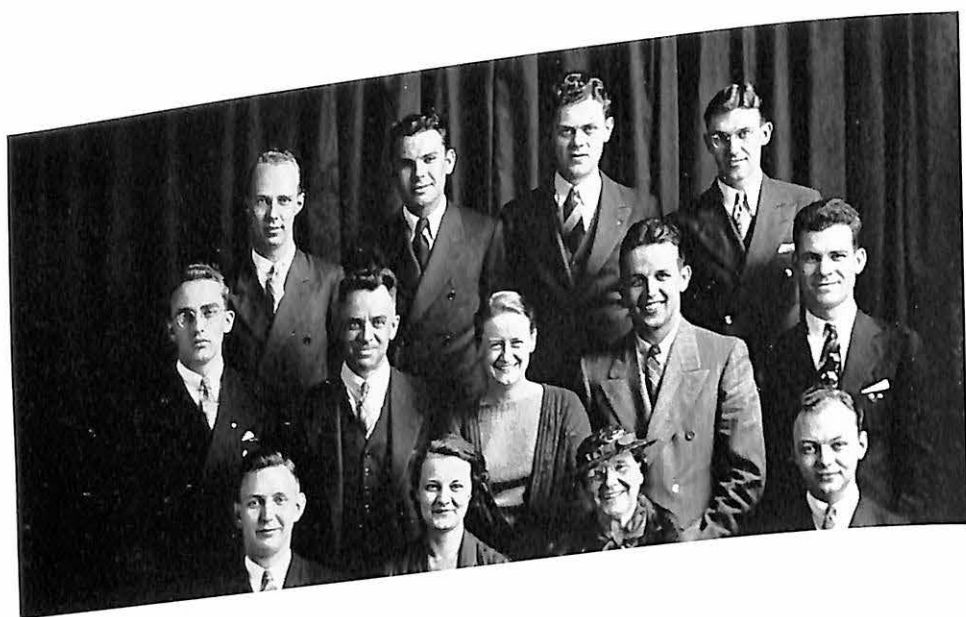

The orchestra this year has been under the direction of Mr. Steven L. Barrett. It has presented several chapel programs and has supplied music for



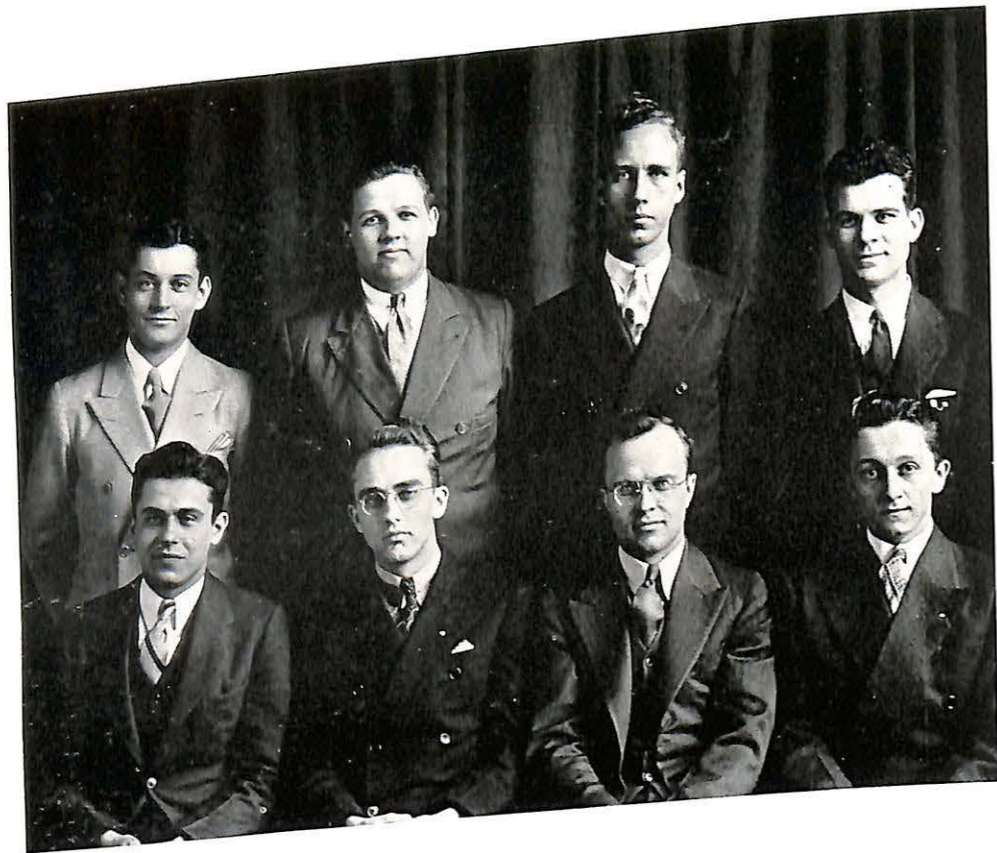

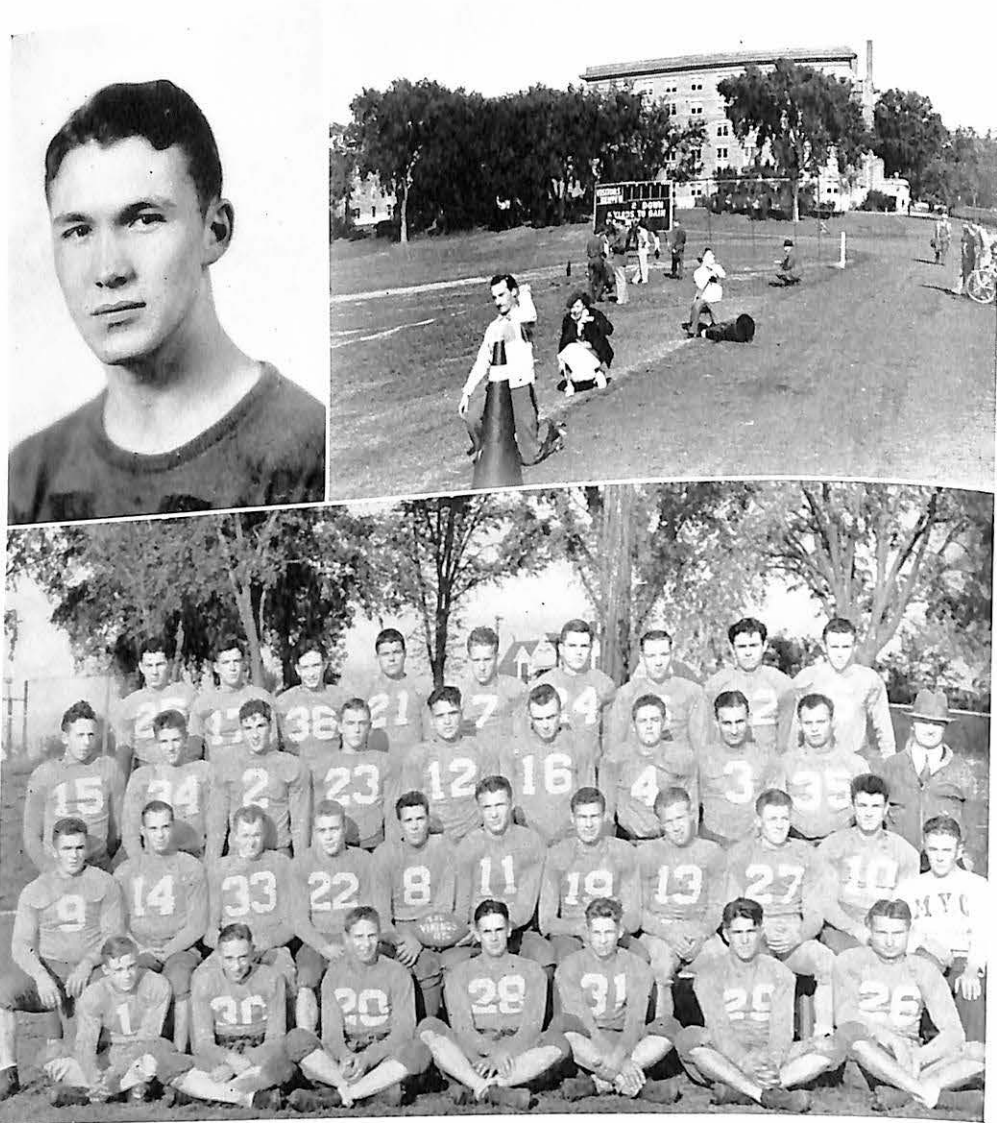
OUR COACH

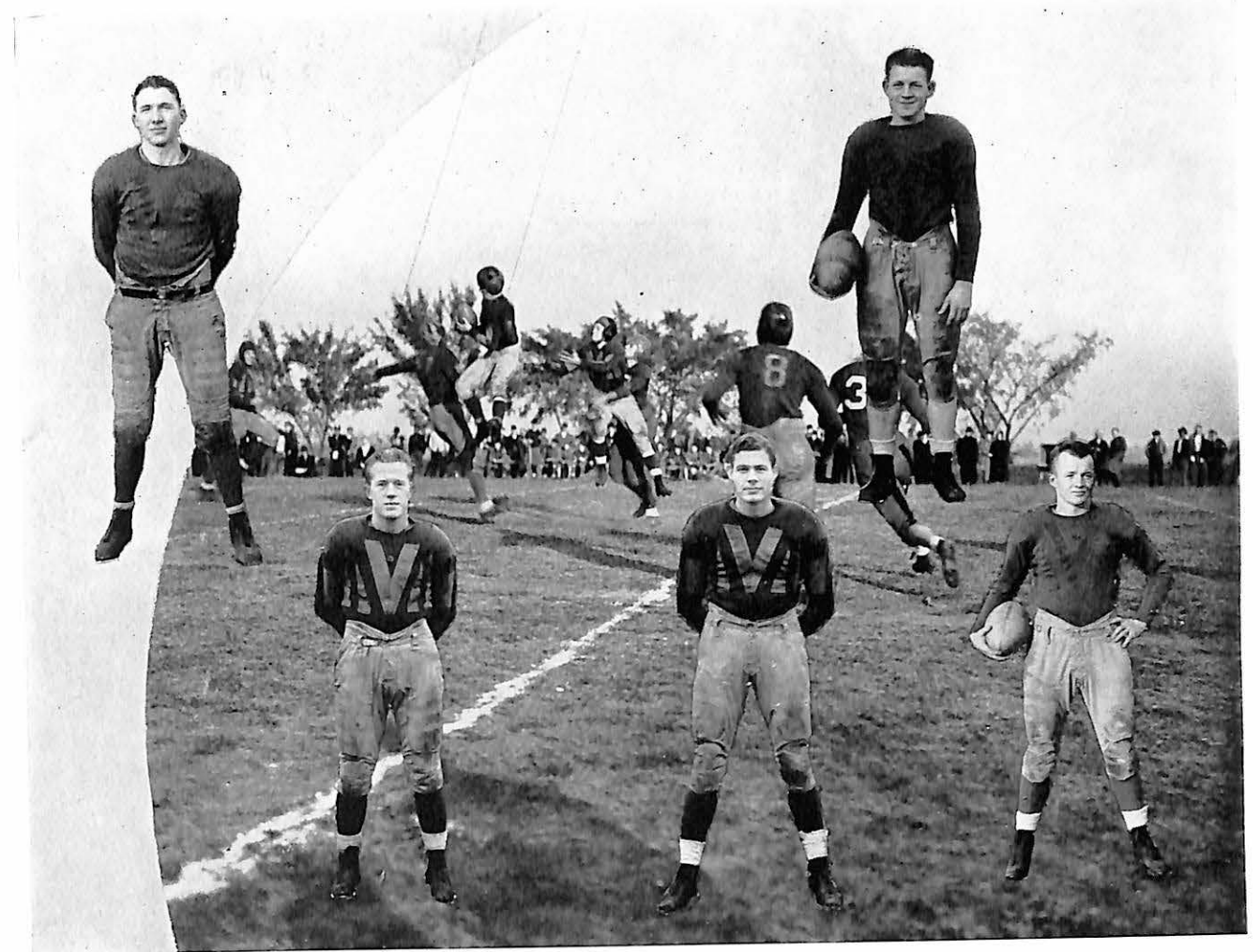

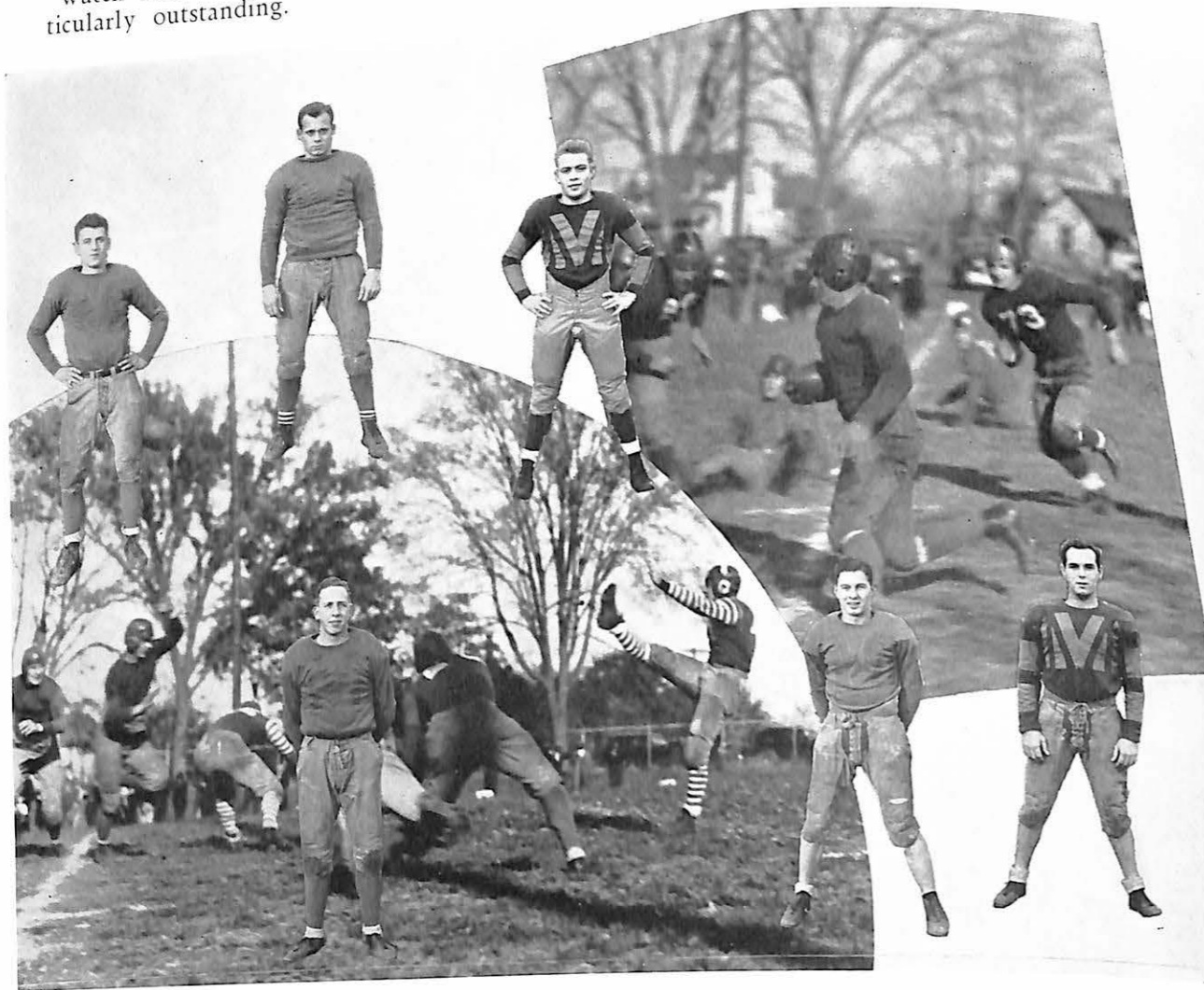

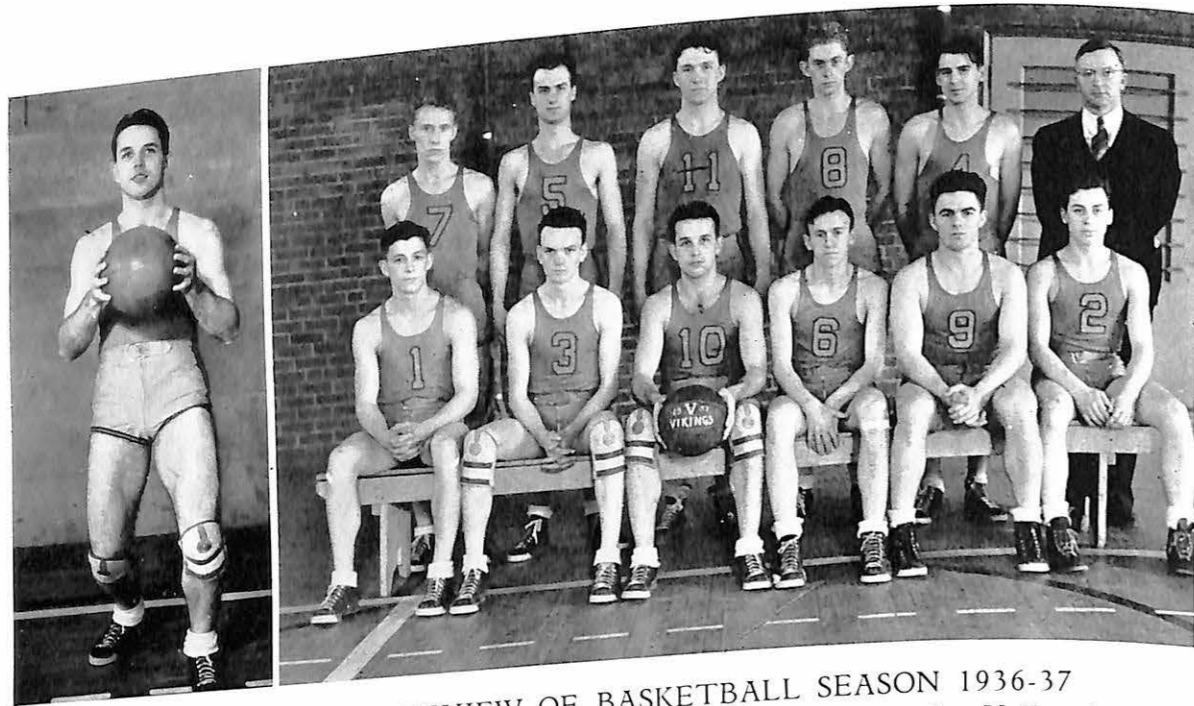

REVIEW OF BASKETBALL SEASON 1936-37

The current basketball season was the most successful one for Valley in the last decade. The team started out with six lettermen returning to practice, and with the addition of some old squad members and a few newcomers proceeded to trounce St. Paul's College in two practice games. The first loss of the season was to the Missouri B team but when the same team came to Marshall the Vikings won a 33-20 victory.

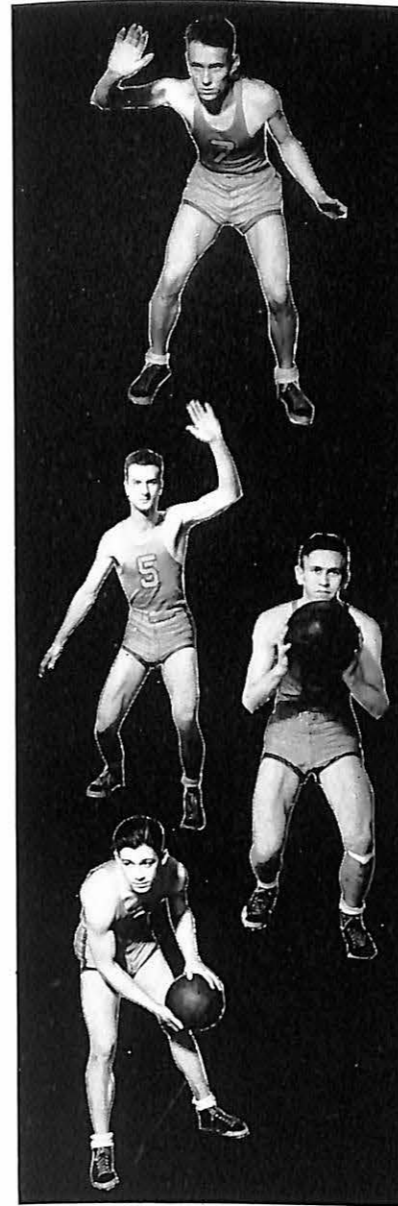
The conference season opened with the Vikings playing Tarkio and after an overtime battle they won with a 30-25 score. The Bluejays of Westminster proved too tall for our boys and the result was a 42-28 loss. Following this game came one of the best sporting events ever seen in the Morrison gymnasium—the Riley-Brown game. The Vikings were invincible that night and showed the Naismith Leaguers of Kansas City some real basketball and when the smoke cleared the Vikings were on the long end of a 59-45 score.

Suffering a relapse from the previous game the Valley cagers lost to Central and Tarkio and to Drury twice. They came out of their slump and handed Jewell a sound beating, the score being 30-12. Drury again proved too clever for the Orange basketekers and they lost by a 33-28 score.

Undoubtedly the most exciting game ever played on Valley's gym court was that with Central. The Eagles led at the half 25-6. Then came the Viking rally and when the last cheer had died out the Valley boys had garnered 31 points while Central made 8. The work of Capt. Sullivan will long be remembered. The Vikings closed the season with wins over Jewell and Culver-Stockton and a loss to Westminster.

At the M. C. A. U. Tournament the Vikings first played Central and were victorious by a 44-24 score, but they then met the Drury Panthers for the fourth time and were beat. In the game for third place in the tournament the Vikings defeated Tarkio by a large score.

In twenty games the basketball team won eleven and lost nine. They scored more points than any that were scored against them. finished fourth in the M. C. A. U. and third in the conference. Of the nine games lost, six were to the two schools that finished above them in the standings. Drury and Westminster. Sulli-van and Long were chosen as members of the second all-conference team.



JIM LONG: "The best backboard man in the conference" is the recommendation that is given to the likable center from Malta Bend. His work under the basket procured the ball in time of need and his scoring proved a boon to the Vikings.

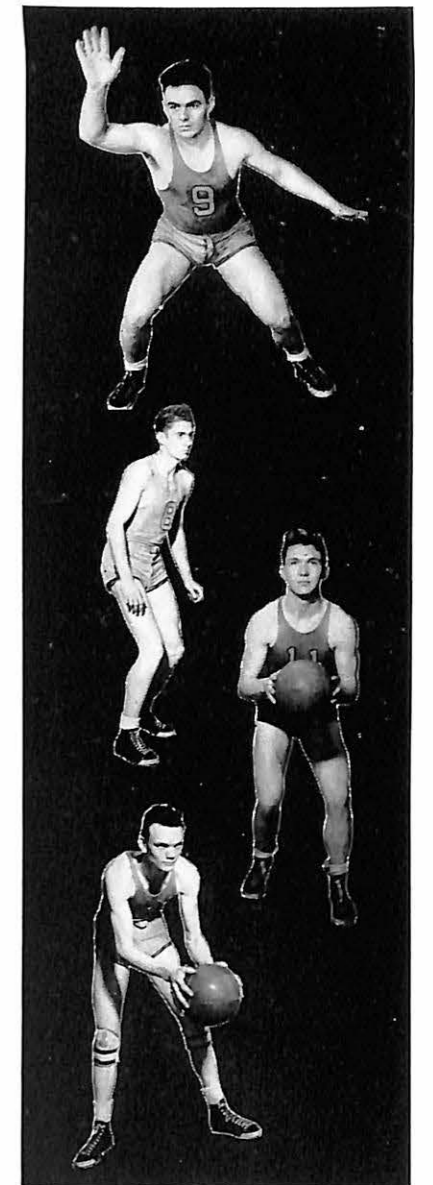

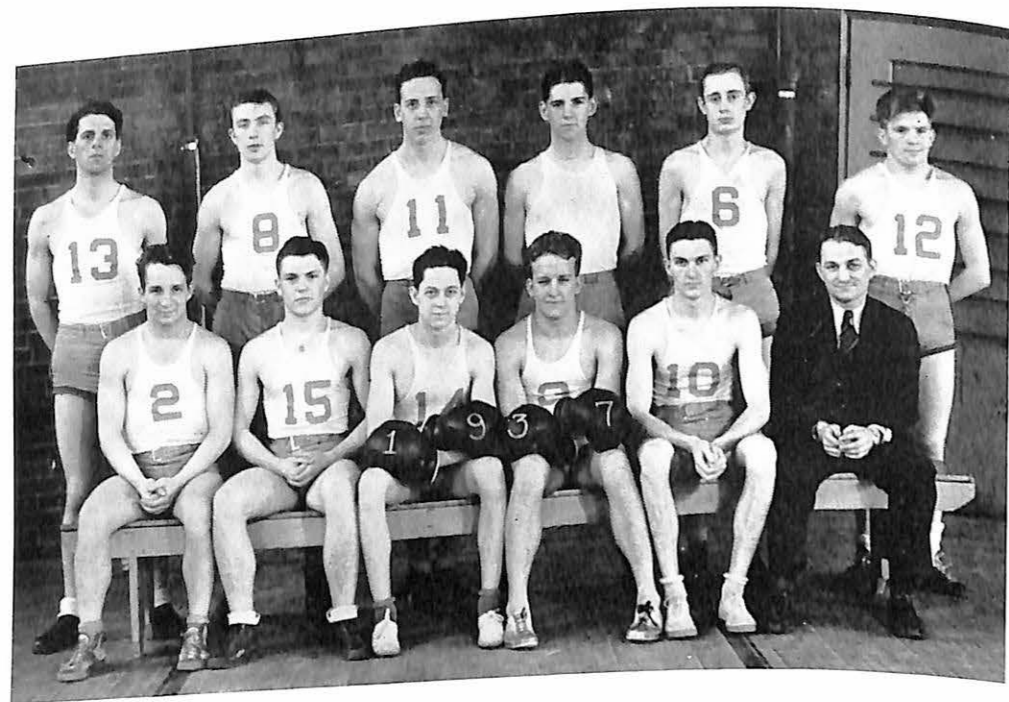
JACK COX: The blond flash from Miami was the spark plug of many belated rallies. He shoots left handed and is an exceptionally good shot.

The sport not only proved beneficial to the participants but provided entertainment during halves of the basketball games.

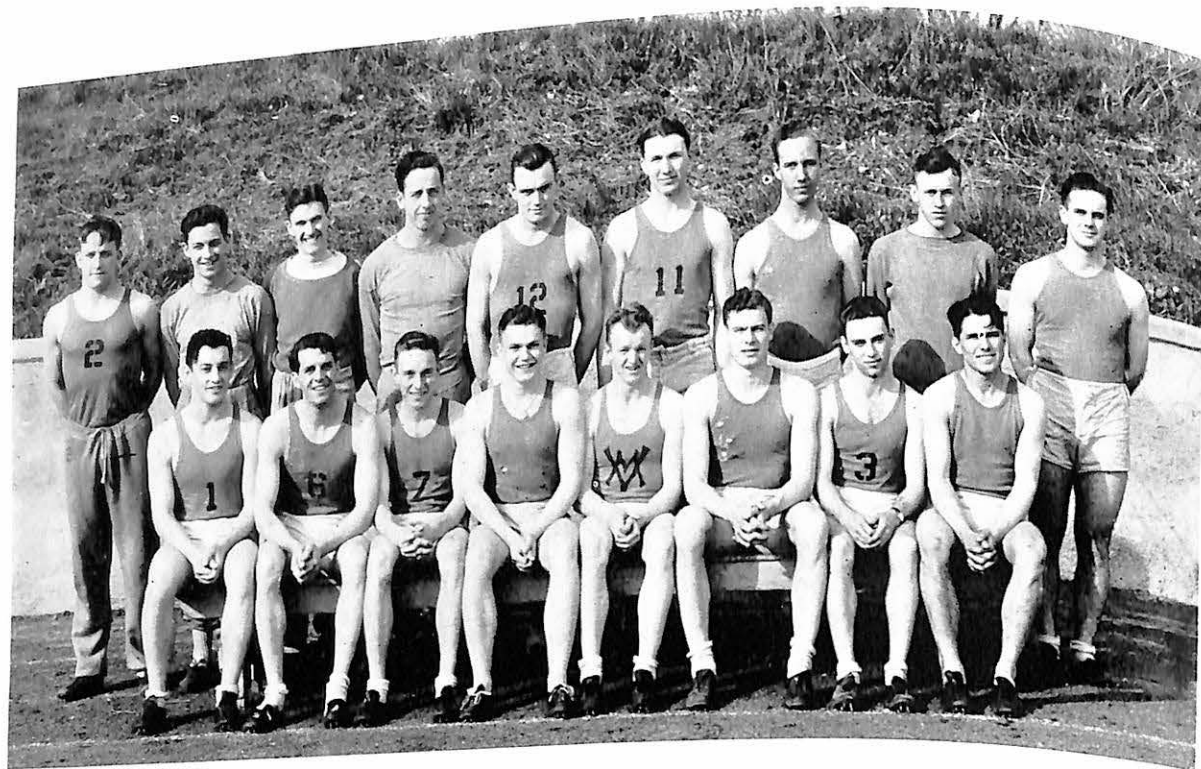

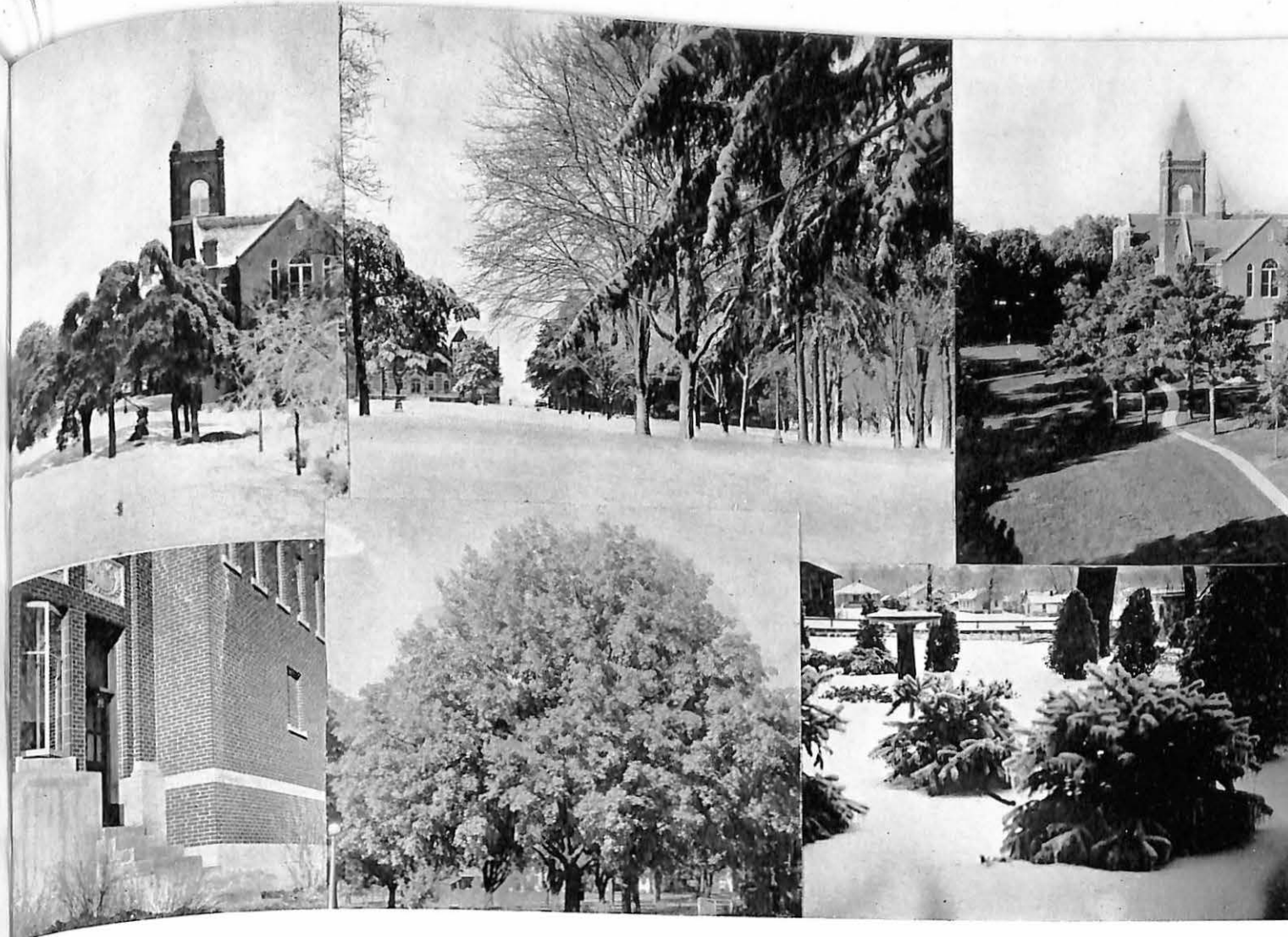
TENNIS

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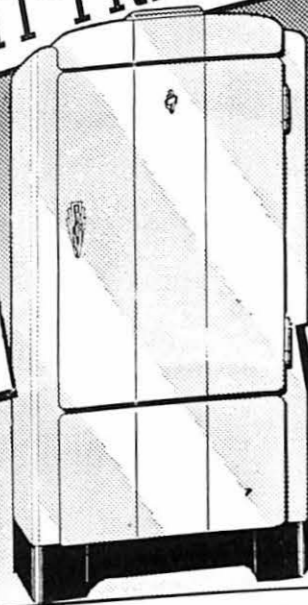
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SENIOR PROPHECY

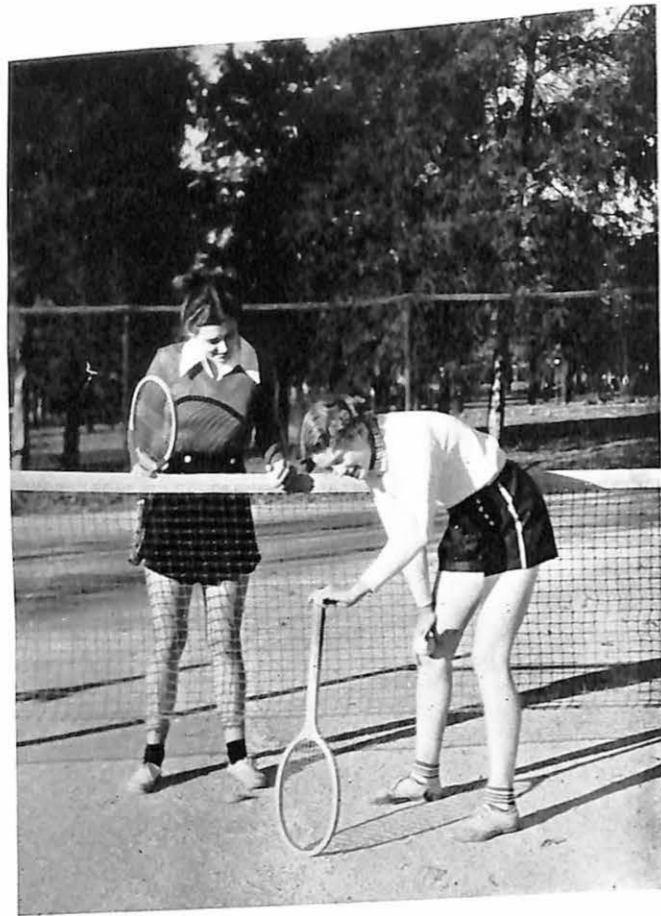
