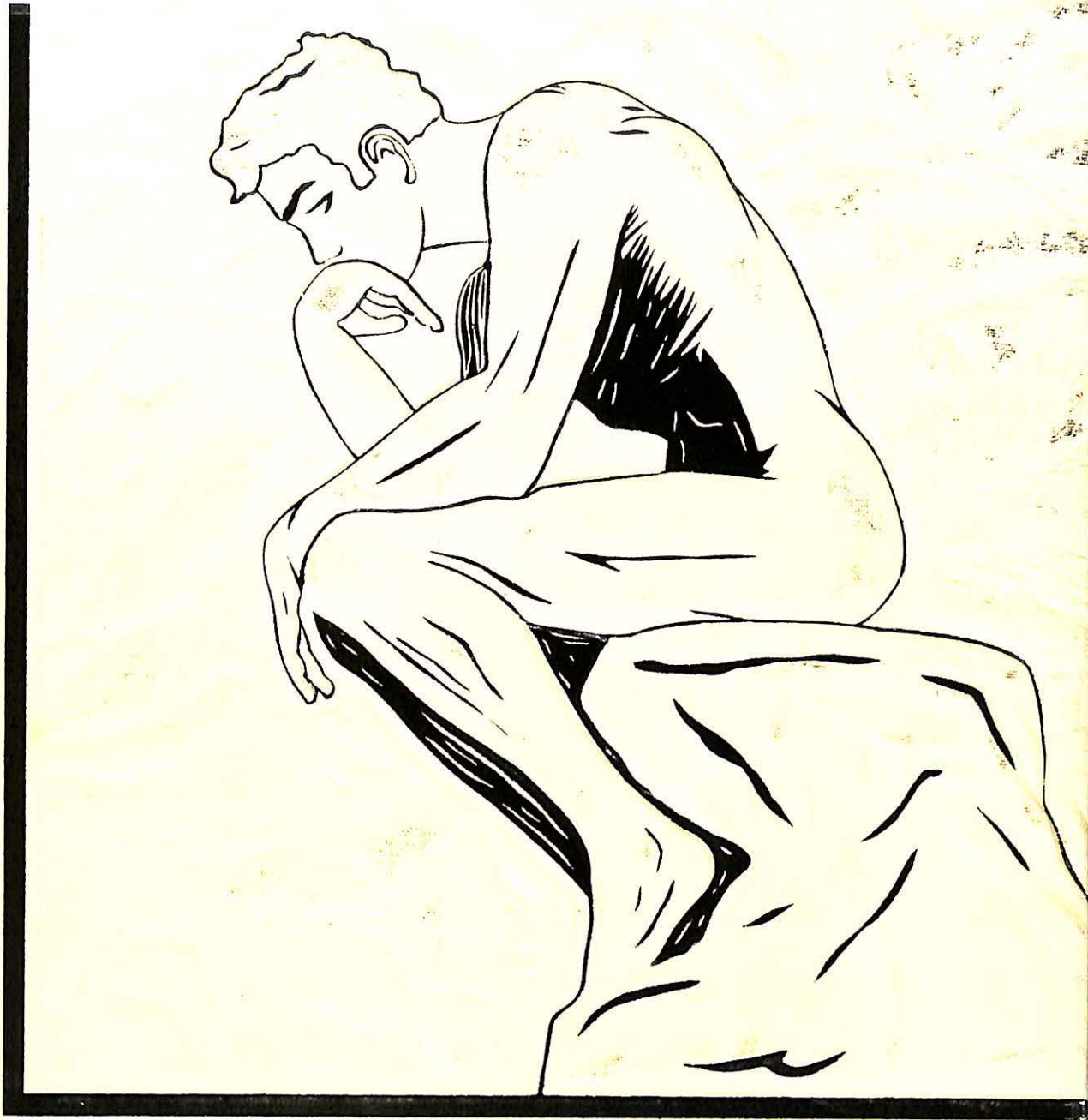

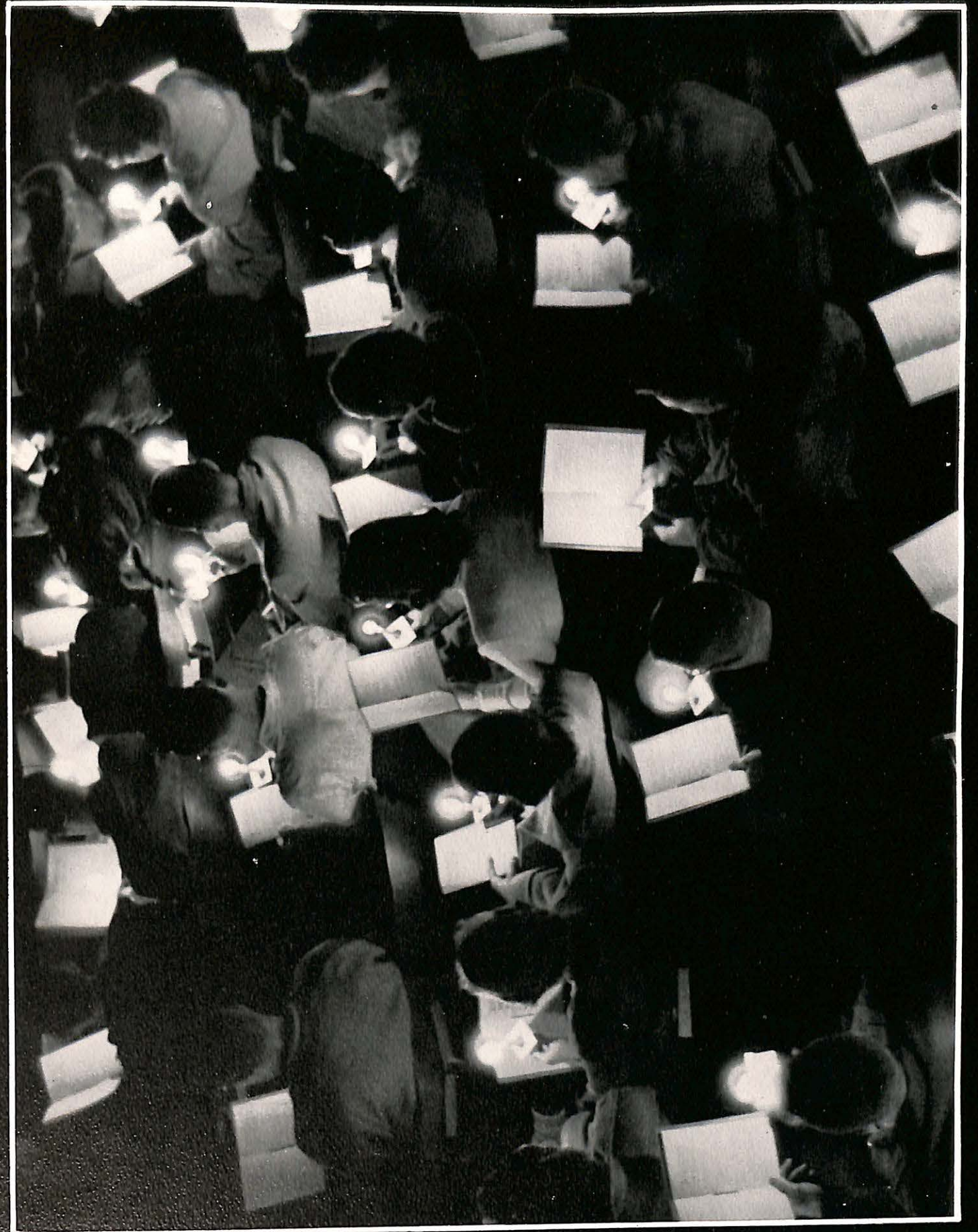

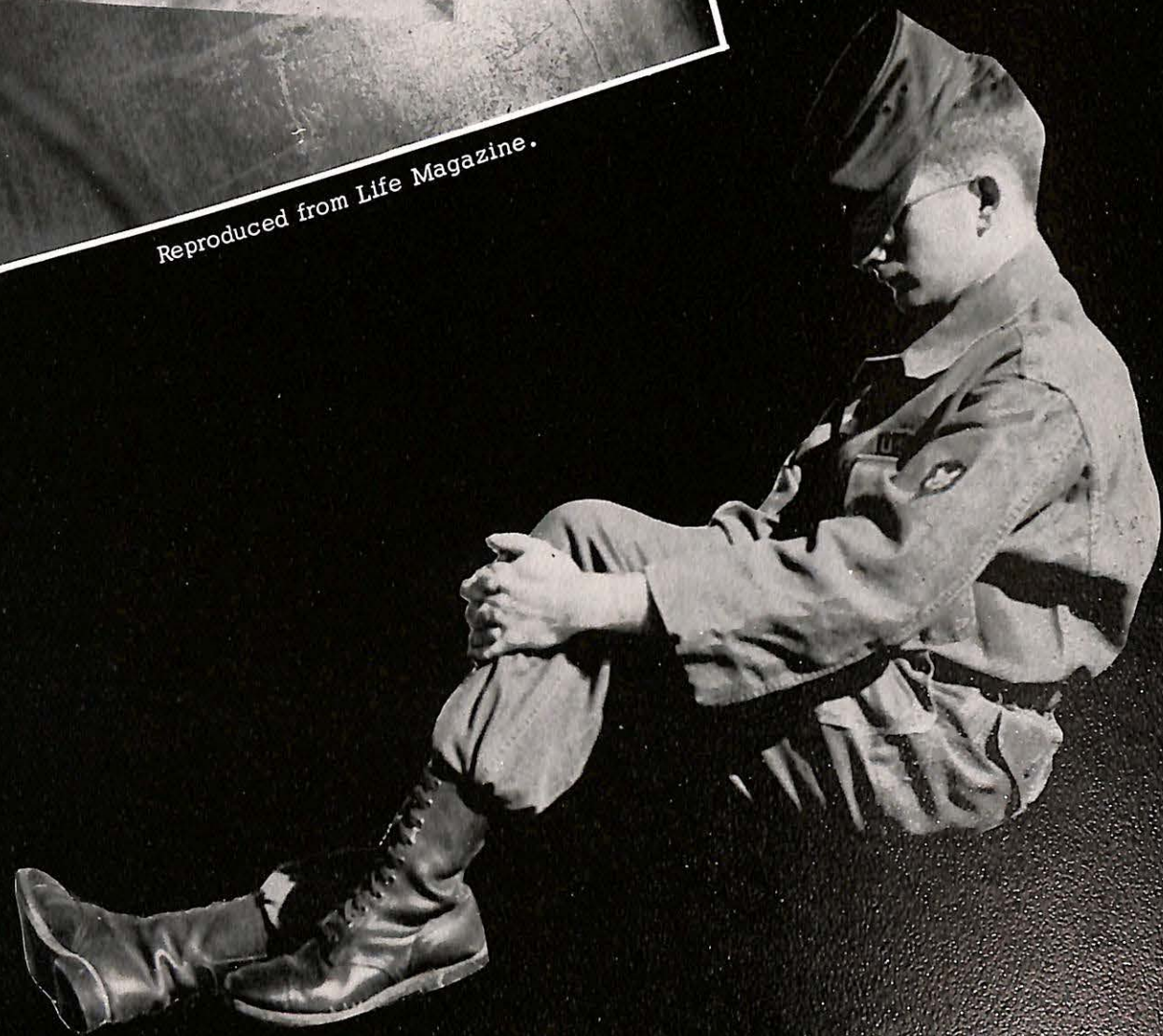


The Year

"Yes, how did you know?" replied the girl.

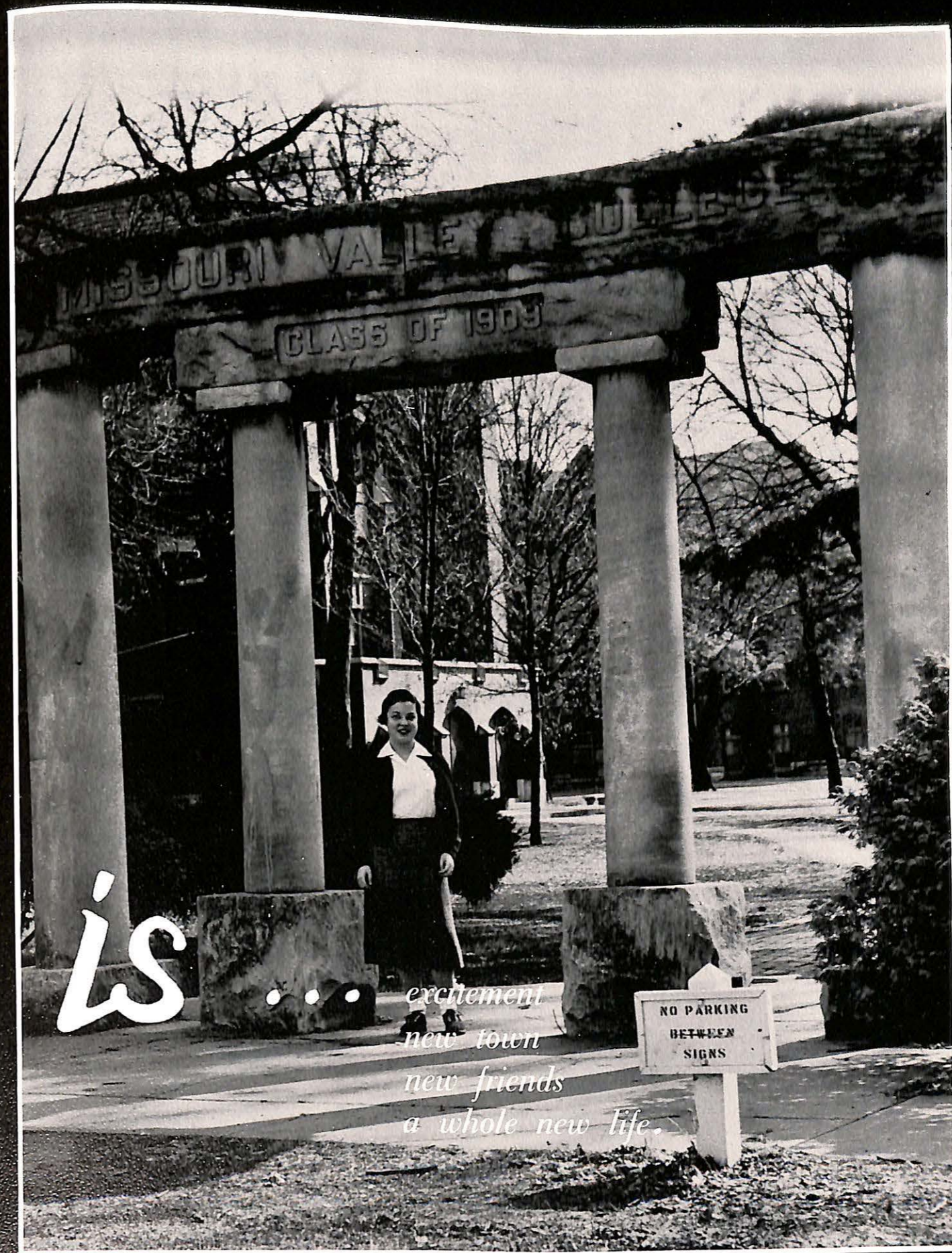

Beta Gamma Phi

Beta Gamma Phi, the scholastic honor society at Missouri Valley, was formed in 1933. Since that time Beta Gamma Phi has come to be recognized as the highest academic recognition given by the college.

The purposes of the society are to honor juniors and seniors who have shown outstanding scholastic ability, and to encourage scholarship in the lower classes.

Election to Beta Gamma Phi is done by the faculty on the basis of a student's grade average throughout college. Seniors with an average of 2.3 or better are eligible. Juniors, to be considered, must have a minimum of 71 hours of credit and have a grade average of 2.5 or better. Only three juniors are to be elected to the society each year.

The present members of Beta Gamma Phi who were elected in 1956 are Valerie Becker, president; Wayne Descombes; Judy Newman, and Donald Oster, all seniors; and Jan Jackson, Ann Riley, and Charles Riley, juniors.

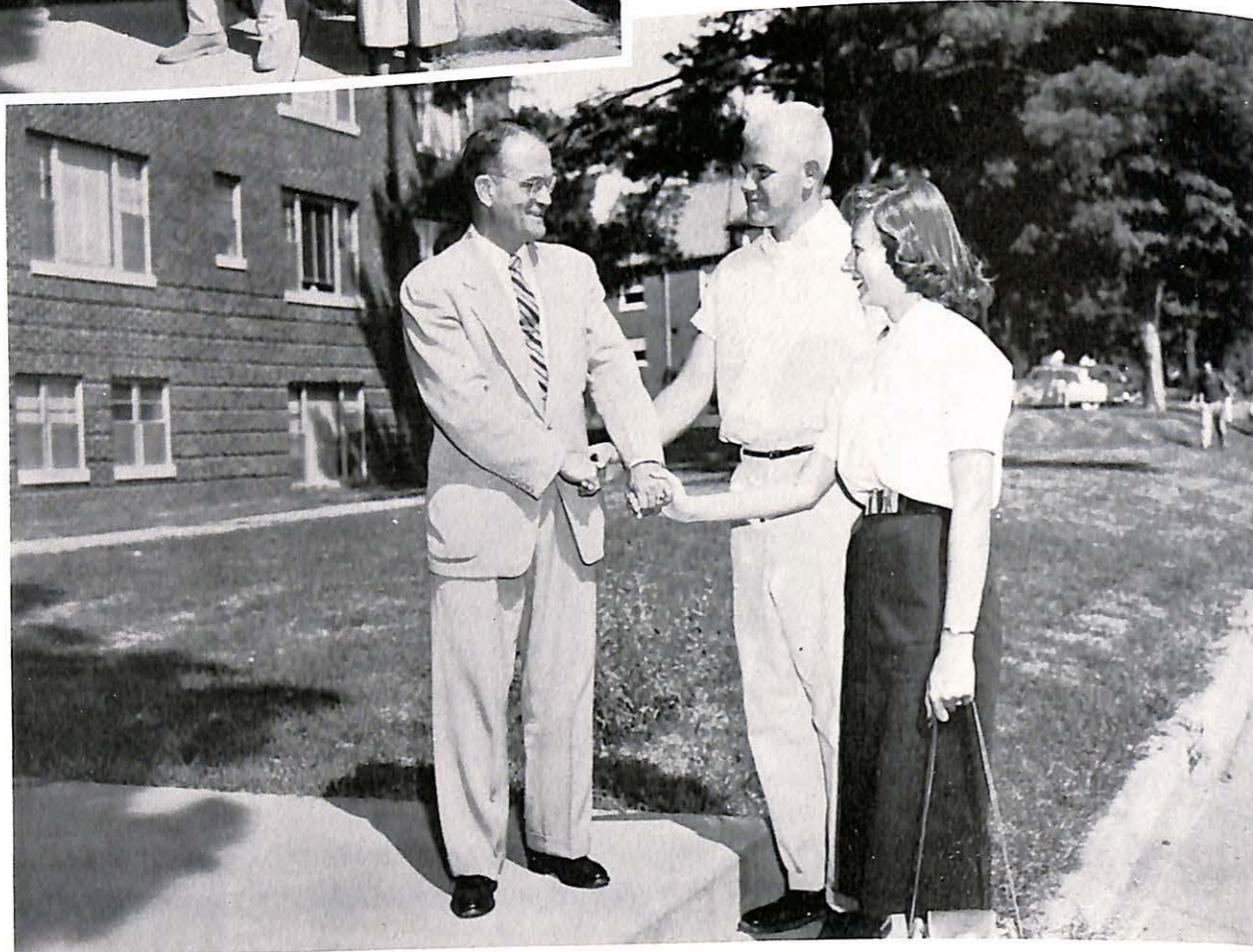
New Student Week Leaders

Season Summary

Once again the Missouri Valley College football team, under the excellent leadership of Coach Volney Ashford finished another highly successful season with a fine mark of 8 wins, 2 losses and 1 tie.

This year's campaign brought the record of Ashford-coached teams at Valley over a 17-year span to 128 wins, 29 losses, and 9 ties, plus nine undisputed MCAU Conference championships, three co-championships, and three runner-up spots, and also eight post-season bowl bids in the states of Florida, Texas, Indiana, and Missouri.

This year's Valley team ascended to the top rung of the nation's football ladder by becoming the first team in the country to win seven football games and gained much national publicity for this feat. However, an old nemesis, the Cardinals of William Jewell College, turned spoilers the following week and knocked the Vikes from the ranks of the unbeaten and untied by holding the Valley squad to a hard-fought 6-6 deadlock.

Apparently this was a sign of what was to come for in the next varsity outing the St. Benedict's College Ravens became the first team to fell the Vikes, performing the task November 10th at Atchison, Kansas, in the closing minutes of an exciting football struggle. The final score found the Ravens on top, 21-14.

As an indication of a team with a fine fighting spirit the Vikes rebounded to cause a big upset of their own, polishing off the highly touted College of Emporia 27-14, in a grid headliner at Kansas City's Municipal Stadium. Emporia came into this match with one of the leading offensive teams in the country but found the Viking defense a big stumbling block, whereas the Big Orange team unleashed a vicious offensive thrust of its own to attain the decision.

A long, but decidedly enjoyable trip to Tampa, Florida, brought down the curtain on the 1956 season. On the field of battle the Vikings took a 31 to 14 pasting from the strong University of Tampa Spartans for the worst defeat in three seasons of play but the Floridians knew they had been put through a stiff battle by the Valley men when the final whistle sounded. Valley only trailed by one point at halftime but fell victim to a wide open brand of ball during the second half that found the play pockmarked with excessive clipping and other rule violations, some of which were detected, and others overlooked.

Valley was one of the few major or small college teams in the nation to attempt an 11-game schedule and this year's slate was termed the roughest in the school's history which places even more stress on the final record.

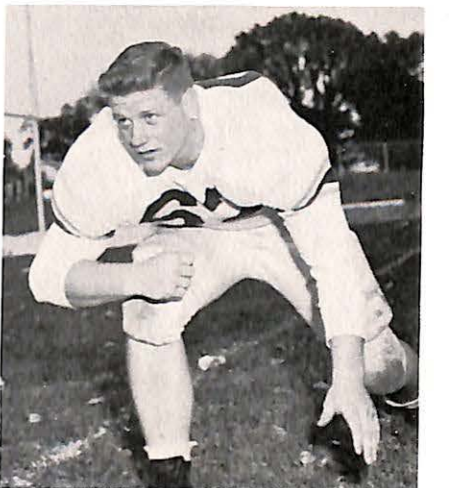

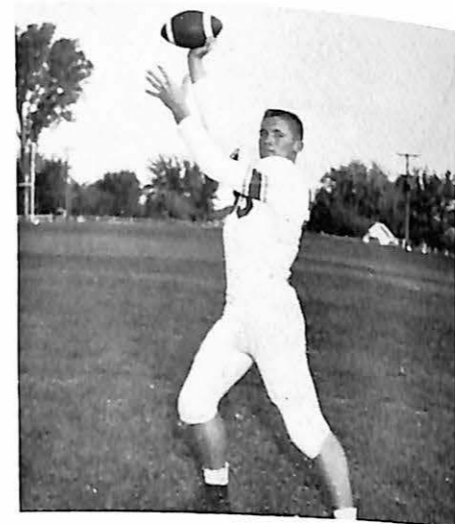
TEMPERATURE FAVORS VIKES

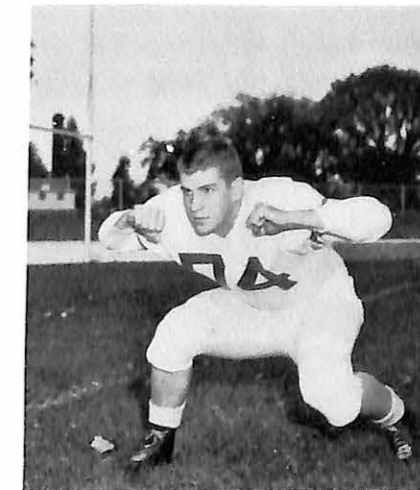
SPRINGFIELD IS STUBBORN

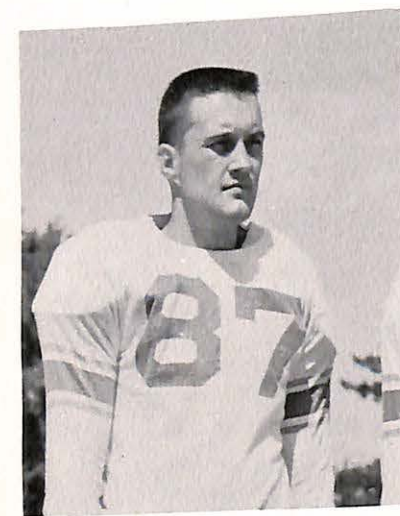

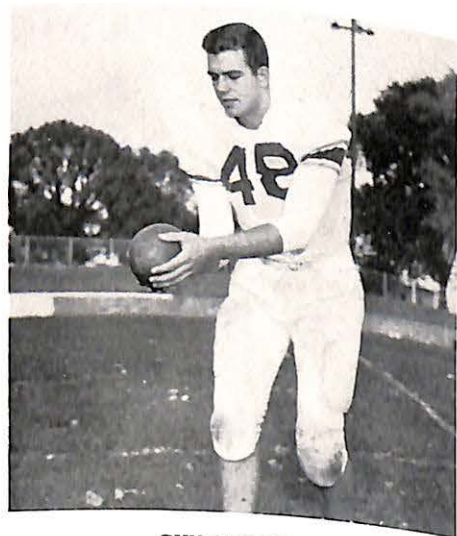
TAMPA BATTERS VALLEY

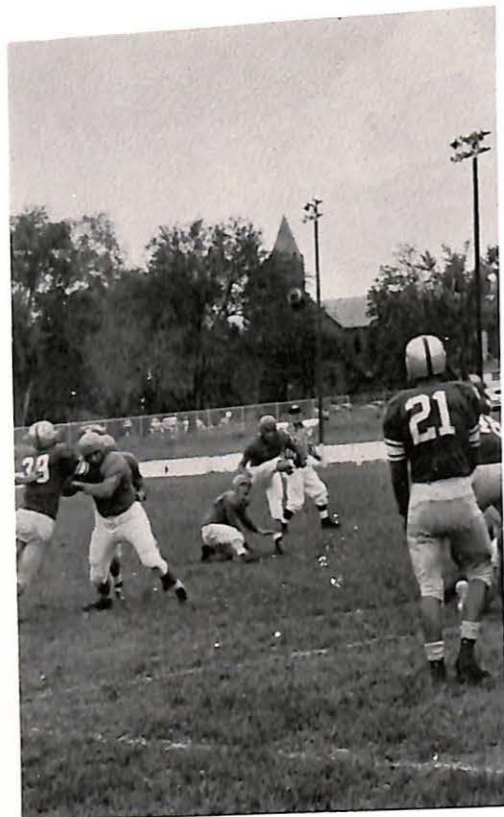

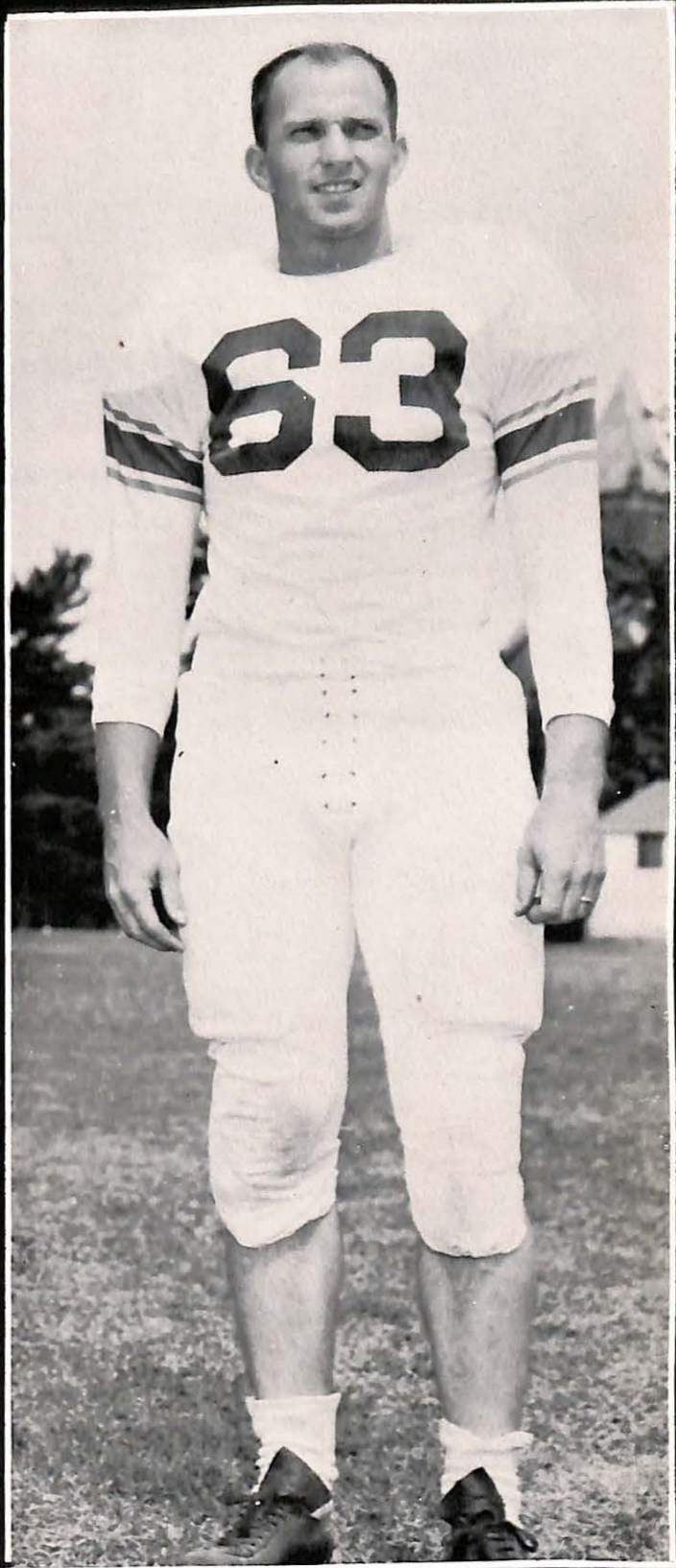

Gibler finished the season with a leading mark of 15.3 points per game and was regarded as one of the finest rebounders in the school's history. Clark was third in scoring and had the best free throw percentage mark.

Looking ahead to next season Valley will have a strong nucleus of experienced players, headed by 6-6 center, Nelson Hart, the team's leading point-maker; Guy Malone, 6-3 sophomore center and 2-year letterman; plus four promising freshmen who saw extensive action on the varsity -- Bob Mitchell, Dwayne Best, Bill Thilking, and Rich Davies. Others expected to compete for positions on the team next year are Jim Queen, George Phillips, Jim Gilmore, Bill Powers, and C. L. Henke.

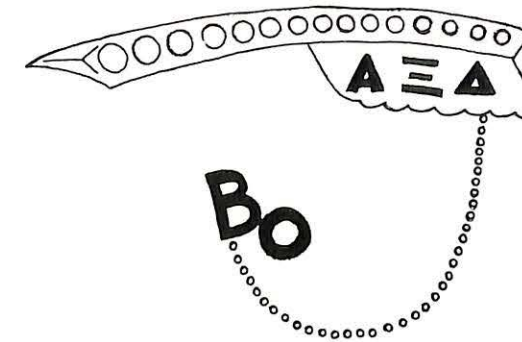

Founded in 1869 at the Virginia Military Institute, Sigma Nu was early known as "The Legion of Honor." The principles of the Knights of the Legion of Honor soon spread to other colleges and universities and eventually the Legion became known as Sigma Nu.

The purpose of Sigma Nu is to build character which is accomplished by placing an emphasis on scholarship and fellowship. Sigma Nu tries to prepare men for life after college by creating a high sense of honor and a love for fellowman. The fraternity is dedicated to the function of providing wholesome, helpful and stimulating fellowship for its members.

Beta Gamma Chapter of Sigma Nu was founded at Missouri Valley College in 1891. Soon after being founded, it was necessary for the chapter to go subrosa, but in 1931 the chapter again became active. Through the years, Beta Gamma Chapter has built a high reputation by preserving the principles of Sigma Nu.

Two of our members, Charles Riley and Dan Coleman, received high scholastic honors during the school year. Charles was elected to Beta Gamma Phi, a scholastic honor society which is recognized as the highest academic recognition open to juniors and seniors. Dan received the President's scholarship for having the highest scholastic average in his class.

Beta Gamma's Commander, Tom Bernero, also served as President of the Inter-Fraternity Council and Charles Riley headed Valley's Music Society.

In athletics Sigma Nu was also well represented. Ross Hampe and Jim Heinzler held down starting berths on the Valley football team; Nelson Hart was first string center on the cage squad; Smith Sweeney lettered as a hurdler in the track and field sport; and Jim Allen and Charles Reid, veteran members of Valley's varsity golf team.

Last fall Dan Coleman performed one of the lead roles in the Valley Players Production of "Our Town."

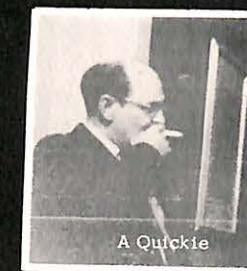

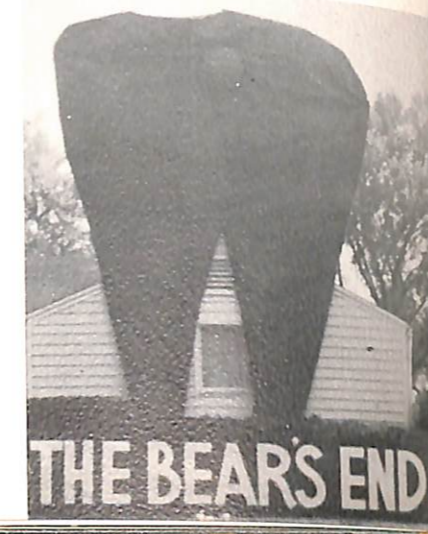
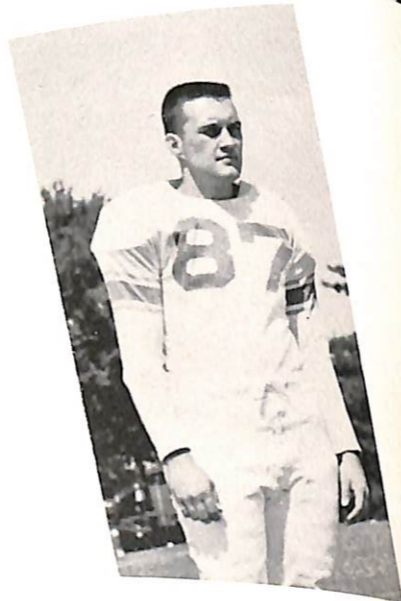

Young Hall has been the home of the Independent Men since 1929, and since then new goals and achievements have been reached with each passing year.

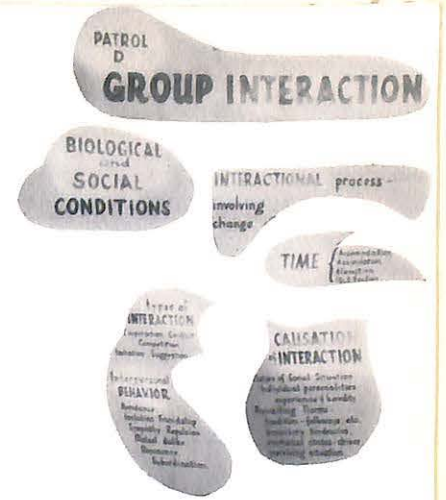
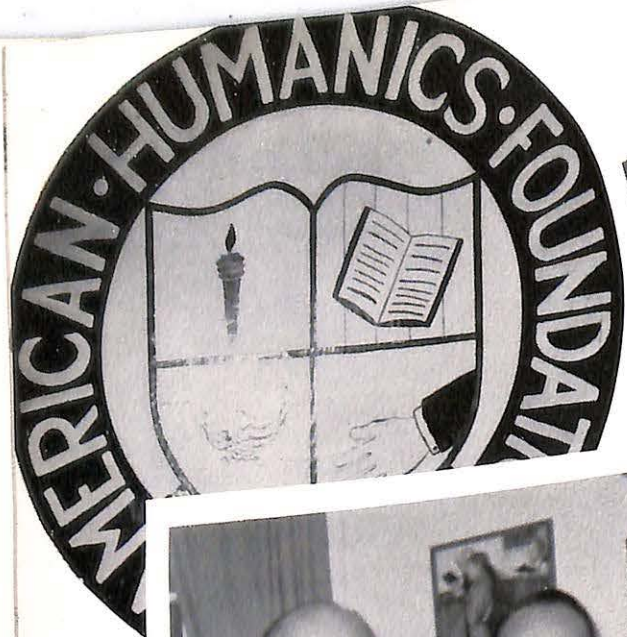

Walking across campus, after the meeting, she decided she would like to be a part of "Valley Players."





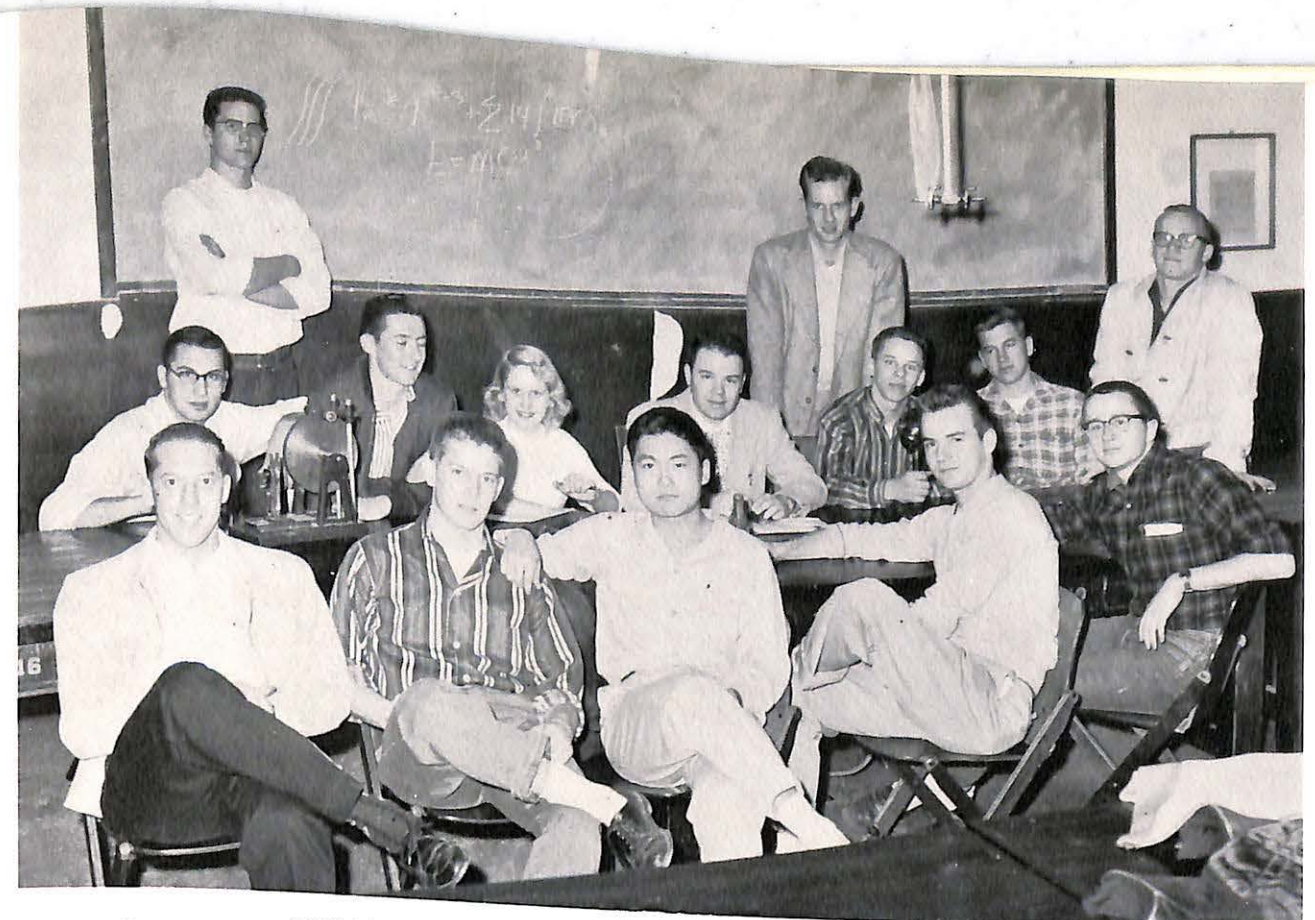
