ALPHA SIGMA ALPHA



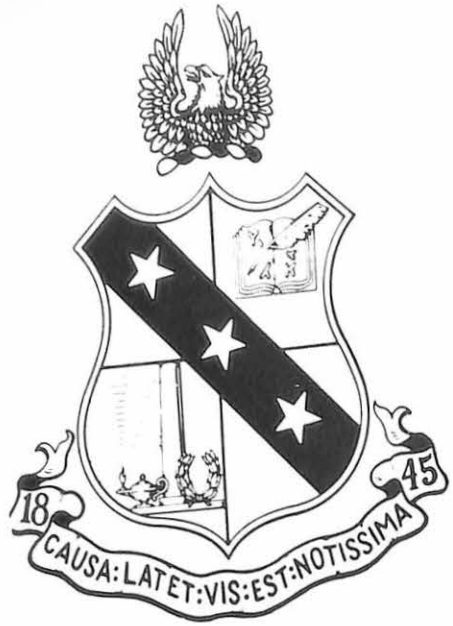
Alpha Sigma Alpha was founded on November 15, 1901 at the State Female Normal School in Farmville, Virginia, which is now known as Longwood College.

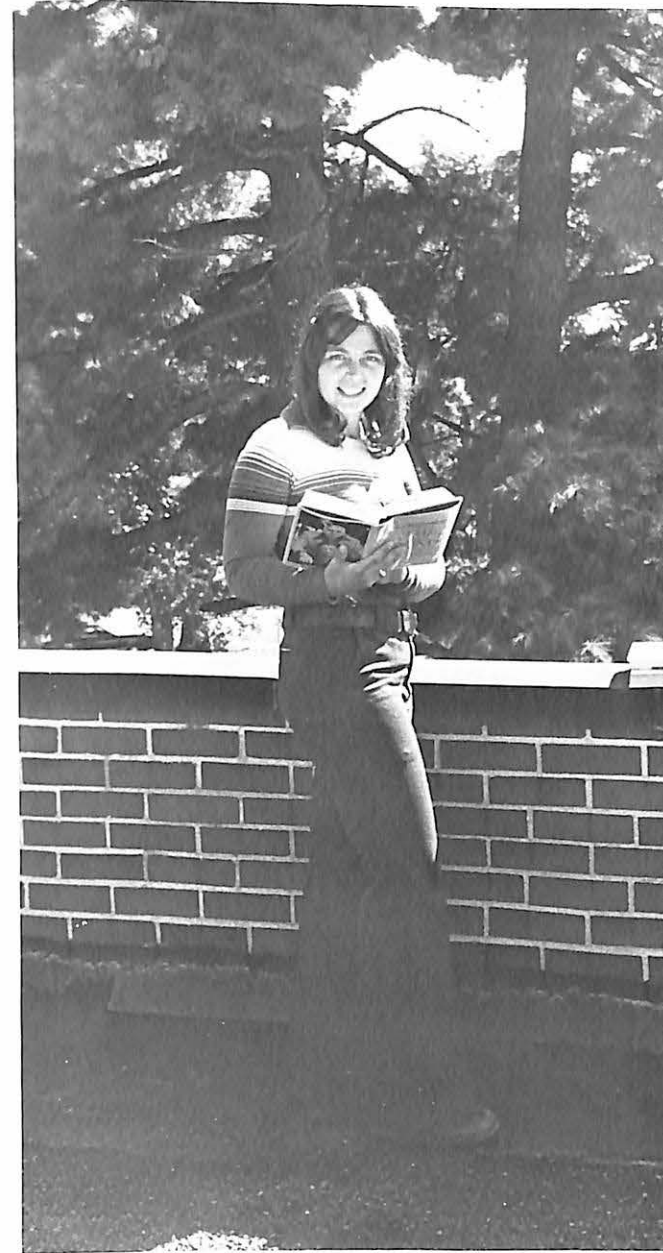
ALPHA XI DELTA

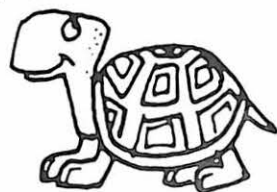

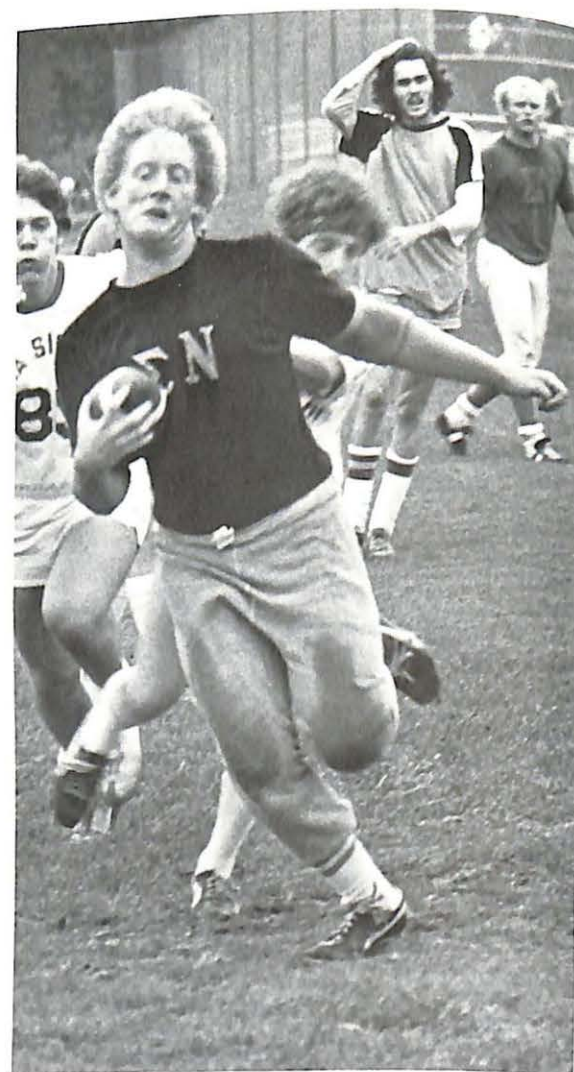
Delta Zeta originated at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio on October 24, 1902. Formerly called Sigma Phi, the Gamma Gamma Chapter of Delta Zeta was established as a National Panhellenic Sorority on October 21, 1945 at Missouri Valley College. Our jewel is the diamond, our flower is the Killarney Rose, and our colors are Old Rose and Vieux Green.

Established as a social sorority, Delta Zeta engages in fraternity exchanges, fund-raising projects, the annual Coronation Ball, philanthropy projects supporting Galludet College for the Deaf, and participates in intramural sports. The highlight for Gamma Gamma this year was being the hostess chapter for the Missouri Delta Zeta State Day. Seven chapters of Delta Zeta were represented along with alumnae from across the state. Besides sorority activities, Delta Zeta's can be seen serving on dorm council, Student Senate, College Center Council, faculty-student committees, the yearbook staff, honorary fraternities, and professional clubs.





SIGMA NU



Sigma Nu Fraternity was founded by cadets at the Virginia Military Institute, in 1869.

In 1891, Sigma Nu became the first fraternity at Missouri Valley College. Fraternities at that time were prohibited by the college which necessitated underground meetings for forty years.

Brother William I. "Pop" Ferguson, the college's most popular and colorful personality, is currently the oldest living Sigma Nu in the country.

This past year, Sigma Nu won the Greek Week Championship, and the intramural basketball and volleyball crowns.

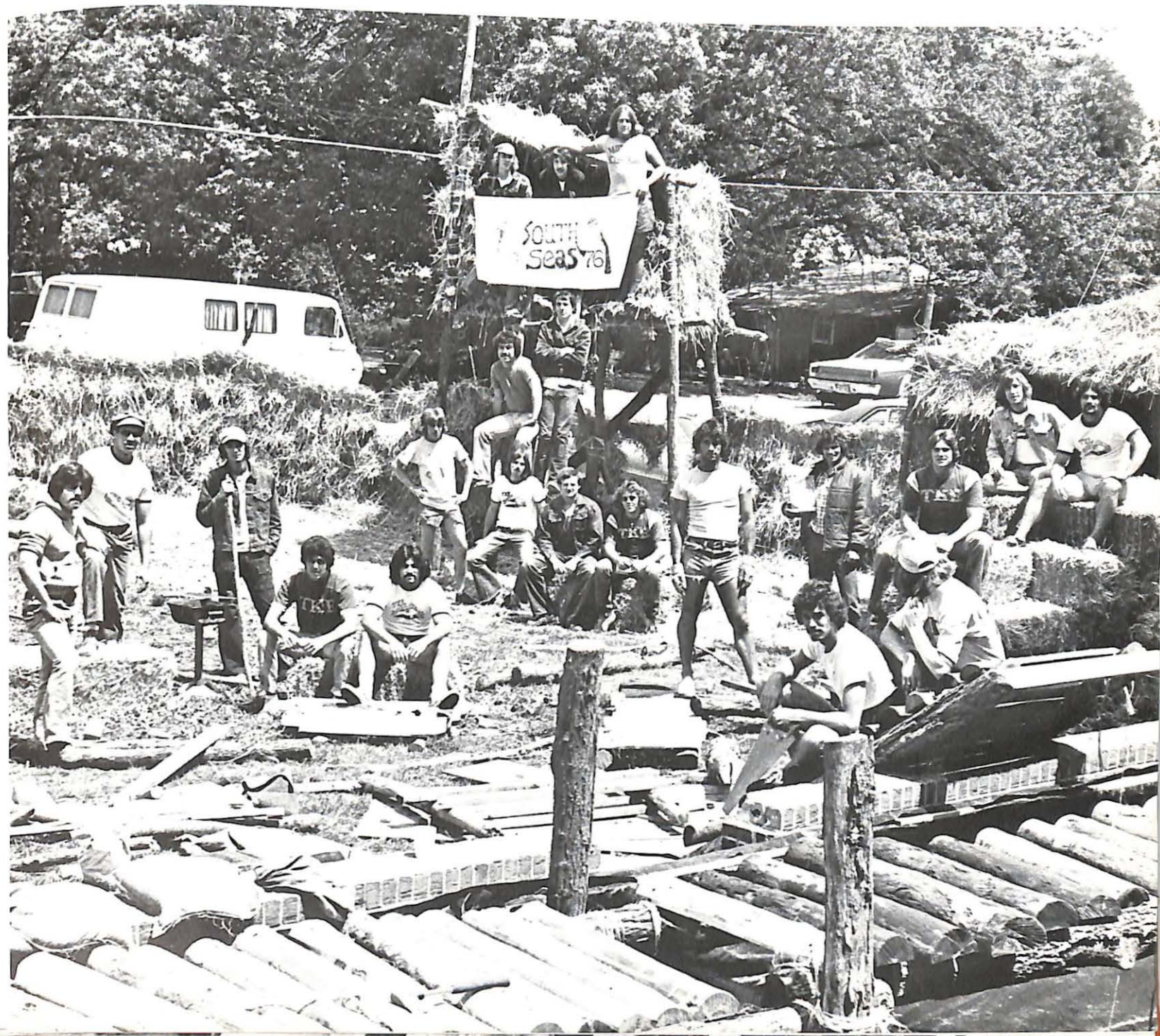


TAU KAPPA EPSILON

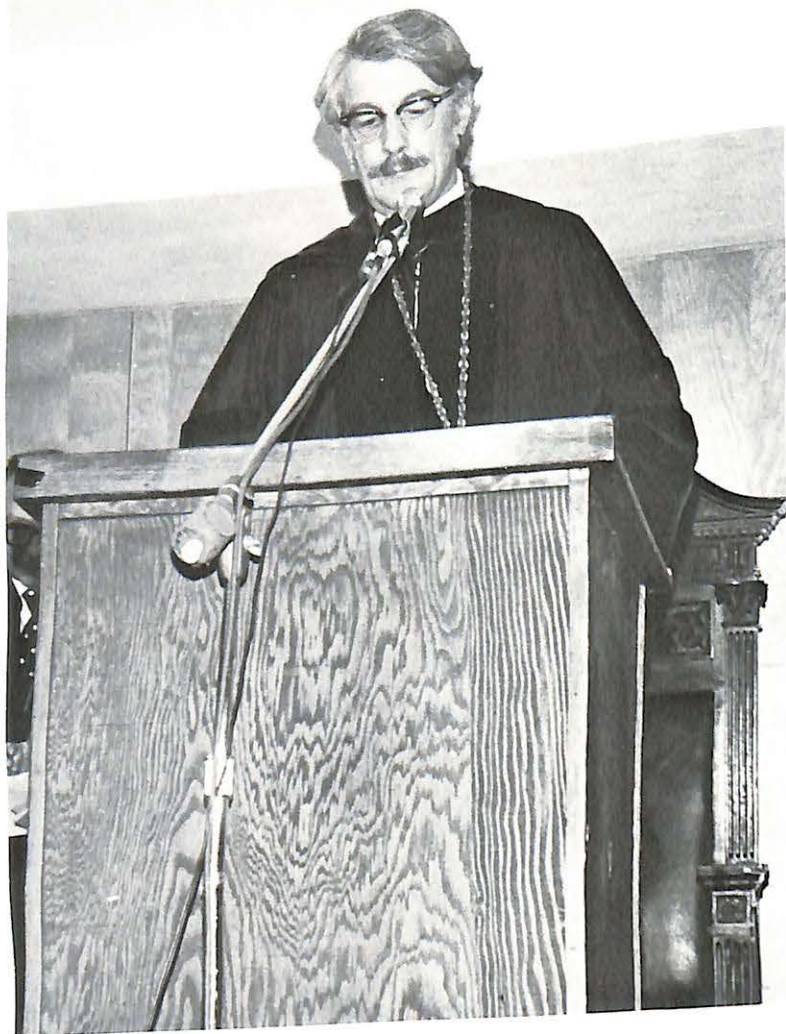

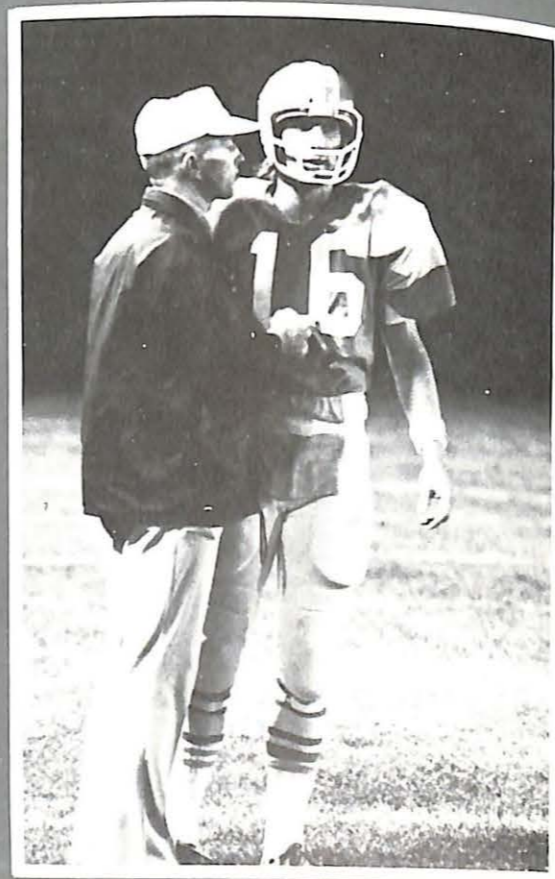
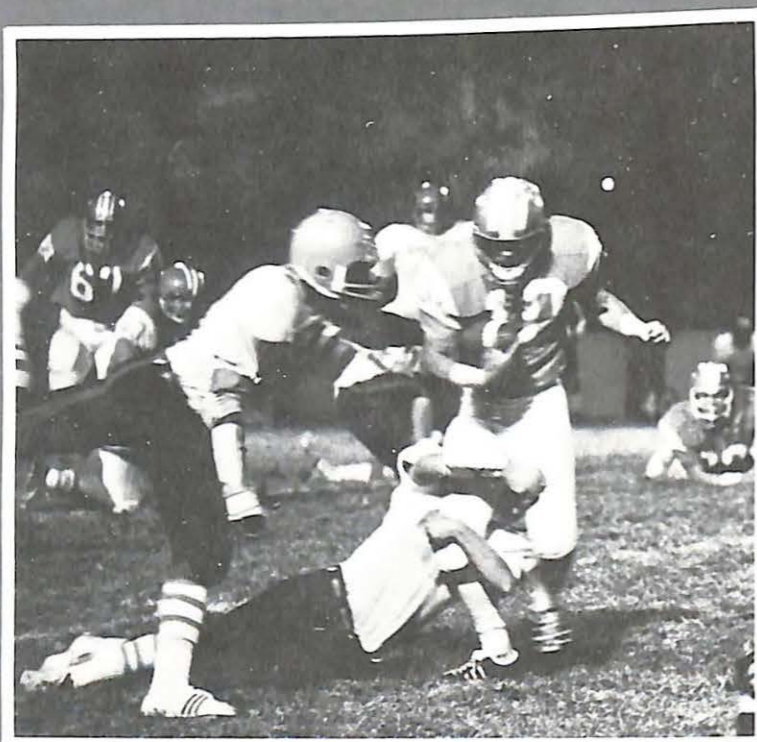




Valley capitalized on Rolla's errors in the season opener played on Jackling Field. The Viking vikings were very quick even though they lost nine of their eleven starters from the 1974 team which had gone 10-1-1 for the season. This was Valleys third consecutive win over the Miners. Each of Valley's touchdowns was set up on a key defensive maneuver. The defense even scored the first six-pointer. Stan McKinney carried the ball into the end zone after a punt was blocked by Jim Audsley, Bruce Beyer, Don Crannon and McJoe Spallina split the uprights with his first of four extra point conversions. Rolla came right back to tie it up 7-7. Beyer recovered the ball from the Miners on a bad pitchout. Five plays later Greg Farris scored. T.D. number three was chalked up on the very first play of the fourth quarter. Craig Conklin fired the bullet to split end Frank Arizmendi. Mike Forrest set up Valleys final touchdown when he nailed an interception. Farris again scampered for the score. Rolla scored again. But with 45 seconds remaining Rolla's frustration came to a boil with an outbreak following Tom Sandwith interception. The vikings won over Rolla 28-14.

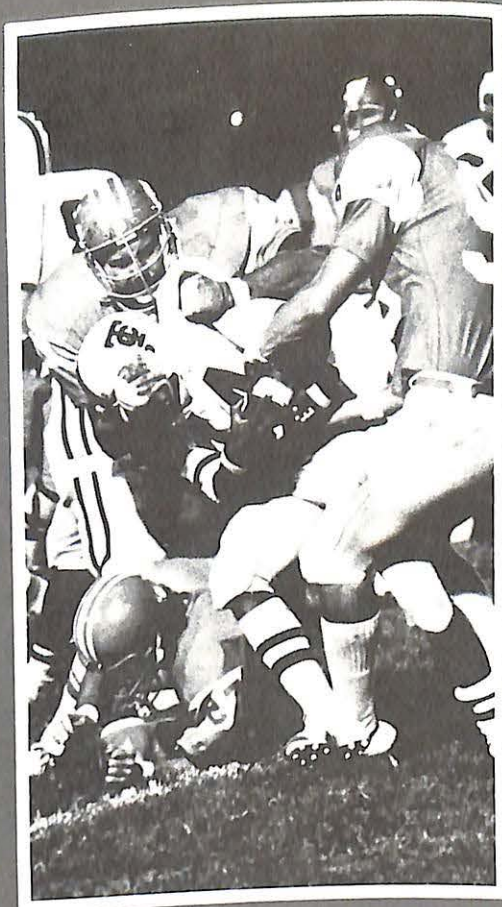
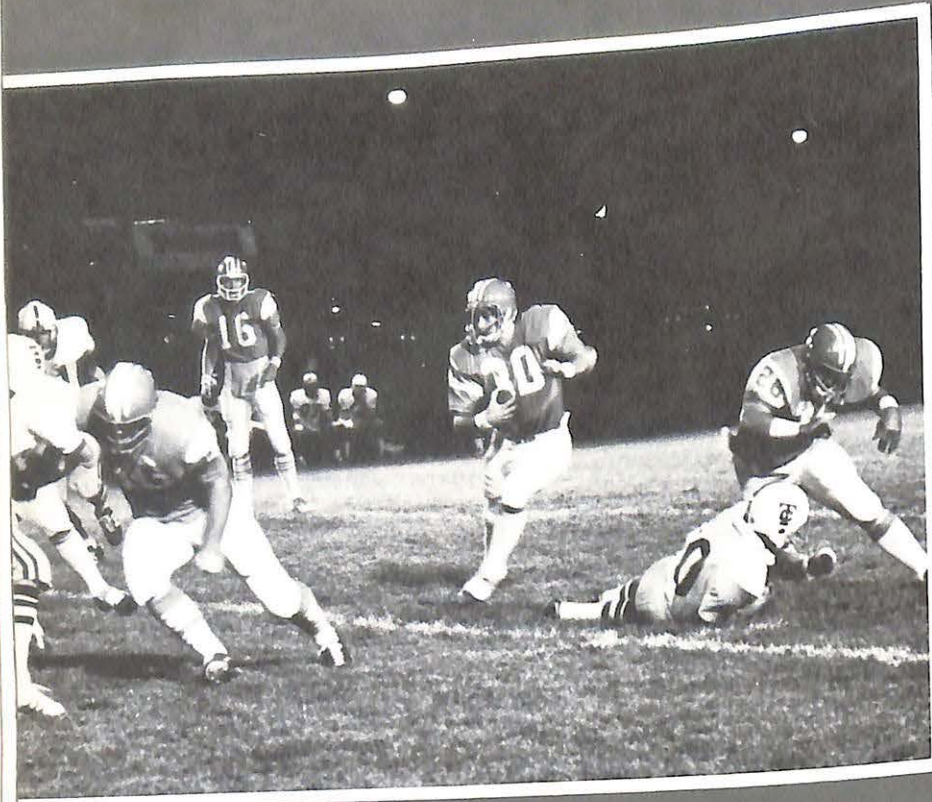
Valleys second game was a shut-out. Led by a strong offensive attack and a consistent defense. Defensively the Vikes were unquestionably up to par, their interceptions totaled four for the entire contest. Valleys defensive line was also responsible for sacking Iowa Wesleyan's quarterback Ed Anderson five times. Valleys first taste of pay dirt came a Craig Conklin ran four yards on an off-tackle slant. Jon Heermann recovered an Iowa fumble setting up the second scoring drive consisting of two Conklin passes first to Arizmendi for 17 yards then Gary Johnson 12 yards and a score. Joe Spallina hit his second of three kicks to bring the score to 14-0. The third T.D. came again by Johnson on a 12 yard pass from Conklin. Valley defense was superb. Dykema proved a definite highlight with his punting.



Valley chalked up another victory. 461 yards total offense provided MVC with a 27-0 verdict over the Bulldogs of Concordia. Valleys first TD was a quick one by Farris, he jaunted 26 yards to pay dirt. The second touchdown came when Pete Roetzer sped 25 yards on a reverse blast. Spallina then kicked his second point after conversion. The third touchdown occurred when only less than one minute had elapsed in the fourth quarter. Pitt rammed the ball in to the three yard line, Farris carried it over on the next play. The games only interception was turned in by McKinney, with 12 minutes left to play. This set up Valleys fourth TD. Jeff Steinle went hurdling into the end zone. Dan Ragle was also a key figure in the final scoring. Strong tackles were made by Paul "Chip" Newell, Mike ForStan McKinney, Gary Sowell, Bruce Beyer, and Bruce McAnelly.

Valley was ranked No. 1 by the 16 NAIA Division II raters across the U.S. When you are No. 1 there's really only one way to go and Valley found out the hard way as they came tumbling down at the hands of Washburn University. An honor all too short lived ended in a 24-7 verdict. In 1974 Valley soundly thrashed Washburn 41-7. It took Washburn less than five minutes to produce the first points. A pass play for 49 yards was finally brought down by Kenny White. Some eight plays later the Ichabods found the end zone on a fourth down carry. Gene Smith was able to cover the football in the end zone when Conklins attempt on a sneak play failed and he relinquished the ball to Smith. Smith was credited with valleys only score in the game. Jeff Steinle ended up top ground gainer with 69 yards. Ragle, who hits through the line had a couple of long gainers and showed an overall accumulation of 46 yards. Washburn went on to score on the Vikings three other times. The Vikings dominated the ball only twice in the third quarter. Arizmendi and Steinle's 22 yard sweep set up the Vikings again to get back in the ball game. Conklin was passing to Johnson and Steinle only to have an offensive holding penalty put a damper on the fun. The major turning of the whole struggle came with 11:47 remaining. Valley was faced with a fourth and three situation and trailing. Instead of going for the first down Mark Dykema was sent in to punt. The 51 yard runback of the 37 yard kick was curtailed by Steinle. Washburn had every thing shift in their favor.





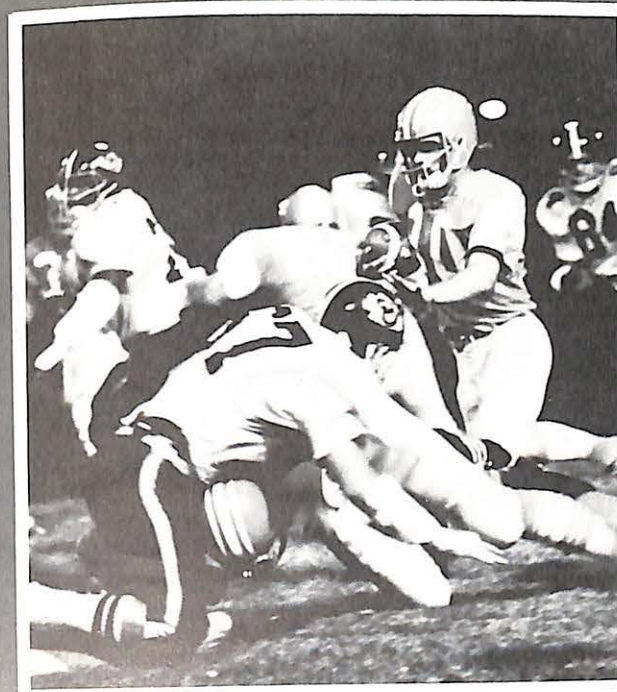
Valley Takes Conference Opener. After last years 14-14 humiliating tie with Tarkio, the Vikings were ready for the revenge. The first score came for Valley when Steinle broke a tremendous hole provided by the left side of the offense and dashed 33 yards to score. Spallina's boot made it 7-0. Steinle's touchdown run was set up by a fumble recovery by Paul "Chip" Newell on the Tarkio 18. The fumble recovery was one of four made by the Viking defense which also intercepted a pass. Defensive standouts include Newell who made 11 tackles, Bruce McAnelly with 17 tackles, McKinney 16, plus a fumble recovery. Forrest and Beyer tallied one fumble recovery each, Rubbo gathered the games only interception. The defence was doing more than holding their own. Spallina's field goal late in the opening period brought in a 10-0 halftime score. Early in the third quarter Tarkio scored their one field goal. Valley scored two other touchdowns. One came on a Conklin to Arizmendi interception. The final opportunity came on Rubbo's intercepted pass on the Viking 47 followed by a 52 yard run by Farris. A tense Tarkio player heaved his helmet at Gary Johnson late in the last quarter for which action he was ejected from the game. The final score a 23-3 victory for Valley.

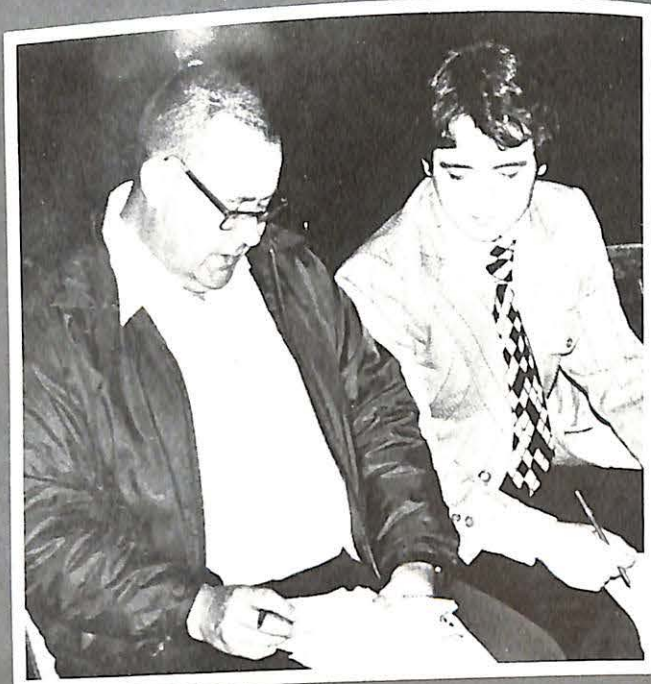

Baker was able to show lights on the score board first but shortly after that Valley succeeded at putting their lights out! Leading ground gainer for M.V.C. was Greg Farris who covered 100 yards in 21 carries. Conklins aerials 4-13 netting 91 yards. Two of those hook-ups resulted in touchdowns. The first was to Arizmendi in the first half and again in the third stanza. Conklin himself scored twice. He ran in from three yards out to answer Baker's six pointer then bounded ten yards for another in the third stanza. The latter play was set up by a fumble recovery credited to tackle Paul "Chip" Newell deep in Wildcat territory. 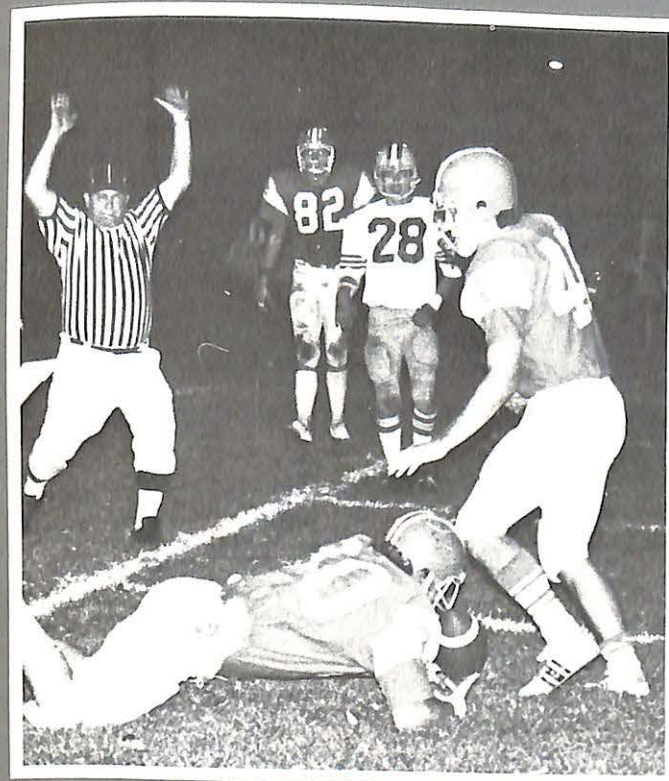

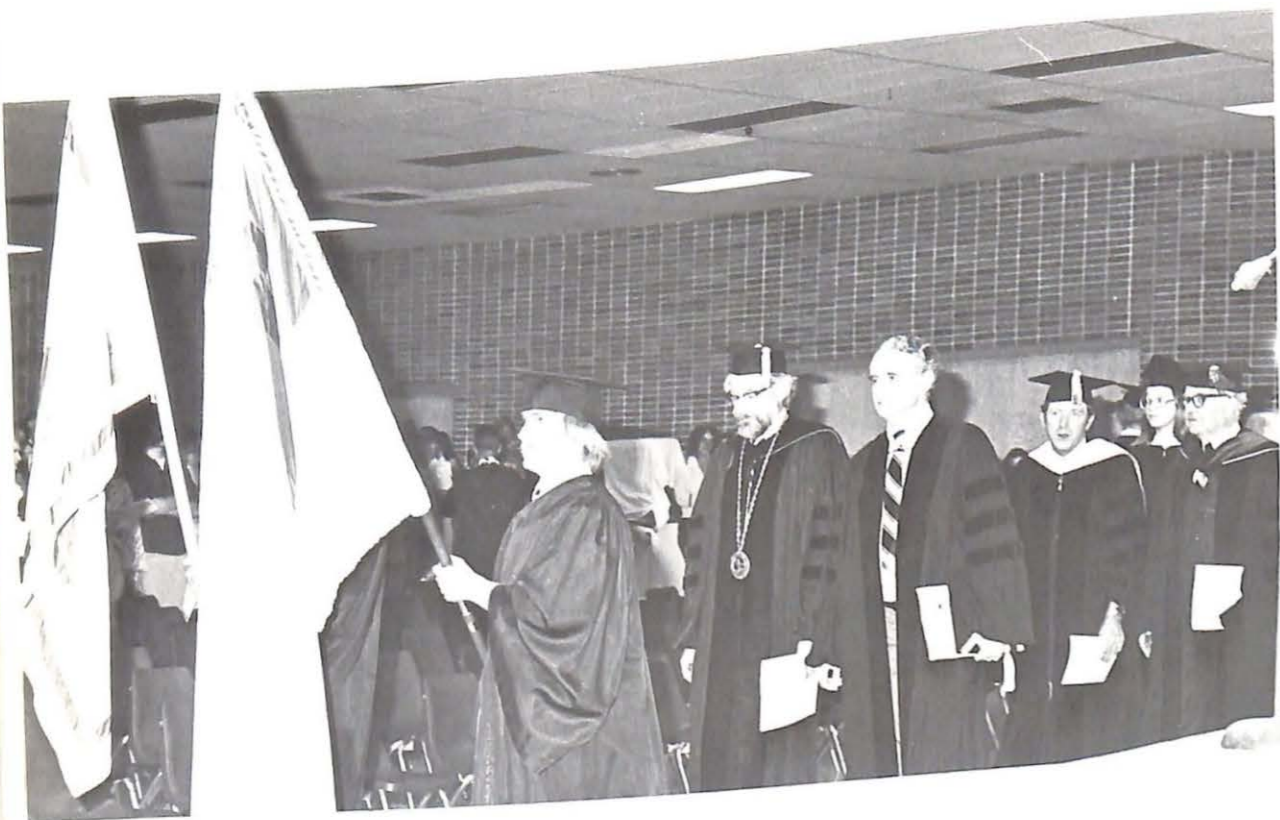


Graduation 1976
