The football Super Bowl winner (January 2006) was the Pittsburgh Steelers team, who defeated the Seattle Seahawks 21-10.

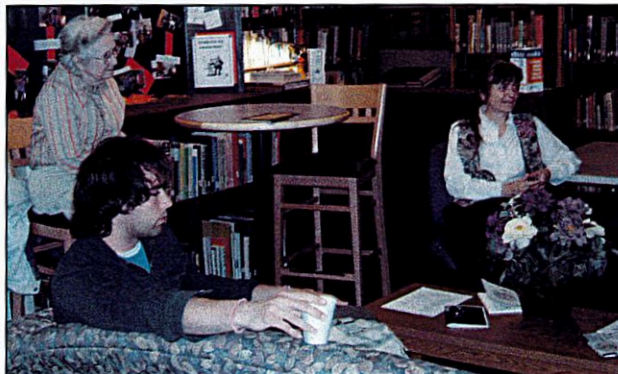
The baseball World Series winner (2005 season) was the Chicago White Sox team over the Houston Astros team.

He also welcomed the freshmen with powerful advice.

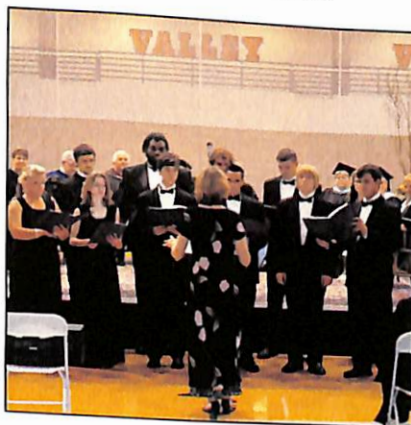
"You are the life of Missouri Valley College. Get involved so you can say, 'I made a difference!'" Hawkins said.

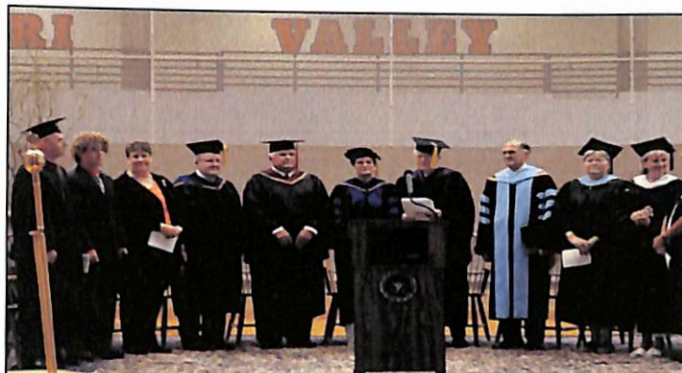
"We have a faculty with exceptional academic credentials.

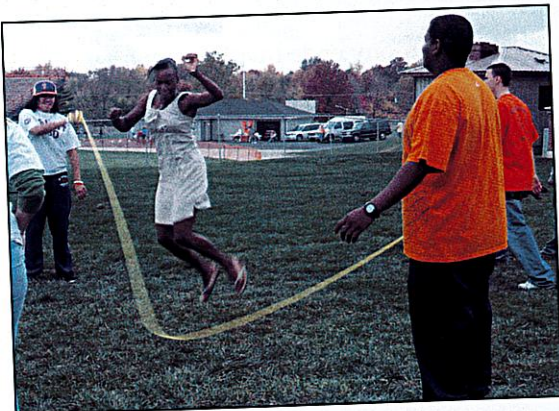

The hurricane season of 2005 was a record-breaking one. It brought the wrath of many storms, but the most devastating was hurricane Katrina.

Hurricane Katrina caused hundreds of deaths and billions of dollars in damage for Gulf Coast states, particularly Louisiana and Mississippi, and was the worst national natural disaster of the century. The city of New Orleans was especially devastated.

More than 75 percent of its population was left without clothing, food, or a place to stay.

In an attempt to raise funds to help the victims of hurricane Katrina, the Student Government Association and various organizations at Missouri Valley College joined forces to host "The One Love Unity Festival" on Saturday, Nov. 5.

This event featured a shave-the-balloon contest, inflatables, face-painting, a three-legged race and the "Pie-a-Theta Phi" stand. Organizations such as the International club, Black Student Union, Theta Phi Alpha sorority and fraternities were present to help raise money for the victims of hurricane Katrina. The One Love Unity Festival was held near the last home game of the season.

"We held it here so that people could watch the game and still be apart of the efforts," said faculty adviser Tamara King.

"Our goal was to bring the community of Missouri Valley College and Marshall together to support and help the people of Louisiana," said Jerad Hollingsworth, one of the student organizers. "The community did not turn out as greatly as we would have liked but there were a few that showed up and they contributed a great deal."

The students raised a total of \$300 at the festival and the Kiwanis Club of Marshall also donated funds to Missouri Valley's One Love Festival hurricane relief efforts.

Picking Corn For a Cause

The Soldiers for Christ (SFC) organization at Missouri Valley College used a unique method of picking corn for fundraising to help the victims of Hurricane Katrina.

The SFC of Missouri Valley, along with students from the International Club and Student Government Association, raised money for hurricane Katrina victims by picking corn in a test plot cornfield just outside Marshall along U.S. Highway 65. The group picked rows of sample ears from a variety of test corn for Syngenta Seeds Inc. Jim Deutsch of Syngenta

Seeds said the group would be rewarded 25 cents for every row of corn picked. The group of 19 students cleared about one acre of the cornfield, working from 7:30 a.m. to 2 p.m.

"We were going to do it as a money-making event to help the group buy snacks for the meetings and gatherings. Then Katrina came through and we realized God had sustained our group and we weren't in that bad of a need for the money," said Susan Dittmer, assistant professor of speech and faculty advisor. "The thing that impressed me was it was 7:30 on a Saturday morning and every student that signed-up was there. That says a lot about some of our college students. We have a lot of students here with good hearts that care about what's going on in their country, and it went beyond this country because some were international students."

"I had never picked corn before, but I knew the cause was important and I wanted to contribute. Our island was hit very hard by Hurricane Frances, so I kind of know what it feels like," said Elkin Knowles, an international student from the Bahamas.

The group donated the money they raised to Seth Theriot, whose family lost their home during hurricane Katrina. Theriot's family lives in Cameron Parrish, Louisiana and experienced the destruction and devastation of hurricane Katrina first-hand. The homes of the Theriot family and other residents of Cameron Parrish suffered severe structural damage, making some of the homes inhabitable.

"Ninety percent of the town was almost totally wiped out," Theriot said.

"We found out about Seth's situation and we just felt like we needed to help and reach out to Seth's community as the Missouri Valley community," said Bryan Gaskill, Soldiers For Christ president.

Theriot's mother was moved to tears by the gesture of the SFC, and the rest of the Theriot family and community of Cameron Parrish were also impressed.

"I am touched and very appreciative of their efforts," Theriot said. "I am not a member of the SFC. but I'm looking to be one now."

During 2005-2006, the SFC held its meetings on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 8:30 p.m. in the Tech Center.

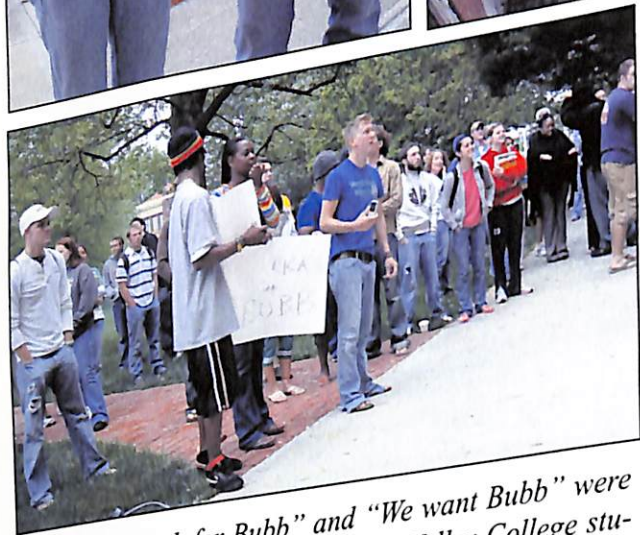
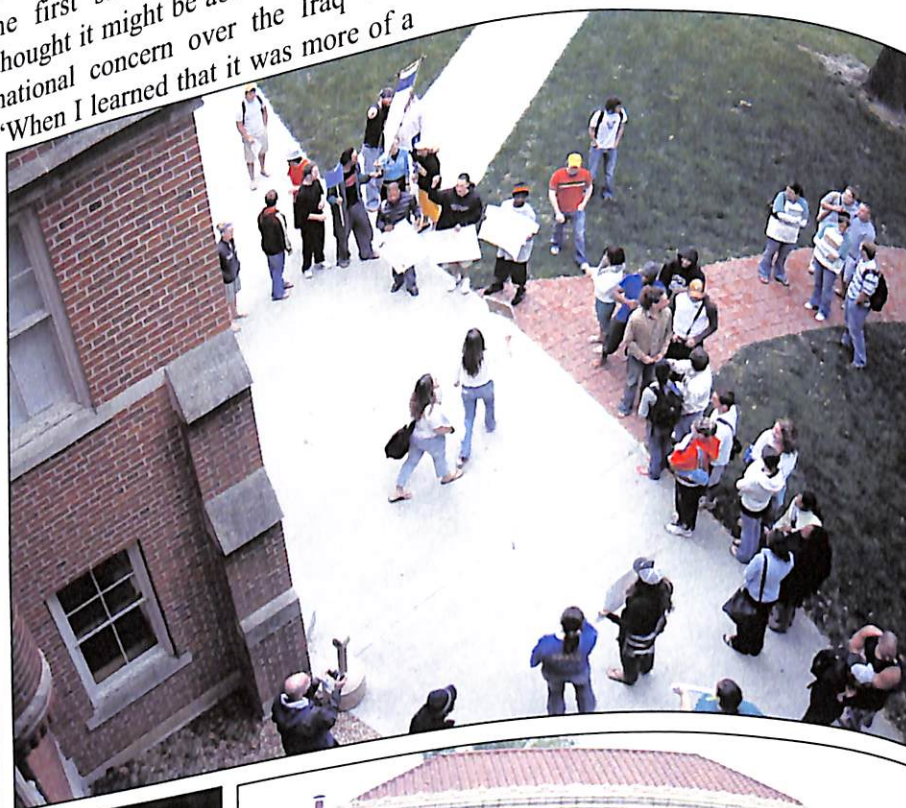
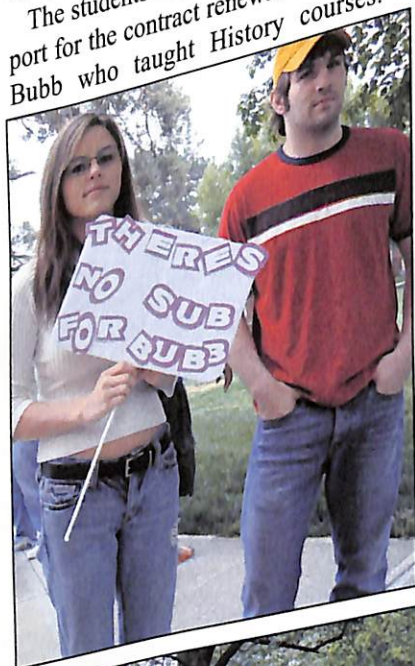
The students organized to show support for the contract renewal of Daniel Bubb who taught History courses.

Bubb and the MVC administration couldn't reach an agreement concerning a contract and his decision to leave drew the concern of students who expressed their support with a campus gathering.

Mass Communication Assistant Professor David L. Roberts said when he first saw the student rally, he thought it might be about the growing national concern over the Iraq War. "When I learned that it was more of a

local issue, I still thought it was good because the rally didn't get out of hand or result in any kind of vandalism," Roberts said, adding that protests or rallies should always stay peaceful.

"Student activism shows that students feel a part of the college community and shows that students care about their college and education," Roberts said. He added that activism is always better than apathy.

First Maastricht Entrepreneurship Institute Speakers from the Netherlands, other places talk about business

In April, for the first time in history the Missouri Valley campus was the home of an international symposium comprised of speakers from both the United States and the Netherlands.

Speakers were generally from the Midwest or the Dutch city of Maastricht, but others included Valley graduates John Ashford, chairman/CEO of the Hawthorn Group of Virginia, and David Wood, York County magistrate judge of South Carolina.

The event was attended by more than 650 people, with about 20 being leaders from the community.

"Over all, I thought that the Maastricht Institute was a fabulous success," President Bonnie Humphrey said. "It was a great opportunity for our students to hear some of the outstanding experts in a variety of fields from all across the world."

The event was initiated in 2004 when former interim President Ed Elliott asked his associate, Benoit Wesly, to speak with students. Wesly, who is from Maastricht, Netherlands, is the founder and owner of Xelat Group which operates in Maastricht and in Herzliya, Israel. Wesly has more than 35 years of experience as a hotel-restaurant-and-travel entrepreneur in Europe. Wesly said he enjoyed his initial interaction with the students so much that he and Larry Stockman, associate professor of Economics and Finance, worked together to organize what would become the Maastricht Institute.

It was a day like every other, but Nov. 11, 2005 marked a special day on the campus of MVC.

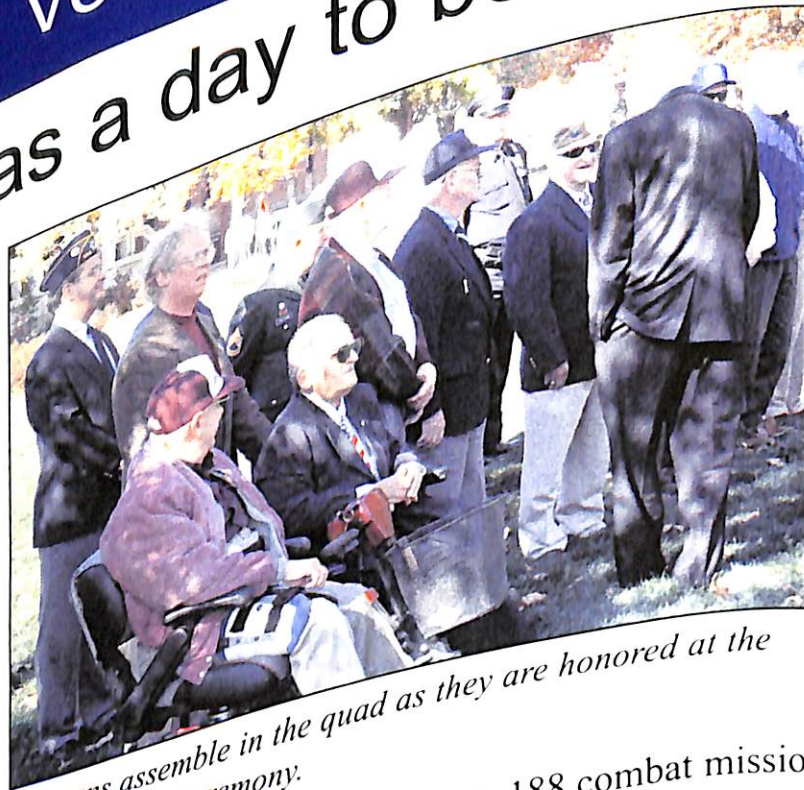
Veterans Day was celebrated with a ceremony in the quad to honor those who had served in the

5. The organization is here to support those who are currently serving in the Armed Forces of the United States.



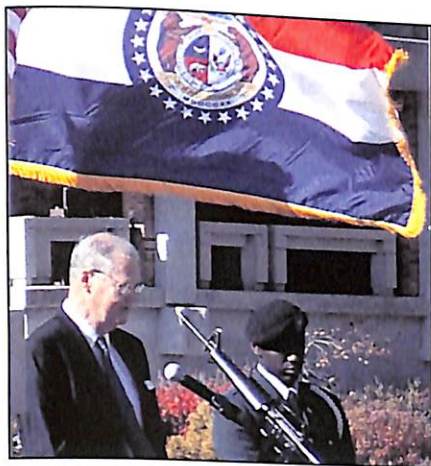

Missouri Valley College revives celebration

 This year's Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday celebration at the college was graced by Clyde Williams, the president of the Marshall chapter of the NAACP.

Williams remembered Dr. King as a conscience of the nation. He said that much has been achieved of his dream but more needs to be done. He cited disparities in education, life expectancy, health and imprisonments as areas that need great attention.

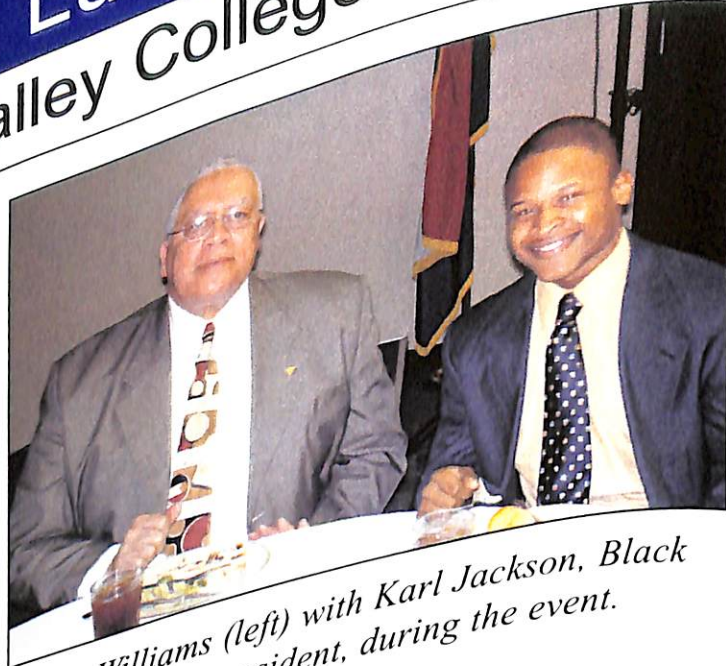
He added that being close enough to achieve the dream is not good enough. "The persistence of racial profiling, hate crimes and unfair wages in some quarters have eroded what Dr. King had envisioned," Williams said.

Others speakers included the MVC Chief Academic Officer Earl F. Wellborn Jr.; the Rev. David Van Horn, adjunct faculty member; Daniel Bubb, Social Sciences lecturer and Karl Jackson, Black Student Union president.

The event, held in the R. Wilson Brown room, was organized by the Black Student Union and the Public relations class with 50 guests in attendance. It was the first MVC event in recent years in remembrance of Dr. King.

few people. She called on those who were present to dream their dreams and articulate them. She talked about the relevancy of Dr. King's dream saying that she is a byproduct of his dream and others. "His dream was for everyone, a God-given dream for the equality of all people," she said.

She gave a personal example when she experienced discrimination because of her skin color. Having married a white man, Easley said she experienced prejudice from both whites and blacks.

However, she appreciated the fact that her parents were from different races, something that was an inspiration to her.

She said people should make sure Dr. King's dream is passed on to their children.

"The dream brought liberation, was far reaching and perpetuating," she added.

The event was organized by Rev. Tim Kiser, director of the Office for Spiritual life.

International Peace Day

Holocaust survivor tells his story

International Peace Day was celebrated on the Missouri Valley College campus on Sept. 21, with a remembrance of the Holocaust.

Speaking also to some individual classes, Peter Loth was the main speaker featured at the Eckilson-Mabee Theatre. Loth was joined by Sarah Colburn, the director of United Campus Ministries of Kansas City.

Loth was a Holocaust survivor of the Stutthof Concentration camp near the Baltic Sea. He was born in the camp of Stutthof in September of 1943. In the camp, if a woman was found pregnant, the baby was usually taken from the mother and killed no matter how old the baby was.

Loth was one of the lucky few who was allowed to live, but that meant he became one of the children who was experimented on.

At Stutthof, the Nazi scientists performed experiments on the women and their children ranging from freezing them to making soap with their body fat. Loth was injected with many different types of drugs by the Nazis and to this day he still has pain from what the Nazis did to him. Loth said that there are days when he cannot even get out of bed, but he has to keep going.

After the war, Loth lived in the city of Torun, Poland under the care of a woman he called his "matka," which is Polish for mother. Because the Russians and the Poles had such a hatred for the Germans after the war, and Loth and his birth mother had German papers, she had to flee. Since it was easier to flee without a child, she left him behind with his "matka." The city of Torun was bombed out from the war so there were not a lot of places to live above ground. Loth and his "matka" lived in the sewer system, eating whatever was available.

"We ate whatever we could find: rats, mice, insects, anything," Loth said.

Soon after he was living with his "matka," he was taken away to live with about 40 other German orphans. Since Loth was born in a German part of Poland, he was considered German by birth.

At the orphanage, Loth was used as a slave, cleaning barracks and clothes and working in the coal mines. He had to endure abuse from the Russian guards on a nightly basis. There were about three or four children who were raped by about four or five

Russian guards. Loth was one of those children. Loth said he has needed many rectal operations in his lifetime because of what he endured in the orphanage. It was not until the age of 14 that he actually heard from his real mother. He got a letter from an American military base in West Germany with a picture of two African-American children. His mother remarried an African-American G.I. and she had two children with him.

"When I saw this picture, I thought there was no way this was my family," Loth said. Before he was able to leave for Berlin to meet up with his mother, he was taken in for questioning by a KGB agent because they suspected him of being a spy.

"They thought I must be a spy knowing someone in the U.S. Army, but I was a 14-year-old kid," Loth said. After 16 months of interrogation, Loth was released and was able to pass Checkpoint Charlie into West Berlin and finally reunited with his real mother. After their reunion, they moved to a military base in Georgia.

Racism and hate followed Loth everywhere he went, he said. In Georgia, he was called names and abused by both whites and blacks for having an interracial family.

Loth currently travels the world spreading his gospel of forgiveness and telling his life story. Loth finds it important that people not forget what happened during the Holocaust and to forgive those people who have trespassed against him. Though he has endured a lot of hate in his life, he still has been able to forgive others.

"If you do not forgive, God will not be able to forgive your trespasses," Loth said, adding it is also important to forgive if you want to be healed. "If I can do it, you can do it," Loth said.

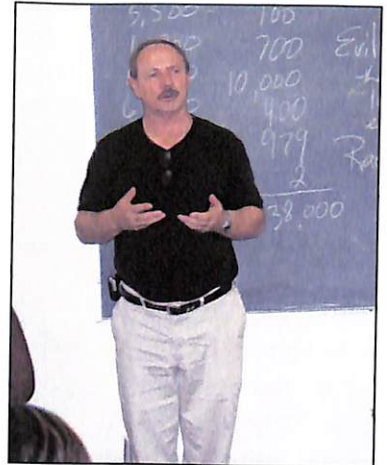

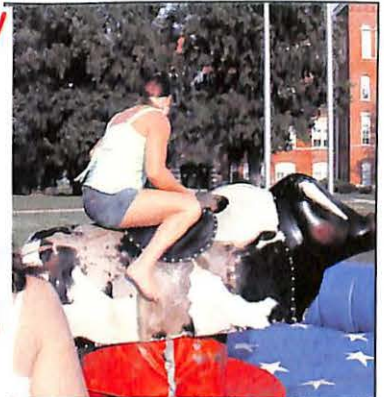

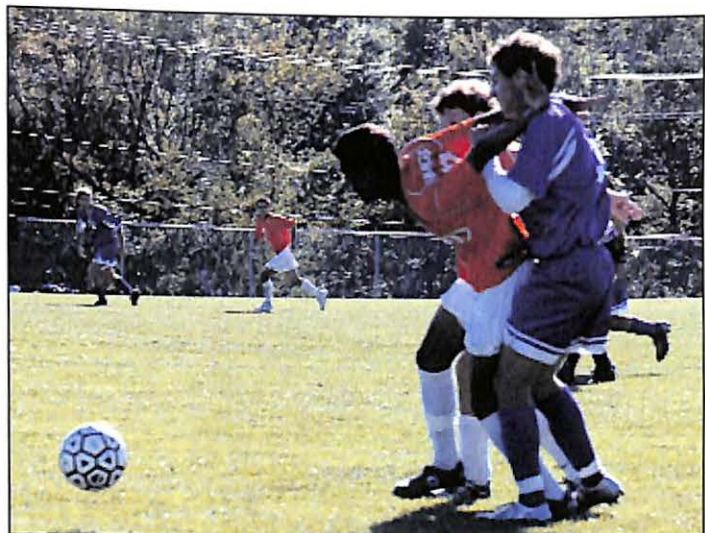

Fighting to look good in the future

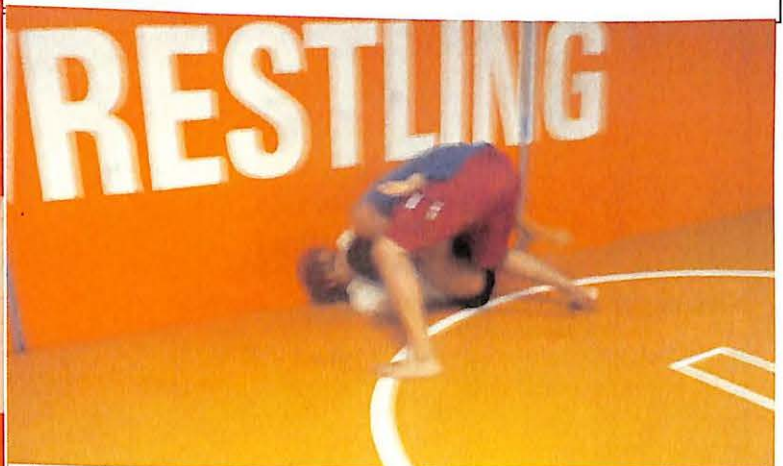

A Future President

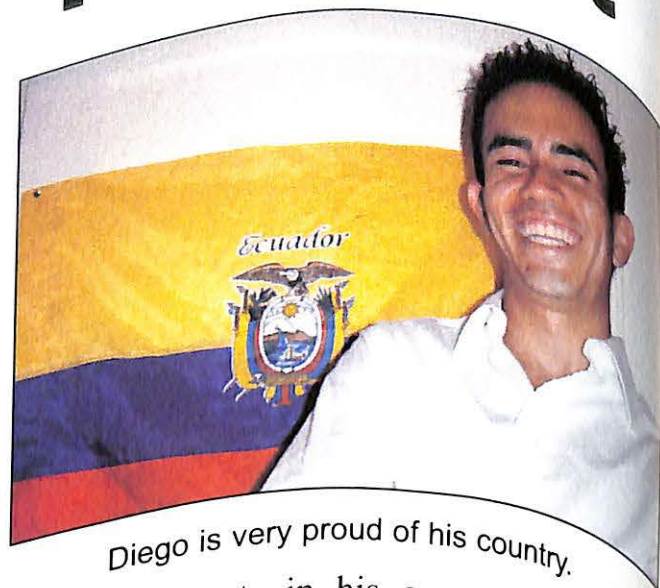

Diego is very conscious about his education. He began to realize that there are a lot of community works to do in society during his first year in the Ecuadorian University. There, he began to work in the Business school student government.

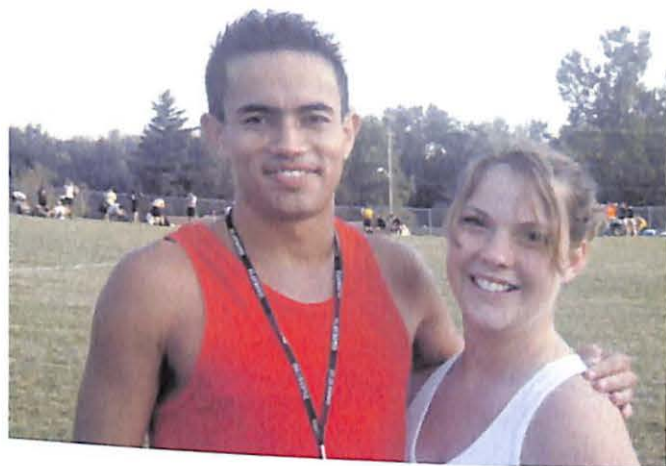

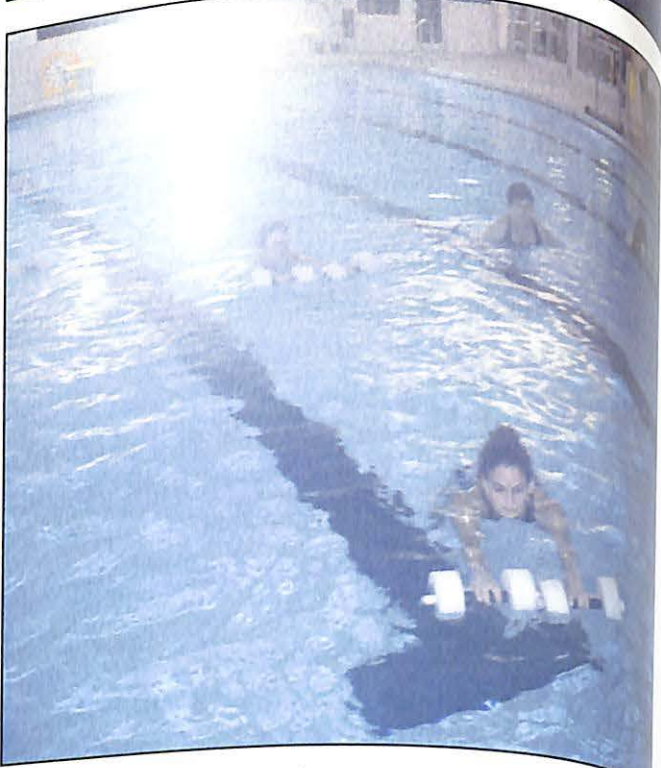
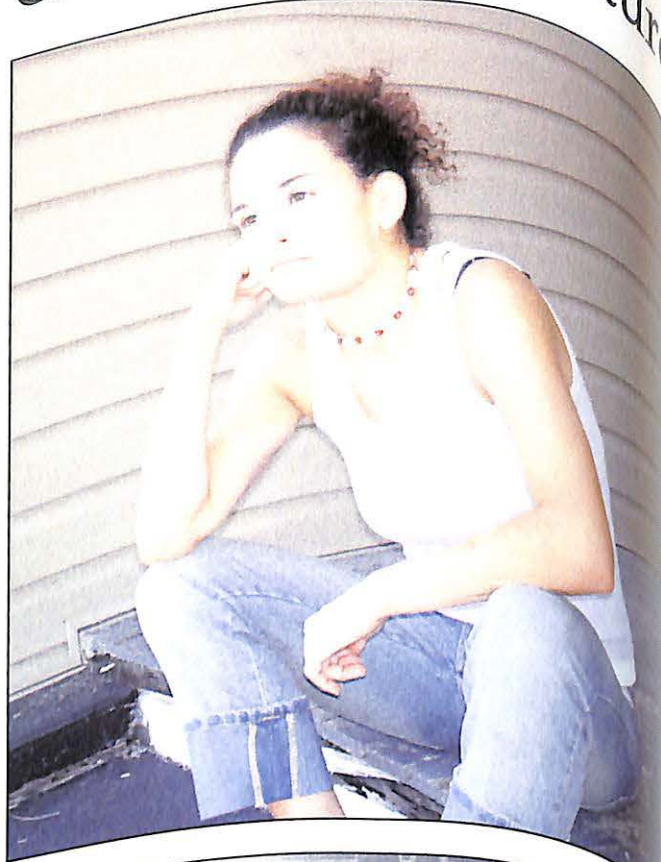
Like most college students, Erin has struggled to find her

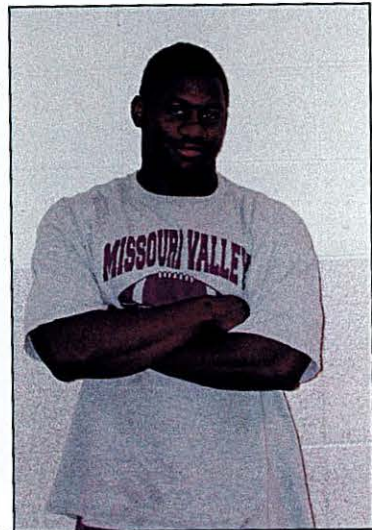

Even though Dean may seem like just another ordinary student, there is more to him than meets the eye.

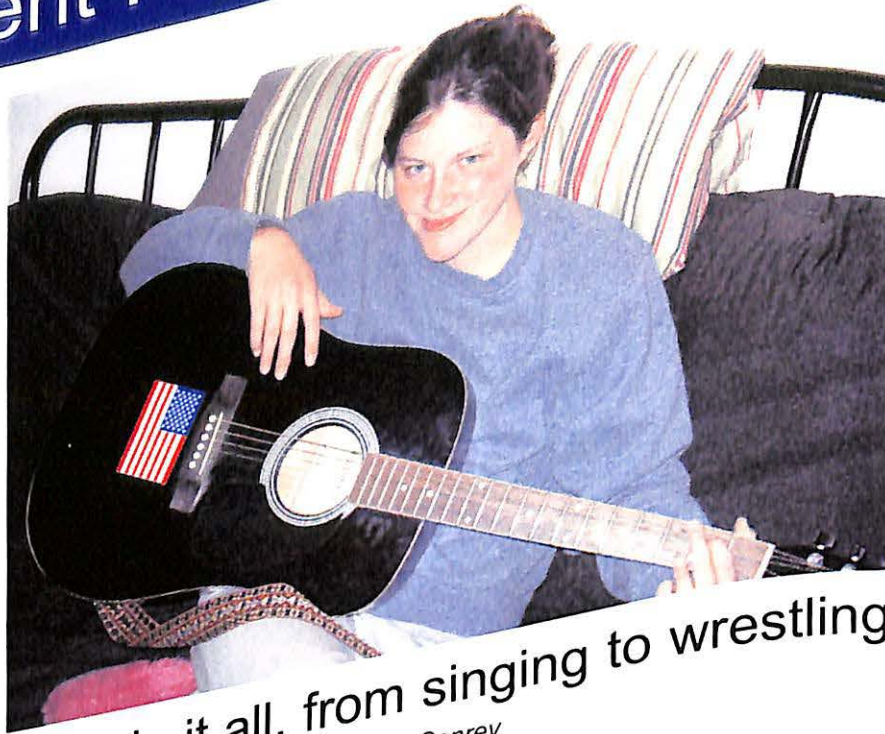


Chris Dean is an art student at Missouri Valley College.

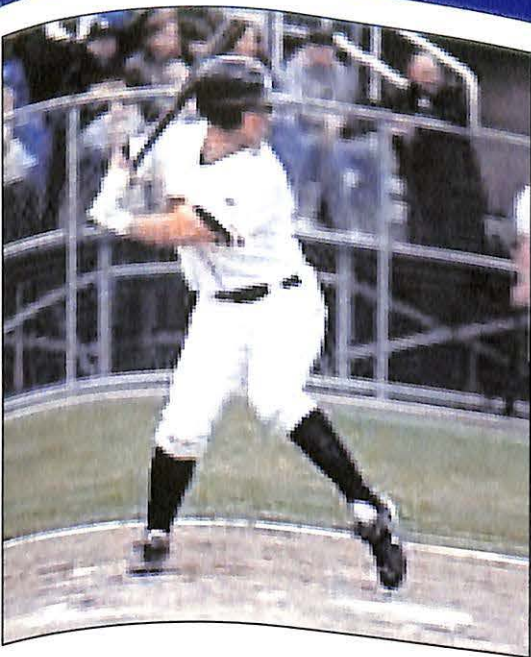

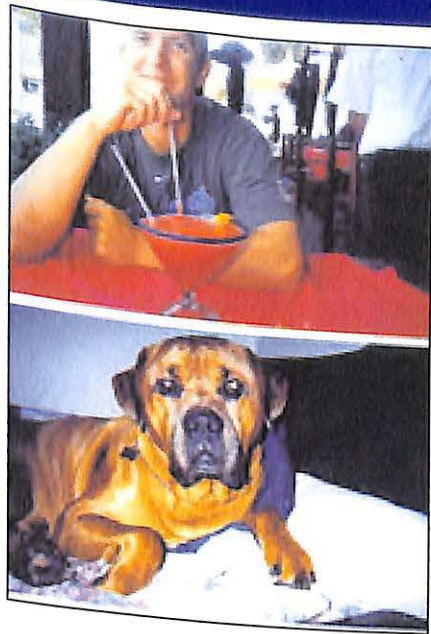

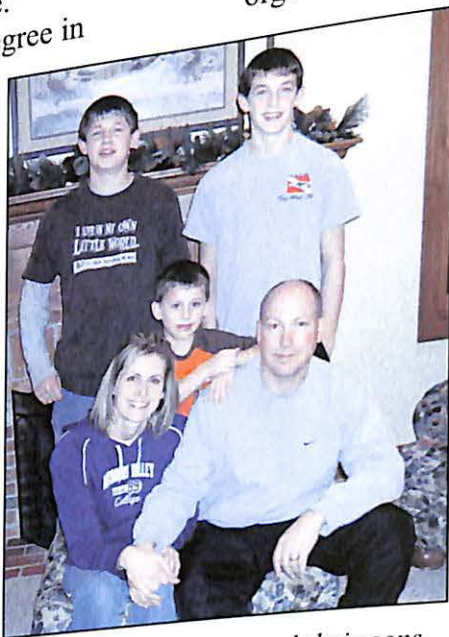
Valley in the fall of 2005. She is a special education major and hopes to teach in an elementary school after graduation.

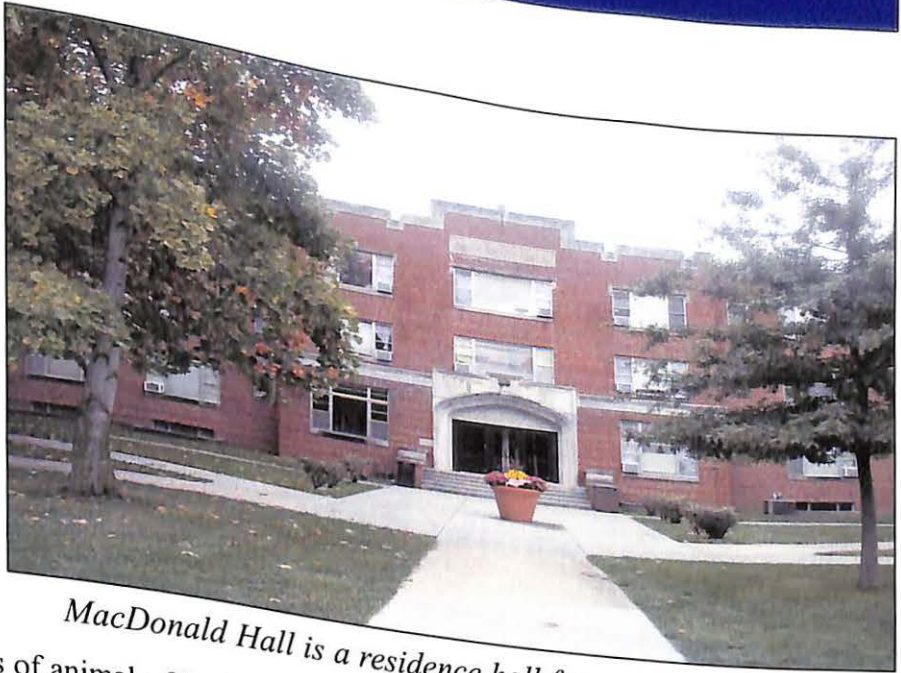
The rooms of the women's dormitory MacDonald Hall are decorated with everything from the ordinary to the unusual.

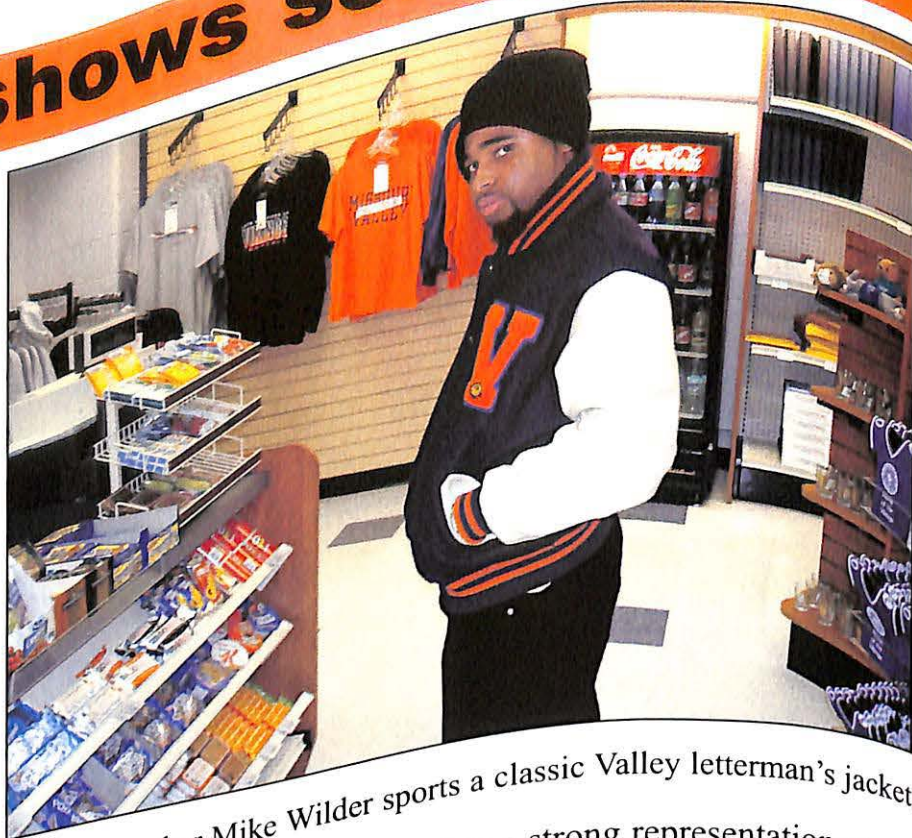
V-Club shows school spirit

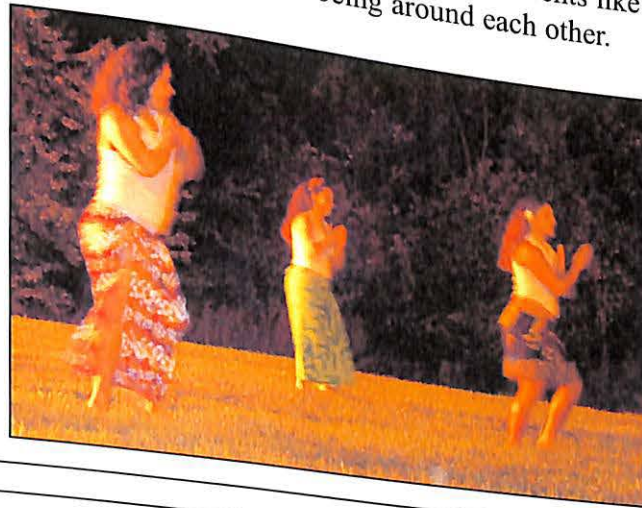

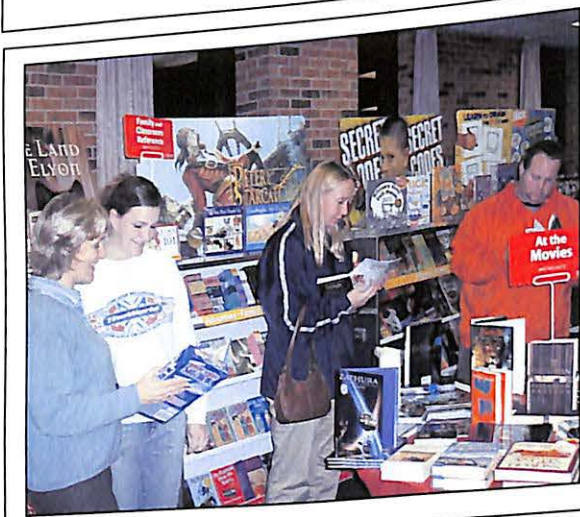
newsletter "The Psyching Viking" is also available around campus.

The Student Government Association, created in 2003, has become one of the largest organizations on campus. The organization provides the students with a representation of their interests at Missouri Valley College.

The SGA was born with the purpose of giving the students a voice. Remembering the initial goal, the members of the SGA have chosen the slogan, "We have a voice."

Tawanda Ngorima, the secretary of the SGA, explained the objective, "We want to give the students a voice and let them know what is happening on campus. Before that, they only had Campus Life."

Last spring, when Drew Hawkins was elected president of the SGA, he said that "getting the student body more involved and informed of the activities that they

For the members, although their meetings are opened to all the Vikings, students only complain through the representatives of the different organizations and residential halls, but they do not want to help solve the problems themselves.

Tawanda does not understand this situation. "All the students must be owners of the school. People don't realize the power they have to change the school."

Because of the lack of involvement, SGA members can only talk with the representatives of the different organizations on campus, and, many times, not all of them attend the meetings. The attendance to these meetings is mandatory for the representatives as part of the council.

Jessica Ross, vice president of Publicity, said, "We can not know what students want if the representatives don't come." The SGA members hope that this situation will be temporary.

Being a SGA member is difficult and time-consuming, too. If a student wants to be part of it, the candidate has to participate in the council during the previous year, have a GPA of at least 2.5, good standing in the college and have been studying in Valley for one year. Gabe Henry, vice president of Student Life, said they "have a lot of work and responsibility and not much time."

Normally, the council members are full-time students, involved in sports or other activities and, in some cases, they have employment as well.

Every March, the entire school is allowed to vote in the election of the seven students who will compose the SGA executive branch.

This year, the association is presided by Drew Hawkins, a senior who was elected last spring as the third president of the organization. He has to preside

over the legislative council and also serve as a representative of students on the Board of Trustees and the Faculty Senate.

Working on the student activities is Gabe Henry, the vice president of Student Life. He has to be on the Campus Life board of activities and help to plan activities for students.

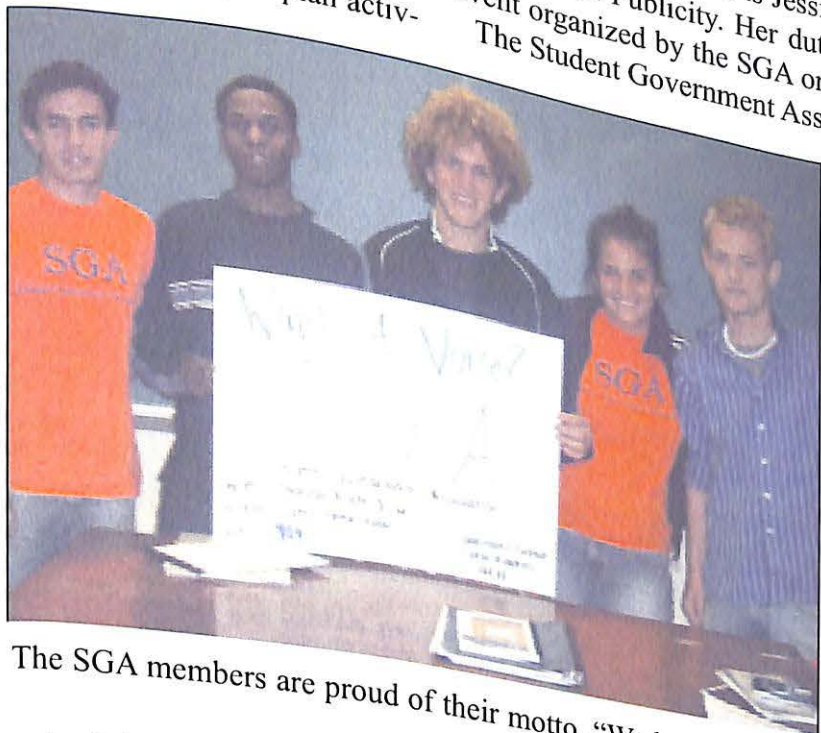
ing Bible studies with the chaplain and getting the community more involved with the college.

Tom Ibarra talks about sports

Cousin's memorial brings KC Star assistant sports editor back to Valley

Tom Ibarra remembered, as a child, how his cousin John, who played on the MVC football team, was considered a real family star.

Ibarra said, for a 5-year-old child, watching an MVC football game was like watching the Super Bowl.

But 15 days before his cousin would graduate from Valley, John was riding in a convertible with a group of friends, returning to Marshall from Arrow Rock, when the car missed a turn and rolled, pinning John under it. John died later from his injuries.

On the 40th anniversary of John's death, the Ibarra family held a special memorial.

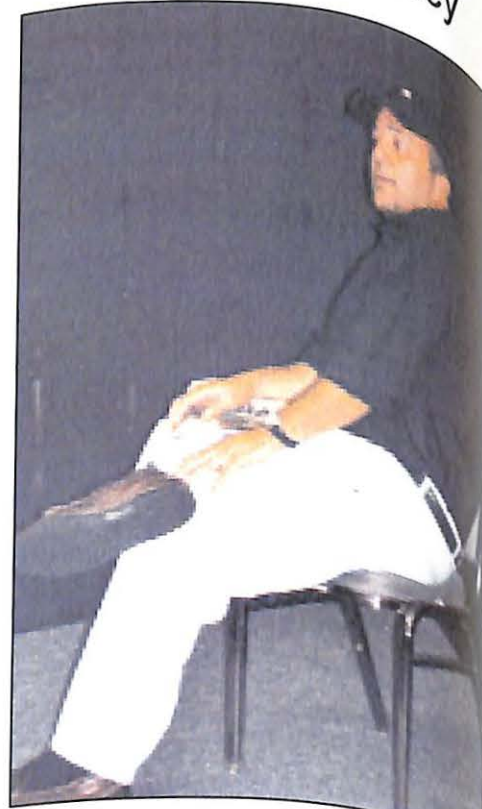
For the memorial, Tom, who is the assistant sports editor for the Kansas City Star, went into his journalism reporting mode in the summer, tracking down people, such as Ed Leslie, who had known John, borrowing MVC yearbooks from Dick Butterfield, attaining scanned copies of photos from David L. Roberts. Tom

found that lots of people had great memories of John.

In returning the yearbooks in October 2005, Tom Ibarra talked to Mass Communication students taught by Kendal Rasnake and Harry Carrell and served as a guest speaker at the Introduction to Mass Communication class taught by David Roberts.

Students enjoyed hearing about Ibarra's 21 years of work at the Kansas City Star. He told about meeting George Brett, Joe Montana, and other famous athletes.

Covering high school sports and auto racing, including a NASCAR event that MVC students also attended for fundraising purposes, Ibarra told about the importance of high school sports. He said people save stories and photos from newspapers about professional sports teams. They cut out stories and photos about their children in high school sports for scrapbooks that student then have for the rest of their lives, he said.

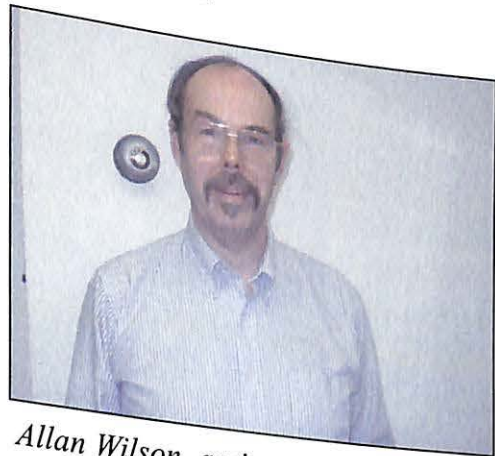

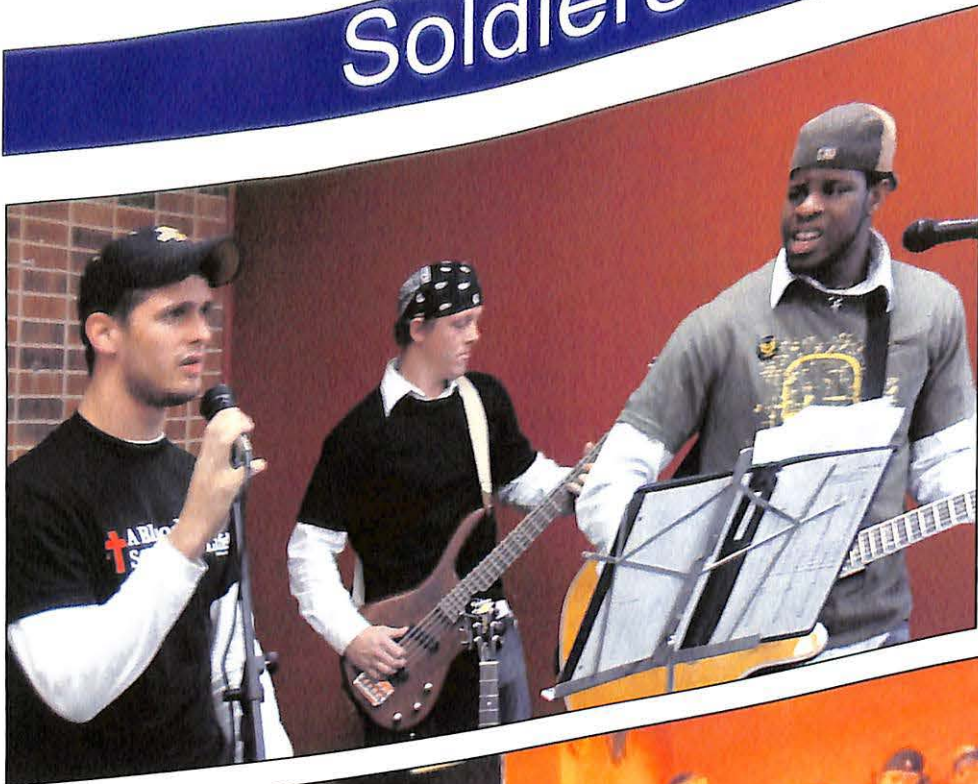

When most people picture the college atmosphere, they imagine a place where sex, drugs and alcohol reign supreme.

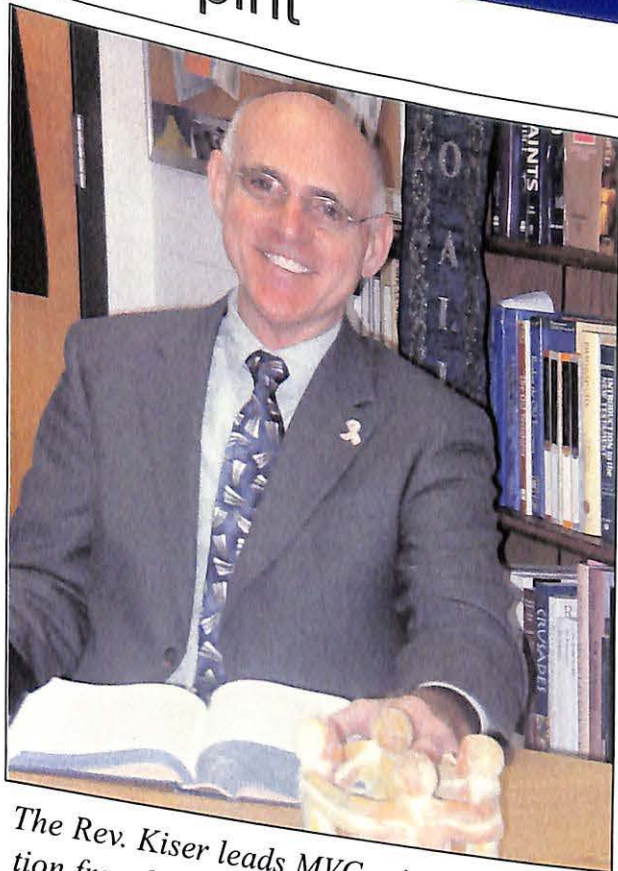

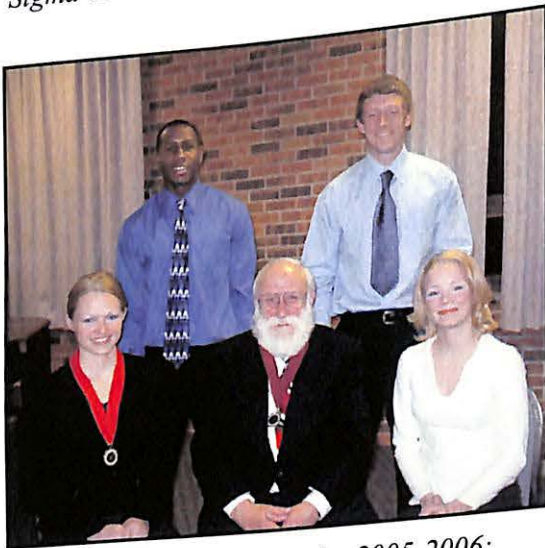

Some of the stories covered by the sports class included Kevin Conrey's winning of the All-American title in track, rodeo expenses, and the wrestling program.

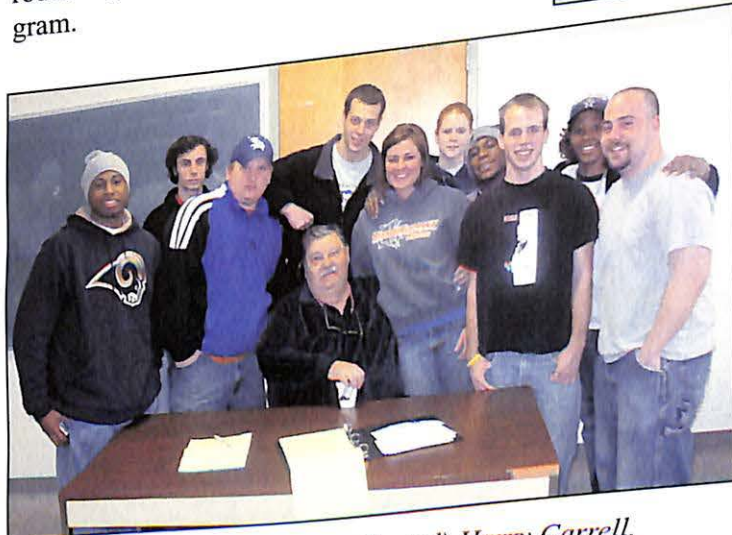

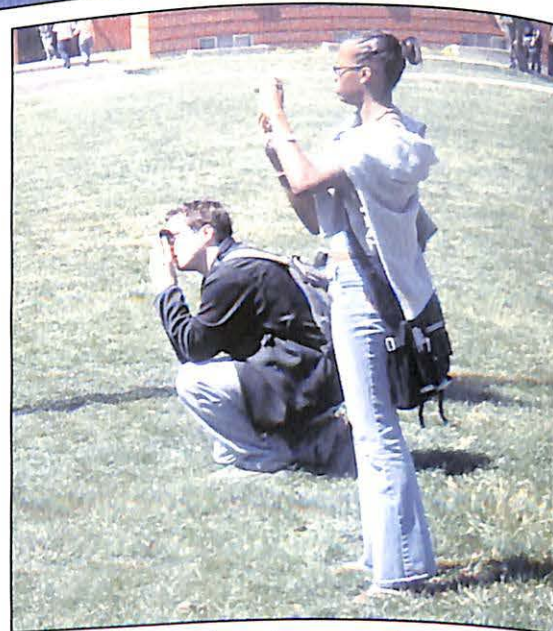

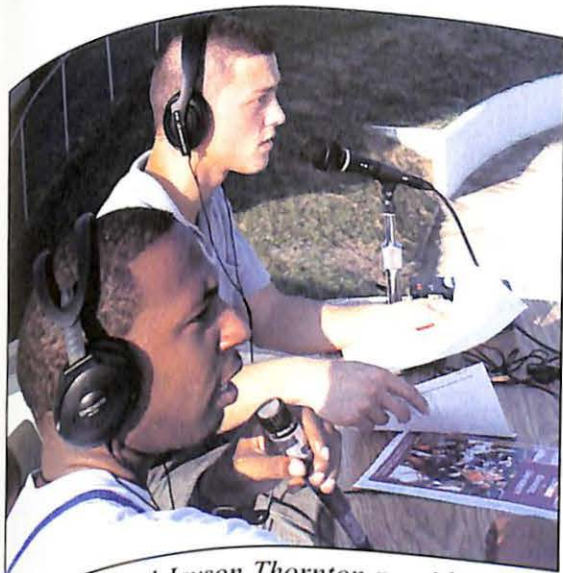

Valley brings talent to the world of Radio

They talk to thousands of people at the same time in one small room, using their personality to grab someone's attention for an hour or two, making someone's day by playing their favorite song and saying their name over the air. This is what some of the college students do day-in and day-out at the college radio station KMVC 91.7, the V. The college radio station has been a great opportunity for students to gain a lot good on-air experience. Experience is mainly what stations look for when they are getting ready to hire someone for any position at the station. A phrase many professors use when talking about it is: Getting your foot in the door. In other words, get a job at a station somewhere no matter where or how trivial the job is, and have something to put on your resume.

Valley is different from most big-time college stations where the competition to get on the radio is so fierce that very few students are actually allowed on the radio.

At Valley, any student can get on the air as many as two to three times a week. Station Manager Ryann Schmidt said, "Working at the radio station at Valley is a great advantage because, at other schools, you may not get on the air until your senior year. Here at Valley, you have a chance to learn the industry as a freshman." Not only do DJs get more on air time but music gets put into the rotation a lot faster here than at big-time stations like 105.7 in Kansas City that just started playing them this past July.

But with every advantage comes some disadvantages. At Valley, one disadvantage is funds, which causes the students to work with out-dated equipment. At a bigger college, the atmosphere surrounding their station would be more realistic to what an actual station is like. The students would be forced to play what the format of the station is designed for and would be fired more easily for not showing up for a shift.

At Valley, however, in the past the format has been whatever the DJ at the time felt like playing. Schmidt said, "The average listener would not be able to tell that we do not operate like a real station except for the fact that we play PSAs instead of commercials."

But the little differences can make a big difference, like when the DJ does not show up for his shift. Then the management must go from a live show to a recorded show that may have been played many times before, or in a worse-case scenario the station just goes completely off the air until the next DJ shows up.

With a new piece of equipment that just came in this year, Valley may have taken a big step toward eliminating this big disadvantage. It is a piece of software called Nex Jen 101, which will allow the station to make a move that lots of stations have already made, a move to a live-assist format. This will mean that the DJs will no longer need CD players to play music. Instead, everything will come directly off the computer. The day of the rap hour here, a country hour there, and a rock hour to finish it off will be over. The station will move to an entirely alternative format. Although there is talk of the specialty show moving to the weekends, it is apparent that the DJ will lose much freedom in this move.

With this move, the station will be making history. For the first time in its existence it will be on-air 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Though some of the DJs' freedom is being taken away, most students seem really excited about the change.

McHendry said, "I am real excited about it because I will be able to tell what is being played at what times." This will help McHendry make sure that people are sticking to the station's format. Though DJs may have lost a little freedom, it appears that they have gained an incredible advantage in the career world of radio.

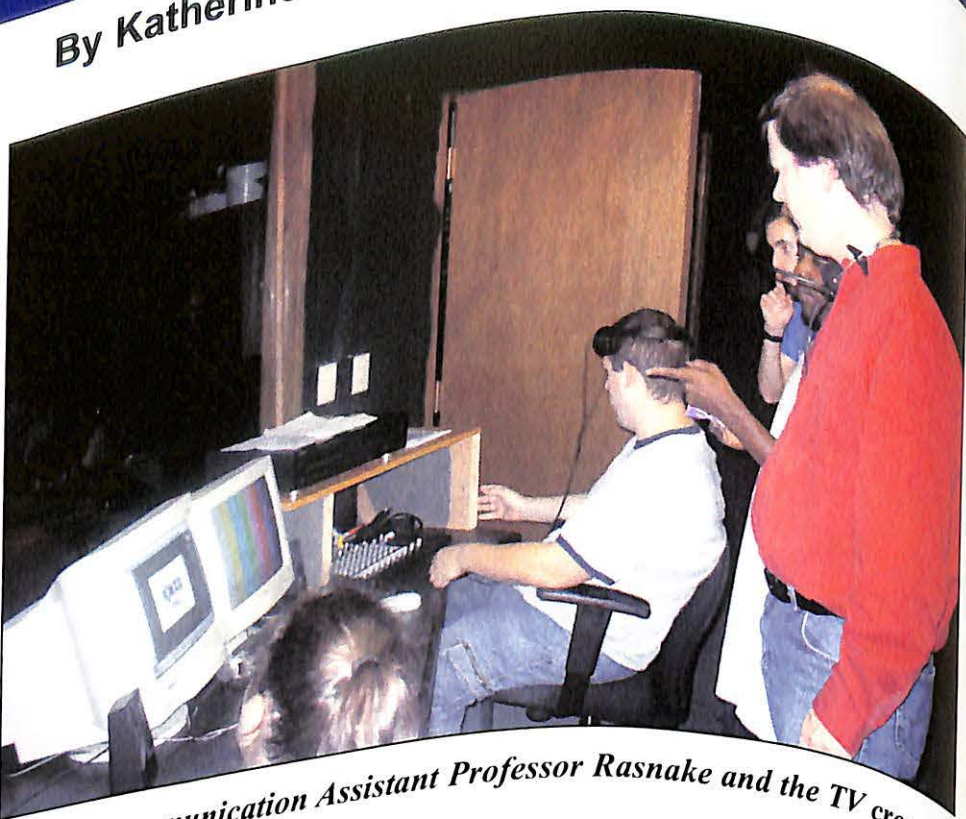

The late night show was hosted by Theatre senior Travis Cox.

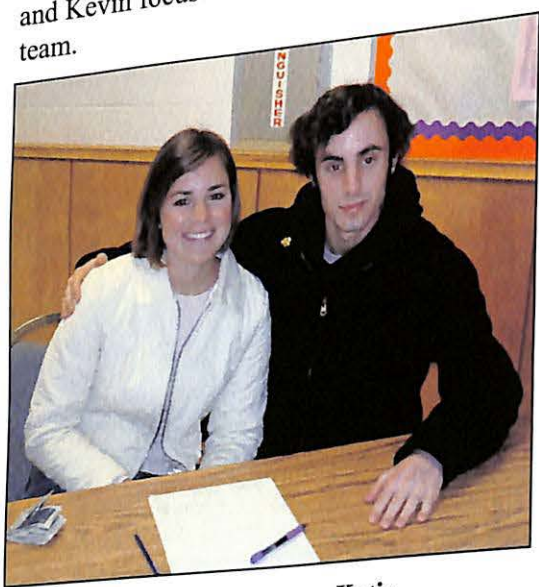

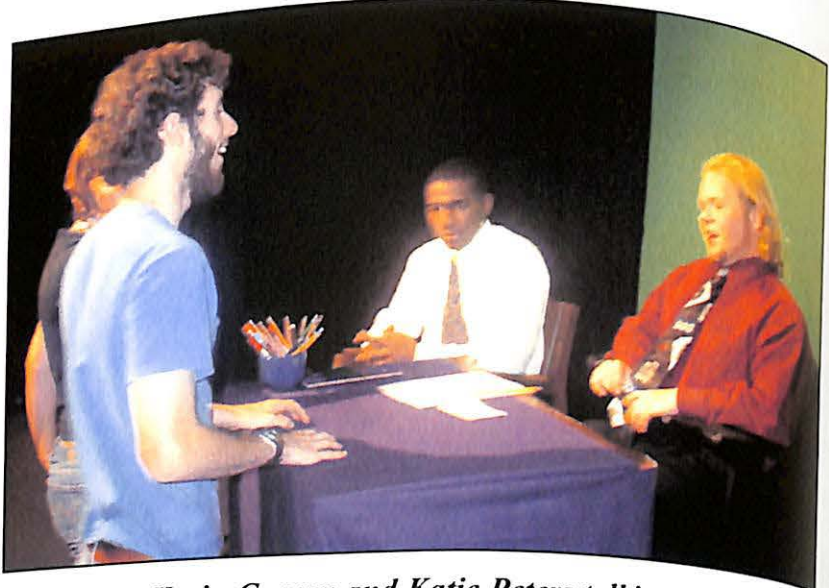

Many students participated or enjoyed watching the intramural activities during this year. Interest is likely to increase for next year, since many students were talking about the fun they had.

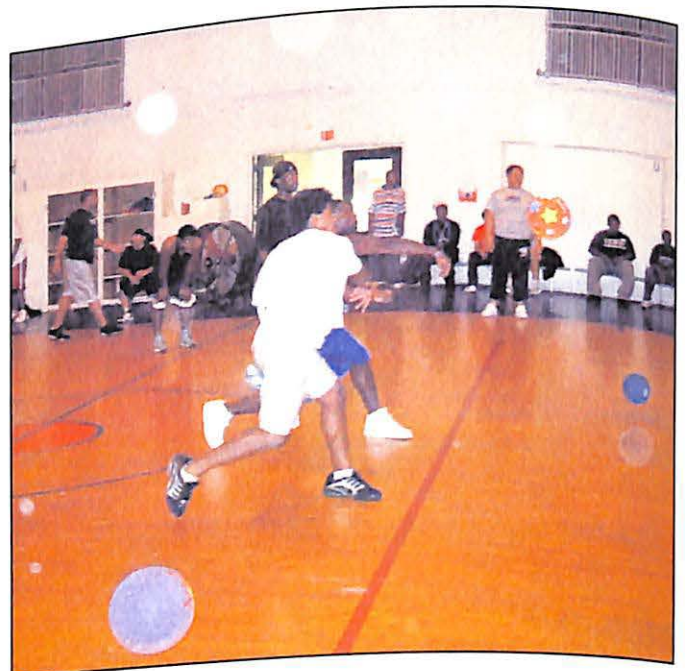

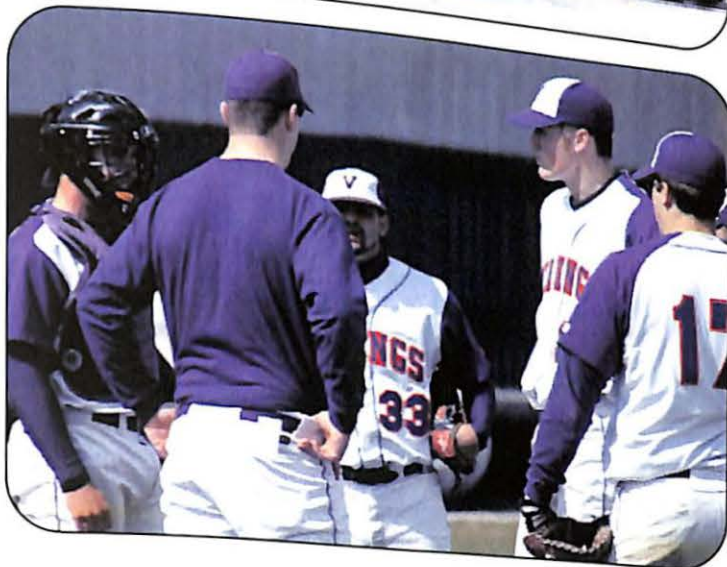
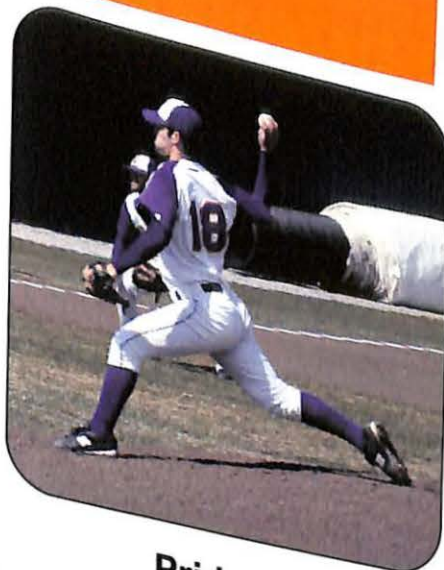

Aside from sweeping victories, the team is also a foundation for inspiring friendships among teammates as well as with their coach.

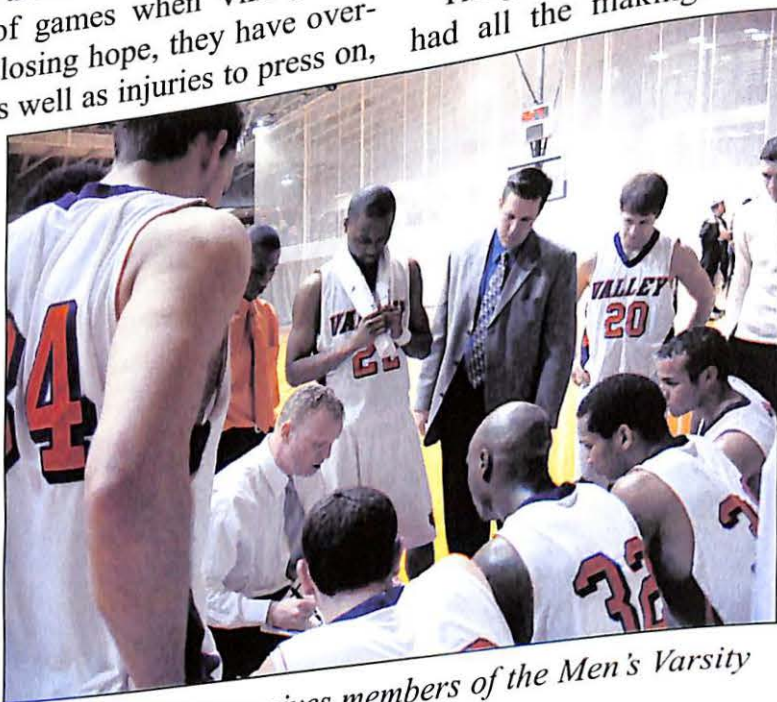
Player Doug Biggs recalled the most memorable piece of advice that he received from Lance- "He always says- it

However, the season as a whole will be remembered as one of inspiration, perseverance and, according to seniors Morrow, Miller and Biggs, just plain "fun!"



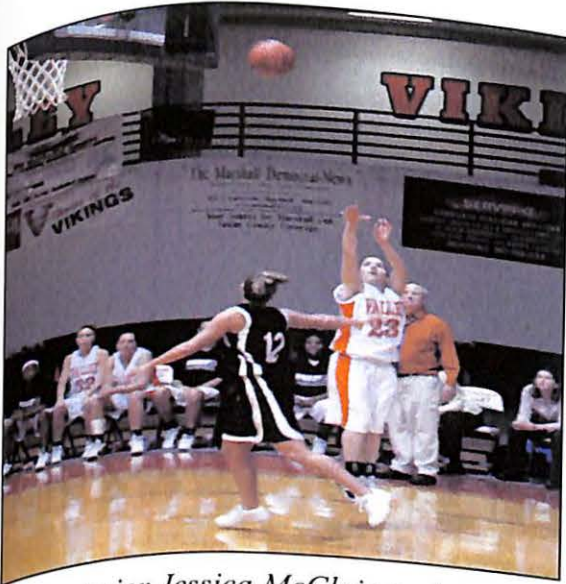

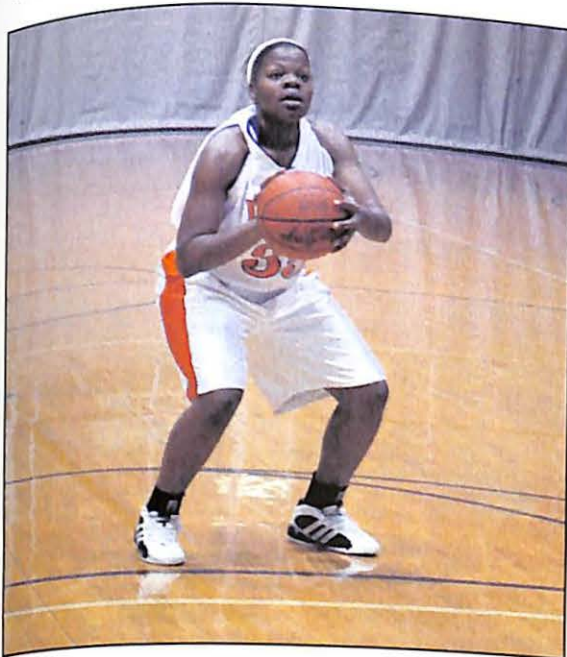

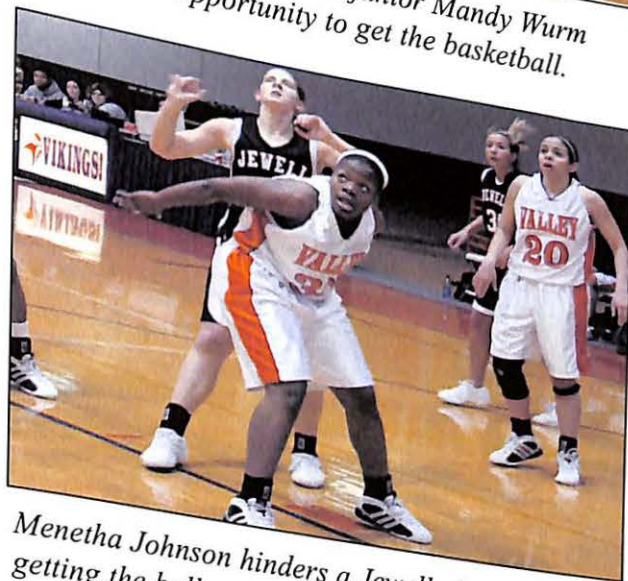

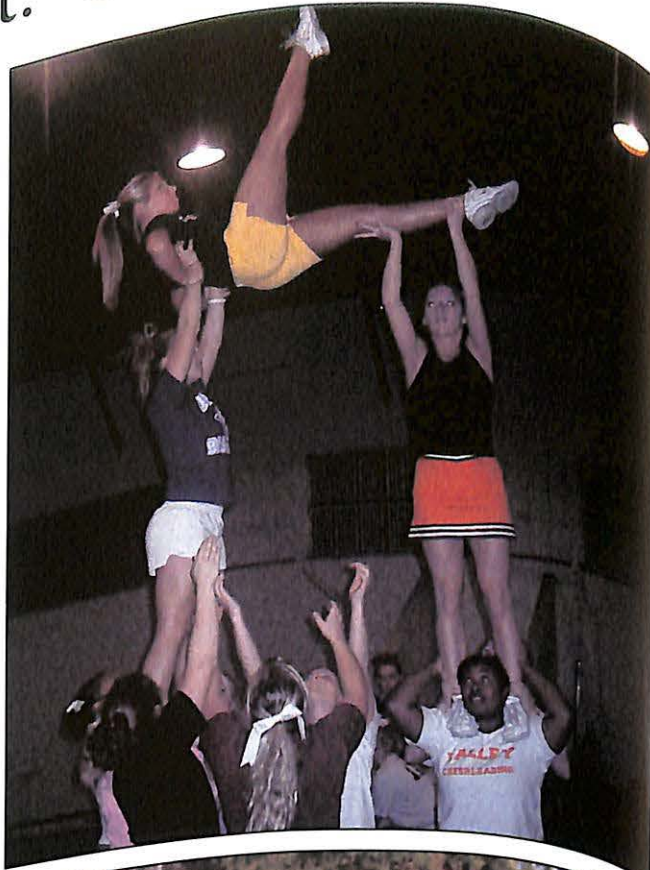
what they present in their routine. "I love stunting and doing basket tosses," cheerleader Nicole Hobson said.

Brazil is probably the home country of the best soccer players in the world. Not in vain, its national team has won the World Cup five times.

For a population largely in poverty, soccer is more than a sport or a hobby; for Brazilians, soccer is passion, a way of life.

Because of this social situation for their country, many Brazilians dream of becoming professional soccer players from the time they are very young.

This is the case of Leonardo, Rafael, Patrick, Jose, Lucas and Diego; six young Brazilians on Missouri Valley College's soccer team.

Diego Rosa has played soccer all his life. He always wanted to become a professional soccer player.

When a friend studying at Valley encouraged him to join the team and he obtained a soccer scholarship one year ago, Diego packed up and set course for the United States. An exceptional season with Vikings Varsity team, including awards as the Players of the Week, helped him to become the captain of the team this year. He shared this position with the defender Robert Peters and the forward Drew Hawkins.

Diego persuaded some of his friends from Brazil to play for MOVAL to reinforce the team.

With their help, the Varsity soccer team finished the season at the doors of the play-offs for the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics' Region V Tournament.

The season was difficult for the Varsity players with a total of 18 games, some of them taking place in the same week. There were good and bad moments.

All of the players selected the games against William Woods and Baker University as the most exciting ones.

The Vikings knocked Baker out of the NAIA Region V top five with two goals of the Brazilian forward Leonardo Silva Jr. and missing a player out of the field. However, the victory didn't produce a ranking. Valley had to wait and see whether their point rating would be high enough to get them into the regional tournament.

Also, the triumph over William Woods by 4-0 is still in the memory of the Viking players.

"William Woods was my best game. The coach told me that I played better than ever before,"

Diego Rosa said.

The Spanish goalkeeper Eneko Ruiz considered the games against Hannibal LaGrange and Benedictine, when he stopped three penalties, as the most important. However, the Vikings have also had their bad moments, as a team or individually.

Leonardo Silva, 22, did not want to remember his first game. "I had my first red card with only 10 minutes playing," he said.

The Spanish forward Brais Barros said, "I felt exceptional at the beginning of the season, but then, my health played me a dirty trick."

The worst was still to happen. Eneko Ruiz could not forget the moment when the team learned that they were out of the competition.

He explained, "Most of us were watching the first basketball game when the coach, Vladir Simic, told us that we were out of the competition."

Diego Rosa said that if they had stayed really united since the beginning, the team would be in the play-offs. Leonardo agreed, "If we had played since the start as the last six games, all would have been different."

In spite of the problems, the Vikings achieved 10 vic-

ories and were 6-3 in league play with much effort and perseverance. However, the complicated score system put the team out of the play-offs for the Regional Tournament.

The leading scorers of the team, the Brazilian players Leonardo Silva Jr., with 14 goals, and Patrick Figueiredo, with 13 goals, were selected on the all-Heart of America Conference squad for the 2005 season, with the Serbian sweeper, Andrija Mirkovic.

As the men asserted, these results would not have been real without the support of their fans. "Every time that I looked to the stands, our fans were most stimulating ones. They screamed, played the drum, took pictures and celebrated the goals with us. I loved it," Brais Barros said.

Coach Vladimir Simic has provided important support for the men, too. Since he began training the Varsity team three years ago, he has gotten better and better results. The team did not only consider him a coach; they also saw him as a friend. Diego Rosa agreed, "He is always there for whatever each of the members of the team needs. Vladimir is an excellent person."

So many hours practicing and playing together have created strong relationships among the players. Patrick Figueiredo recognized that many of his friends are members of the team; in fact, he lives with the other Brazilian players, Leonardo Silva, Rafael Carneiro and two Argentinean players of the JV, Maximiliano Coronel and Mariano Galeano.

Eneko Ruiz said, "There are many international players in the team; thus being so united is normal." Brais Barros considered the several trips to the away games another reason for the friendship and the companionship among the members of the team. "The trip to Oklahoma was an unforgettable experience, I think that we were more integrated after it." Since the men's soccer program was established at MOVAL in 1986, every year it has received more support and popularity.

The Vikings compete in the NAIA and are a member of the Heart of America Athletic Conference and Region V, which is one of the most competitive regions for soccer in the nation. Whereas football and basketball tend to rule the sports world in the United States, in the home countries of these players, like Brazil or Spain, soccer is "the king sport." The players come from an environment where becoming a professional soccer player is the dream of many children. Diego Rosa talked about "tradition" as he referred to the passion for soccer in his country. "I think it's a question of hot blood. Latin people have soccer in their veins." The goalkeeper Eneko Ruiz pointed out, "Professional soccer is a candy that most people never get." Consequently, he prefers to enjoy soccer while he finishes his college degree.

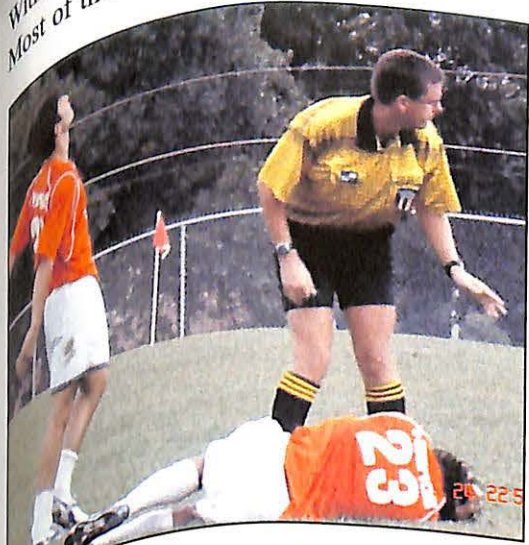

With the soccer season completed, the Vikings think about their futures. Most of them, as Eneko Ruiz, are doing videos of their season with the

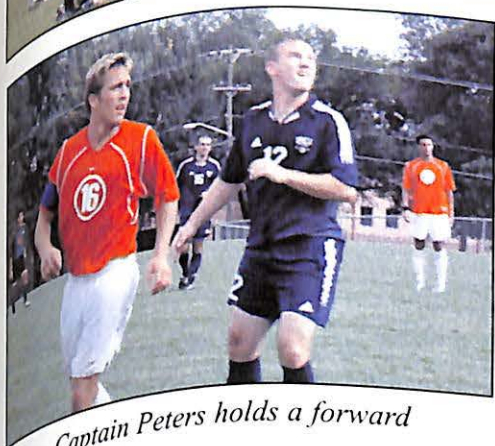

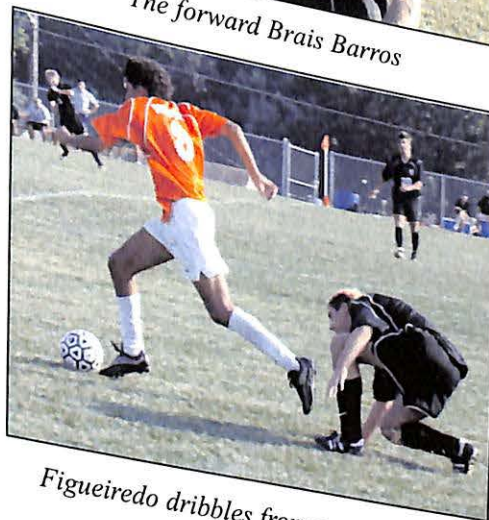

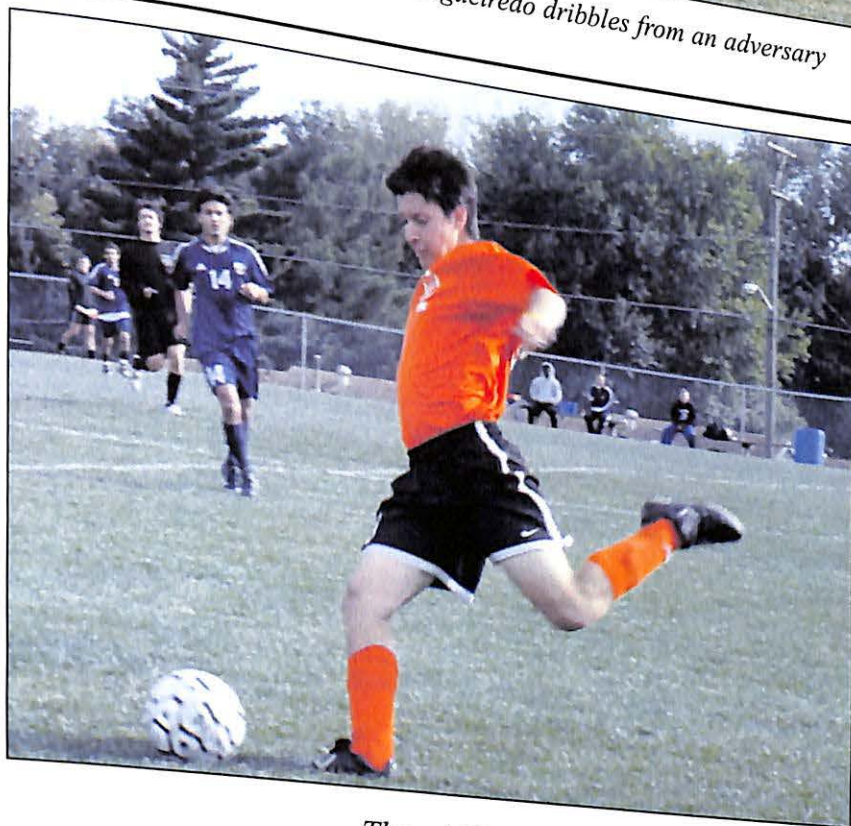
The Junior Varsity Players

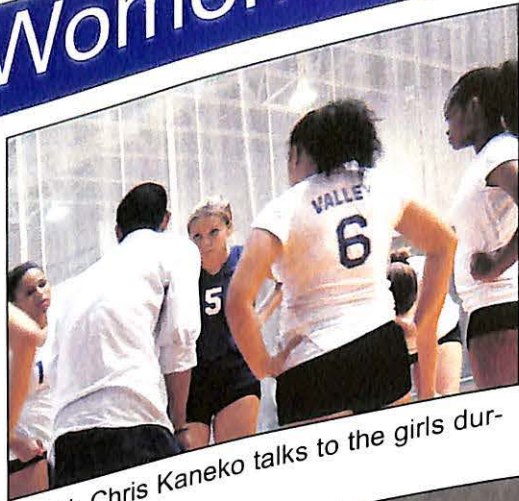

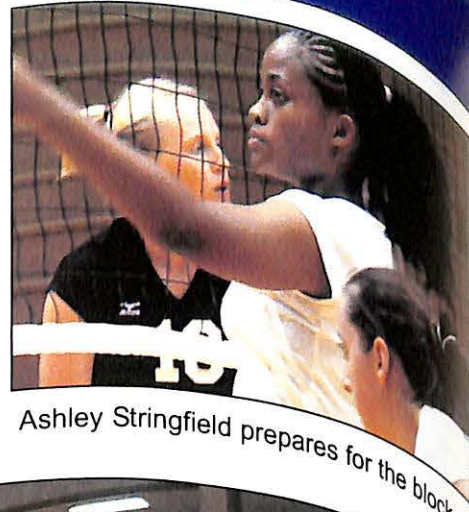

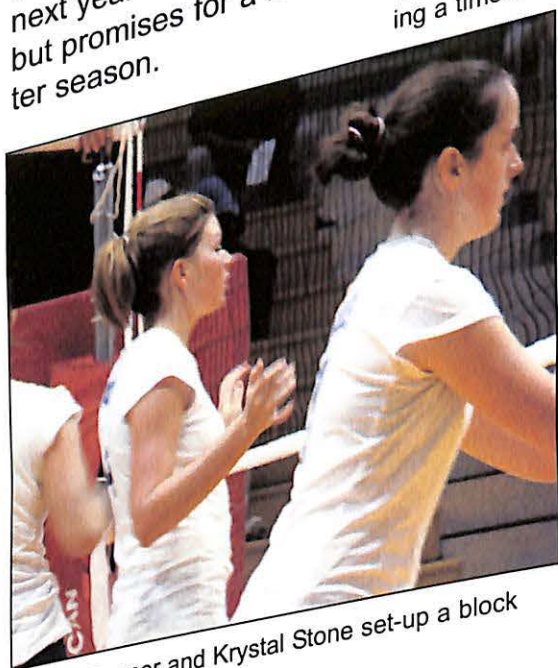

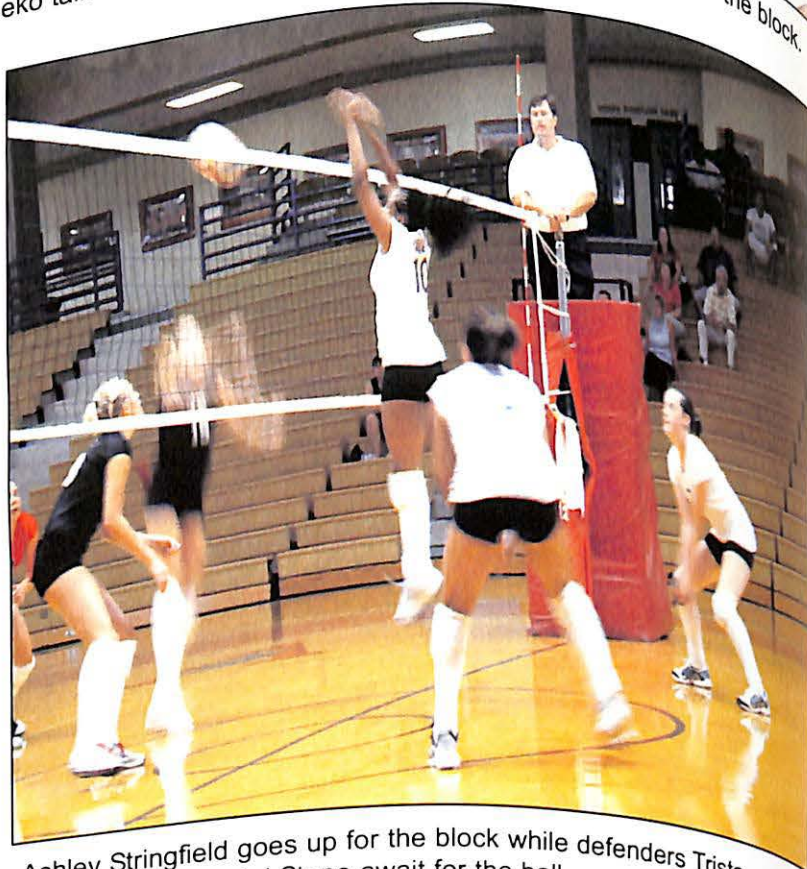

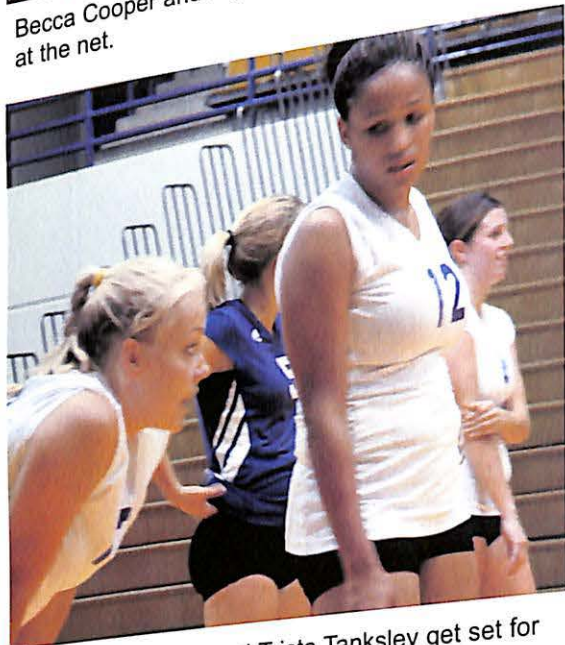

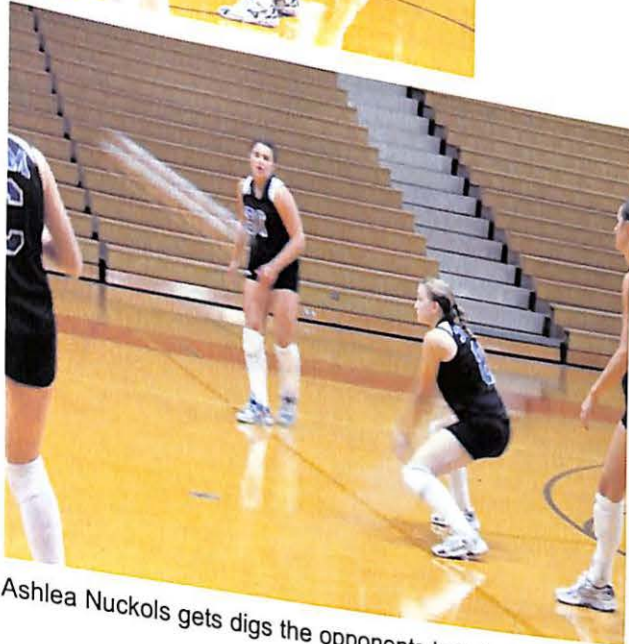

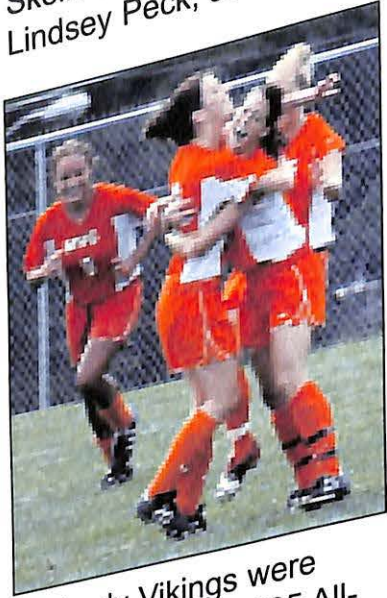
Rodeo
