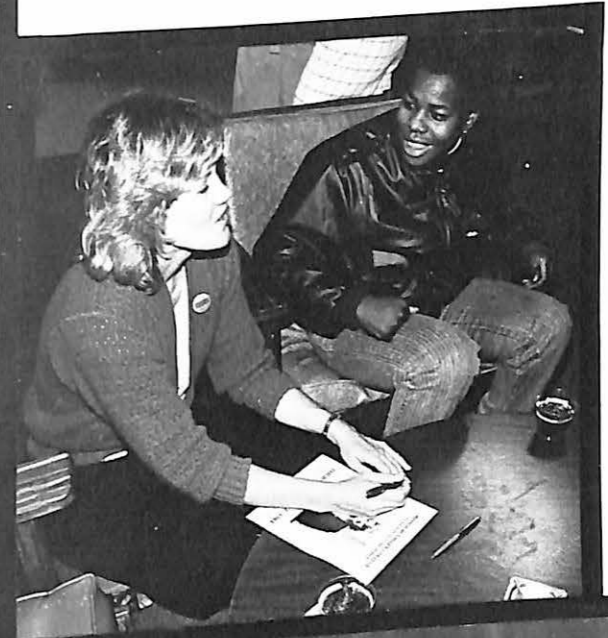




Eckilson in Action

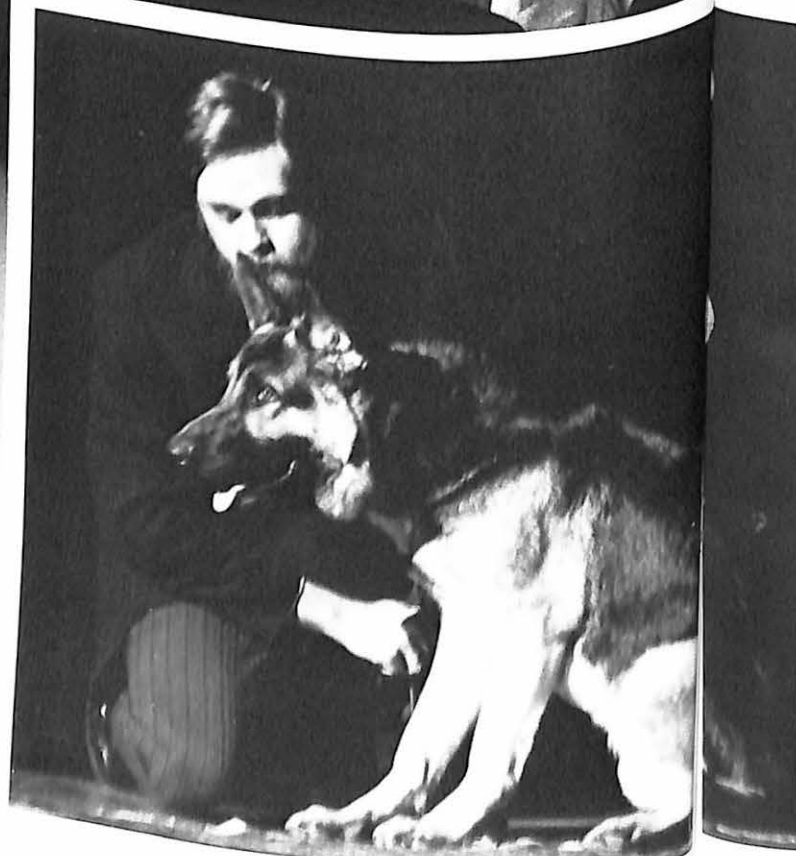
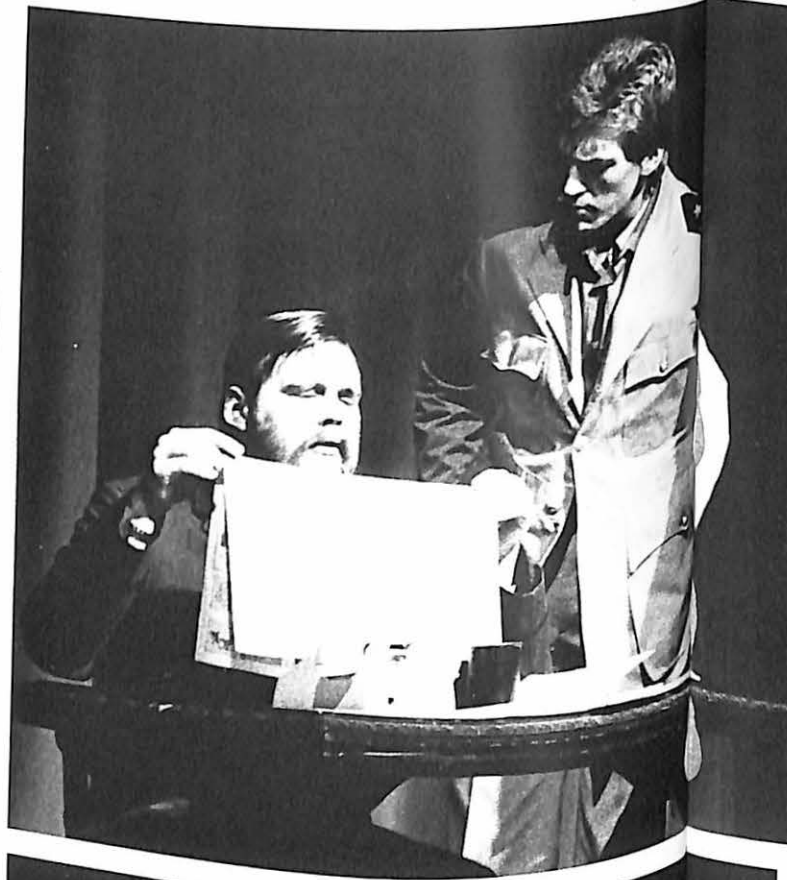

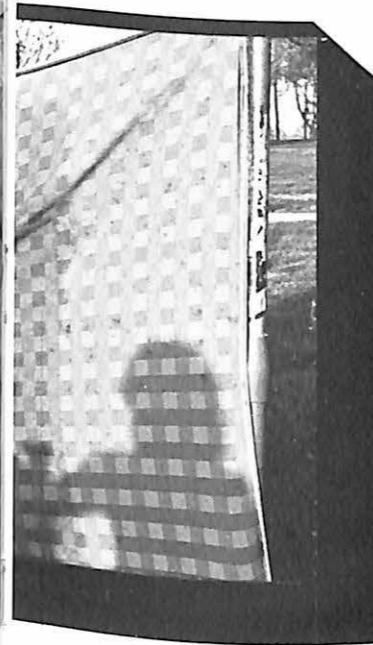
SNOOPY AND SPOON RIVER

CAB

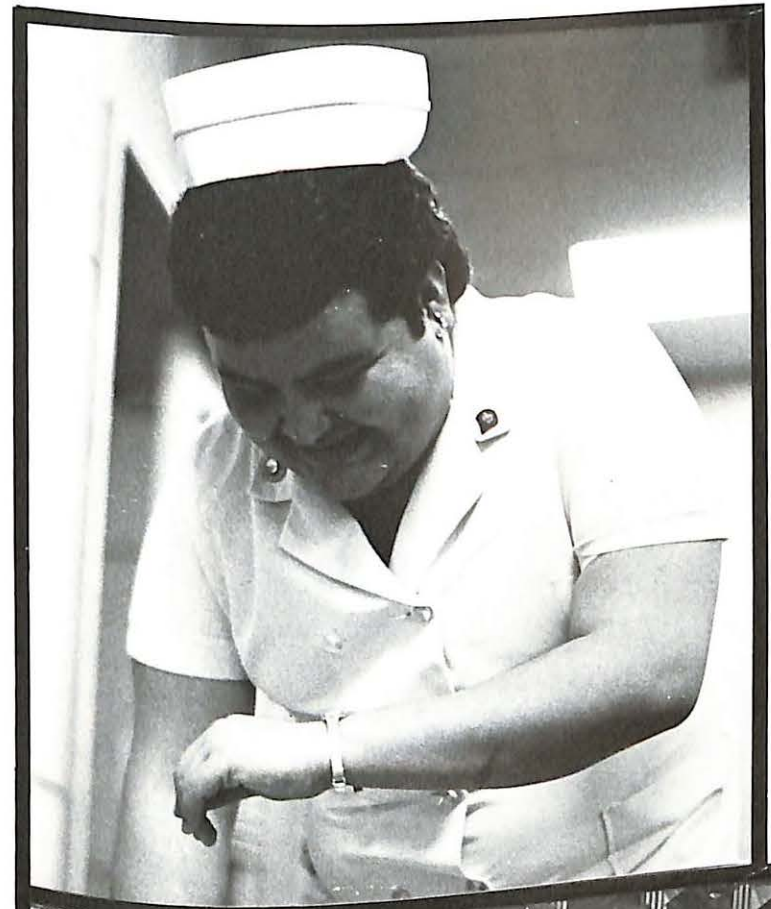


**SIDE BY SIDE

TRAGEDY STRIKES..

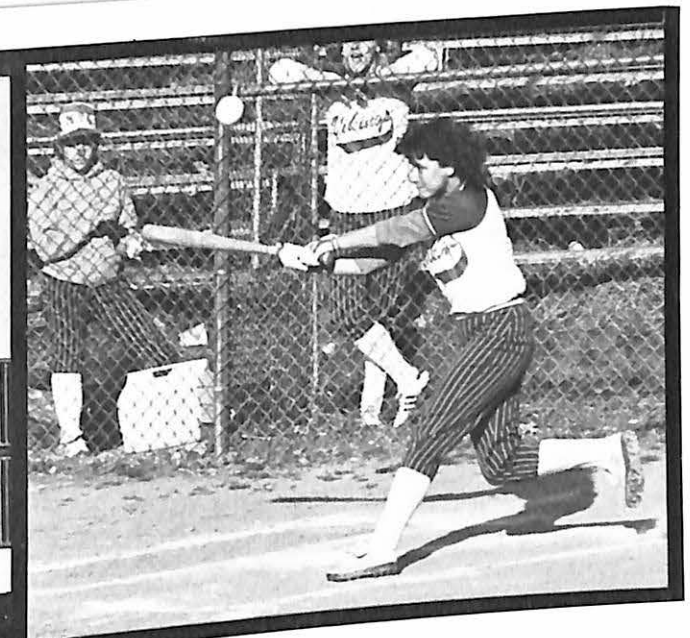
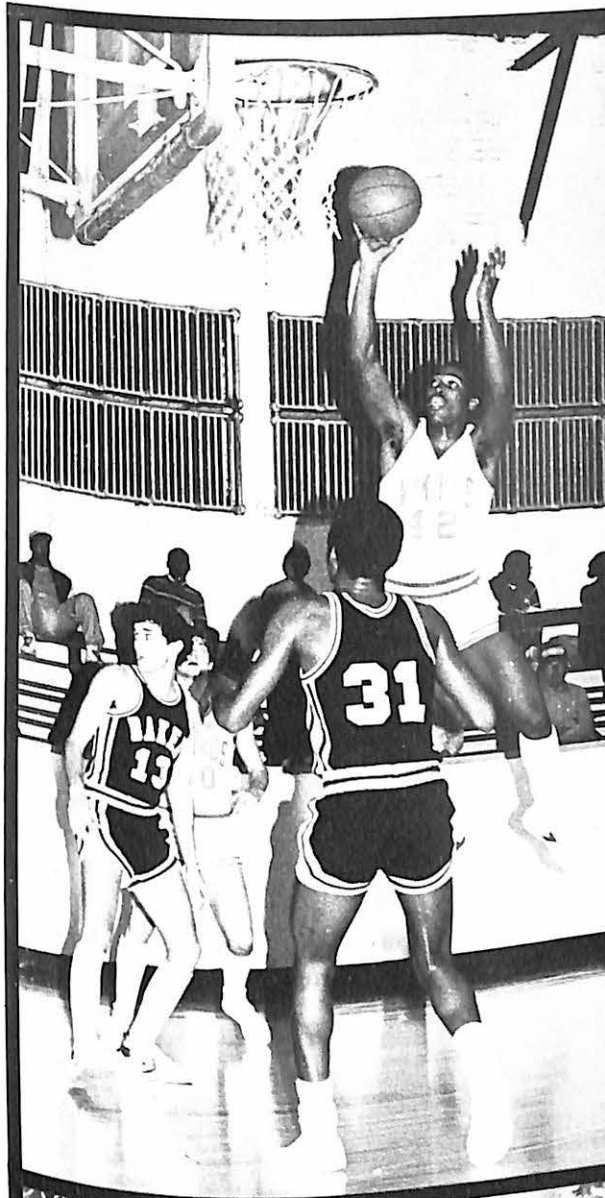


On Tuesday, April 17, 1984, fire broke out at the Tau Kappa Epsilon Fraternity House. The fire originated in resident Hector Bernal's room and other occupants of the structure were evacuated upon its discovery. Bernal ran from the building with his clothes on fire when Jimmy Anderson tackled and rolled Bernal on the ground to extinguish the flames. Bernal suffered burns on over 30 percent of his body and were severe enough to necessitate skin grafts. Anderson was commended for his bravery at an appreciation dinner and many fund raising activities were held to help defray some of the expenses facing Bernal.

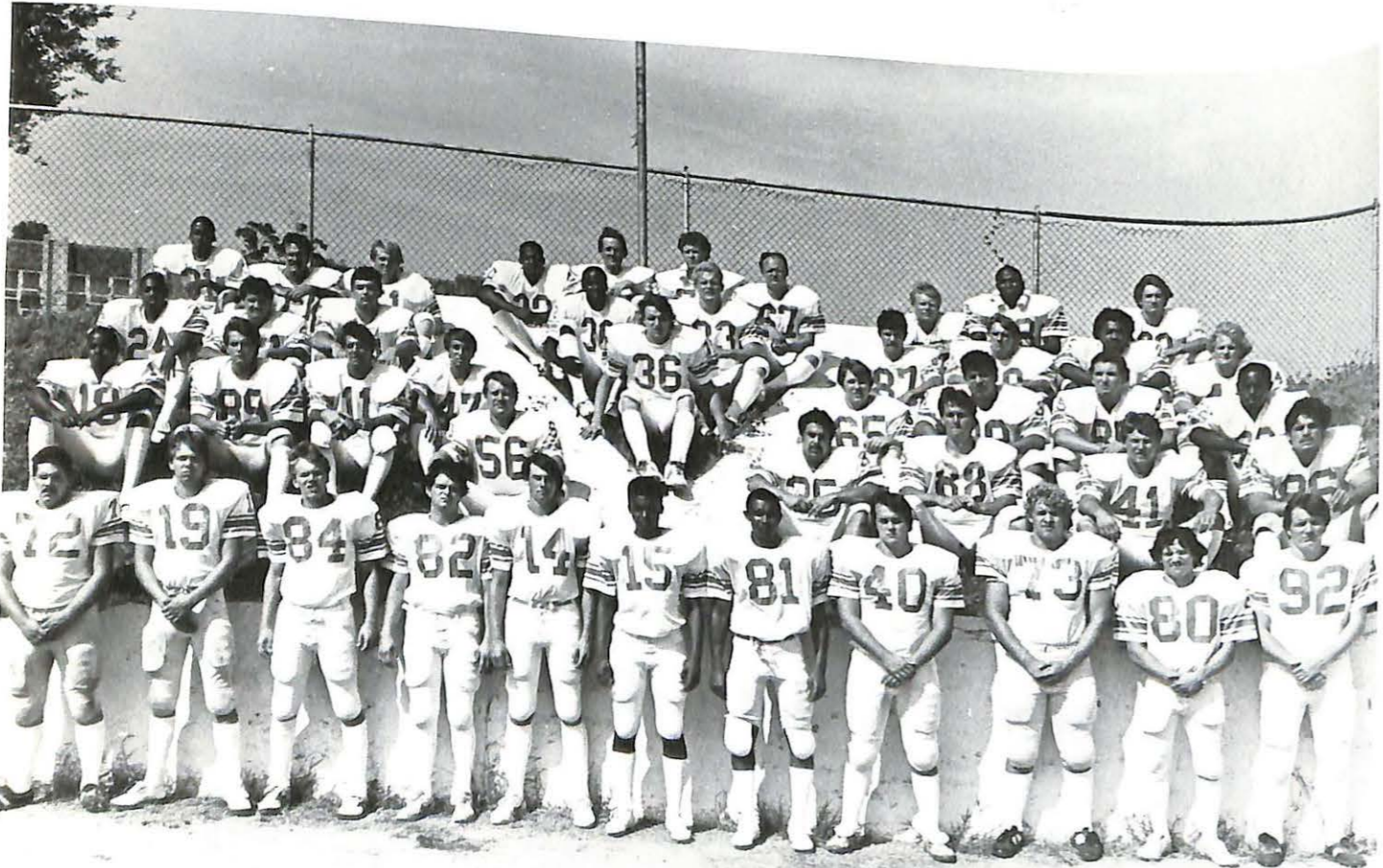
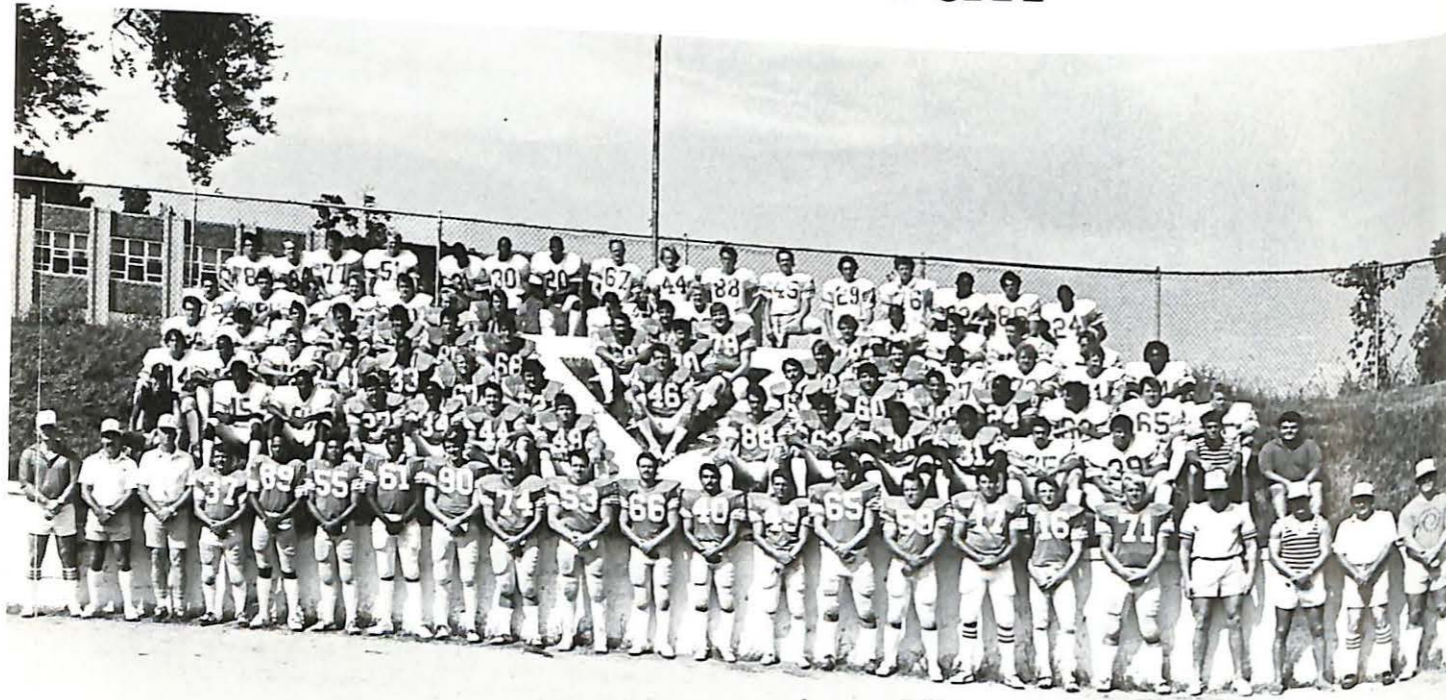
SPORTS

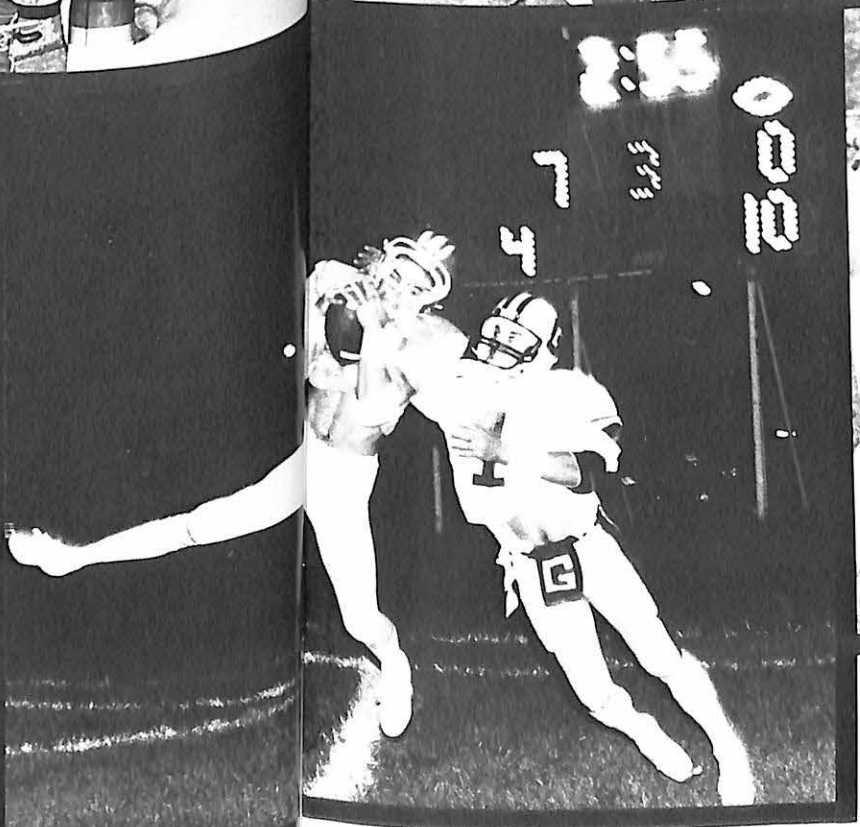

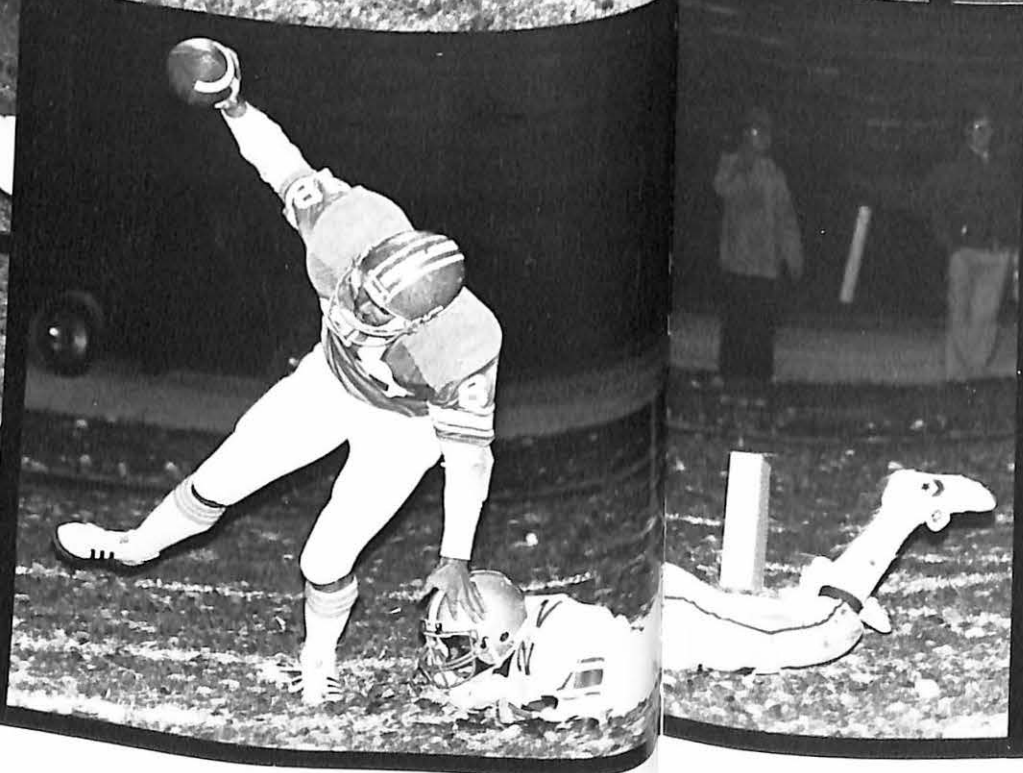

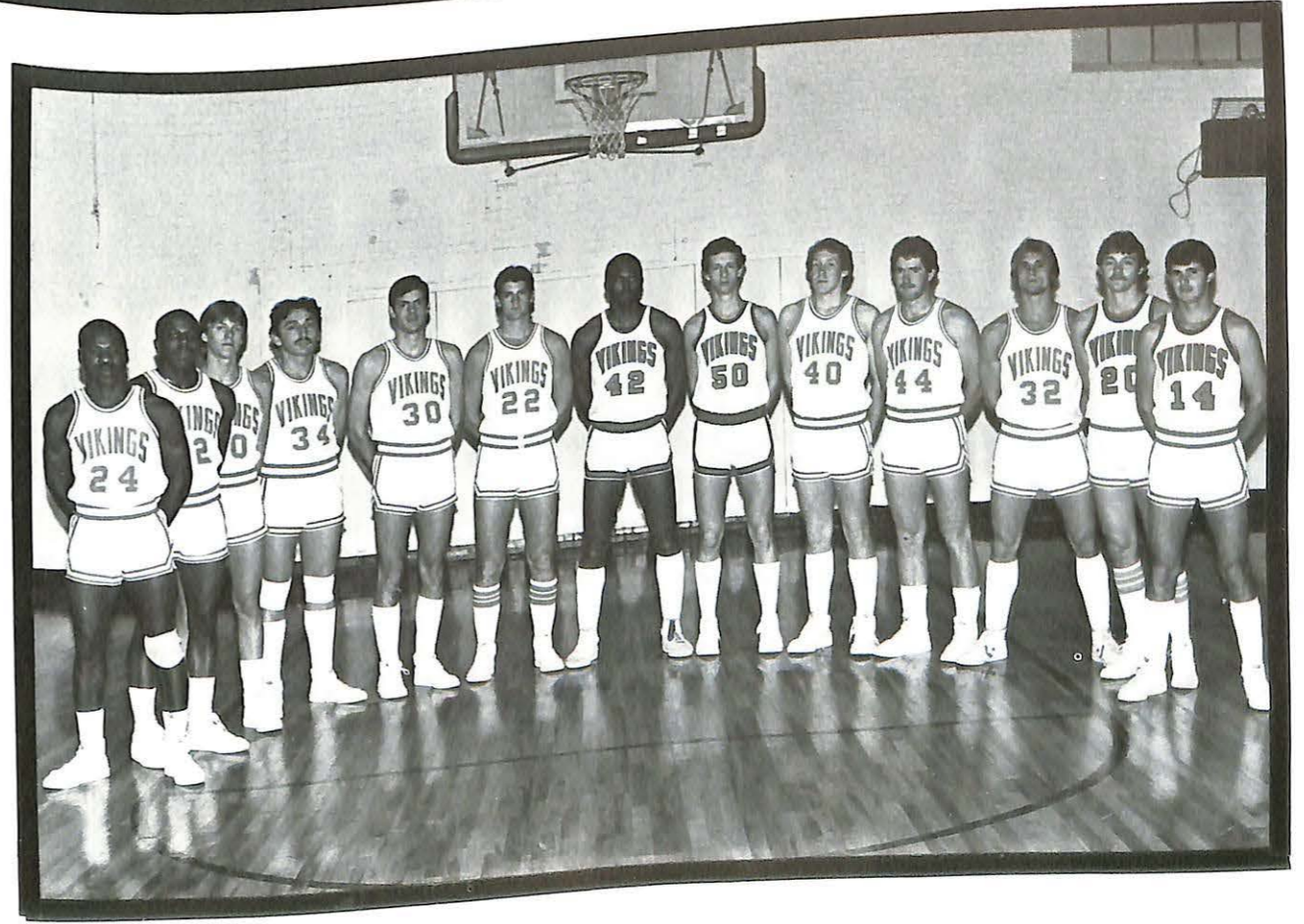
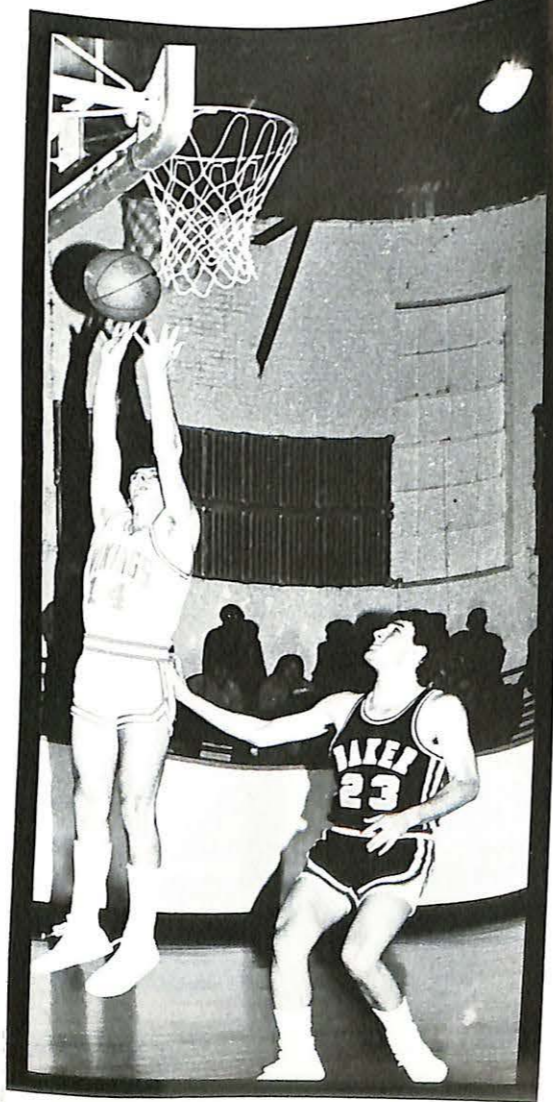


TRIBUTE TO COACH DICK DAVIS

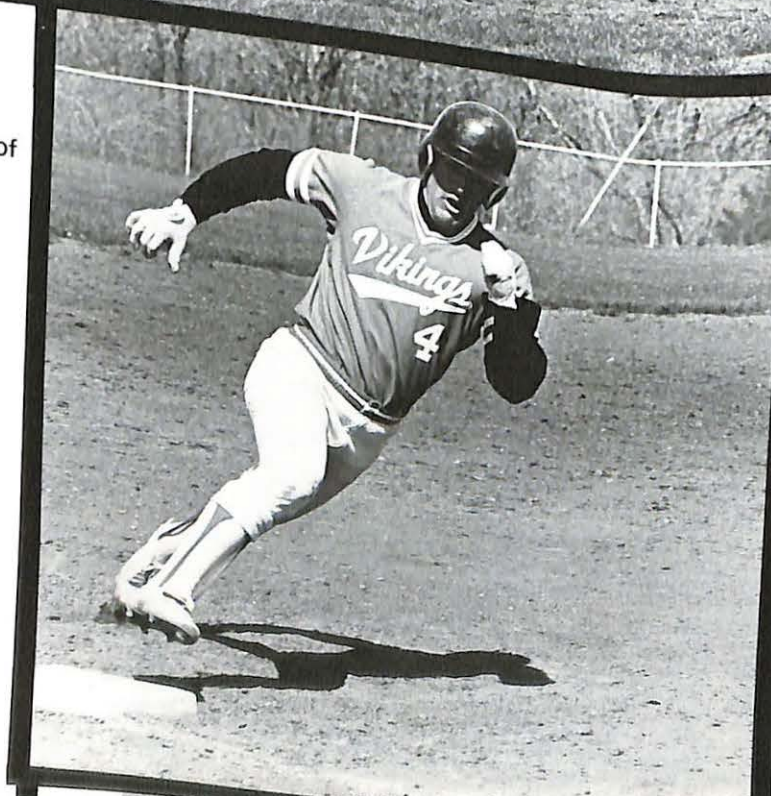

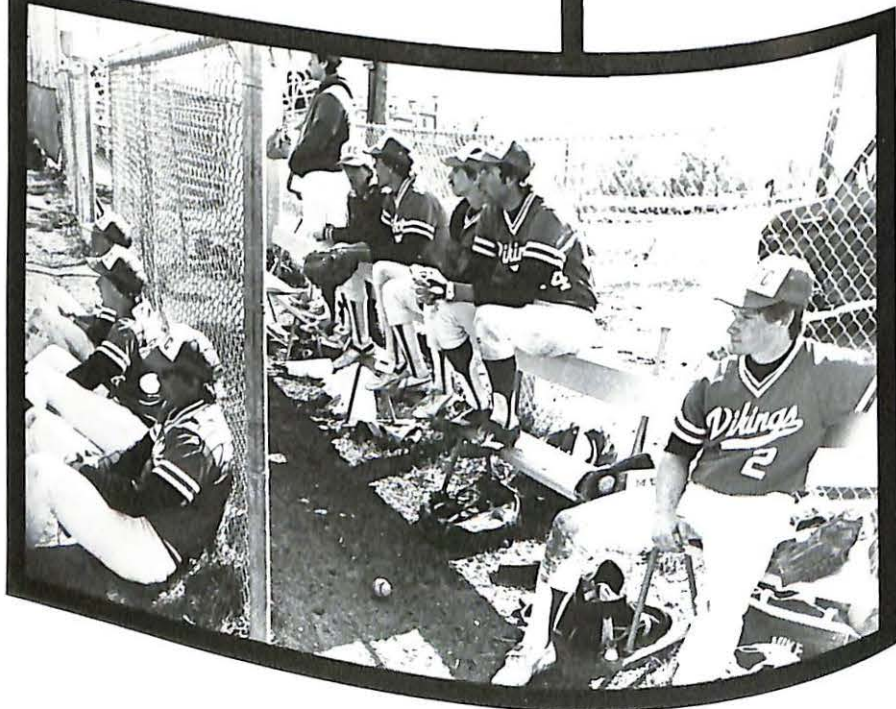

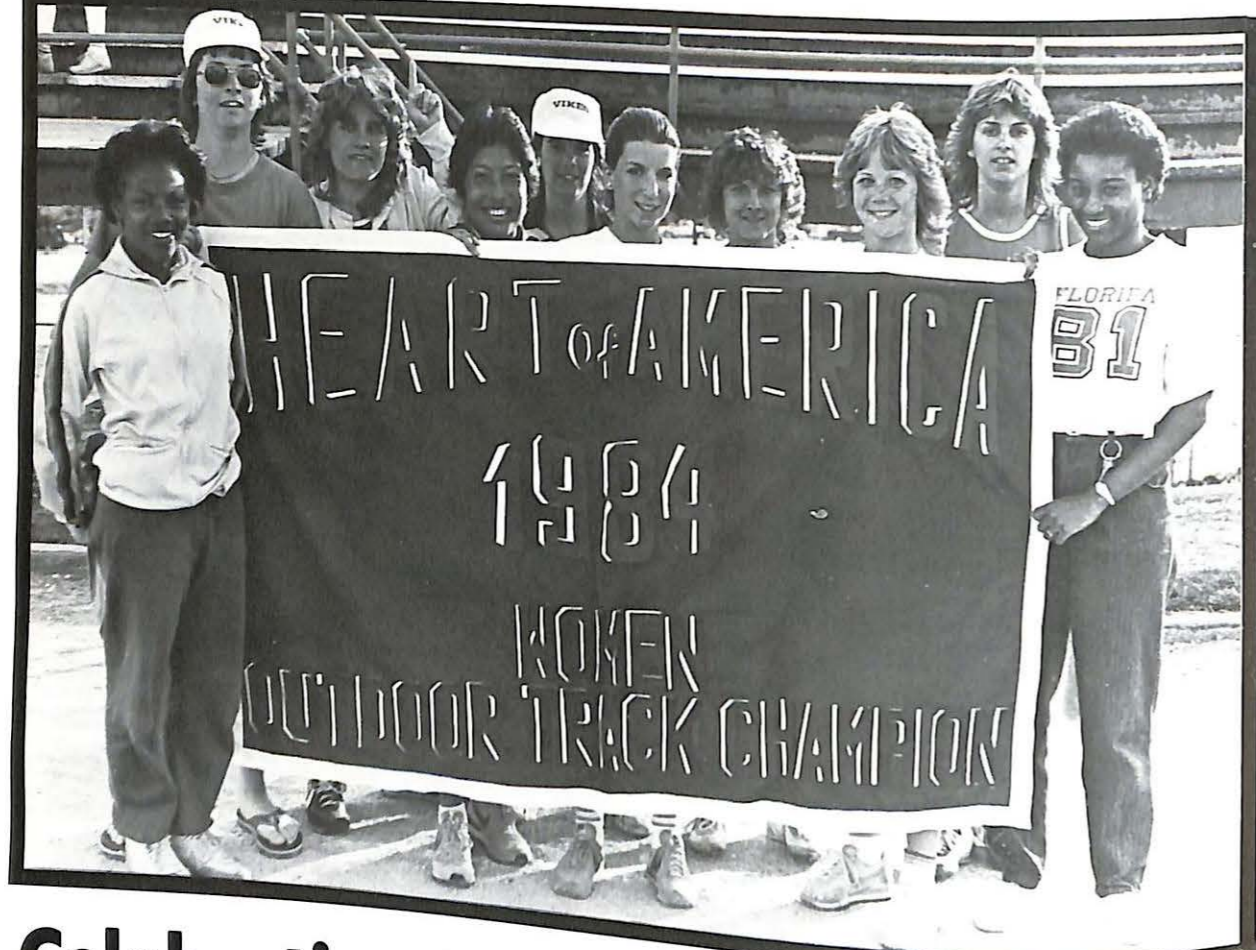

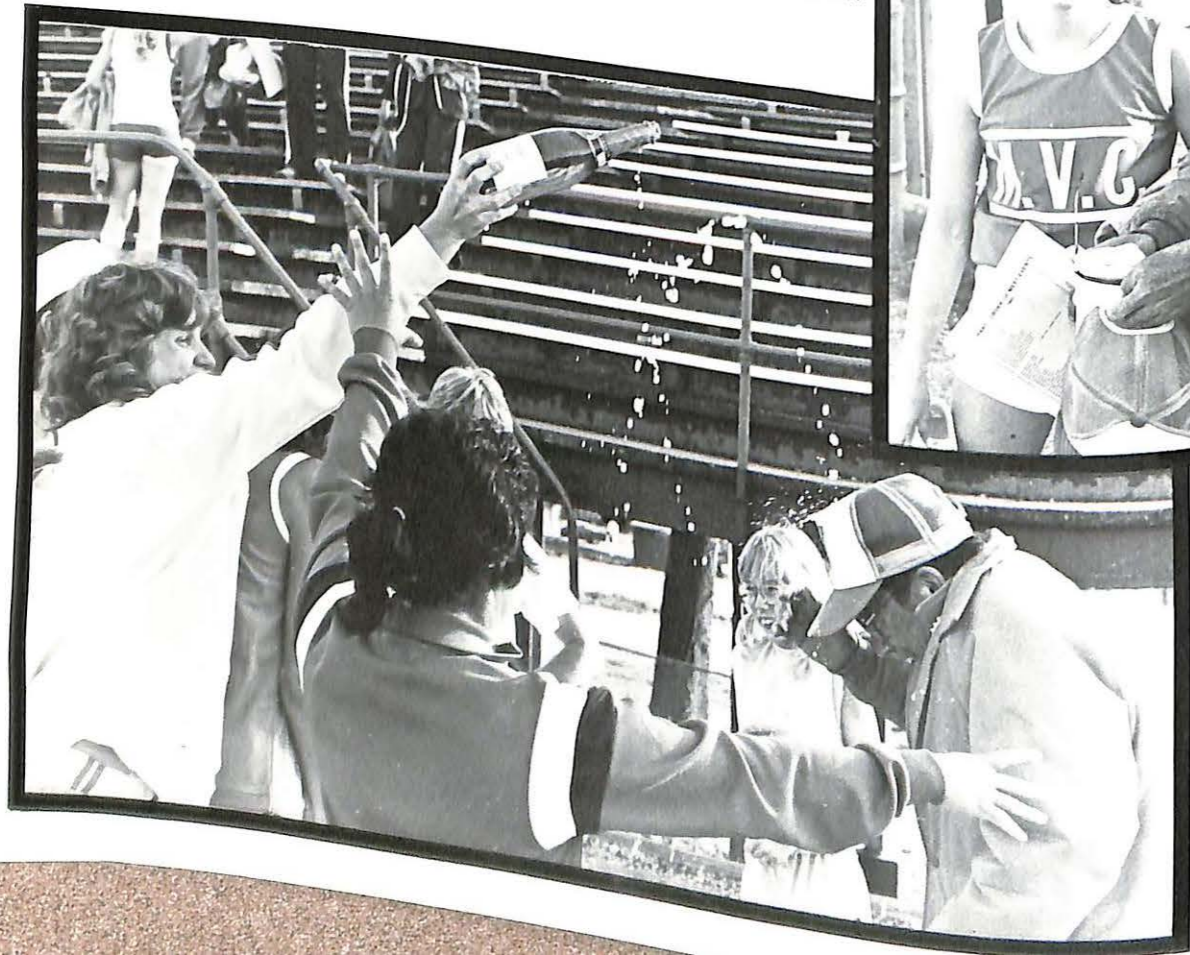
