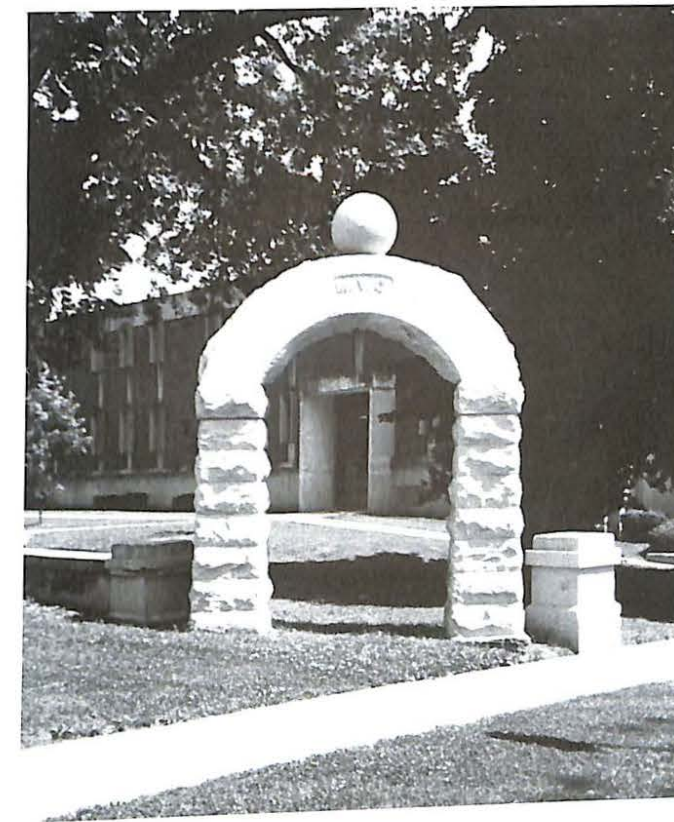

The city of Marshall, MVC students and faculty pulled together to provide the fourth annual drug education and awareness program. Participants pledged to use legal drugs responsibly and not to use illegal drugs, according to event organizer Jane Bartlett. She is Assistant Professor of Psychology and Human Services at MVC.

In an attempt to raise awareness of a commonly reported problem, Valley Women presented the Rape Awareness Seminar October 9th.

"This seminar is a way to present something relevant to campus life, beneficial to all students and a problem that the Valley Women felt needed to be addressed," Valley Women president Christine Johnson said.

The speakers were Dr. Darrel DeGraw, Associate Professor of Criminal Justice at MVC; Margaret Jackson, head of the Saline County Counseling Center in Marshall; Hugh Harvey, Saline County Prosecuting Attorney; Mica Newman-Koehn, M.D., a physician at Fitzgibbon Hospital and Pat Glasier, of The Rape Crisis Center, University of Missouri — Columbia.

Valley Women is composed of Marshall-area women, including MVC faculty, staff and wives, who support the college. — Christy Sapp and Lee Peek

Robert Hastings, a UFO researcher and lecturer, spoke a week after Halloween. In the November 8 presentation, he offered possible evidence that something else may exist out there.

Hastings spoke about US government cover-ups of UFO information that were based on previously classified documents which were secured via the Freedom of Information Act. The documents are now available to the public.

An electron microscopist from New Mexico, Hastings spends several weeks on the road each year speaking on the topic. He has spoken at over 300 colleges and universities nationwide. — Lee Peek

Former university and professional football star Paul Coffman spoke to MVC students December 3, 1993. The Chase, Kan., native attended Kansas State

University — Manhattan. A walk-on at the start of his university football career, Coffman was picked as an All-Big Eight second team tight end his senior year.

He was a Green Bay Packers All-Pro 1982-84. Coffman played tight end for the Kansas City Chiefs in the 1986 and 1987 seasons before finishing his football career with Minnesota Vikings in 1988.

Sponsored by the MVC Fellowship of Christian Athletes Huddle, Coffman represented the Kansas City-based FCA.

According to Shannon Howe, Coffman gave his personal testimony about his finding the Lord, telling the audience of his "wild days during his professional career, of his ups and downs in his personal life.

"He thought he had the Lord in his heart, but discovered he didn't.

"After his football career was over, Coffman found Jesus Christ as his Savior," Howe said.

Students remarked, "He was outstanding"; "He had great comments" and "I'm so glad I attended." — Christy Sapp

Mass Communication students got a taste of the real world in early December when Joel Nichols spoke to them. He is a news reporter and the morning show co-host at KMBC-TV, Channel 9, in Kansas City, Mo. Nichols explained how television was more or less an accident for him.

While studying to be a teacher at the University of Wisconsin, he worked as a volunteer at a public television station. Nichols enjoyed his experience so much that he stayed in TV after earning his teaching degree. He wanted to see if he could succeed in the business.

Nichols has. He is now one of the most popular faces seen on Kansas City television sets. — Lee Peek

MVC sororities and the Community Blood Center of Greater Kansas City, Mo., (CBC) organized two blood drives during the 1993-94 academic year.

The first and more successful drive took place November 10th. The CBC collected 44 units of blood. Seven of the 51 potential donors were deferred. Twenty-six were first-time donors.

The CBC collected 10 units of blood April 10, 1994. Three of the 13 who tried to donate were deferred. Six were first-time donors.

Sales Manager Judy Lene of KLTE-FM, Kirksville, Mo., agrees that the best advertising is by word of mouth. Radio advertising is just that — word-of-mouth.

She gave a short course in radio advertising to Mass Communication students April 15, telling them, "Be a marketing consultant for your business owner. Find out who your client's customers are, what your client wants to sell and write copy that brings them together.

"You aren't selling time, you're selling merchandise on the radio.

"Truth," Lene stressed, "is always better than creativity when you write ads."

Friday, the 13th of May, 1994, was a lucky day for English and Mass Communication classes. R. Kevin Speese inspired them.

Speese, a consultant for a statistics gathering subsidiary of McGraw-Hill, proudly told of being raised in a Los Angeles, Calif., ghetto and how he left with a one-way airline ticket for a college education at Simpson College in Iowa.

There, he learned the value of writing well, of having confidence while speaking and of reading a lot, which led to several successful career moves.

Speese's abilities led him to television reporting and then to an anchor spot on the Satellite News Network.

He transferred his skills to television production companies and to acting on the stage and in commercials.

Speese left television to become a reporter again, this time for McGraw-Hill. He generated over 500 two-page economic reports a month which summarized construction activity in the US.

"Anytime you see on the news that housing starts are up 'x' percent, it came from McGraw-Hill," Speese said.

He added, "Realtors, construction companies, city planners, chambers of commerce — even the federal government — use our services."

Promoted to a consultant's position, he built his territory to extend from Missouri to the northwestern states and Canadian provinces and Alaska.

Speese urged his audiences to overcome obstacles, to meet deadlines and to compete with themselves — not with others.

"Believe in yourself. You can do anything if you focus on your goal.

"Part of professional growth means reading, writing and expressing yourself clearly.

"The more you know, the more you can help yourself, your customers and your employer.

"Be honest. If you don't know something, admit it. Tell the person you're working with that you will find the answer. Then do it." — Elwood Brooks

Thunder brought massive flooding to the Midwest in 1993. Missouri was especially hard-hit. The state's rain-swollen creeks and rivers fed the already overflowing Missouri and Mississippi rivers.

The spring rains lasted until the winter's deep, wet snows.

Until late fall, travel to Marshall and Missouri Valley College was essentially cut off in all directions except via I-70 and US 65 from the south.

High winds added more damage, toppling one stately tree on campus, breaking tree limbs throughout Marshall and downing area power lines in September.

Quieter thunder was heard over Central Missouri skies the day after Fall Semester finals at MVC. It was more like a whisper.

Barely audible, barely visible, a razor-thin B-2 stealth bomber sliced the skies over Whiteman Air Force Base. Flying over an awed crowd, it banked. Hovered. Like a perfectly thrown Frisbee ... before cutting away to land softly.

December 17, 1993 — the day the fleet of 20 elusive bombers made Whiteman Air Force Base their permanent home.

Thunderous applause meant Viking pride in 1993. Ed Leslie was honored as the State of Missouri's Teacher of the Year.

Only a few clapped for Ian Rickerby, however. MVC's Instructor of Physical Education and Social Science entered the Saline County Cancer Society's Most Beautiful Legs Contest. He gathered \$138.90, compared to the \$2,701 Jim Seigfreid brought in. Seigfreid, the first-place winner, owns Jim's IGA in Marshall. KMMO's announcer, Brian Holsten, collected \$2,600 and ranked second in the contest.

Rickerby appeared on the Marshall High School stage as "a self-styled peasant" in workman's clothing, winning the Most Industrious Legs award in January 1994.

Ed Leslie and Ronald Pardeck were neither separated nor confused at birth, but at least one faculty member new to Valley's campus was puzzled by their appearance.

Shortly after his arrival and unable to speak IBM-DOS, English professor Dr. Loren Gruber asked business administration professor Ron Pardeck computer-related questions.

"I know computers, but you have mistaken me for Ed Leslie," said Pardeck in plain English.

That prompted mathematics and computer science professor Ed Leslie to design two ID badges. They read, "I'm Ed Leslie — He's 'Ron Pardeck,'" and "I'm Ron Pardeck — He's Ed Leslie."

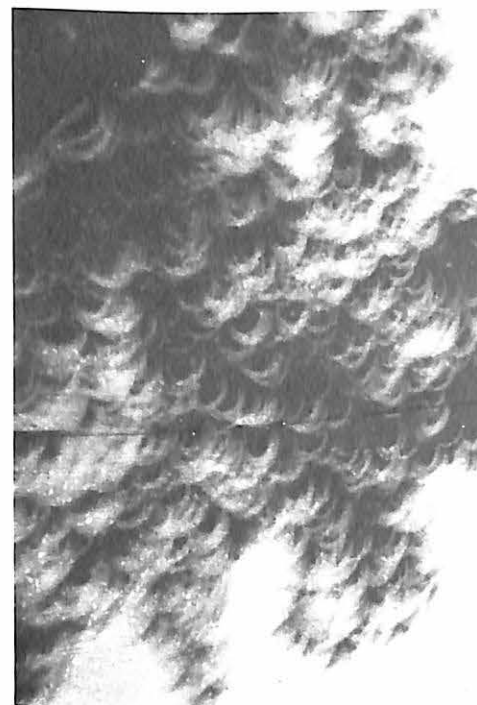
Make no mistake about it. Missouri Valley College's 2/20 Fund Raising Campaign was inaugurated in February, 1994. Of the \$2 million dollars to be raised over 20 months, \$1 million will be designated for the Annual Fund.

\$500,000 will be applied toward MVC's programmatic funds. Another \$500,000, enhancing Phase II of the Georgia Robertson Burns Athletic Complex, will go toward the parking lot, bleachers and classrooms.

Ceremonies held October 1, 1993, at the complex honored the memory of the late Judge John J. Kelly, a member of the college's board of trustees from 1974-1990. "Jack" Kelly served as its chairman from 1979-1983.

Members of his family joined MVC trustees, faculty, staff and students to dedicate the athletic director's office at the Burns Athletic Complex in the judge's name.

20-year-old Eliud Barngetuny scorched the indoor track at the Iowa State University Classic as he set a world's best in the 5,000 meter event. The MVC freshman from Kenya defeated 21 other runners in the February 11, 1994, invitational with a time of 13 minutes, 45.81 seconds.



Other MVC athletes led the way as well. Jeff Moore and Ryan Braden were selected as 1993-94 NAIA All-America Scholar Athletes. The graduating seniors on the men's varsity basketball team were among 66 honored for their leadership, performance and achievements on the basketball court and in the classroom.

Moore, a physical education major, ranked 10th among the honorees with a GPA of 3.88. Braden, a computer science major, placed 37th among the NAIA Basketball Scholar-Athletes with a 3.69 GPA.

MVC's Mass Communication Department scored a different kind of first on March 11, 1994. It hosted the first annual Press Day for area high school journalism students, cartoonists and photographers.

Keynote speaker Paul Stevens, the Associated Press bureau chief for Missouri and Kansas, opened the session. Southwest Missouri State University's athletic promotions coordinator Art Hains spoke at the awards luncheon.

Chillicothe's Mary Favors, a junior theatre major ranked first on the Missouri Intercollegiate Forensic Honor Roll in February. Favors topped 14 others in the novice oral interpretation category, speaking on the strength of the African-American woman.

MVC was filled mostly with bright days during the 1993-1994 academic year. A golden opportunity to link MVC with Saline County journalists came with the dawning of the Saline County Media Club.

John Harwick, Associate Professor of Mass Communication, formed the group which met for the first time April 27.

The director of the Marshall Public Library, Winifred "Wicky" Sleight, was elected president of the Media Club, and Harwick, the secretary-treasurer.

Doug Crews, Executive Director of the Missouri Press Association, spoke on media legislation in Missouri.

The sun shone on Valley's Everybody Sells and Serves Program, which involved students and professors alike.

"Professors evaluated their courses to identify the connections between theory and practice to sell their students on the value of a liberal arts education. They also examined how their courses relate to sales and service," Ed Watkins, MVC's Development Consultant, said.

He added, "The program had an immediate impact on new student recruitment. The current students made over 4,500 new student contacts, and the 60 faculty followed up with over 1,000 contacts prior to May 1st. The college had 100% more students signed for the fall of '94 than they did at the same time for the fall of '93."

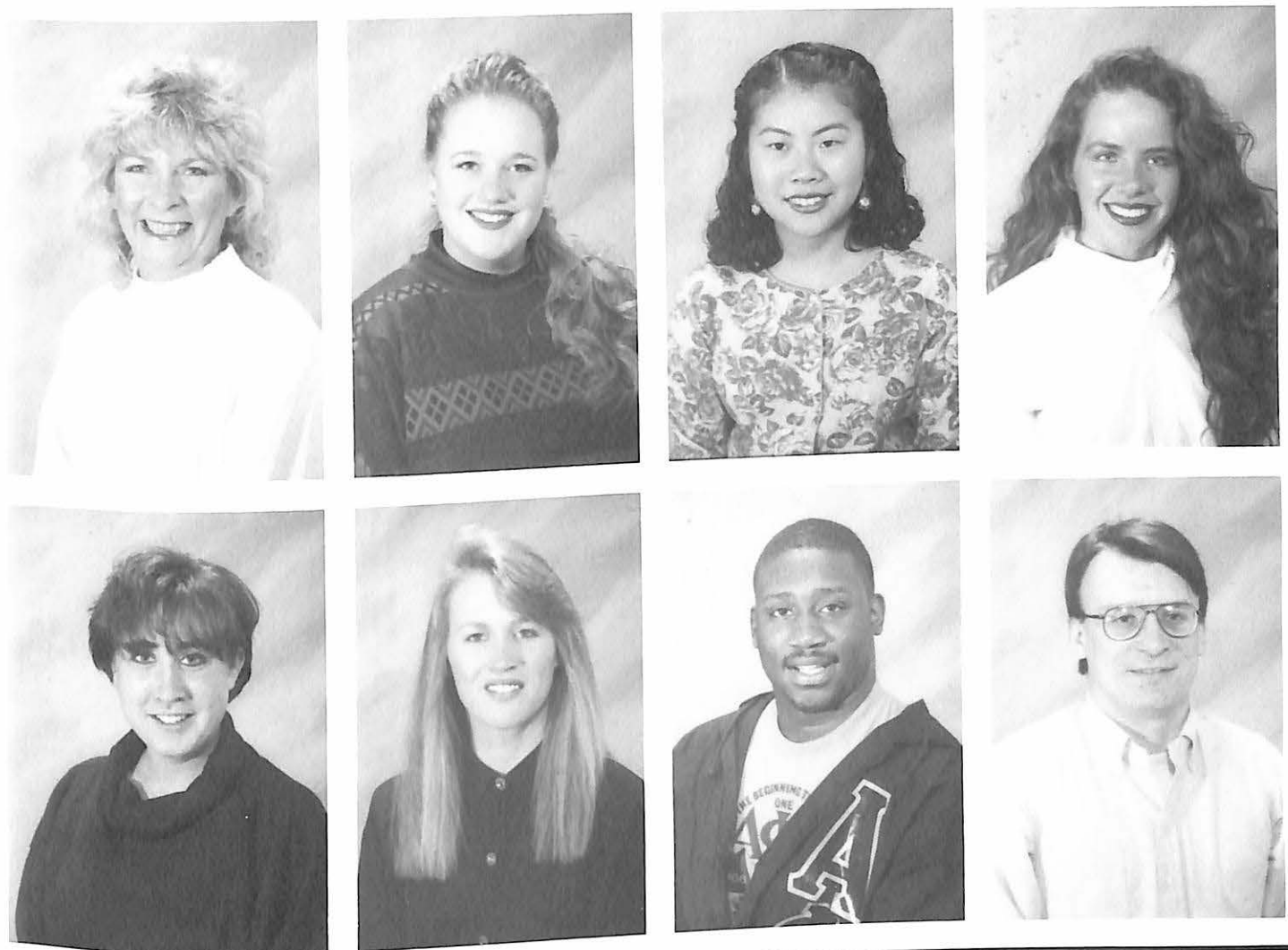
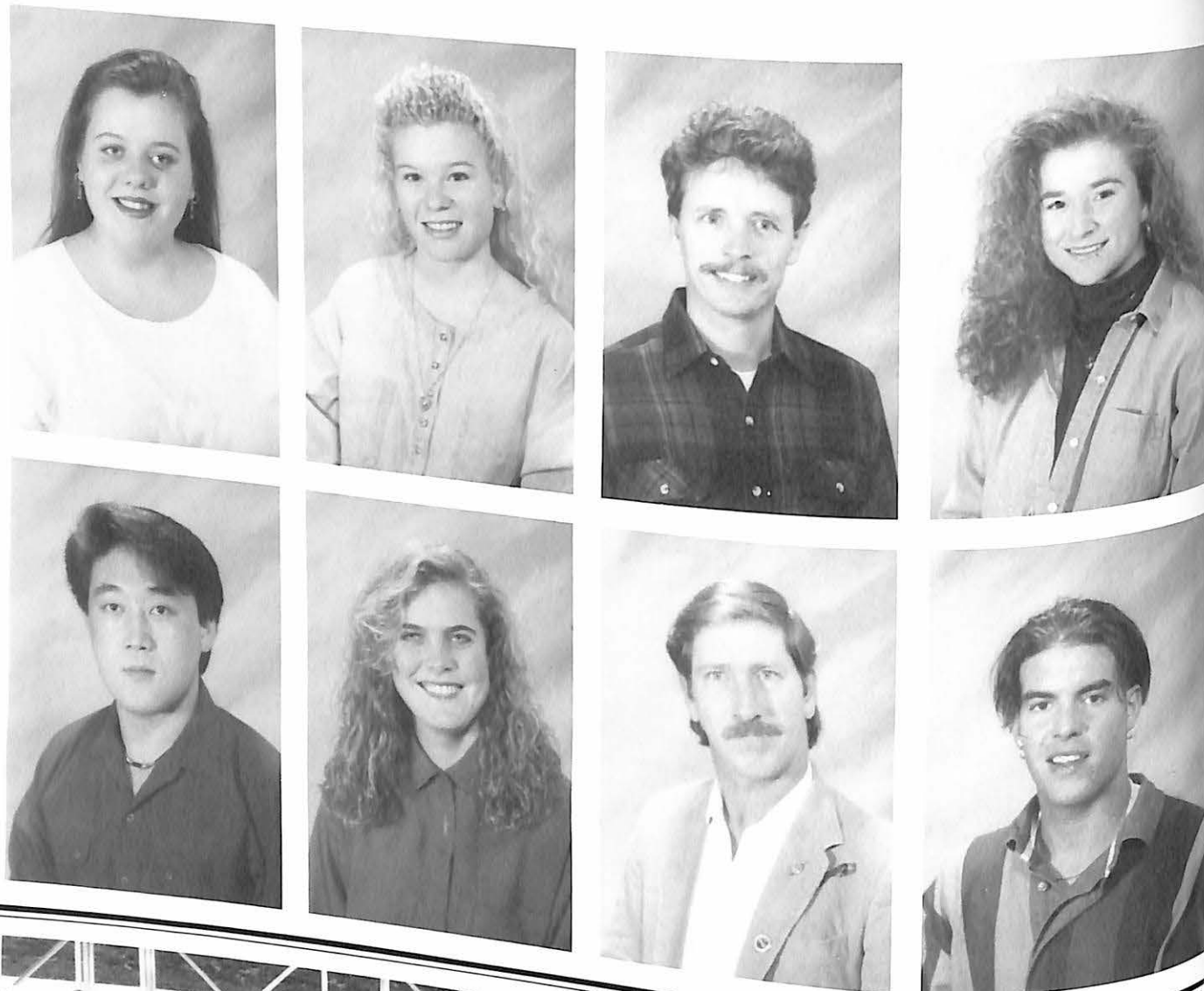
Two were dark days in the Spring Semester. **Marshall** and the college community were saddened by the unexpected death of Wilma Reeves, wife of college president Earl J. Reeves. After a short bout with cancer, she succumbed on April 27, 1994.

Much of Central Missouri was shrouded by the twilight of a total solar eclipse on May 10, 1994. While many of the faculty, staff and students marvelled at the display, birds sang their evensongs at noon.

The following Friday, Friday the 13th, turned out to be a bright day for MVC. At their regular annual meeting, MVC's board of trustees promoted Dr. Reeves to Chancellor of the College and Dr. J. Kenneth Bryant to President of the College.

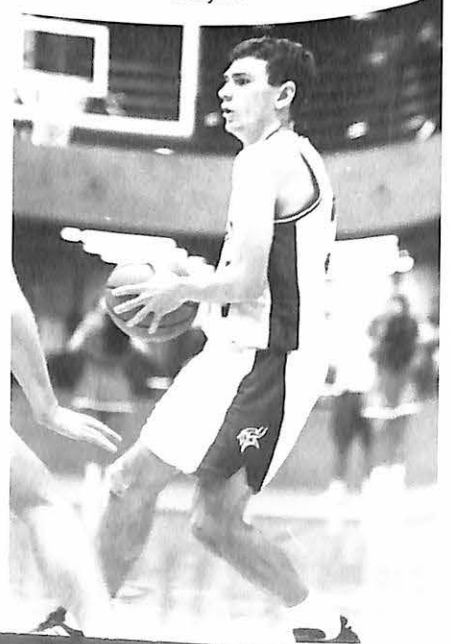

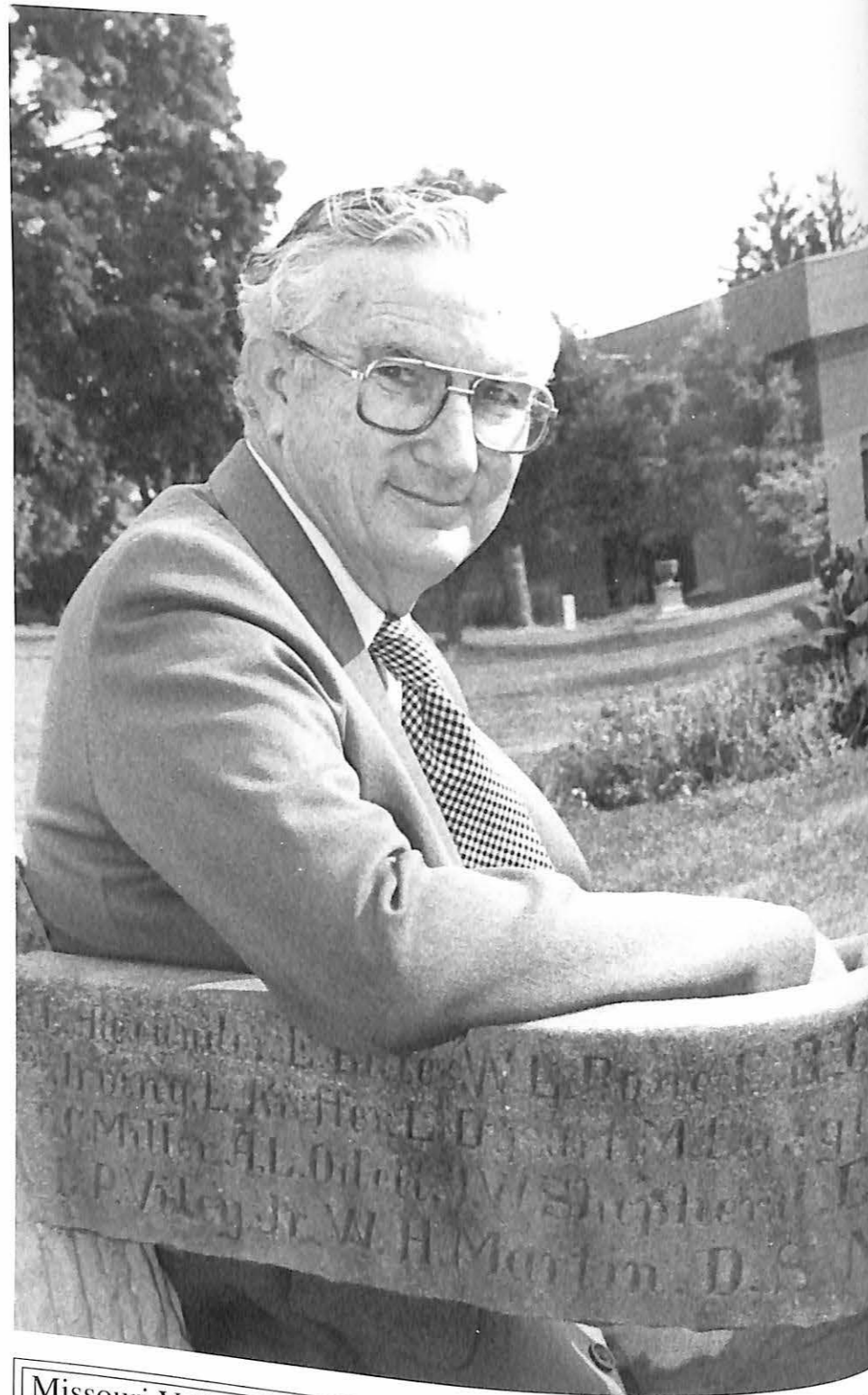
The past year has been an eventful time in the life of the college and in my own life. Enrollment of the college has continued to be above 1,110, and we have begun a new sales program to give our students experience that will assist them in the job market while expanding our admissions and development efforts.

The athletic programs of the college continue to grow in numbers and quality. We had the second most successful overall athletic program in the Heart of America Athletic Conference in 1992-93 and this year appears to be another banner year. My service on the President's Council for the Conference and in the activities of the National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics gives me an opportunity to participate in major policy decisions that affect our programs and to compare our programs with others. We do indeed have much to be proud of in athletics.

The academic programs of the college have been strengthened. We have the largest faculty in the history of the college. Major improvements have been made in the English program. A full-time faculty member has been added in Criminal Justice, and the enrollment in that program has doubled. We have divided the faculty into six divisions instead of four and have thus opened up new opportunities for leadership. As I participate in the hiring and evaluation of our faculty each year, I become increasingly impressed with their quality and commitment.

Our fund-raising efforts, which occupy a significant part of my time, have been fruitful. We raised over \$600,000 last year for the annual fund, which supports our programs in a variety of ways, and we anticipate that our endowment may pass the \$1 million mark this year.

The college is proud of its continuing affiliation with the Presbyterian Church, 24 President's Message

USA. Last year I served on a major committee for the Synod of Mid-America. In addition, several of us participated in Presbyterian College Day activities for the Missouri Union Presbyterian.

We are also grateful for the strong support the college receives from the cities of Marshall and Saline County. Along with many of our faculty and

staff, I am involved in a variety of local activities with local churches, the Chamber of Commerce and the Marshall Philharmonic Board.

The students, staff and faculty at Missouri Valley College are creating a vital and effective educational institution and it is a privilege to be part of this process.

President Earl Reeves works closely with the Development Office, which informs him about gifts and donations to the school. The president also works with Allan Jones to write letters to those who donate \$100 or more.

The Development Office also establishes a priority list of potential donors who should be visited. Gayle Carter accompanies the president on many of these trips to help him solicit support for Missouri Valley College.

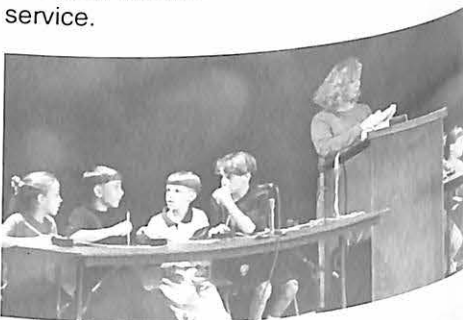

She also oversees placement, C-base tests and assessment.

Fifer, Assistant Professor of Physical Education, teaches Introduction to Teaching and Theories and Methods to education majors.

He has spoken at the University of Missouri Show-Me Basketball Clinic about post-season play. Additionally, he has attended a national basketball convention and clinic, and Fifer has conducted MVC's summer basketball camp for area schools.

Elaine Piha, besides being an admissions counselor and assistant women's volleyball coach, is head women's basketball coach.

"I foster a strong sense of pride in the students, teach them to voice their opinions, and to believe in what they are doing. That way, they become leaders on the floor," said Piha.

Jim Cox said, "I do my best to develop techniques in order to showcase the athlete's abilities." He is the head men's and women's track coach and an Instructor in Health and Physical Education.

Cox served as meet director and coordinator for indoor track and field competition among 13 area high schools at the Burns Sports Complex on the Gibler Campus at MVC.

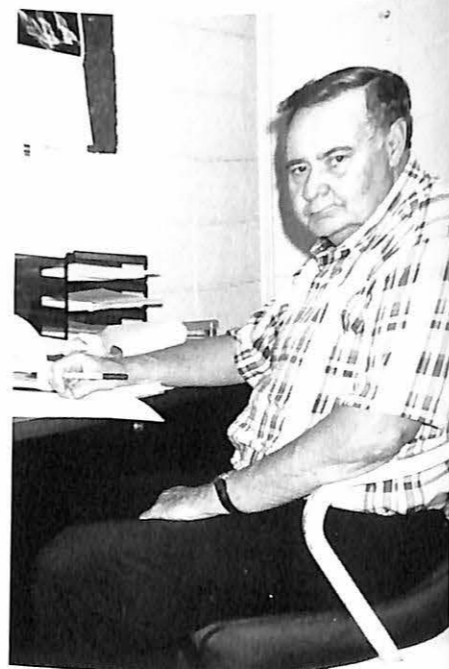
The Marshall Owls and Lady Owls hosted competitors from Malta Bend, Santa Fe of Alma, Lexington, Richmond, Carrollton, Brookfield, Orrick, Marceline, Salisbury, Westran of Huntsville, Lee's Summit and St. Mary's of Independence.

Cox was named Heart of America Conference Coach of the Year for the 10th time and NAIA District 16 Coach of the Year for the ninth time.

Head women's softball coach Pam Adams described her role within MVC this way, "I teach students to use their athletic abilities to get an education. Students should learn to relax and enjoy college competition because it is more intense than in high school." Adams is also an assistant volleyball coach and admissions counselor.

In addition to his duties as assistant football coach, Kelly Martin is the Vikings' head baseball coach. "By coaching, I hope to create a positive influence on athletes so they will turn that influence toward MVC," said the Instructor in Physical Education.

Head athletic trainer Joel Cagle has many duties, but his primary tasks are preventing injuries and treating student athletes.



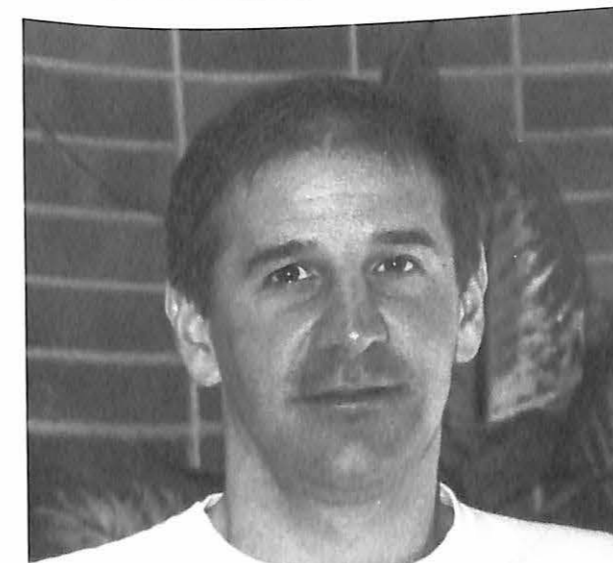
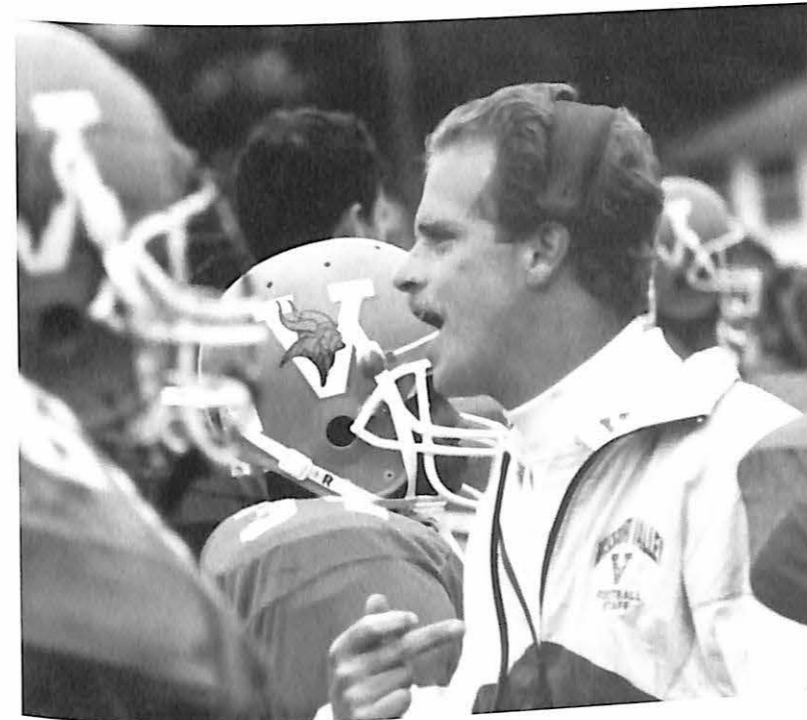

He organizes and manages the training room. Cagle also sets up physicals and coordinates medical appointments. "I help provide a safe environment for the student athletes at MVC," said Cagle.

As Instructor in Health and Physical Education, he teaches courses on athletic training. Cagle is the program committee co-chair for the Mid-America Athletic Trainers Association spring symposium.

Jerry Arnett is MVC's Sports Information Director, and he is in close contact with not only the coaches but also with their athletes virtually on a year-round basis.

"It is my responsibility to report results of the games,

contests and meets to the media outlets on a daily basis," he said. "I also distribute the results to KMVC-FM, the Campus Life Office, to Al Jones and Ken Bryant."

Arnett prepares schedule cards and calendars, printed programs and brochures; he coordinates athletes' pictures for Viking Views, Sabiduria and the media. He writes articles for Viking Views and Sabiduria.

"Much of the advance information for games with opposing teams is channeled through the SID's office, as is follow-up information, often by fax.

I maintain and handle all the football statistical data at the game site and send in the cumulative weekly reports on Sundays for the conference roundup emanating from Springfield. I also coordinate the individual and team statistics for basketball, baseball and softball," added Arnett.

He covers all home sports events personally. That means he covers varsity, junior varsity and freshmen football, soccer, basketball, wrestling, baseball, softball and indoor track and field contests — men's and women's teams included.

Arnett also covers the away football games, and occasionally he covers the away basketball, track and field events. "Otherwise," he said, "head coaches handle many of the away events through late-night telephoned reports for early morning relays to radio stations.

Adding, "There are no provisions presently for home cross country or outdoor track and field events. The rodeo team basically performs on a year-round basis away from home."

He provides hometown news releases which announce new student signings, student athlete appearances on the dean's lists and their special honors throughout the school year.

Arnett plays an integral part in preparing for the MVC Homecoming Athletic Hall of Fame Dinner.

He was the public address announcer for all sports events when the Burns Sports Complex first opened.

What is? Art

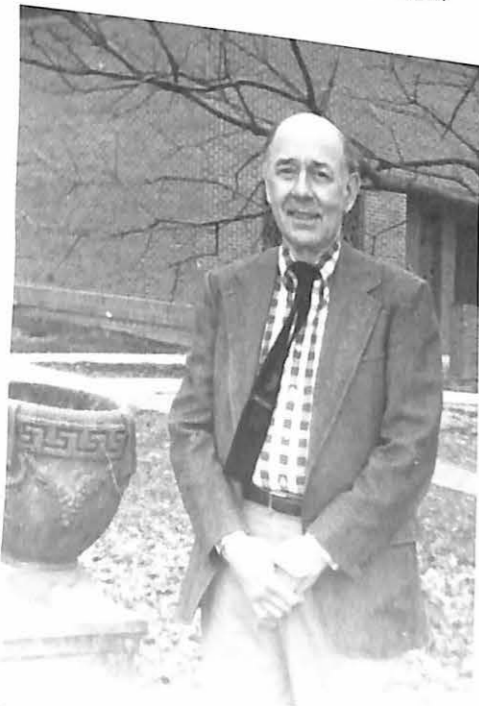
n., s. 1. craft combined with imagination 2. the fine arts, especially design, drawing, painting and pottery

Between 60 and 65 students are currently enrolled in art courses at MVC.

Assistant Professor Jo Kolks teaches Spanish and English as a Second Language (ESL). She believes her role includes more than teaching language skills.

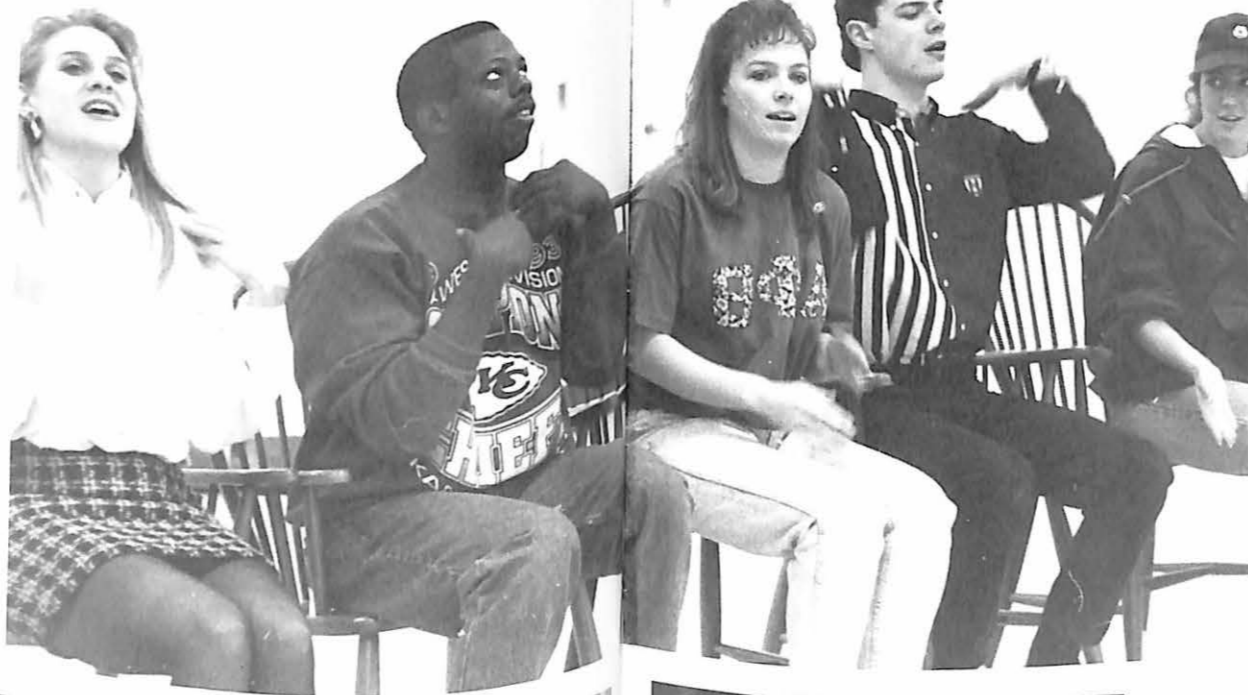
"I teach my students to be aware of their cultures and those of others — that includes their economies, politics, customs and literatures," said Kolks.

Bean, a frequent speaker at media seminars, is a two-time winner of the Tennessee State Award for news director. He attended the Missouri Broadcast Educators Association convention.

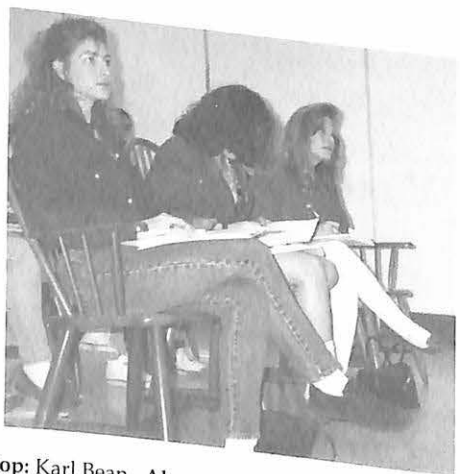

Keynote speaker Paul H. Stevens explained how writers and photographers become part of the Associated Press, which feeds stories to newspapers and radio and television stations from around the world, the US and the state of Missouri.

MVC graduate Art Hains described at lunch how he developed his career that began with his working at the Marshall News Democrat. He now works in university promotions at Southwest Missouri State University and is the "Voice of the Bears" for SMSU's football and men's basketball games over KTXR radio.

MVC senior Mike Eldred, editor and cartoonist for the AH Founder, spoke on editorial cartoons.

The Sedalia Democrat's Ron Jennings focused on columns, while Becky McRoberts, a broker salesperson for Blackburn Real Estate, advised students on editorial writing techniques.

McRoberts is a former reporter for The Daily American Republic, Poplar Bluff, Mo., and free-lance feature writer for a Long Beach, Ca., newspaper.

Dr. Loren Gruber provided tips on interviewing to create feature stories, and Amy Robinson-Weber, Fitzgibbon Hospital's Director of Marketing and Public Relations, illustrated eye-catching front-page makeup.

MVC Director of Communication Allan Jones spoke on photojournalism. Retired staff writer Jo Woodward and Scott Wogomon, both of Marshall's Democrat-News addressed reviewers and sport writers respectively.

Marshall High Marsaline advisor Harry Carrell conducted an advisor round-table.

High school students toured KMVC-FM and KMVC-TV studios and the Democrat-News.

Marshall high school students won most of the contests for their work in The Marsaline: Cliff England, cartoons and front-page makeup; Willie Harlow for editorials and feature stories; editor Erica Smith, newspaper of the year and sports stories; Jennifer Davis, news stories.

Tylisha Johnson of Frederick Douglass High School's Bulldog Growl won first for columns, and her fellow staffer Jason Forsee won in reviews.

What is? Sabiduria

n., s. MVC's annual history book

Sabiduria, which means knowledge, is MVC's annual. Dr. Loren Gruber is the faculty advisor and the staff is made up of the print production class along with work and learn students.

"The yearbook provides mass communication majors with practice in photography, design, layout, magazine-style writing and editing," said Gruber. "Staff members are responsible for recording campus history accurately as it unfolds," he added.

Staff members names are on the title page.

To keep pace with current production methods, MVC adopted Aldus Pagemaker 4.0 software, which will be upgraded to 5.0 in the 1994 Fall Semester, along with Microsoft Windows and WordPerfect 5.1. Hardware is an IBM compatible 486SX, which was assembled by Ed Leslie of the mathematics and computer science department.

Instead of hand drawing the layouts, or pasting exact-size photos on mounting boards, the staff produces the book by computer.

After planning their layouts, staffers draw the layouts on computerized Fast Track E-Z Design templates with a mouse, type the script with the word processor on the templates and print a laser copy of each double-page spread.

The photos are not digitized, but they are scaled and pencil-cropped by the staff. The index is also produced by a computer program.

Sabidurians attended a Jostens-sponsored fall workshop in Sedalia, Mo. And the rest is history.

With the exception of Karl Bean, Director of Mass Communication and KMVC's general manager, students hold the leadership positions within the station.

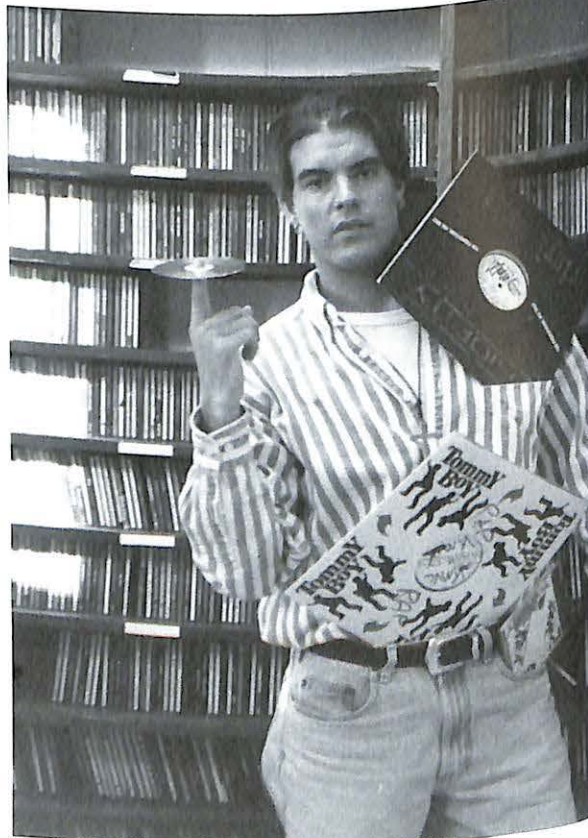
Station manager Willy Lehotz files all FCC documents and, with Bean, generated the papers necessary to upgrade KMVC's wattage.

As program director, Lee Peek works closely with Bean and Lehotz. Peek supervises the DJs and the contents of their shows.

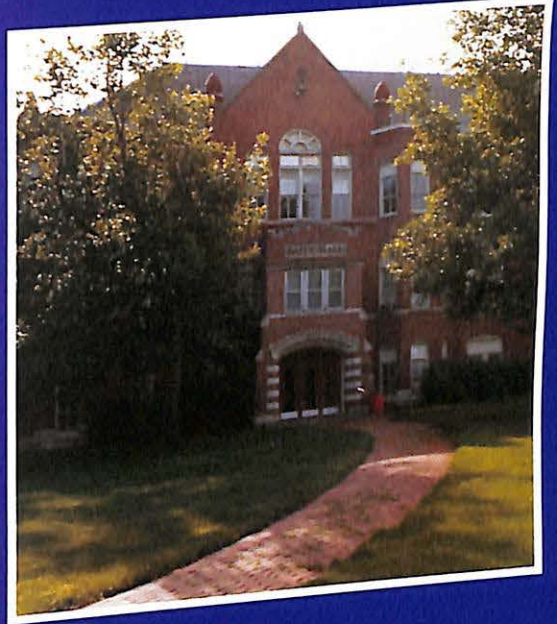
Production manager Jennifer Maloney handles the public service announcements and the station promotions.

The staff consists of mass communication majors, work and learn personnel and volunteers. — Lee Peek with contributions by Ray Colaiacovo



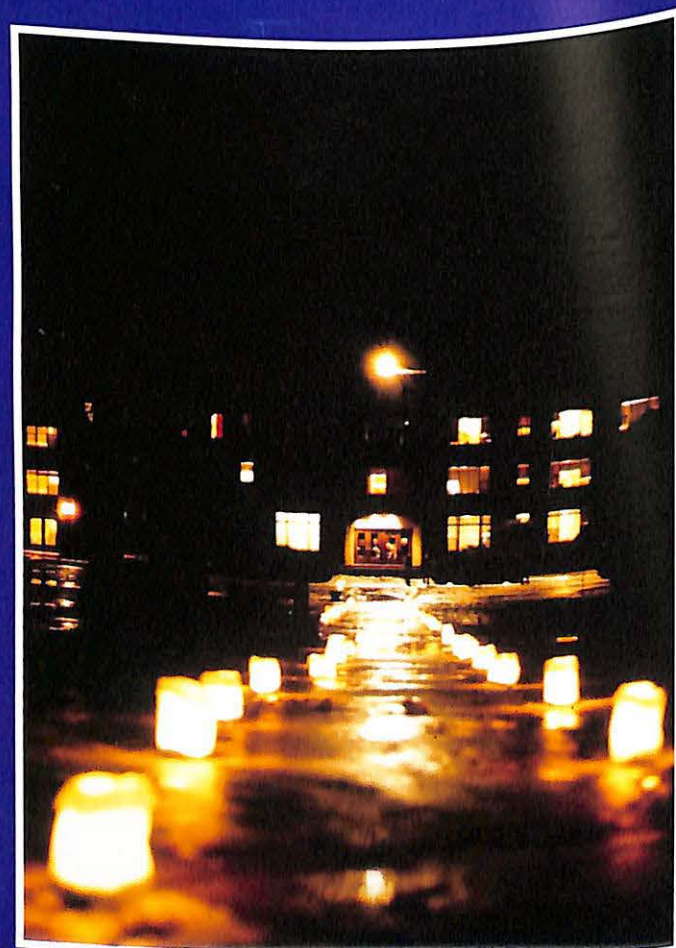
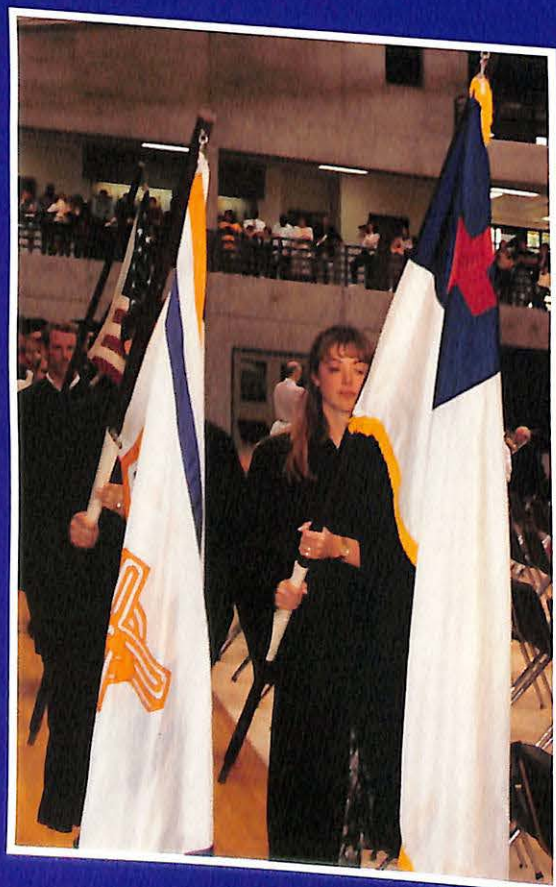
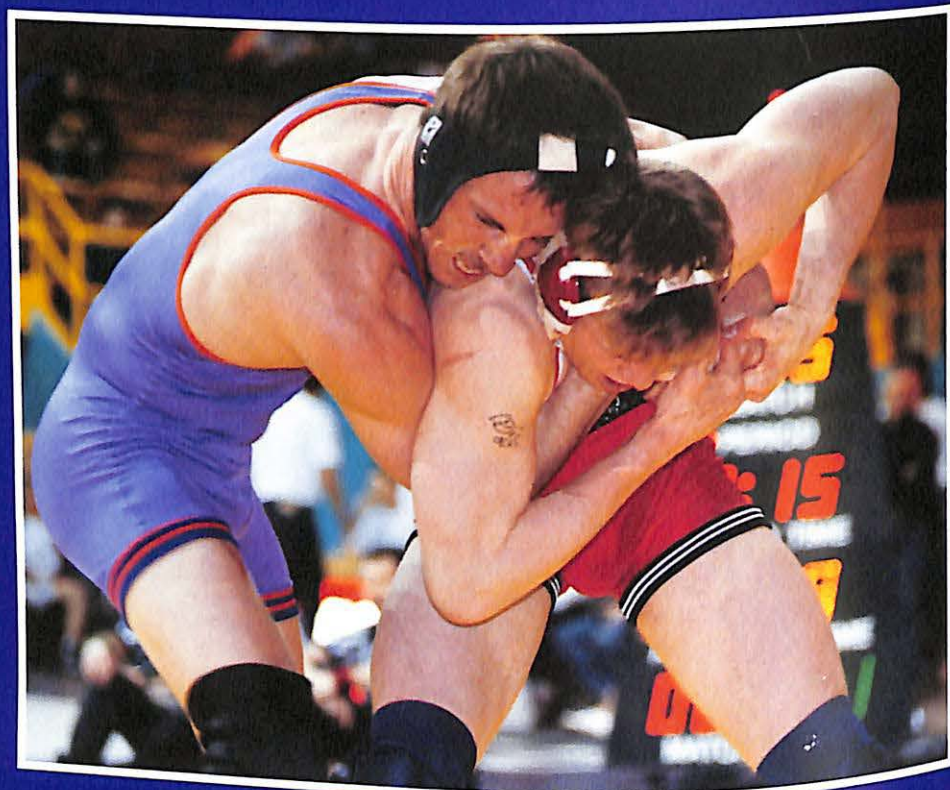
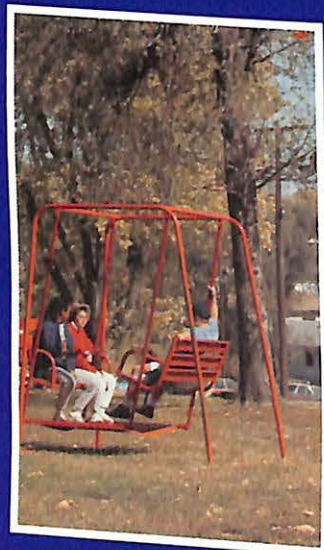

Karl Bean has accomplished a great deal since becoming Director of Mass Communication in the fall of 1993.

With his guidance, MVC has invested more than \$25,000 in studio equipment.

"The original design of the station was good, but the equipment was dated and barely usable," said Bean. He added five tape decks, two camcorders, an editing station and a Signus Alta effects unit. Among the unit's effects are freeze-frame, strobe and colorization.

Bean hopes to add a character generator, new monitors and a teleprompter.

To accommodate the new equipment and projected growth, Bean hired an engineer to rewire the entire studio.

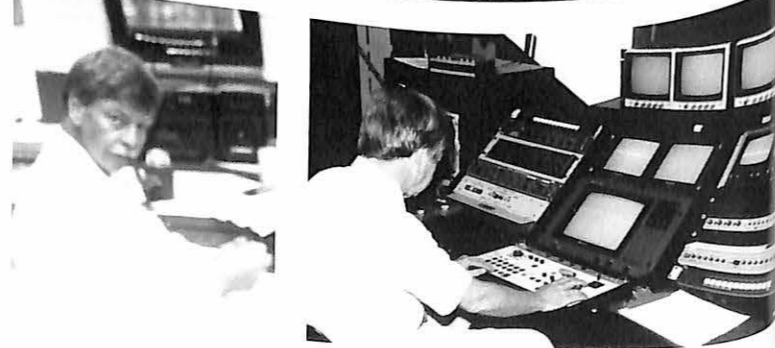
These improvements have paid off for students who aired Club MVC, On the Edge Magazine, Back Door Videos and Viking basketball on Marshall public access Channel 10.

The community of Marshall has benefited from the changes at the studios as well. The Marshall Chamber of Commerce and KMVC-TV teamed up once again for an annual fund-raising auction.

Marshall third graders gathered at the studio this spring to participate in the Quiz Bowl and to root for their favorite team as the final round was broadcast.

Mass communication students produced a 10-minute video and a 30-second commercial to promote the college.

Dr. Joe Sadeghi, Professor of History and Political Science, and KMVC-TV aired the Dialogue Series, whose panels discussed topics ranging from poetry to politics. — Lee Peek

Human Services Education

n., s. learning to reach out to others



Dr. Carl Gass, Associate Professor and Dean of Human Service Education, teaches courses which train MVC students to become administrators of profit and non-profit organizations.

Students target agency or recreation management. Graduates often find careers in organizations such as Boy and Girl Scouts, 4-H, American Red Cross and Goodwill Industries.

Human service graduate courses leading to an M.S. degree are also offered on the MVC campus through Lindenwood College.

Among his other duties, Gass is advisor for the American Humanics Club, and he serves on the National Strategic Planning Team for American Humanics.

His published work has focused on organizational structures and strategic planning. Gass' most recent article, which deals with the needs of non-profit organizations, appeared in the September, 1993, issue of Journal of Humanics.

Asked to describe his role in human services education, Associate Professor Carl Foster said, "It is important to teach students to learn as well as to prepare them for occupations.

"It is also as important to teach students how to live their lives and how to earn a living."

American Humanics and Human Services Education were founded in 1948 by H. Roe Bartle at MVC. Hobart Hill implemented the program and developed the curriculum as its first professor.

What is? Mathematics and Science

n., pl. the investigation of actual and theoretical structures in the universe

Reed Kepner, Associate Professor of Biology and Dean of Mathematics and Science, is known for his rigorous courses, pointed remarks and sense of humor. "I feel there is no use of dealing with students unless you can get them to where they want to go in the future," he said. "That's why I drag them kicking and screaming through the course." Afterwards, realizing they can use what they have learned, they discover themselves on solid ground — that he has planted them on their own two feet. Kepner also beautifies MVC by planting flowers.

Dr. Leif Youngdahl, Assistant Professor of Biology, has the career goals of his students in mind. "I provide students with the opportunity to develop their thinking skills and maturity (so they can) have a successful career." "Biology also leads to many different career opportunities, including medicine, nursing, chemistry, wildlife management, environmental science and others dealing natural resources," Youngdahl noted. "We also train a lot of future high school biology teachers. In addition, we provide non-science majors with the appreciation of science," he concluded. Youngdahl has published extensively in English and Spanish. His articles and book chapters on plant nutrition, specifically on the micronutrient requirements of tropical food crops and the rates which rice, beans and corn take up and distribute nitrogen fertilizers. zinc and phosphorus are standard fare in his field. Youngdahl will assume the rank of Associate Professor in the fall of 1994.

Dr. Lawrence Krebaum teaches the general, organic and bio-chemistry sequences, supervises honors research and independent studies. "I want my chemistry students to attain a knowledge of chemistry that is equal to or better than American Chemical Society standards."

The Assistant Professor of Chemistry is writing an article, "Eliminating Unnecessary Hurdles in General Chemistry," which is to appear in The Journal of Chemical Education.

Dr. John Gault, Professor of Physics, sees his duty "as guiding the students to better understand the limits and the possibilities of physical science; to help them better understand God's creation and mankind's limits in understanding and utilizing that creation."

Much of Gault's published research, in English and Portuguese, has focused on liquid crystals. He designed and constructed a time-of-flight neutron spectrometer; he supervised graduate research on the medical use of thermotropic liquid crystals; and he worked with K. W. Logan and H. R. Danner on the formation of ozone by the radiolysis of liquid nitrogen.

Gault sponsors MVC's weekly Bible Study, and he is executive director of Our Redeemer Lutheran Church's congregation. He attended two National Science Foundation workshops, one on radioastronomy and another on the use of multi-media computers in physics instruction.

Dr. Ruthanne Harre, Professor of Mathematics, believes "math is extremely important in everyone's life" and that "life-long learning and the improvement of oneself (fosters) self-dignity and self-worth." She works with secondary math student teachers and enjoys helping her students collectively and individually so they can reach their full potential.

Harre attends the fall and spring conference of the Missouri Council of Teachers of Mathematics.

"Anything you do in life has to do with math. The purpose of an education is to succeed in life and to get a paycheck. Math helps you make sure you get the right pay, and I help you do just that," observed Assistant Professor of Mathematics George Clemens.

Michael Doolan, Assistant Professor of Computer Science, prepares computer science majors for entry-level application programs.

As to his teaching style, "There's no such thing as a dumb question," said Doolan.

Ed Leslie, Associate Professor of Mathematics and Computer Science, provides for his students' needs. "I (believe) that all students at MVC should be exposed to computers."

Leslie has been busy during the year, assembling and maintaining non-proprietary IBM compatible computers in MVC offices and laboratories.

He conducted faculty workshops on word processing and spreadsheets; he attended a MORENET conference on networking for schools and colleges and another for community representatives; he is co-chairman of the Saline County, Mo., steering committee to provide access to the information superhighway.

Leslie is also the faculty sponsor of Sigma Zeta, a member of the Marshall Citizens Advisory Board, and elder and trustee of Covenant Presbyterian Church.

He received the 1992-1993 John McCallum Excellence in Teaching Award, and the 1993 Missouri Governor's Award for Excellence in Teaching. Leslie's biography appears in Who's Who Among College Teachers.

What is? Sigma Zeta

Sigma Zeta honors those MVC students who have earned at least a 3.0 grade point average in a minimum of 15 semester hours in either mathematics or science, or in a combination of those courses.

What is? ALDS

n., s. the study of substance abuse, its prevention and cure

ALDS is an acronym for Alcohol and Drug Studies, one of MVC's programs which prepares its majors to earn their credentials for counseling. The Director of ALDS, Dr. Joseph Mathapo, is in charge of developing the program and teaching its courses.

Mathapo, who is Associate Professor of ALDS and Psychology, is assisted by Keith Sternberg. Sternberg is an Assistant Professor.

Together, their goal is to "make ALDS one of the best counseling programs in the United States," said Mathapo. He added, "ALDS majors are required to receive 360 hours of supervised in-service training at an agency, business or treatment center.

"That way, our majors can be prepared to pass the state certification examination." Sternberg's "Prevention of Chemical Abuse" is scheduled for publication by the US Government.

Mathapo's "The State of Black Cleveland" appeared in 1981. He presented "Affirmative Action in the U.S.: Lessons for Post Apartheid South Africa" at the 16th Third World Studies Conference at the University of Nebraska.

Criminal Justice is new to MVC. Started this fall, the criminal justice major is an answer to a large demand.

"By working in this department, I plan to supply the US with more educated officers," said Dr. Darrel DeGraw.

The Associate Professor of Criminal Justice has a special interest in prison research, and he has recently published his article, "A Study of Correctional Educators in Adult Correctional Institutes."

In addition to his doctorate in criminal justice, DeGraw holds five master's degrees — the latest an M.S. in Criminal Justice at the University of Alabama, in December, 1993.

He attended four conferences, two dealing with legal issues of police officers, one on marriage counseling, and one for criminal justice educators.

DeGraw is a member of the board of directors for the Miami, Fl., Police Hall of Fame and Museum.



What is? Social Sciences

n., pl. the studies of people and their relationships to culture and time

The Social Sciences Division of MVC includes majors in alcohol and drug studies, history, political science, psychology and sociology. Dr. Lori Gates, Assistant Professor of History and Dean of Social Sciences sees her role as helping majors within the division to act together. Doing so, Gates believes, will help the students.

An active historian, Gates is president of the Saline County (Mo.) Historical Society. She presented a paper, "Widows and Remarriage in Late Medieval Communities," in Montreal, Canada, and she published a review of Growing Up in Medieval London in the Journal of Economic History.

She also attended the American Historical Association and the International Congress on Medieval Studies.

Gates has worked with Dr. Ron Miller, Associate Professor of Education, to produce several short films that help students learn history. Her biography appears in Who's Who Among America's Teachers.

Jane Bartlett, Assistant Professor of Psychology and Human Services, was presented with the 1993-1994 John McCallum Excellence in Teaching Award.

Defining her understanding of education, Bartlett said, "I view learning as a lifelong process, and students must learn to participate in that process. I also try to equip my students for service in their communities."

She presented "Applying Developmental Theory Through Community Involvement with Special Needs and At-Risk Youth" at the National Institute for Teachers of Psychology.

Bartlett also attended the Great Plains Student Psychology convention and the Missouri Division of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Tri-State Partnership conference.

She moderated the World AIDS Day Panel and attended workshops and seminars on caretaker burn-out, hospice communication and grief.

Bartlett was also the keynote speaker for The Federal ACTION Agency VISTA In-Service gathering, and she spoke on stress before the Marshall Chamber of Commerce Secretary's luncheon.

Additionally, Bartlett is an advisory board member for the Mental Health Association of Saline County, the Cancer Society and the Marshall Area Alliance for a Responsible Community.

She is advisor to the Social Sciences honor society, Pi Gamma Mu. Bartlett's biography appears in Who's Who Among America's Teachers, and she will assume the rank of Associate Professor in the fall of 1994.

Dr. Gerardo Acay, Associate Professor of Political Science and Public Administration, presented a paper for the New York State Political Science Association entitled, "Remarks on the Rawlsian Maximin Criterion."

The Proceedings of the 17th International European Studies Conference published his article, "The Two Faces of Rationality: A Preliminary Analysis."

Asked about his major, Acay said, "Political science is an area of study that teaches discipline and views human behavior within groups."

Dr. Vivian Snell, Associate Professor of Sociology, understands herself as someone who helps "students better understand the social development of people. Health care, food systems and sports reflect social development, and ethical values reflect how people live with each other.

"Leadership," she added, "is the outcome of knowledge."

Snell attended the Mid-West Sociological Society convention. Dr. Joe Sadeghi, Professor of History and Political Science, views teaching in terms of critical thinking.

He helps students identify their cultural and political identities, which in turn, helps each student's self-discovery process.

Business Administration

MVC offers four concentrations within its Business Administration major: agribusiness, management, marketing and finance. Graduate courses leading to an M.B.A. through Lindenwood College are also offered on the MVC campus.

John "Scotty" Campbell, Associate Professor and Dean of Business Administration leads a group of dedicated professors.

He founded the Expanded High School Credit Program in 1985 and still administers this MVC-sponsored outreach program, which has had a positive impact on admissions.

To date, 518 students from high schools in Marshall, Carrollton, Malta Bend, Alma and Tina-Avalon have participated. Slater will become the sixth, starting this fall.

"I enjoy watching high school students, who don't think they can 'cut it' with college-level courses, discover they can," said Campbell.

He went on, "And it's wonderful to see these and other youngsters get excited about college once they arrive on campus."

56 Business Administration

Reflecting on his educational theory, Campbell noted, "I bring the academic and business worlds together so my students can get real hands-on experience.

That way, they're better prepared for their careers when they graduate."

Campbell attended a seminar on the financial futures for educators and a conference on economic education hosted by the Missouri Council for Social Studies.

Patricia Vazzana, Associate Professor of Business Administration, commented, "My students learn technical skills, which not only make them more marketable, effective business people, but also help them develop personally."

The Missouri State Board of Accountancy recently certified her as a CPA. Vazzana addressed 300 students from 13 high schools at the Future Business Leaders of America conference.

She also attended the National Conference of the Academy of Business Administration, and she was elected president of the Missouri Association of Accounting Educators.

Ronald Pardeck, Associate Professor of Business Administration, sees himself as one who prepares students for entry into the business world.

"Although my classes are large, I still make every effort to establish a participative class environment," said Pardeck.

"I avoid chastising students for incorrect answers, but do express disappointment if they have not attempted the assignment.

He assumed the rank of Associate Professor in the fall of 1993.

Pardeck is the advisor of Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE). His views on SIFE are found on page 59.

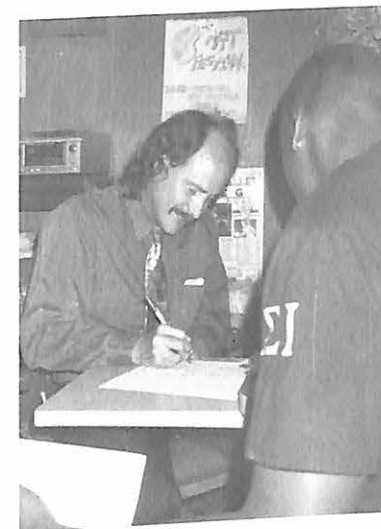
Pardeck received the Samuel M. Walton "One of America's Leading Educators" Free Enterprise Award.

The winners of SIFE's sixth annual high school essay contest are both students at Malta Bend High School.

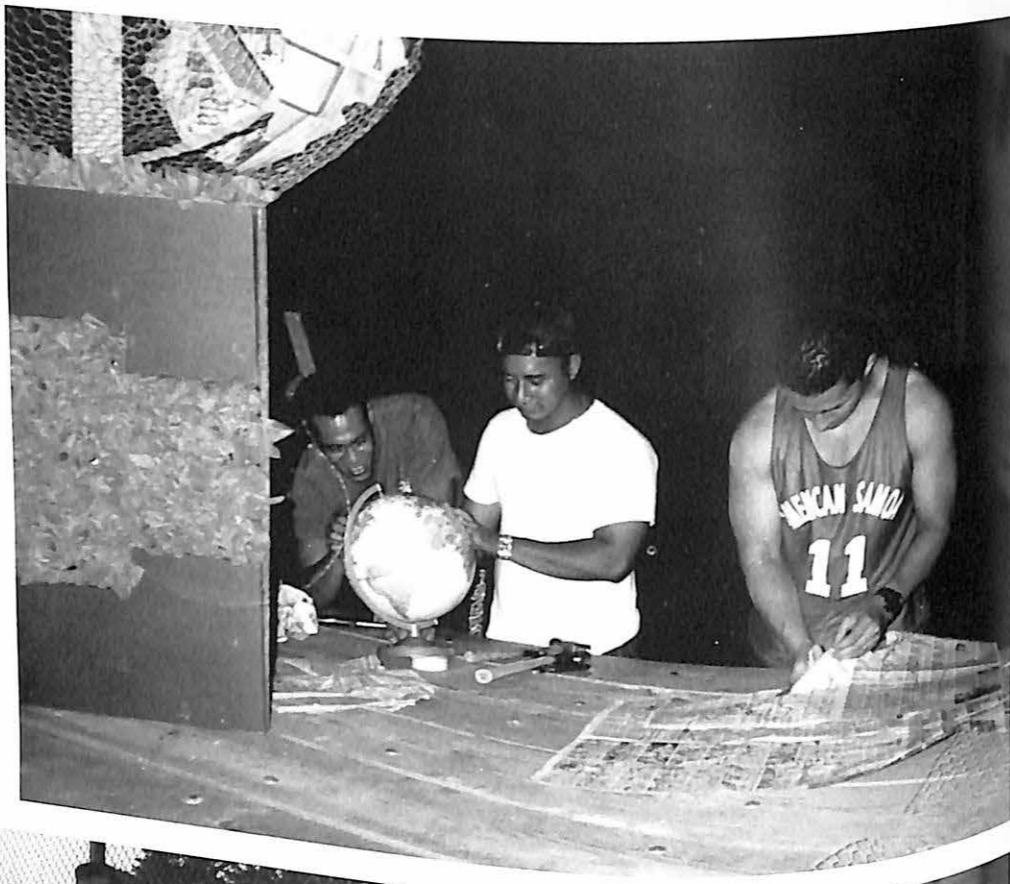

The Red Ribbon Campaign and Springfest were among other senate-sponsored events at Valley.

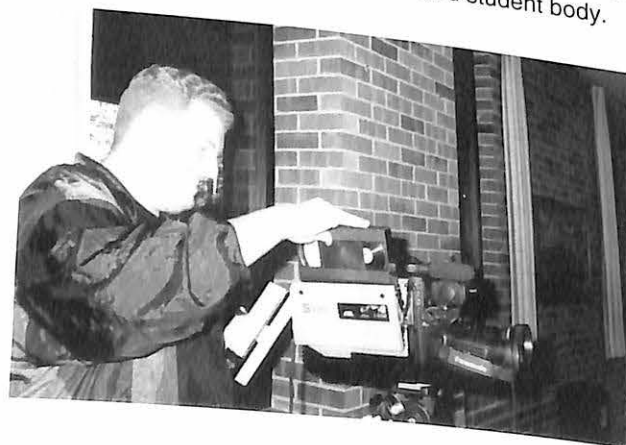

organizing a Valentine's Day door-decorating contest.

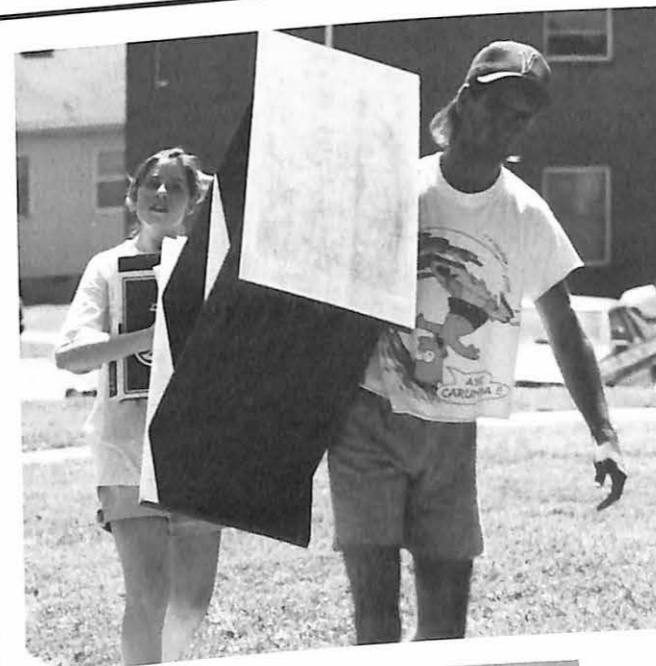

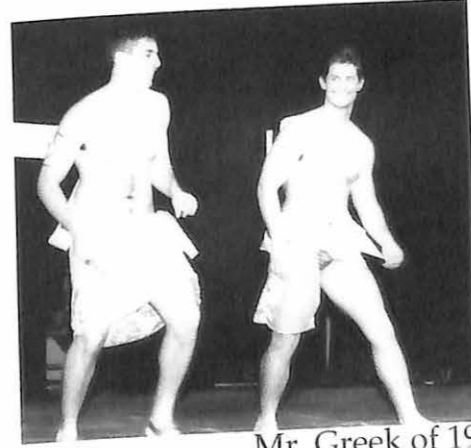

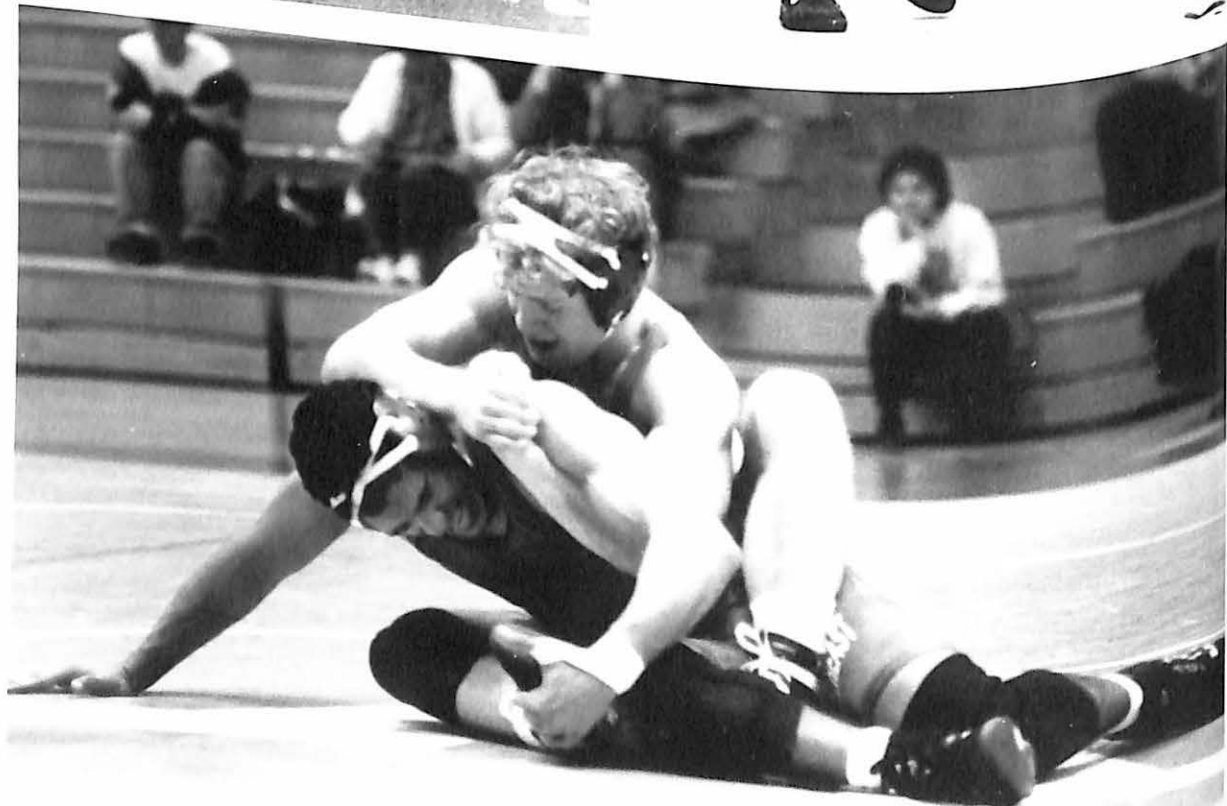

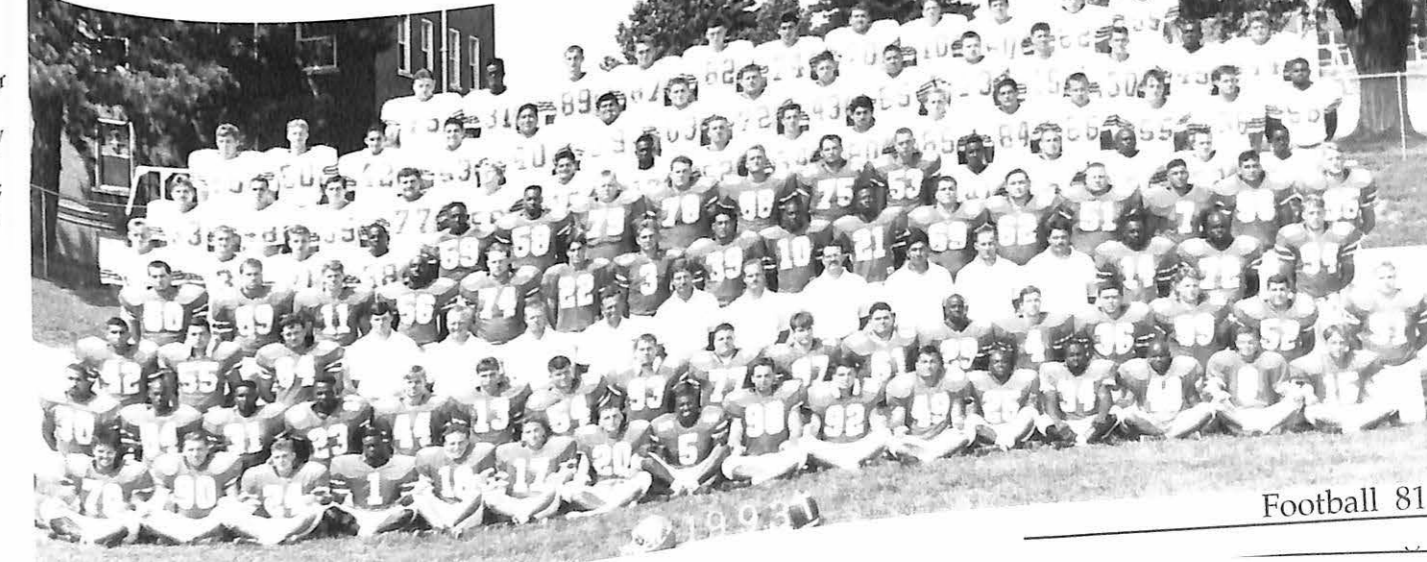
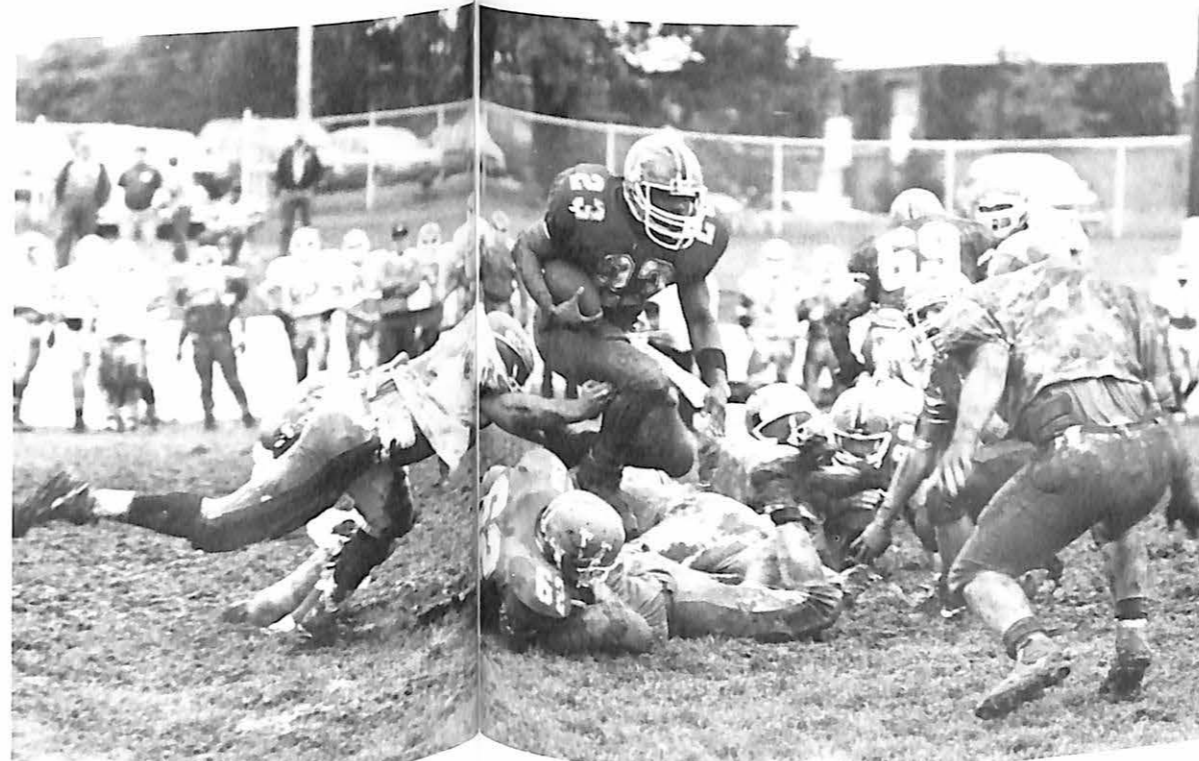
Dennis Rohr, a junior, was selected offensive lineman for the Heart of America Athletic All-Conference team.

The week of October 4-9, 1993, was one of Homecoming spirit on the MVC campus. Student Senate sponsored a variety of activities revolving around the theme, "Encountering All Cultures."

Students, faculty and staff dressed in Mexican attire on Monday. Tuesday and Wednesday were Greek and Italian Day, respectively; campus organizations hung their banners in the cafeteria on Wednesday for judging. On Thursday evening, four new members of MVC teams were inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame during the 25th annual banquet.

Elmer Horman, '48, Marshall, Mo., earned letters in basketball, football and track and field. Enrolling in 1941, his play was interrupted by World War II. He served the nation as an Army Air Force P-51 fighter pilot. Horman quarterbacked the Viking victories in the Boys' Ranch Bowl in Abilene, Texas, and the Cigar Bowl at Tampa, Fla., in 1947 and 1948, along with Harold H. Scott.

Both bowl games were MVC's first. **Harold H. Scott**, '48, Midlothian, Va., also played MVC football during the glory days of the Viking football team in the 1940's — 41 consecutive wins. Service with the US Navy during World War II interrupted his play just as it did for Horman. Scott's seasons were 1941 and 1942, 1946 and 1947.

John J. Hunt, '50, Missoula Mont., was MVC's head basketball, golf and tennis coach; he was assistant coach for the football and track and field teams from 1955-1959. Hunt enrolled at MVC in 1946 and helped his teams set the national record with the 41-game winning streak that began early in the 1941 season and ended in 1948 with a 13-7 bowl-game loss to Evansville and a 13-13 tie with St. Thomas in another post-season bowl game.

Nevertheless, Hunt's teams won four MCAU championships, one of which was declared 1947 National Small College Championship. He also played in five post-season bowl games and earned first team all-conference honors. Lettering as a shot putter in track and field, Hunt contributed to the track and field team's conference championship.

Chuck Stephens, '62, Indianapolis, Ind., was an outstanding blocking back for MVC who went on to coach football at Franklin Central High School in Indianapolis from 1975-1990, compiling a record of 165-70-1. His teams were 35-6 in state competition. **Ted Chittwood**, '48, presented Horman; **Don Kumpy**, '43, presented Scott; **Dick Butterfield**, '56, presented Hunt and Dwain Hall, '64, presented Stephens for induction, bringing the MVC Athletic Hall of Fame roster to 83 members.

Friday night saw the spark of Homecoming spirit ignite the Viking football team and their fans during the annual bonfire behind the science center. The Vikings burned Culver-Stockton Saturday afternoon, 47-22.

Halftime was devoted to honoring the 1993 Homecoming Queen, the MVC Athletic Hall of Fame members and campus competition winners. President Earl Reeves presented Joe Carroll with a plaque honoring him for his many years of service as President of the Quarterback Club.

Student Senate president Angel Gambino was crowned queen. A member of Alpha Sigma Alpha sorority, she is also on the women's soccer team. The names of the Queen's Court members and the winners of campus Homecoming competition appear on page 84. — Lee Peek and Christy Sapp from contributions by Jerry Arnett and Student Senate

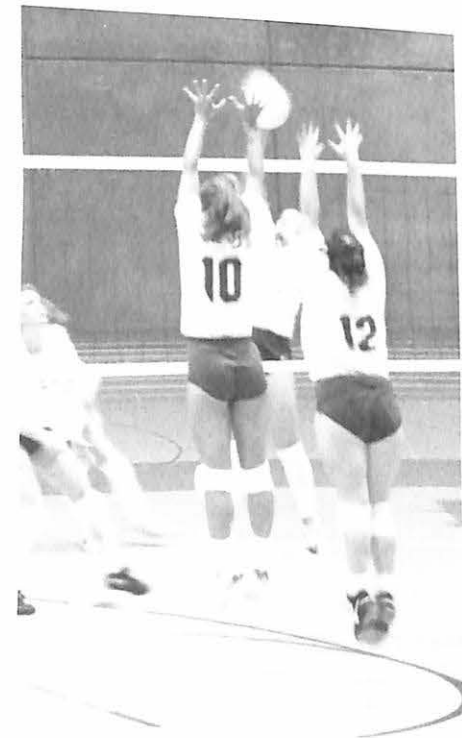

Three outstanding Vikings added to the tracksters' momentum — Eliud Barngetuny, Roman Botcharnikov and Asparuh Ivanov. Barngetuny earlier had set the world's best time for the indoor men's 5,000-meter run. He ran the course in 13 minutes, 45.81 seconds at the Iowa State Classic in Ames, Iowa. The February 11 competition saw him compete against NCAA Division I runners.

Barngetuny, a freshman from Kenya, was crowned the NAIA Outstanding Male Athlete and MVC's MVP at the March 4-5 national indoor championship meet in Kansas City, Mo. He participated as part of the All-America distance medley team and won the men's mile run in a time of 4 minutes, 7.98 seconds and the two-mile in 9:09.28.

Sophomore Roman Botcharnikov and freshman Asparuh Ivanov tied for third, along with Luke Walker from Azusa Pacific in the pole vault at 16-08.

Freshman Texan Moulton took third by heaving the shot put 53-05 in men's competition. Ivanov also took a third place in the men's long jump by leaping 23-10. **Mathew** Buffum, a sophomore, placed fifth in the 55-meter hurdles, while fellow classmate Terrance Morris took sixth in the long jump. Morris was also a member of the fifth-place district medley team.

The Lady Vikings won the outdoor Heart of America Athletic Conference championship for the second consecutive year and captured top honors in the district as well. Individual and team statistics were unavailable at press time.

Outstanding hurdler Debbie Cobbler finished seventh in the women's 100-meter hurdles with a time of 14.69 seconds on the Azusa Pacific outdoor track in California at the NAIA Nationals.

Tachelle Duke's long jump of 18-0 placed her 11th in women's competition.

Tammie Florience ran the preliminary women's 400-meters in 57.61 seconds for fourth place and ran the semifinals at 58.49 for eighth.

Alkie Lewis, Debbie Cobbler, Tachelle Duke and Tammie Florience placed fifth in the 4X100 meter relay at 49.49 seconds in the preliminary competition.

Tammie Florience, Tachelle Duke, Johane Joseph and Alkie Lewis' time of 4:02.10 in the 4X400 preliminaries placed them fourth.

The Lady Vikings track team finished 43rd in the nationals with two points.

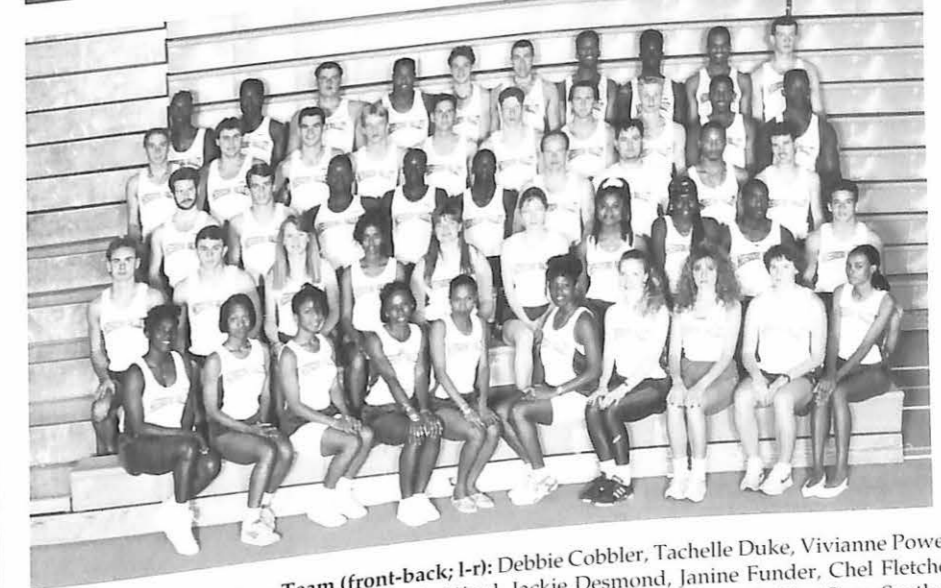
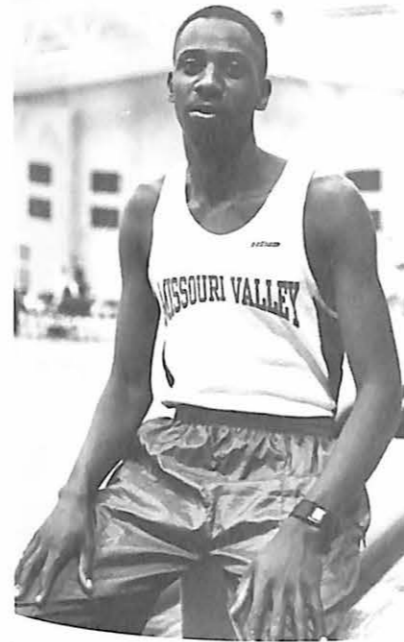
Barngetuny was national outdoor champion in the men's 1,500-meter run, setting a stadium record with his time of 3 minutes, 44.05 seconds. His 14:07.58 also made him top runner in the 5,000 meter event in Azusa.

He was not the only Viking to take NAIA outdoor champion's laurels, however. Botcharnikov took the top spot in the pole vault competition at 17-05 1/2.

Eliasas Tanui took third in the 3,000 meter steeple chase with his time of 9 minutes, 15.49 seconds, as did Asparuh Ivanov with his long jump of 24-2 1/2 in men's competition.

David Collymore placed seventh nationally in the men's triple jump at 48-5 1/2.

Thirteen proved to be a lucky number for the Viking wrestling team in 1994. Head wrestling coach Kevin Grage moved the matmen to 13th place at the NAIA nationals, compared to their 1993 20th standing. Thirteen of the squad also qualified for the NAIA nationals, and ten participated.

Of the 10 Vikings who participated in the NAIA nationals, juniors Steve Allen and Derek Lark, along with freshman Jon White, wrestled and brought home All-America honors.

Allen was national champion at 167 pounds and was inducted into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame in Stillwater, Okla. Allen had 30 wins in 1994, taking first at the Dana, Fort Hays and Tri-State Area (Iowa, Mo. and Neb.) tournaments. He placed second at the Wheaton and Midwest tournaments. He earned the Viking Outstanding Wrestler Award and holds a 3.0 GPA in education.

White took seventh in the 190-pound weight division. The Vikings' overall dual record of nine season wins and five losses included a second out of 24 teams and their first tournament trophy at the Wheaton Invitational.

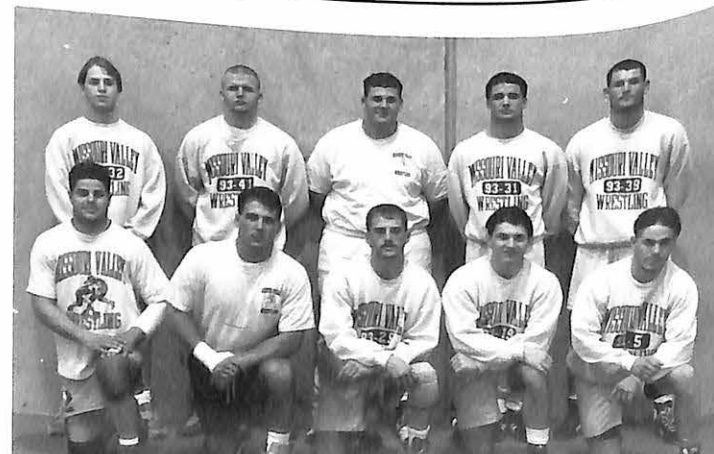

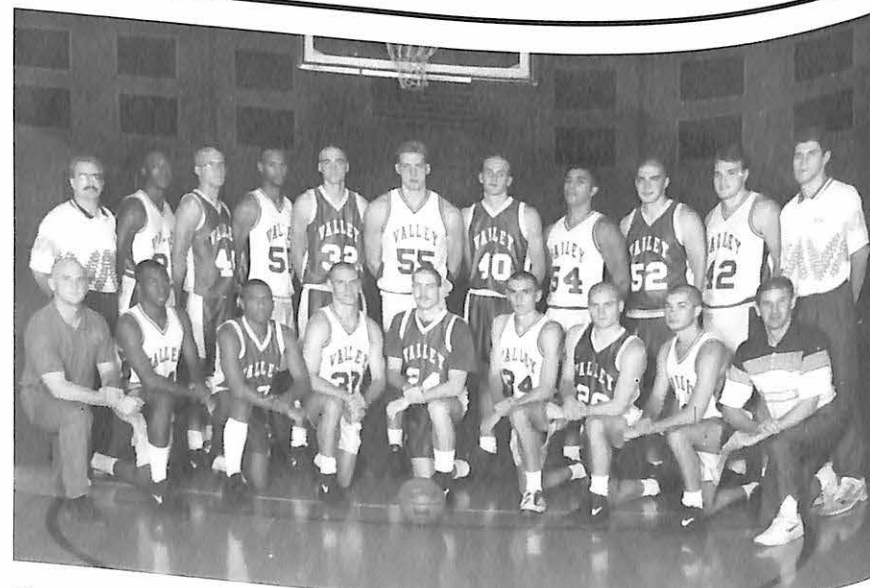
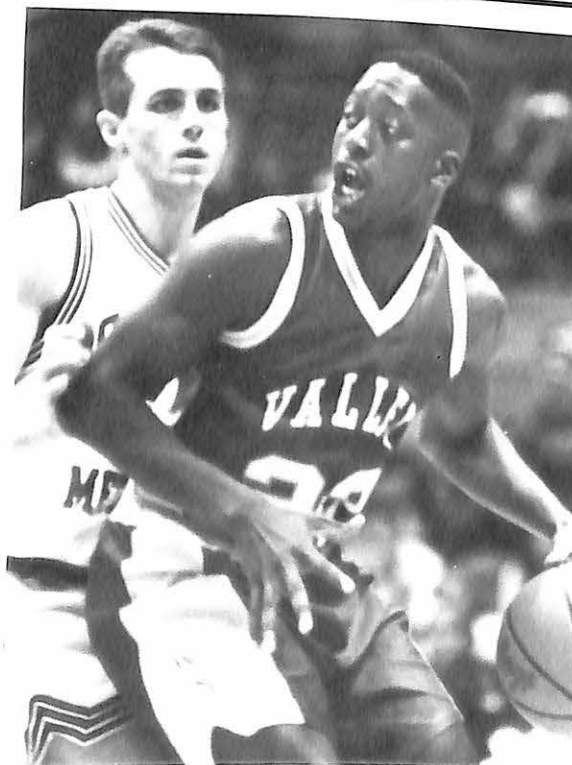

Moore, a playmaking and excellent defensive guard, ranked 10th among the All-Americans with a 3.88 GPA as a physical education major.

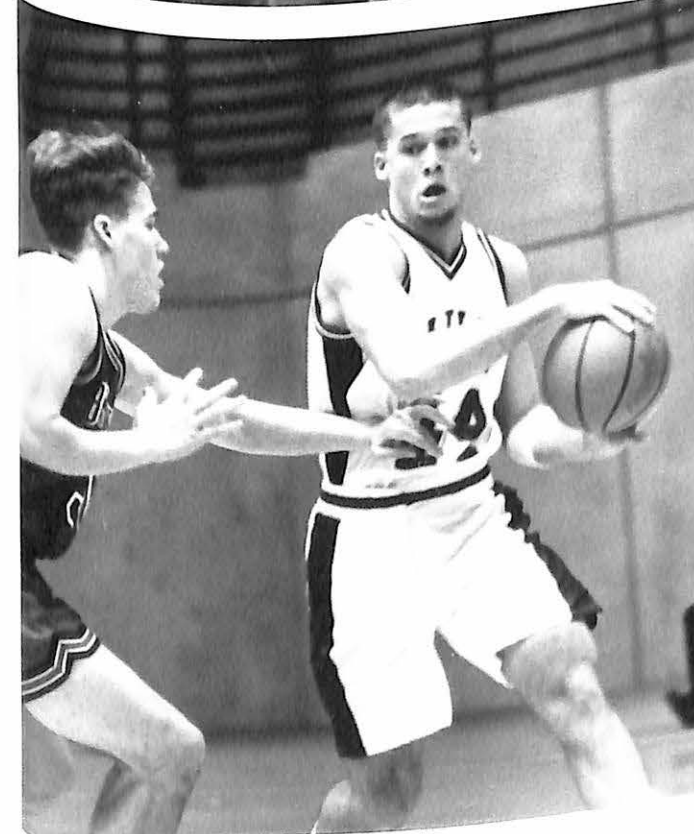
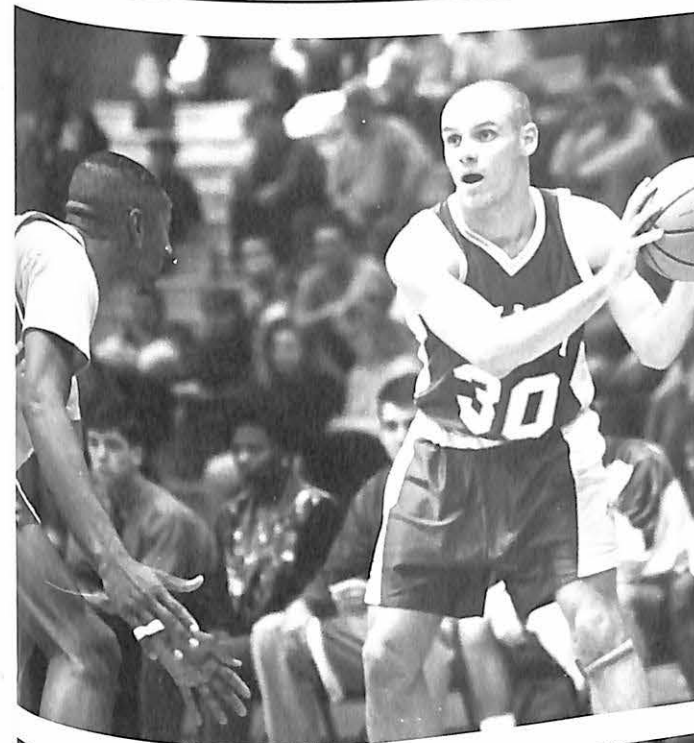

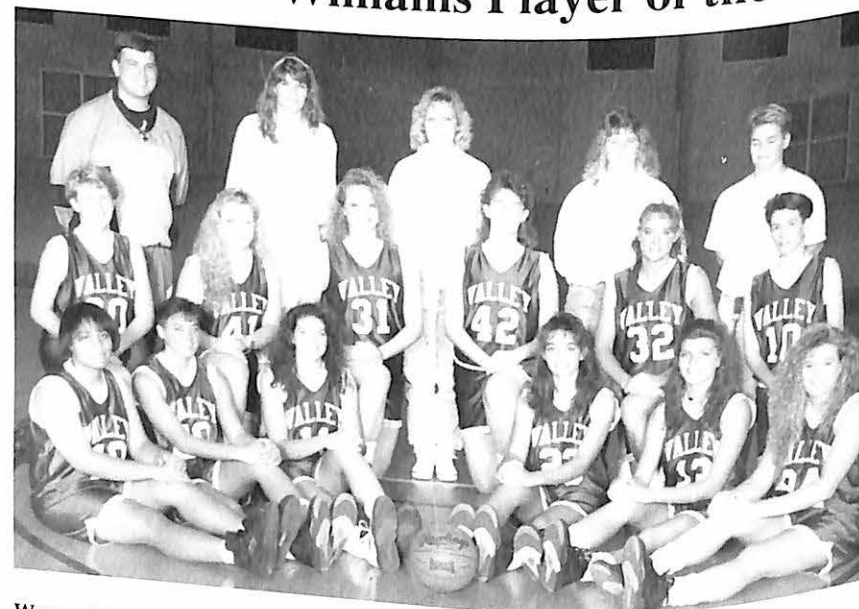
Six-foot-4 center Stacy Ahrens also contributed to the Lady Vikings' performance which led to the Heart of America Athletic Conference playoffs.

There, they defeated Mid-America Nazarene, 79-65, but the Lady Vikings lost to Culver-Stockton, 88-71.

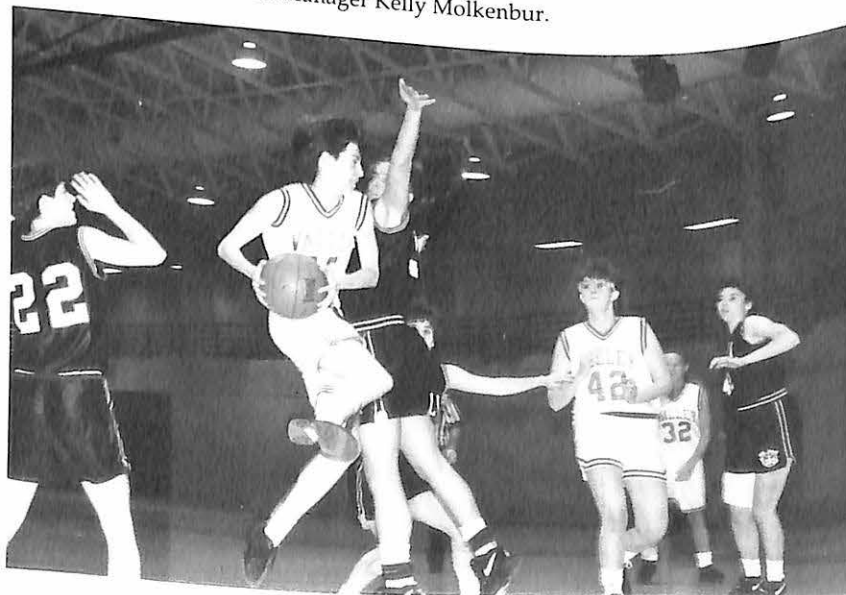
Seniors Delores Campbell and Sandy Paulus, junior Dawn Williams and sophomore Stacey Ahrens were named All-Conference players.

Campbell also received the Most Improved Award, and senior Melissa Williams was named Best Defensive Player.

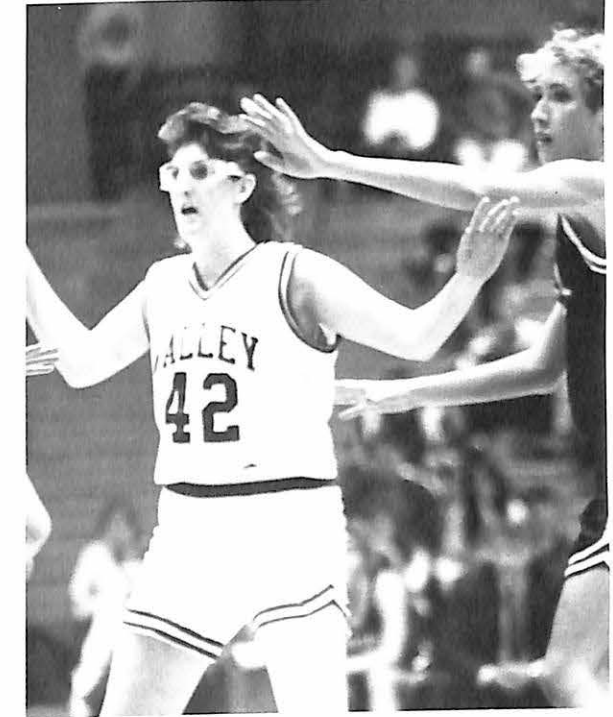

The Vikings were in position to win the HAAC championship, but they were edged out by William Jewell the last day of play.

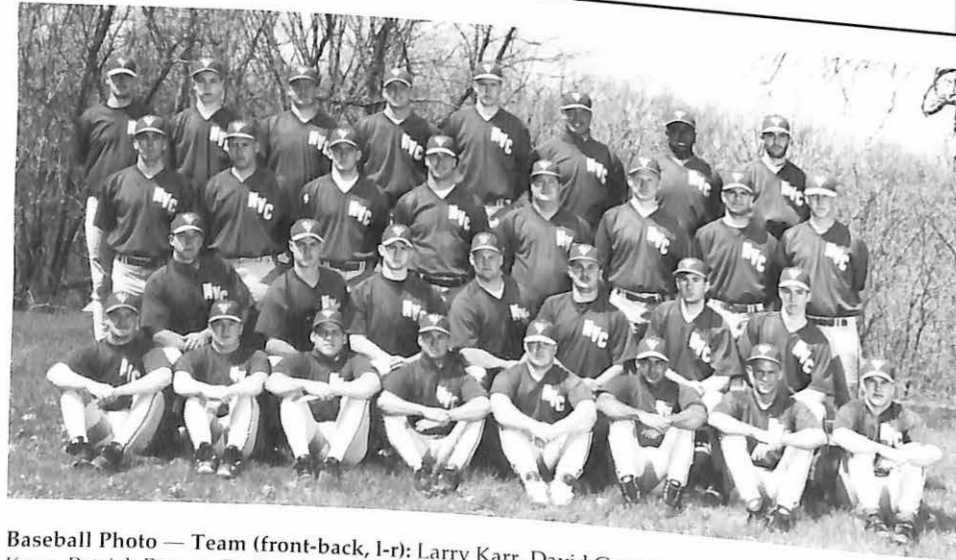
One of the season's brightest spots: the Viking baseballers played nine games during spring break at Fort Myers, Fla.

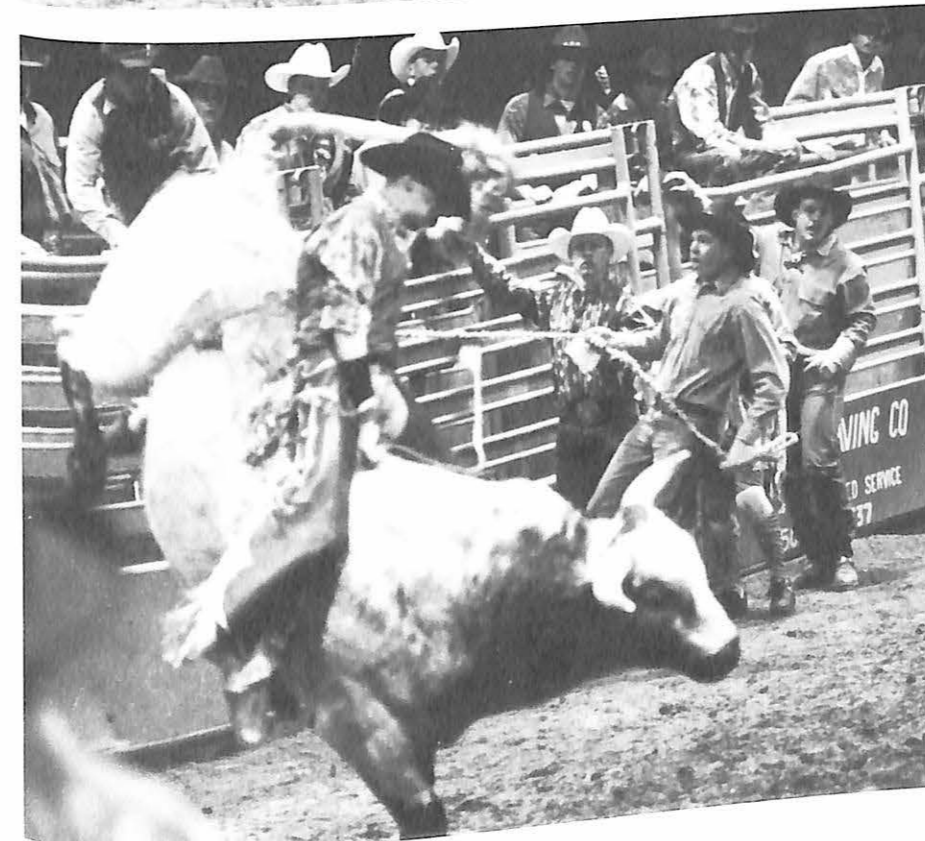
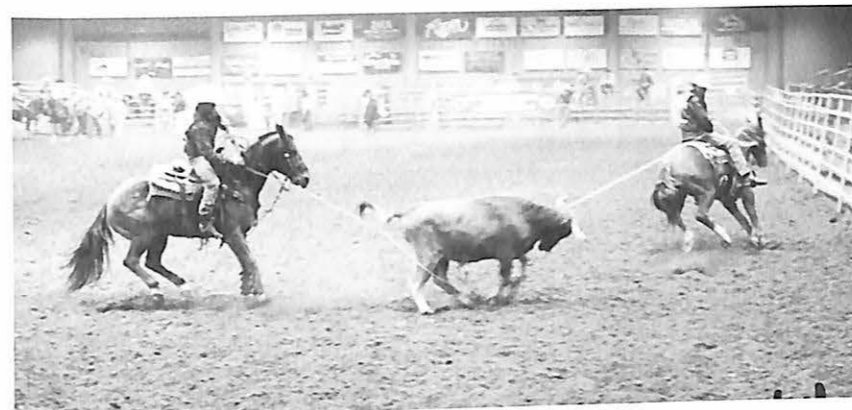

Humane Treatment of Rodeo Livestock Rules

1. A veterinarian shall be in attendance at every rodeo, or reasonably available, and will attend any injured animal after its removal from the arena.
2. Calves shall not be jerked down. A ten-second penalty will be imposed on a calf roper who accidentally jerks a calf down. A calf roper shall be disqualified for the remainder of the rodeo or fined for deliberately dragging or jerking down a calf.
3. All fresh brands or wounds will be treated as soon as possible and as often as necessary.
4. Humane livestock prods shall be used only when necessary, and only on appropriate areas of the animal's body.
5. Chutes, corrals and mangers must be constructed to prevent injury of livestock.
6. All horse and bull flanks are to be provided with protective lining.
7. Any individual deliberately abusing livestock in the rodeo arena will be removed from the arena, disqualified from that rodeo and fined.
8. The hazer must not hit the steer before the catch is made.

These rules are summaries of those in the International Professional Rodeo Association rule book and used by permission of the IPRA.

Animal rights activists have recently targeted the sport rodeo as being inhumane to animals. Even before these attacks, most rodeo associations established rules much like the IPRA rules summarized above to protect livestock.

Participants in the sport are aware of activists' efforts to pass legislation that would ban rodeo events altogether. In response to these activists, rodeo associations have established even stricter rules regarding the treatment of livestock, they have formed lobby groups and are making a concentrated effort to educate the public.

"I think the biggest problem between animal rights activists and rodeo stock contractors and contestants is that one has never been behind the scenes with the other," said MVC team member Christy Sapp.

"A well-fed, healthy animal is the only type of animal that will perform," stock contractor Kevin Hampton added. "As a rule, rodeo stock is better fed and taken care of than most backyard pets."

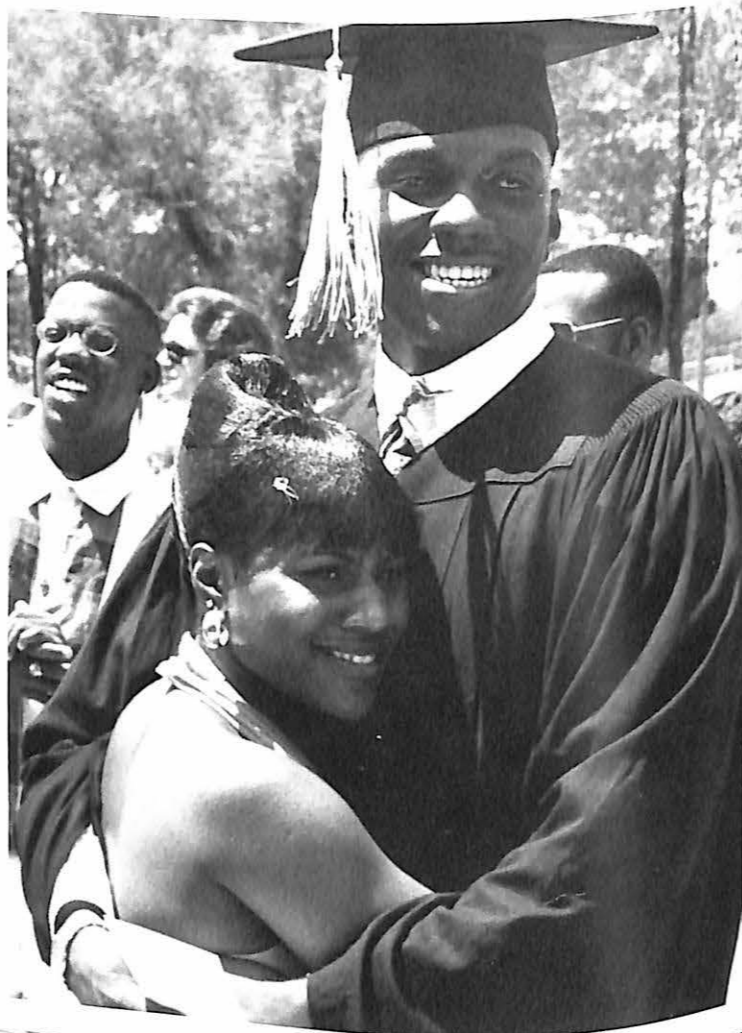

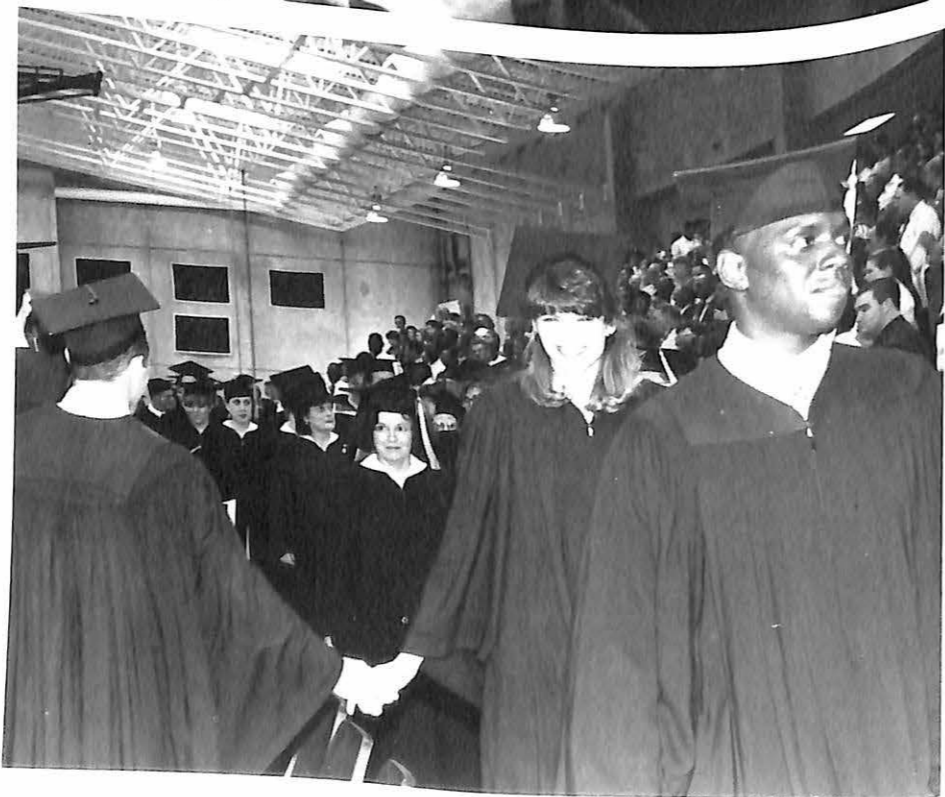
The Dow Jones average fluctuates, investors vacillate and Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan postulates that interest rate increases will halt inflation.

After four grueling quarters or as many as nine innings — which seemed either like four years or nine semesters — 115 Vikings of the Class of 1994 finally outsmarted the 65 MVC faculty members and made a clean sweep of the finals. 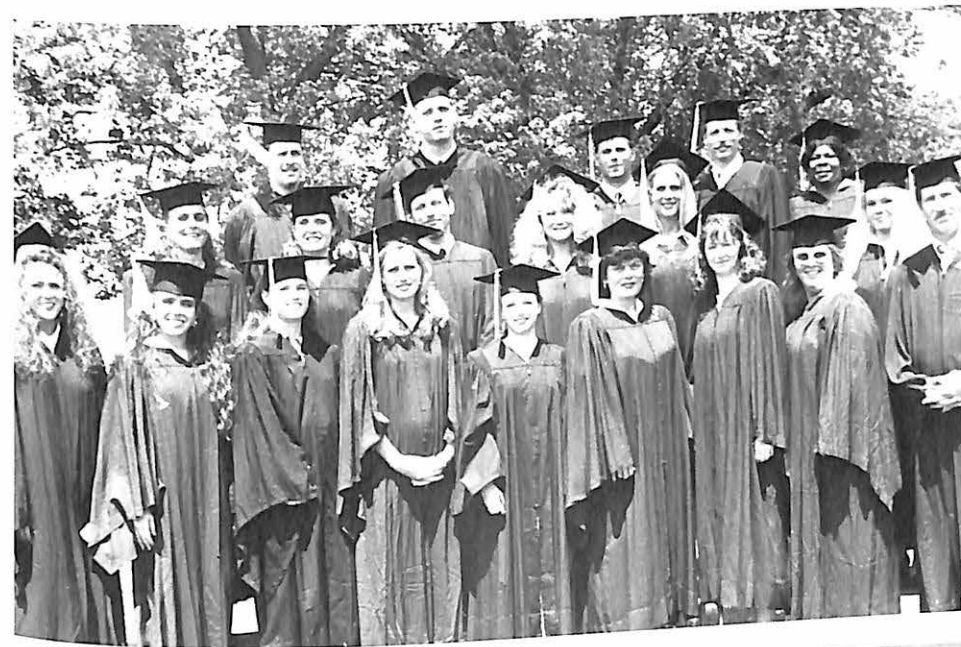
