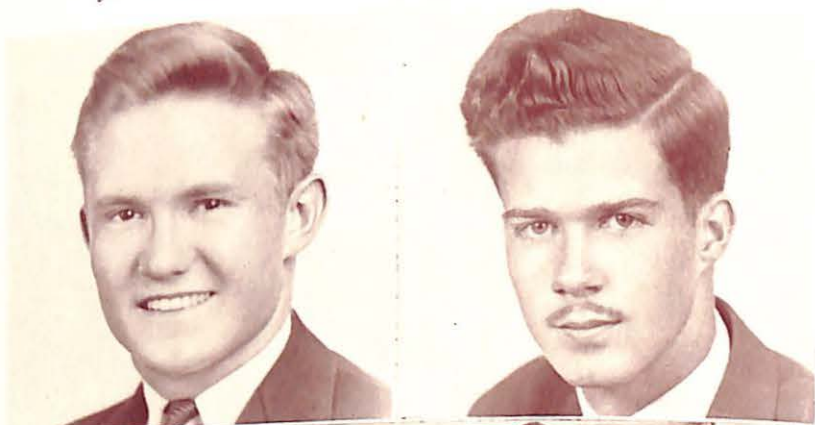
## STUDENT SENATE

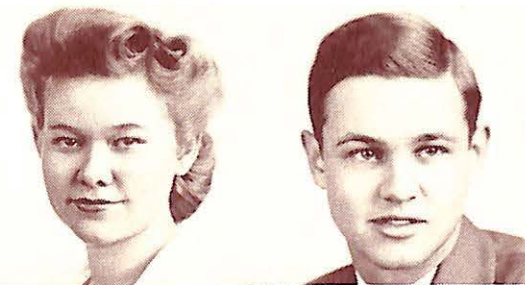

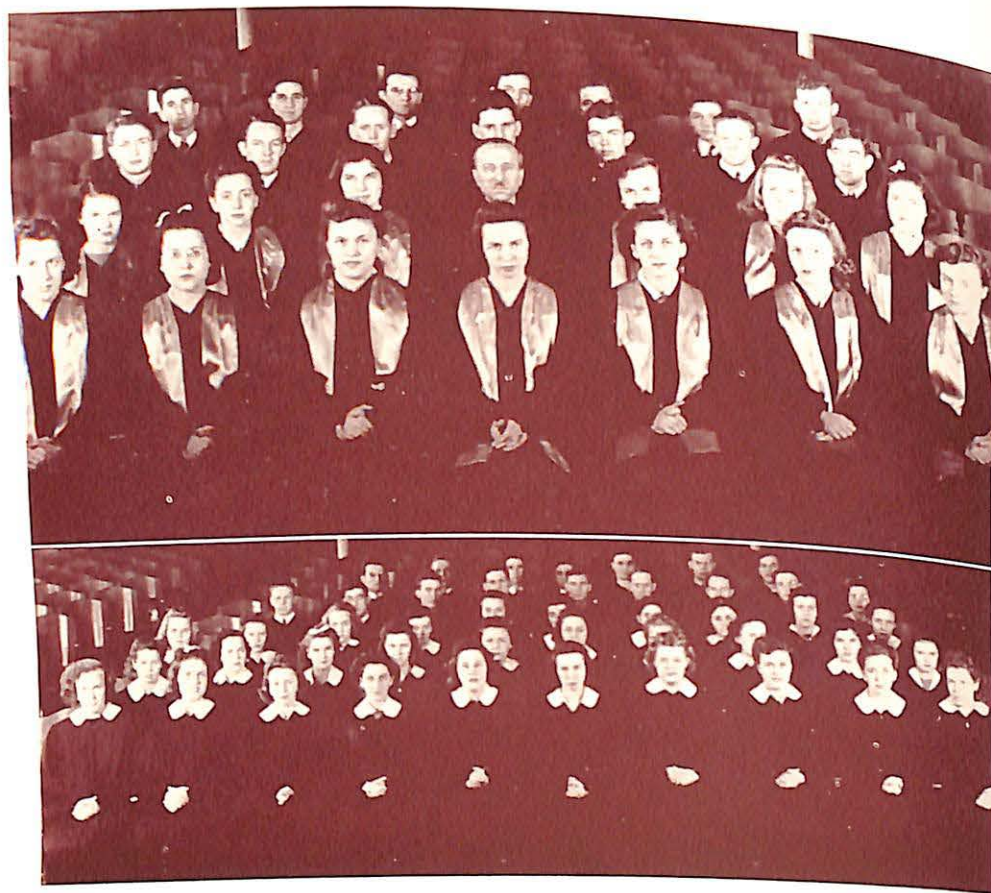
The Barnyard Frolic, the Hay Ride, and the Christmas Nativity Pageant have become traditional activities of the Y's.

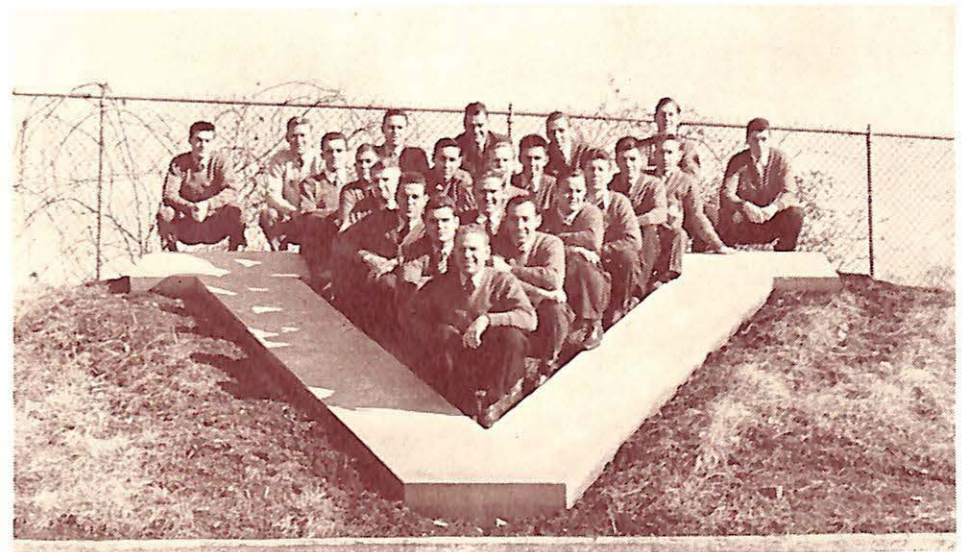

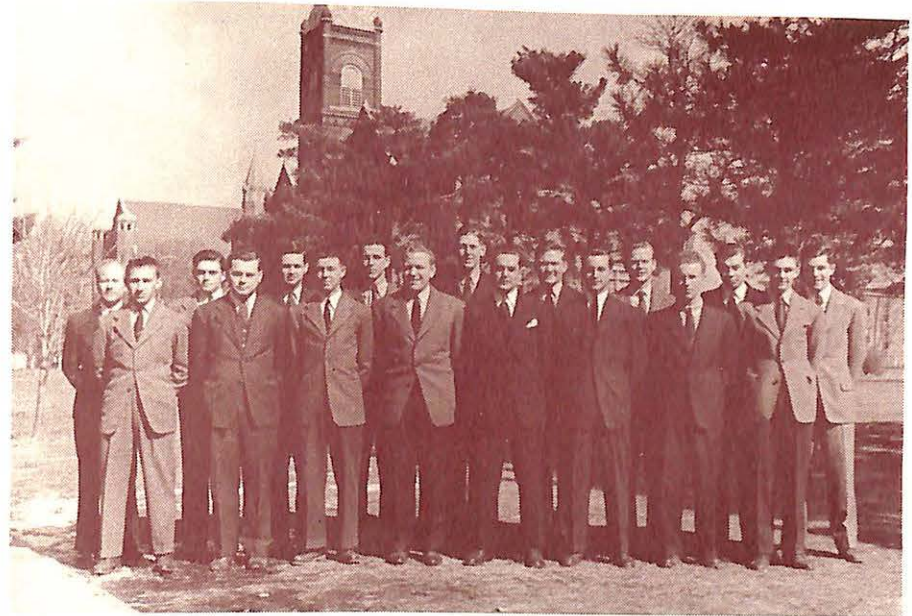

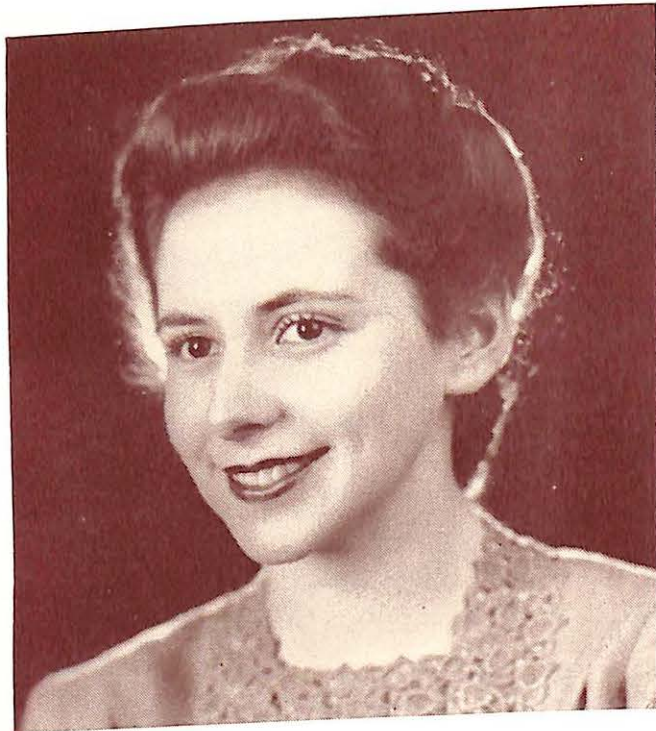
Friendship, fellowship, and fun characterize Alpha Delta Kappa, local fraternity of the campus.

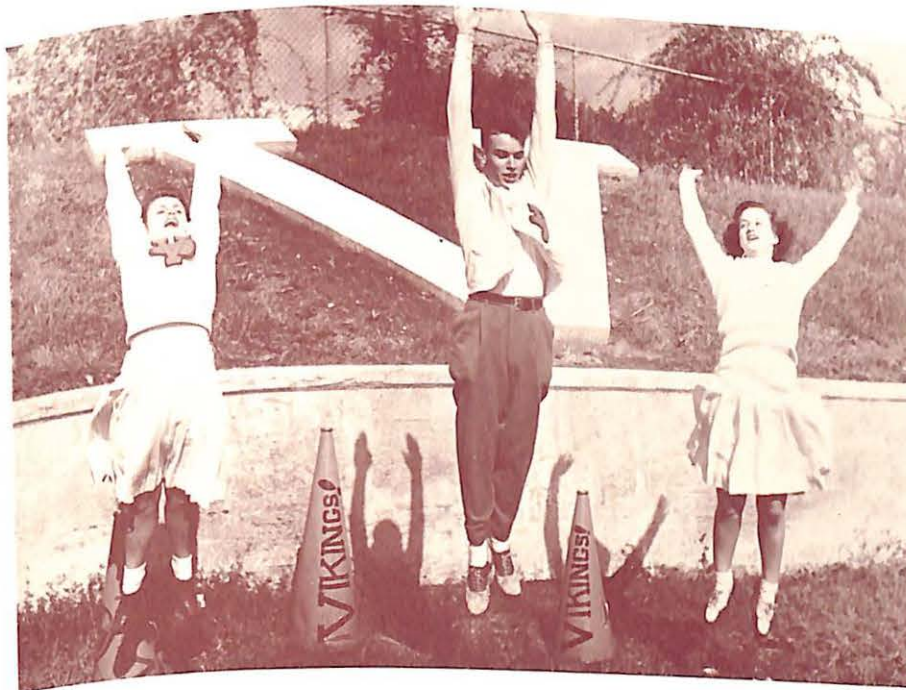
### —Valley Wins B. B. Championship and attends K. C. Tourney—

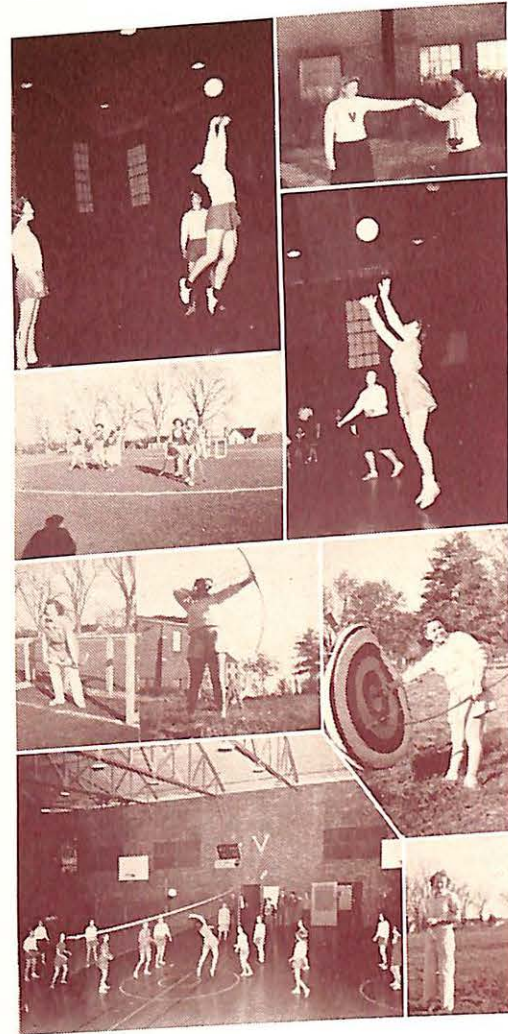
