This has been the first year of our second century of service at Missouri Valley College. During its first 100 years, the college weathered many storms, endured many challenges, developed a great tradition of service and provided educational opportunities for

thousands of students.

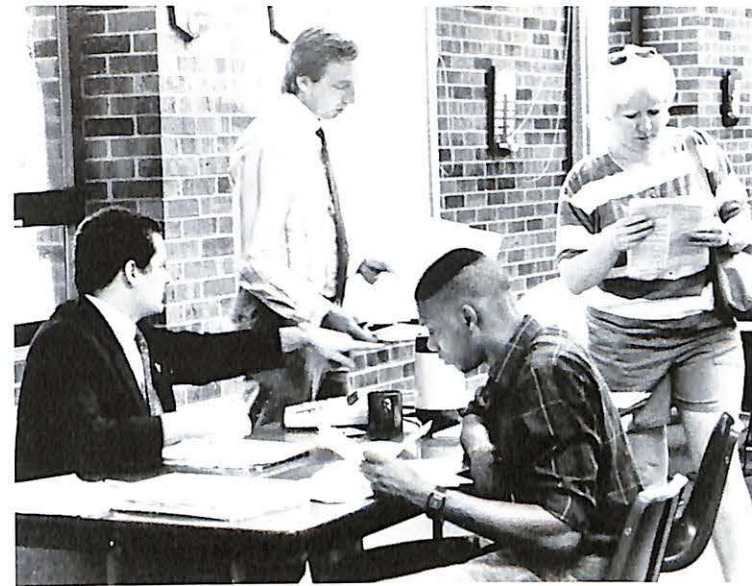

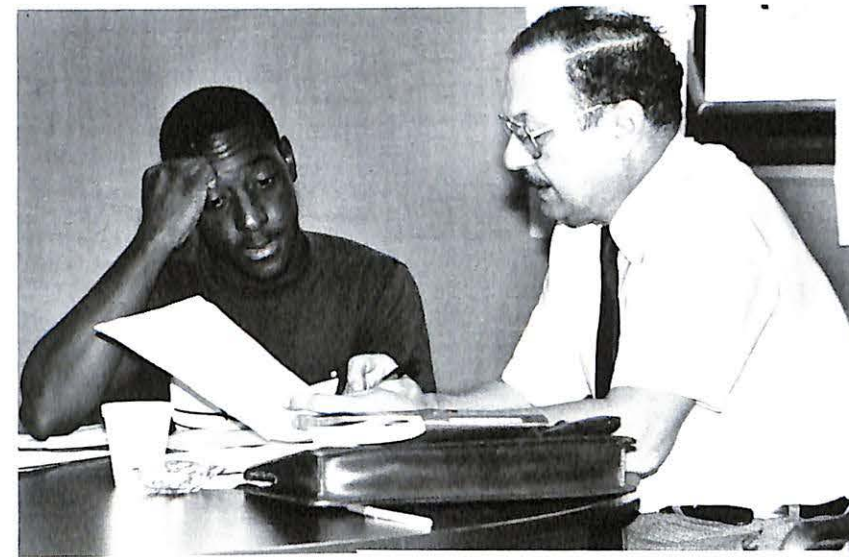

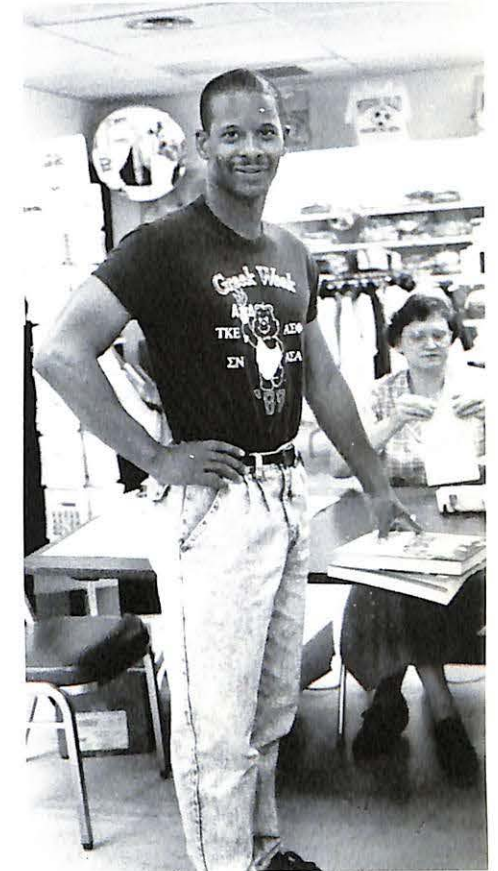

Dedication: John McCallum

After 28 years on the Missouri Valley Faculty, John McCallum, associate professor of English and long-time dean of the Department of Arts and Humanities, stepped down. This 1989-90 yearbook is dedicated to the years of teaching and administrative service he gave to Missouri Valley College.

Born in Paisley, Scotland, McCallum grew up in New York and joined the Army in 1943, seeing action in France, Belgium and Germany.

After his discharge he began his English education at the College of Emporia. He acquired further education at Kansas State University, New York University, Oklahoma State University and the University of Missouri.

Before joining the Missouri Valley Faculty, McCallum taught at Parsons Junior College, and was editor of *Petroleum Equipment Magazine* in Houston, Texas.

Besides teaching English, mass communication and film classes at Valley, McCallum has served as Director of Murrell Library, and as program and production supervisor of the campus television studio. He was advisor

to Blue Key, a national honor fraternity, and Sigma Tau Delta, English honorary.

In the spring of 1989, McCallum was named an honorary alumnus of Missouri Valley College.

Baity Hall inducted into

It's no secret to MVC students -- present and former alike -- that Baity Hall is a landmark, but now it's official.

On Oct. 1 the college celebrated the building's induction into the National Register of Historic Places. It also commemorated the 100th anniversary of the day students moved into Baity Hall, known as "the college building" in 1889.

Speaking at the afternoon ceremony were President Reeves, John McCallum, Virgil Rabe and

representatives of the city of Marshall and the MVC alumni association. The A Cappella Choir also performed two numbers. At the end of the ceremony, Dr.

Reeves unveiled a bronze plaque honoring the event.

When Baity first opened, it contained classrooms, offices, laboratories, chapel, museum and separate gymnasiums for both men and women.

It was known as Old Main until 1948 when it was renamed in honor of Rev. George Baity, the college's first classical graduate in 1891 and the president of the Board of Trustees from 1918 to 1947. A plaque inside the building acknowledges Baity's "loyalty, devotion and service to his alma mater."

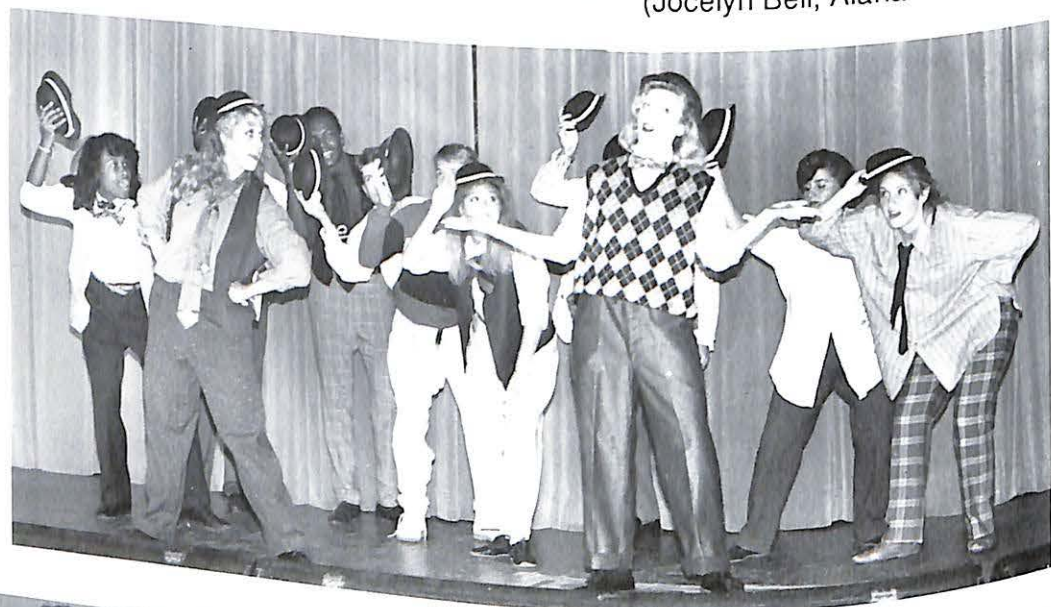

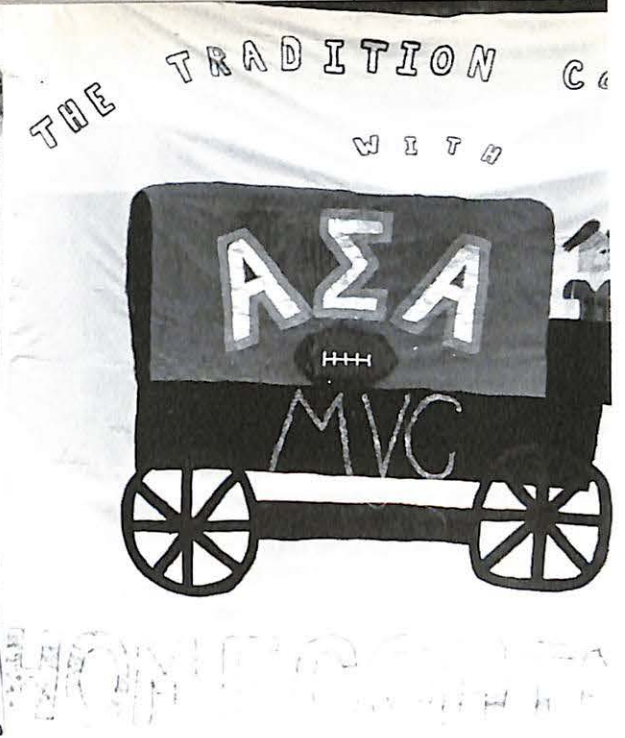

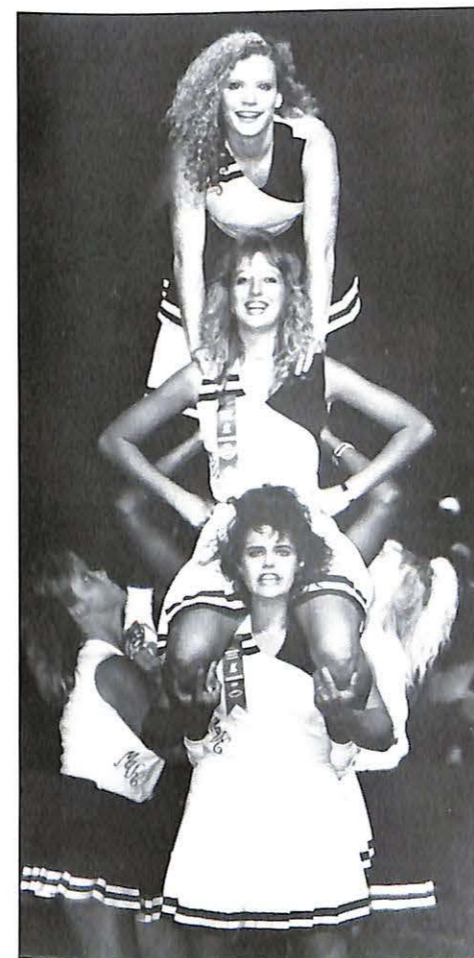

Vikings rule HAAC; enter playoffs

For the first time since 1978 the Missouri Valley Viking football team, led by HAAC Coach of the Year Ken Gibler, won the conference title and advanced to the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Division II post-season playoffs.

Valley posted a 9-1 regular season record and was ranked #3 nationally in the NAIA Div. II final poll. According to Gibler, that was the highest ranking any of his Viking teams have attained since 1975, when, at one point in the season, MVC was ranked #1.

"We have never been this complete on both sides of the ball," Gibler said.

With a team that featured

talented skill players and experienced linemen on both sides of the ball, MVC unleashed a team that could score from anywhere on the field.

Providing the leadership were: junior quarterback Brad Drehle, NAIA All-America runningback Brian Clayton, junior fullback Claude Tolbert, and senior split-end Mike Polk. They accounted for 5,263 total yards and 502 points, both school records.

Never before had Gibler opened up the offense as he did in '89. MVC led the nation in scoring with an average of 50-plus points per game. The Vikings were second nationally in total offense with 526.3 yards per game.

Drehle set MVC season records for most completions (121 of 218), most passing yards (2,148) and most touchdowns (20). Most of those completions went to Polk, who set the standards in receptions (50) and yards (1,196). His 92-yard kick return for a touchdown was also a school record.

Kicker Todd Moore, a junior, hit 44 of 54 PAT's and three field goals, the longest being 39 yards.

All of the hard work that went into the season garnered the Vikings one of 16 NAIA playoff spots (pages 22-25) and many individual honors (page 18).

In the beginning, 1989 didn't look like it would be a record-

setting year for Valley. In the first game MVC fell to Peru State 38-30. Valley showed promise, however. After being down 28-6 at the half the Vikings surged in the final two quarters.

In the second week, against 15th-ranked Benedictine, MVC broke open a 10-7 game with 35 unanswered points for a 45-7 pasting. The next week the Vikings entered the NAIA Top 25.

Hastings was then in the wrong place at the right time and suffered a 49-0 loss as 2-1 MVC tuned up for the HAAC season.

Two weeks later Valley spotted Tarkio a touchdown before rolling to a 54-7 win. Mid-America was helpless in a 65-9 loss, as was Culver-Stockton in the next week's Homecoming contest.

Against the Wildcats MVC gained a school record 788 yards and a record number of points in a 77-13 walkover.

Clayton took a Drehle pass for 91 yards and a TD on the first play against William Jewell. A few hours later MVC came home with a 49-3 win and another record -- the Valley defense had held the Cardinals to -41 yards.

Valley, now #5, took on #3 Baker the next week. Baker had a potent offense of its own, averaging 41 points per game.

No problem, Valley scored on its first four possessions en route to a 48-21 win.

The Vikings came out flat against Graceland the next week, but after a scoreless first quarter cruised to a 38-0 shutout.

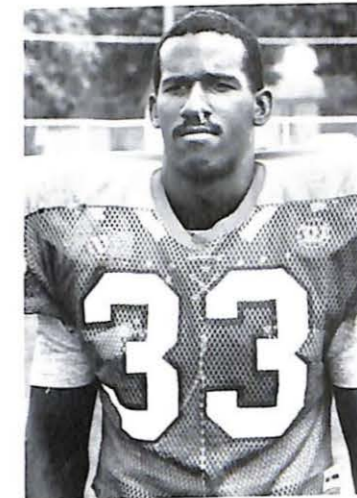
The final regular-season contest was at Springfield against Evangel. There was no letdown as Valley won 47-10 and finished its undefeated HAAC season.

Playing their final HAAC game as Vikings were seniors Clayton, Polk, John Walters, Fred Lepper, Tim Newman and Sam Richardson on offense. And on defense Perry Morrow, Mike Knehans, Mike Phillips, Farrell Shelton, Gary Taylor, and Larry Taylor finished out their football careers in fine fashion at Valley.

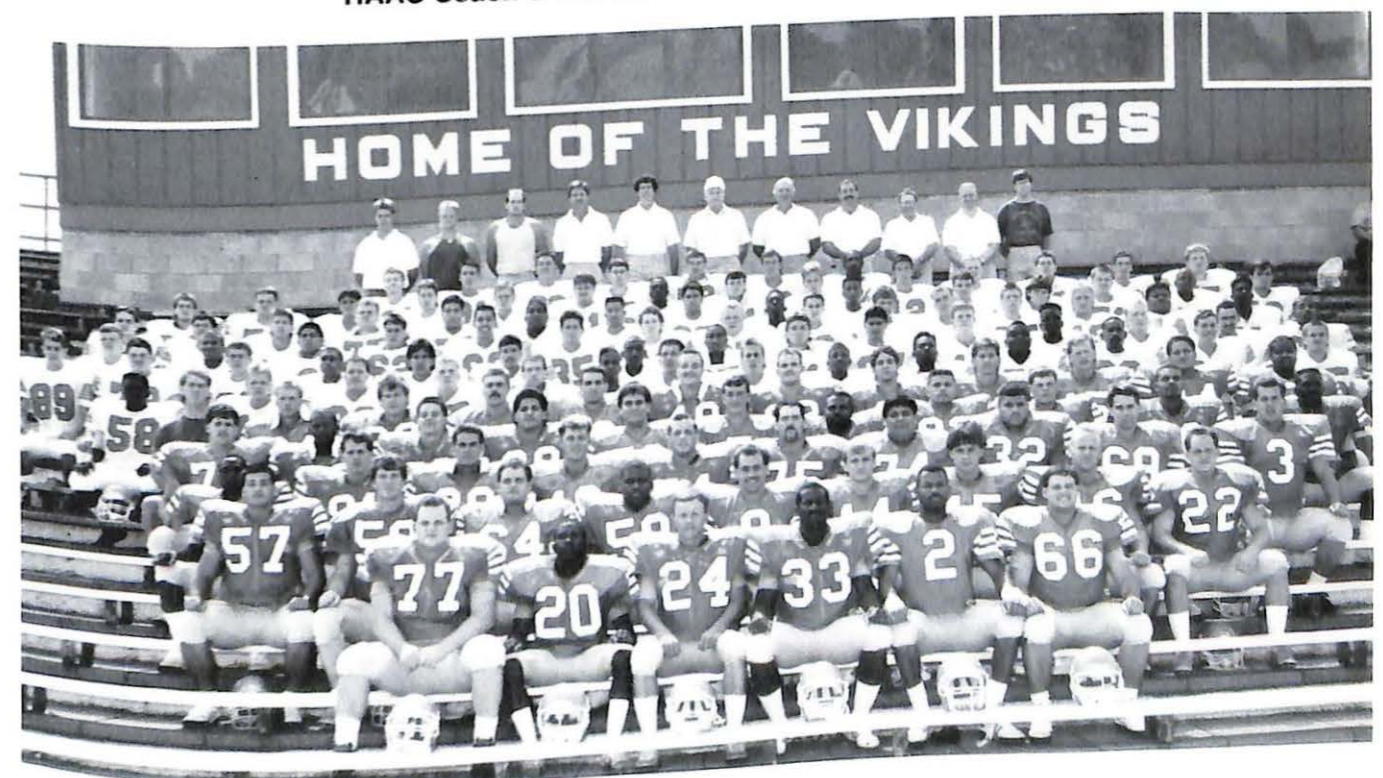

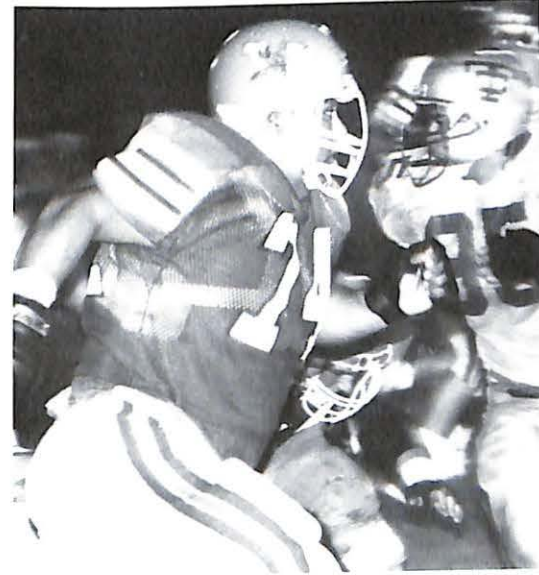
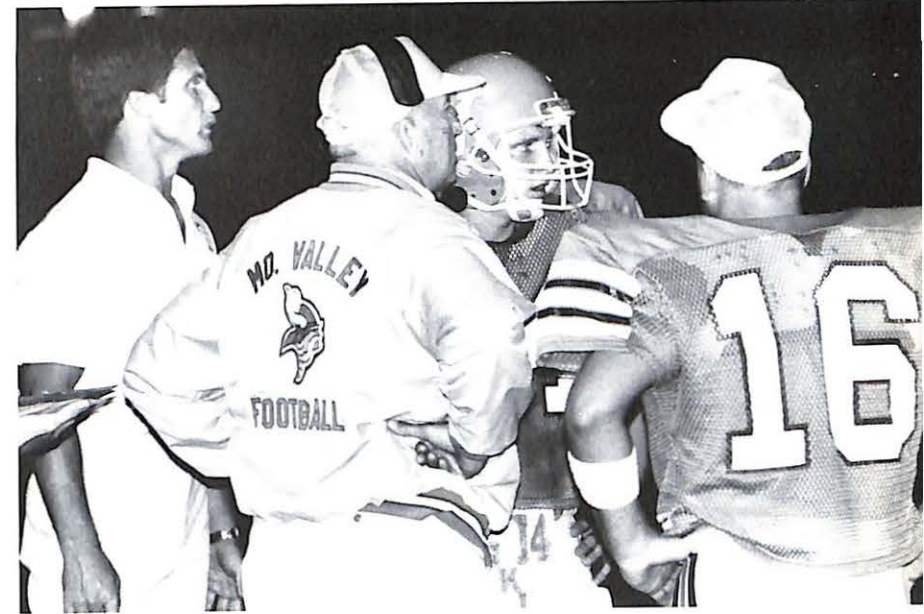
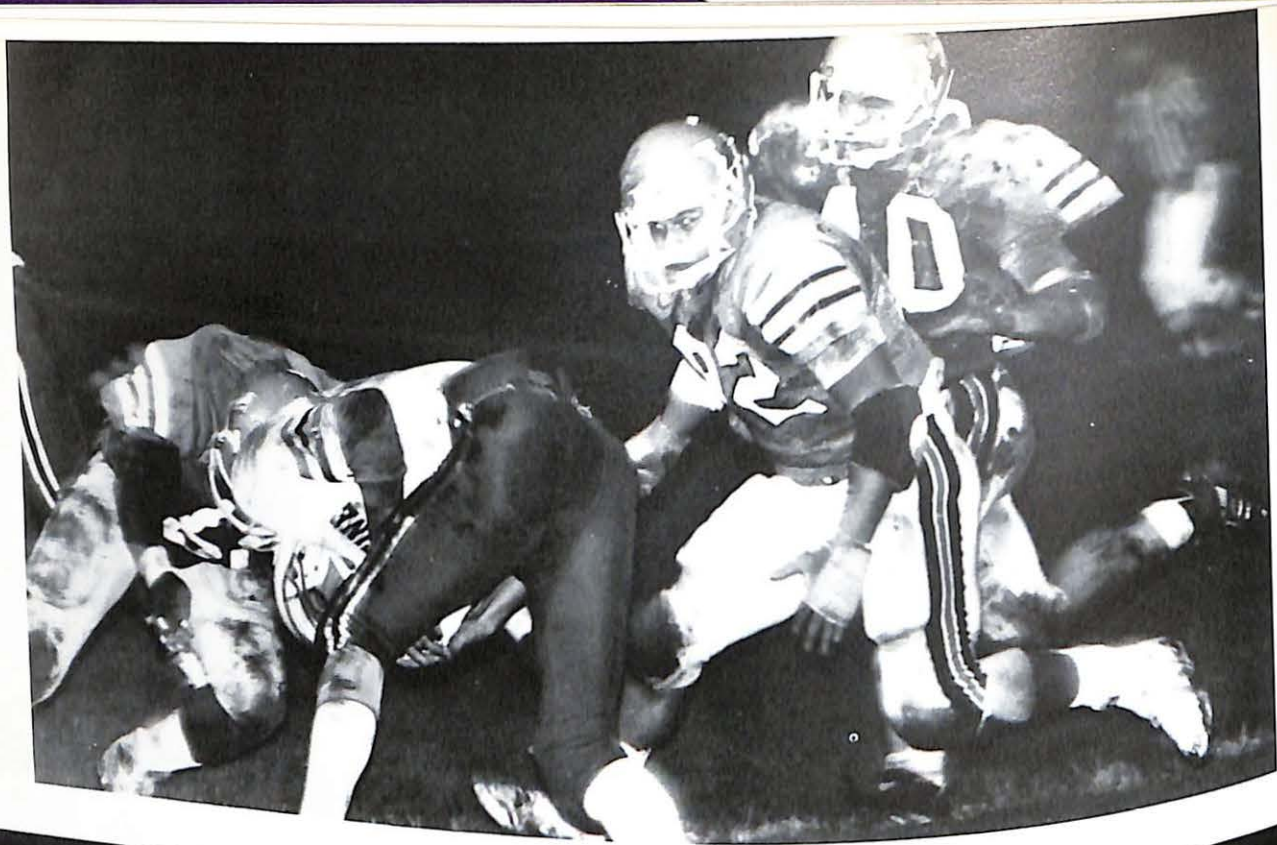

Vikes easily handle Hanover

Valley took Hanover's run-and-shoot offense in stride Nov. 18, winning the first round of the NAIA Division II playoffs 48-27 and setting up a rematch with HAAC rival Baker.

MVC again relied on its ground game as Brian Clayton scored four times, Claude Tolbert twice and Scott Fuimaono once against the Panthers of Hanover, Ind.

Clayton scored on runs of 1, 1 and 64, then pulled in a pitch off a Brad Drehle audible that went 40 yards for a Valley score in the fourth quarter. For the game the senior runningback had 224 yards and was named offensive player of the game by attending media. He added another 100 yards on pass receptions.

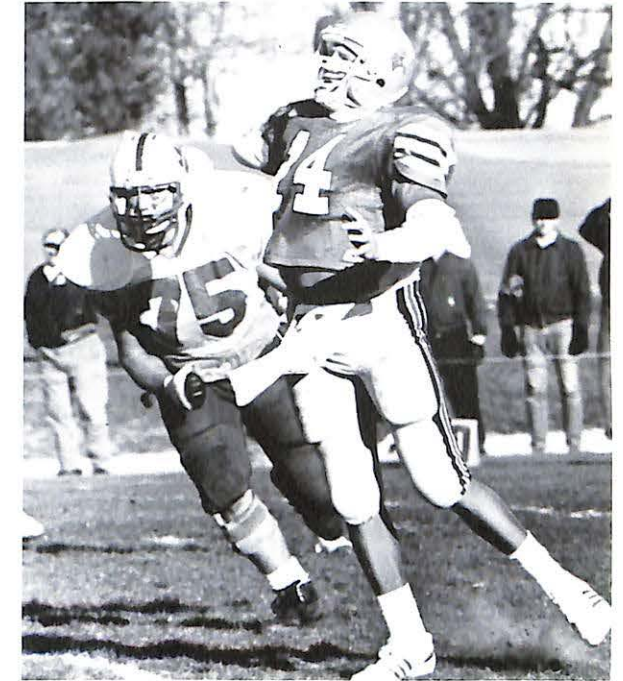
Viking junior noseguard Todd Vaughn was voted the defensive player of the game. Hanover, 9-1-1 and cham-

pions of the Indiana Collegiate Athletic Conference scored first on a 30-yard pass play, but Valley scored on three short

runs, the third by fullback Tolbert, and led 21-14 at intermission.

Both teams scored twice in the third frame, but by the fourth quarter Valley's bigger and stronger line had worn the Panthers down.

Defensively, MVC was led by linemen Vaughn, Joy Maberry, Jason Lea and Gary and Larry Taylor. The backfield of Perry Morrow, Paul Day, Mike Knehans, Tuli Fuimaono, Farrell Shelton and Mike Phillips also had their hands full stopping Hanover QB Gary Gabbard and receiver Brian Glesing.

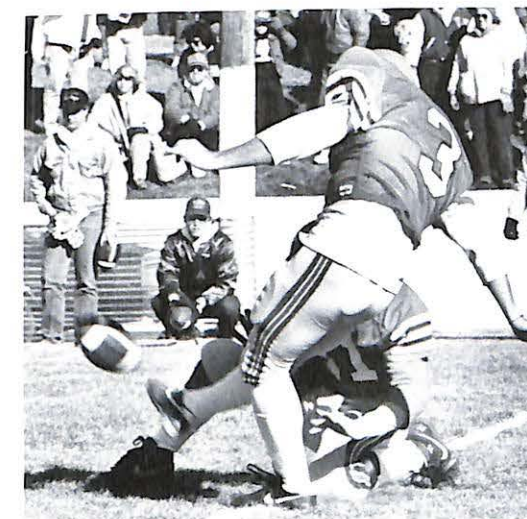
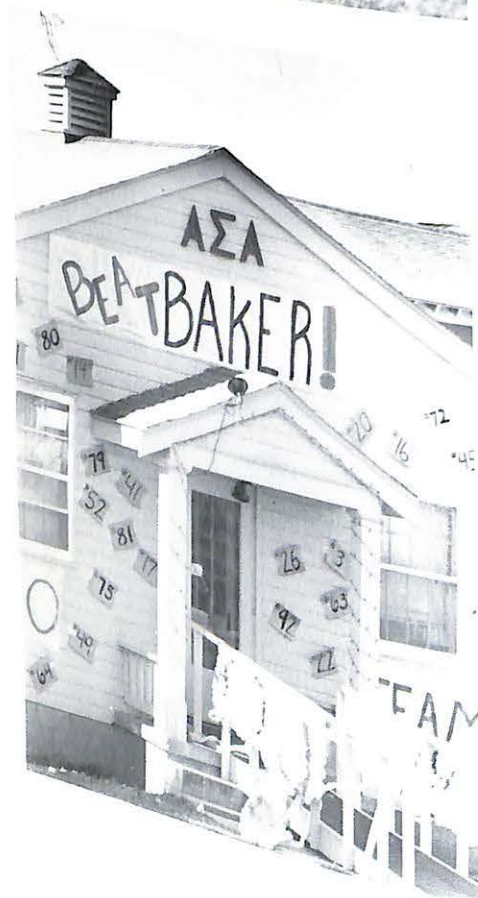
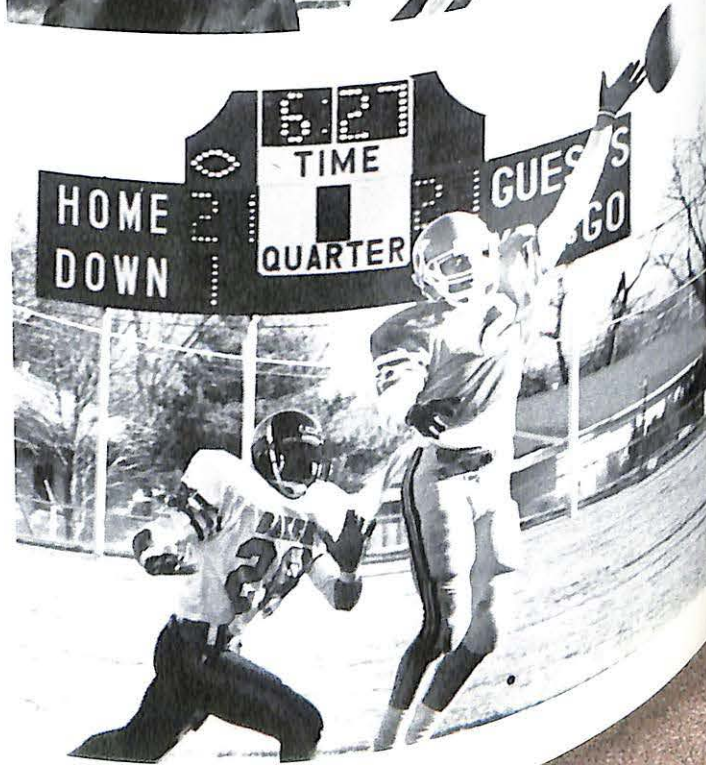
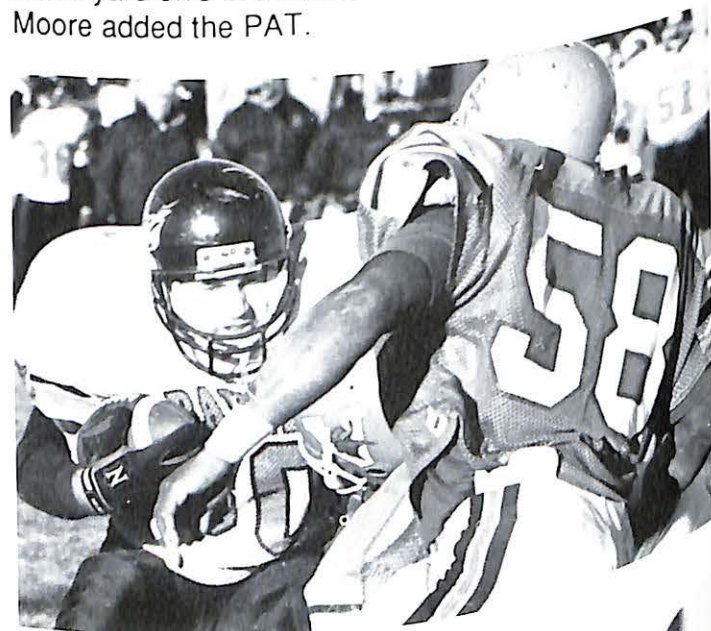
Postseason ends with HAAC rematch

The weather turned out to be Baker's strongest ally against Missouri Valley Dec. 2 as the Wildcats topped the Vikings 35-28 in the NAIA Division II quarterfinals.

Valley's season came to a 10-2 close on the cold and windy day that saw Baker score all five touchdowns in the two quarters it had the wind at its back.

After spotting the Wildcats to a 21-7 first quarter lead, the Vikings forced Baker to come from behind in the final stanza.

Keith Henderson got Valley on the scoreboard with a 20-yard first quarter TD, the only score against the wind all game, and Brian Clayton brought Valley to within a touchdown by scoring on a one-yard dive in the second. Both times Todd Moore added the PAT.



Claude Tolbert and Brad Drehle then gave the Vikings their first lead of the afternoon by scoring on two and one-yard dives respectively.

Valley's charmed season ran out in the fourth quarter, however, as Baker rang up two field goals, a touchdown and a two-point conversion to lock up the win.

For the game, Clayton ran for 119 yards and Tolbert 94. Valley's Perry Morrow was named defensive player of the game for his efforts.

the Heart of America Athletic Conference Tournament, and three players with league honorable mention.

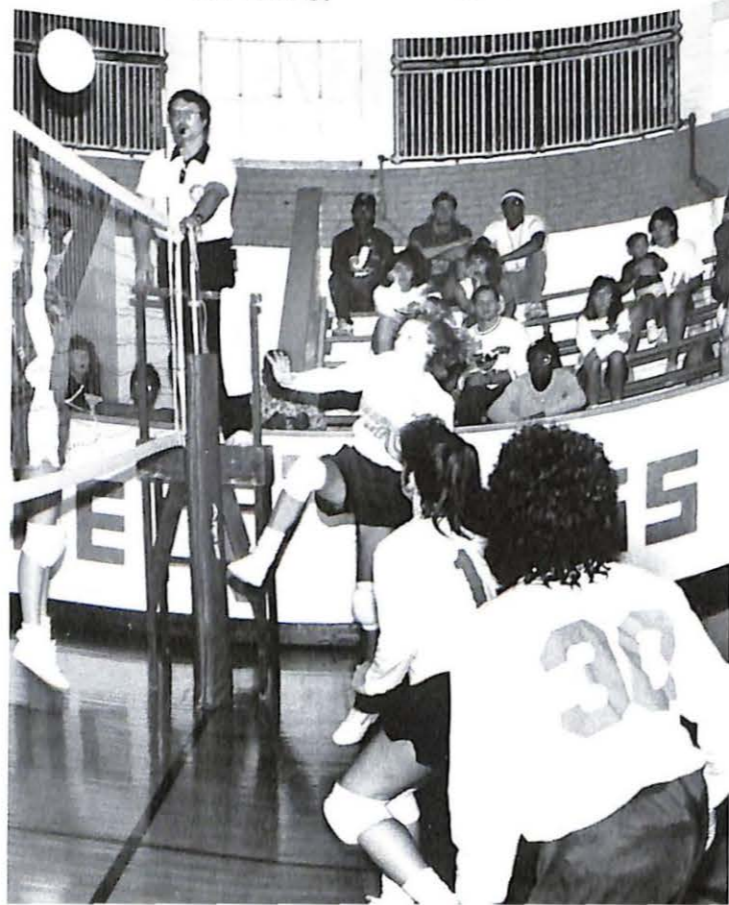
MVC went into the league tournament seeded third, another new standard. In first

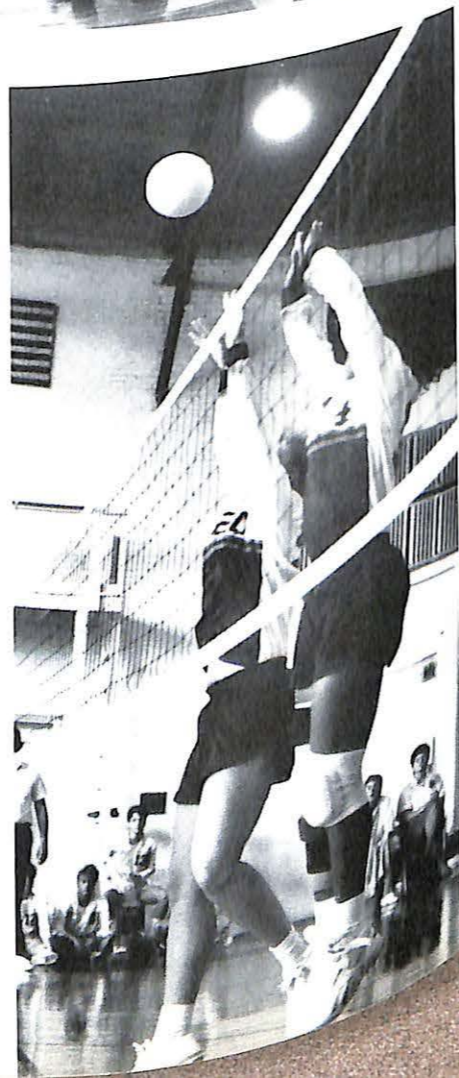
In voting for team awards, Palmer and Hazelwood were named co-most valuable players, Palmer was named most inspirational, and Chantilly Little most improved.

It took most of the season, but Valley put together a full team for the NAIA District 16 meet, finishing fifth with 104 points and qualifying one for the national meet.

Warren Lambert finished the Indian Foothills course in 27:47, second to Jewell's Tony Mayfield. At the national meet held in Wisconsin, Lambert ran a cold and frozen 8K course in a season best 28:08, but finished 239th out of 251 runners. The winning time was 24:01.

Joining him on the 1989 Valley squad competing in district competition were Claude Rhone, Richard Tyrell, Steve Estill and Ronnell Deans. Mike Negussu also contributed to MVC's effort over the season.

Success continues for MVC women

Even with the addition of eight new starters, three of them freshmen, Missouri Valley's women's soccer team continued its winning ways and earned its fourth straight post-season tournament berth.

Second-year coach John Guffey finished his tenure at MVC by leading the squad to an improved 9-6-2 season mark.

The improvement came despite the team's youth and a schedule that saw the kickers playing a rugged district schedule as well as a tournament at Tulsa against Arkansas-Little Rock and Southern Methodist University.

The women earned a mid-season split, falling to SMU, an NCAA Division I Top-20 team, before returning to the field the next day to best Arkansas-LR 1-0 in overtime on a Julie Miles goal.

MVC lost 5-0 to SMU, but the goals came on set plays and Guffey said, "It showed us we could play

fast, play hard and play smart against a good team. We felt good about that."

Post-season play is always foremost on an athlete's mind, and this season MVC earned the third seed in District 16. After a first round win over Park, the women fell 1-0 to Lindenwood. The game went through two overtimes and was finally decided by a sudden death penalty kick shootout.

Junior transfer Julie Miles, freshman Lisa Stockert and junior Terri Lansing accounted for the balance of MVC's scoring over the season.

Individually, Miles and Stockert earned NAIA All-America honorable mention and first team all-District 16. Lansing landed on the first team and Tina Duenow and Kathy Einerson on the second. Cheryl Kamp earned honorable mention.

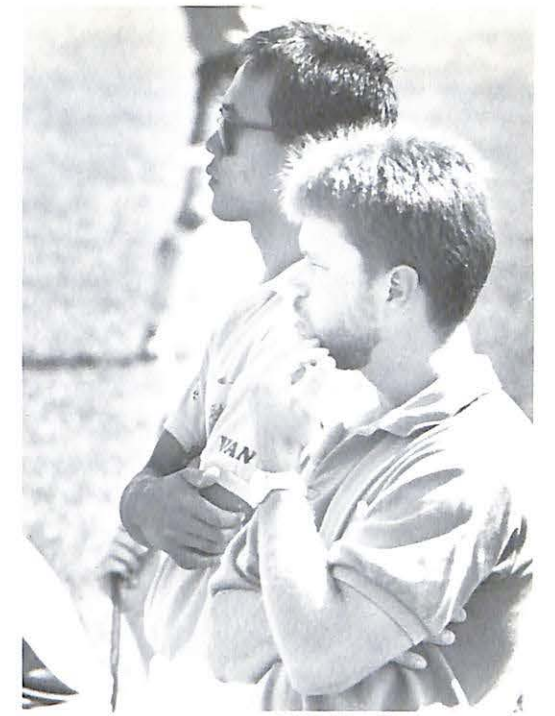

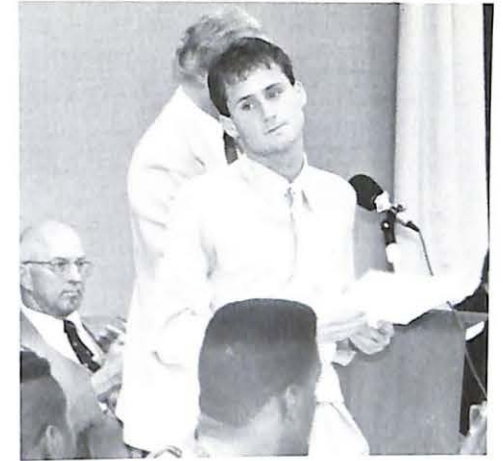
New choir forms

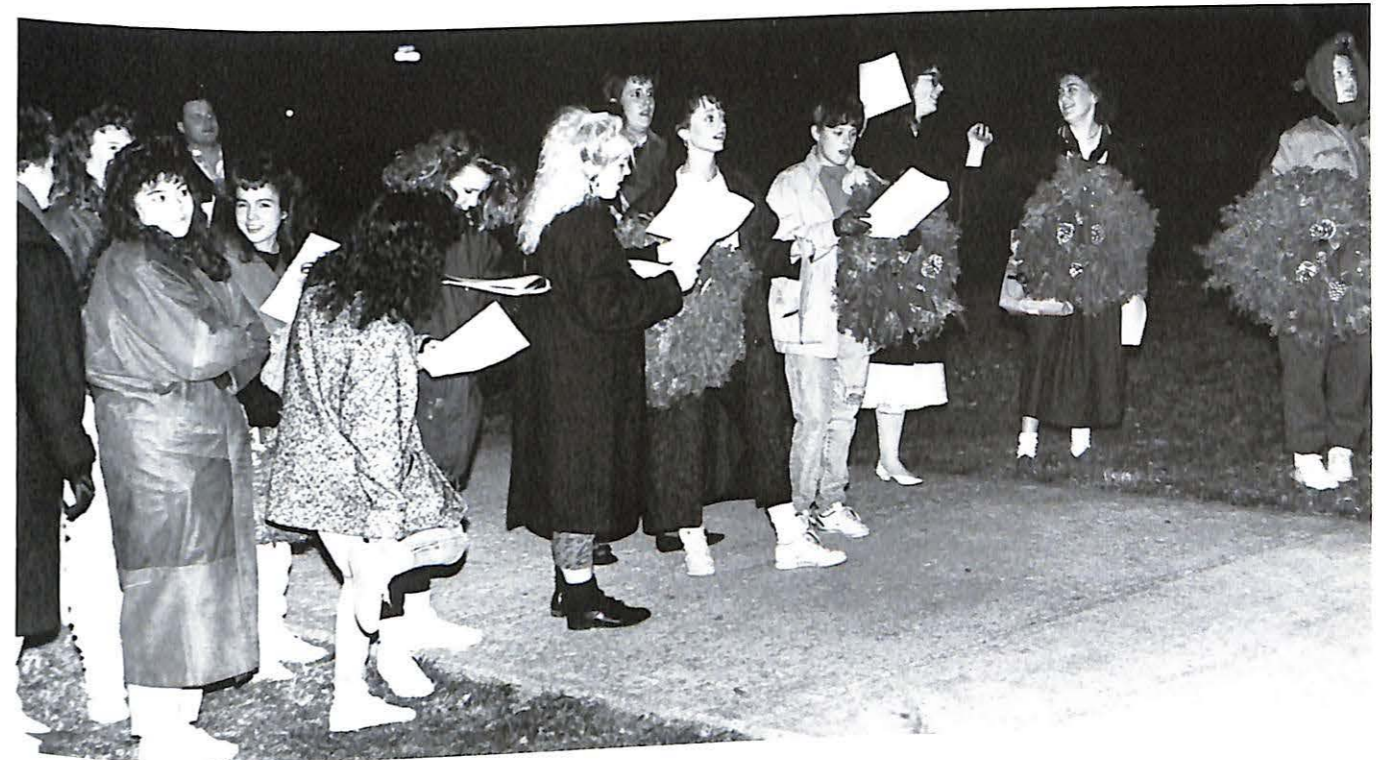

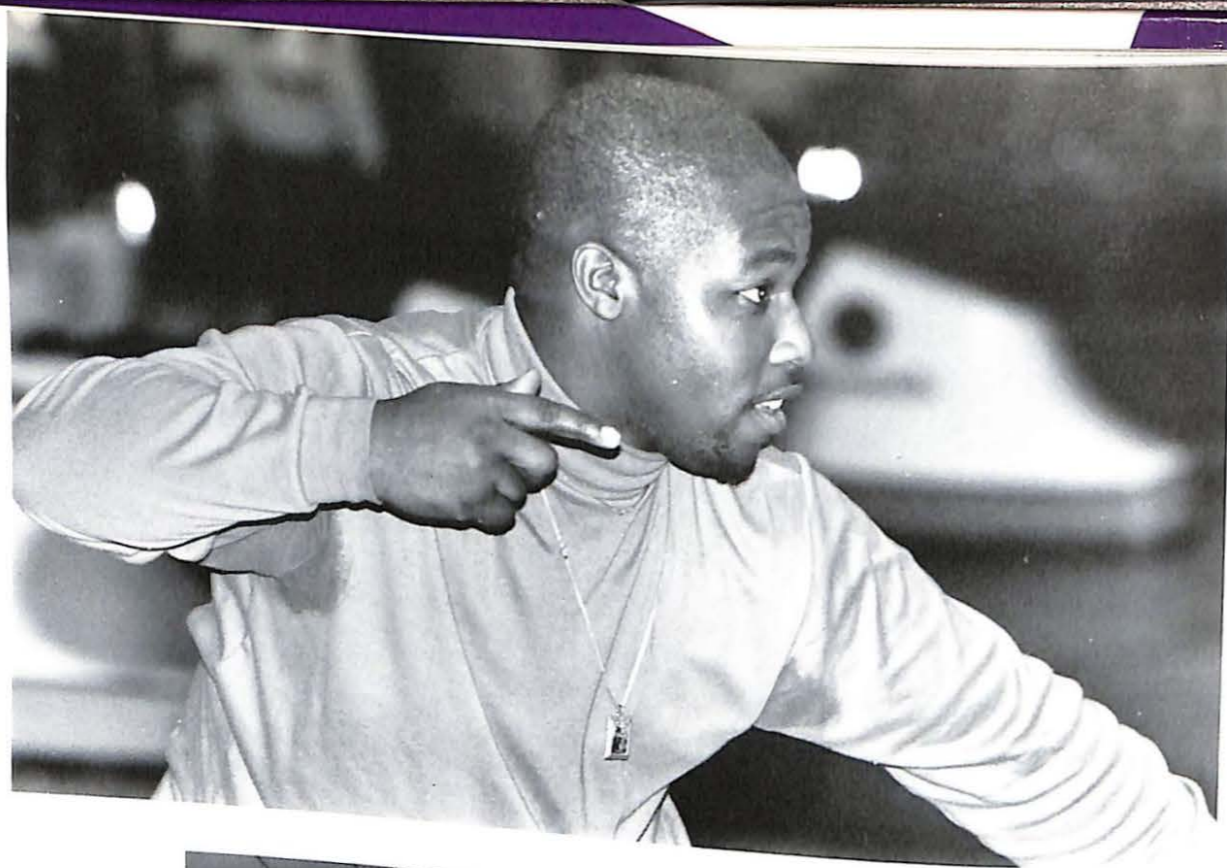
Something's Afoot

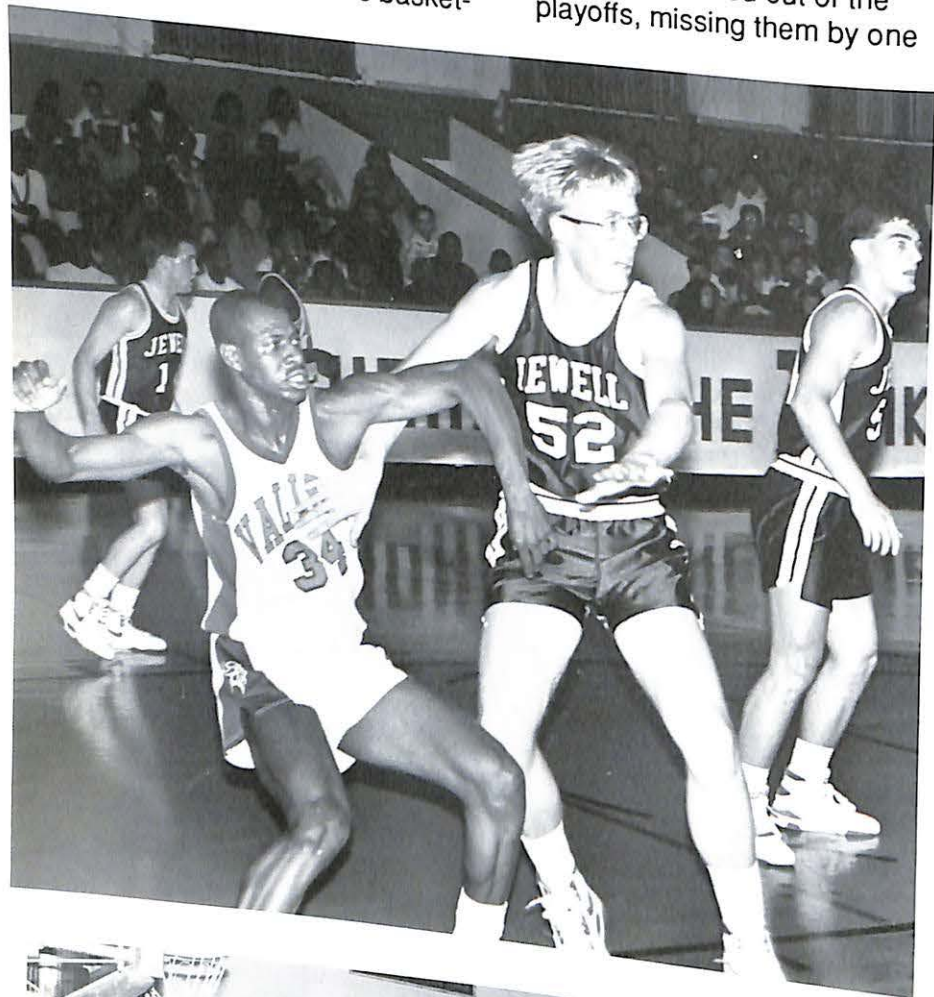

ball team finished out of the playoffs, missing them by one



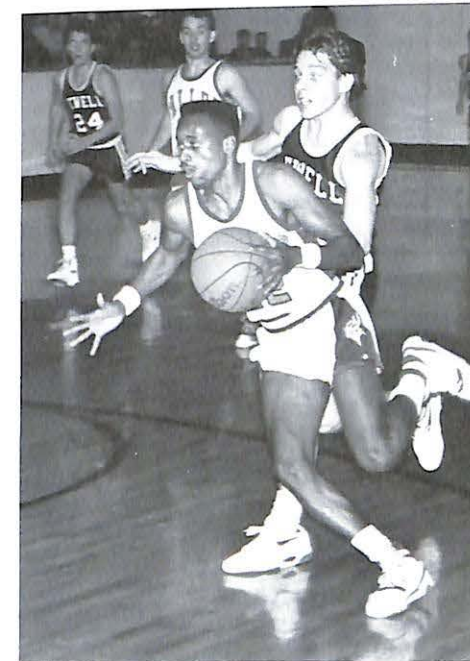
spot and four-tenths of a point. The team's final season mark was 14-17 overall. A 5-8 conference mark netted the men fifth in the Heart of America.

Sophomores were Eric White, Kevin Conway, and Joe Francis. Bart Stewart was the lone freshman.

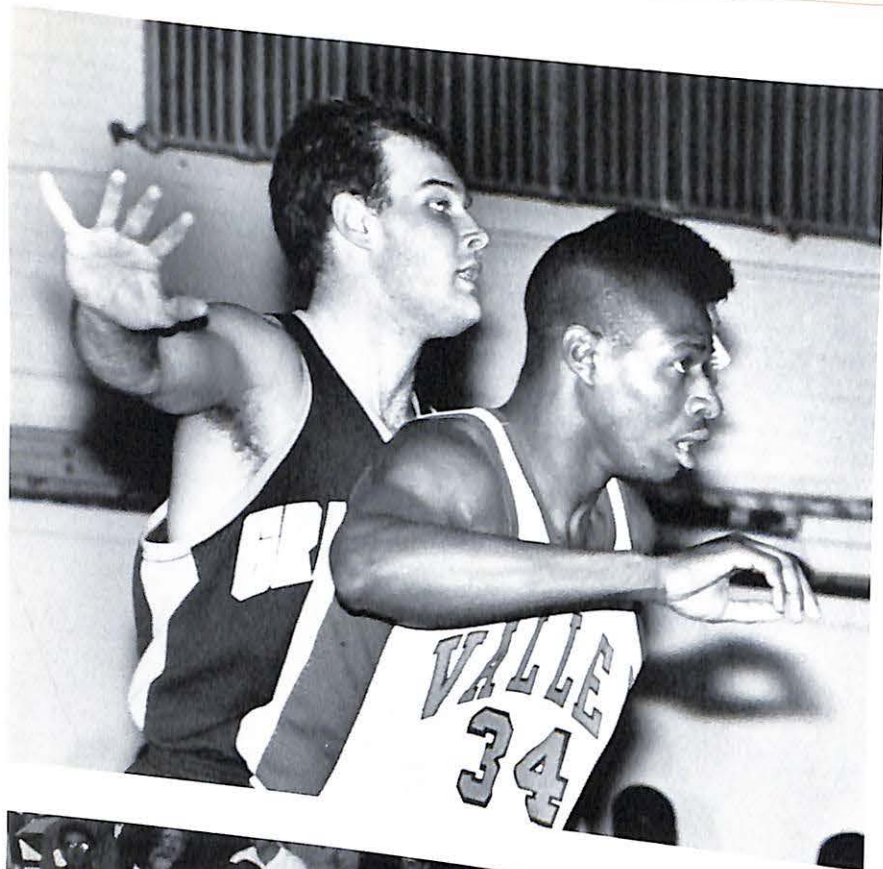


From above: Kevin Conway looks for a pass; the crowd looks for a win; Allen Hundley leads the offense; Scott Wolf dribbles to the top.



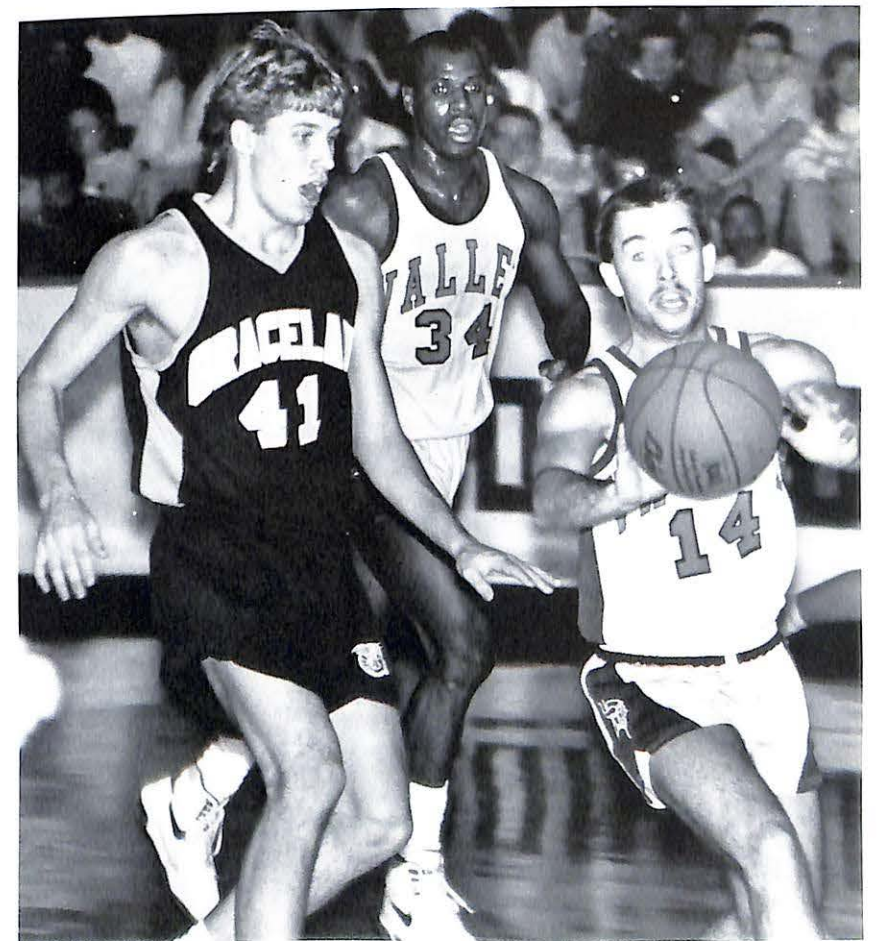
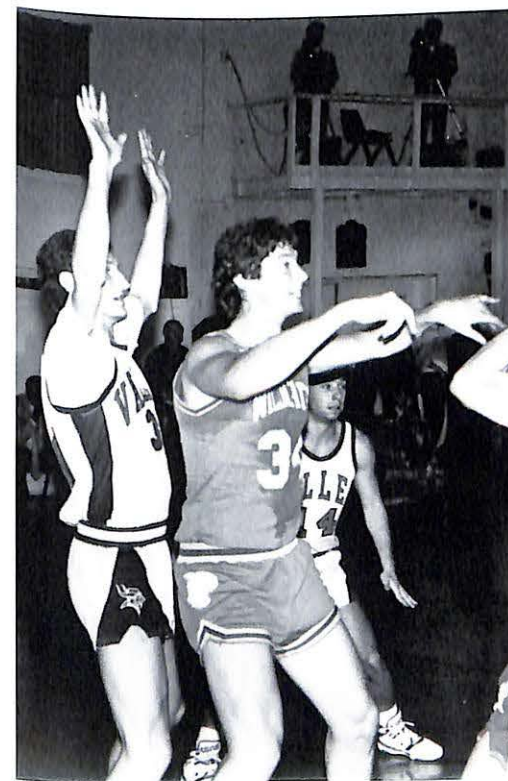
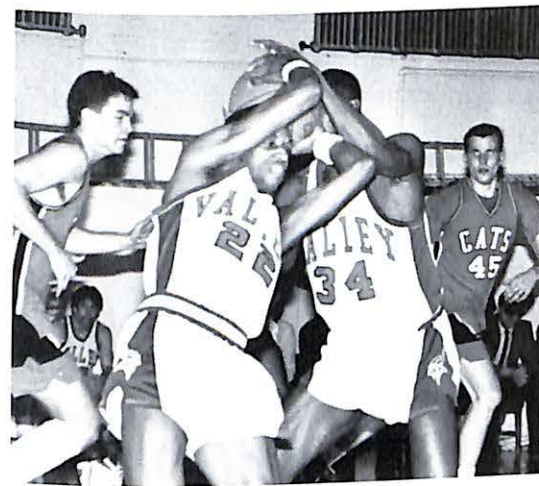
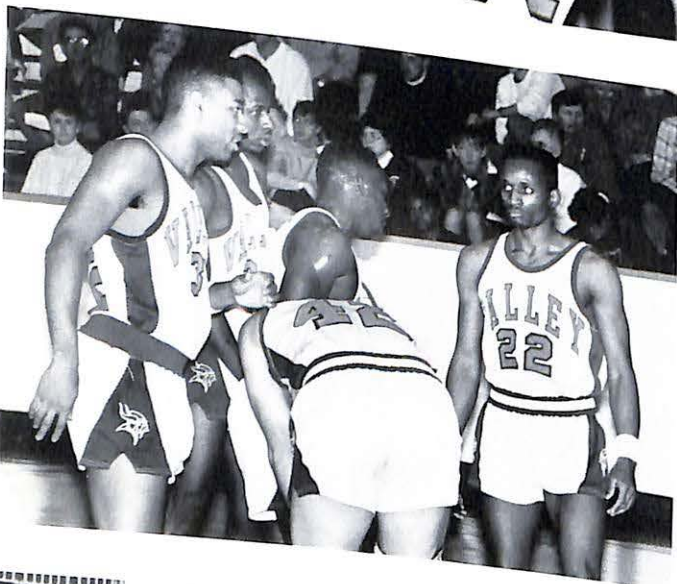

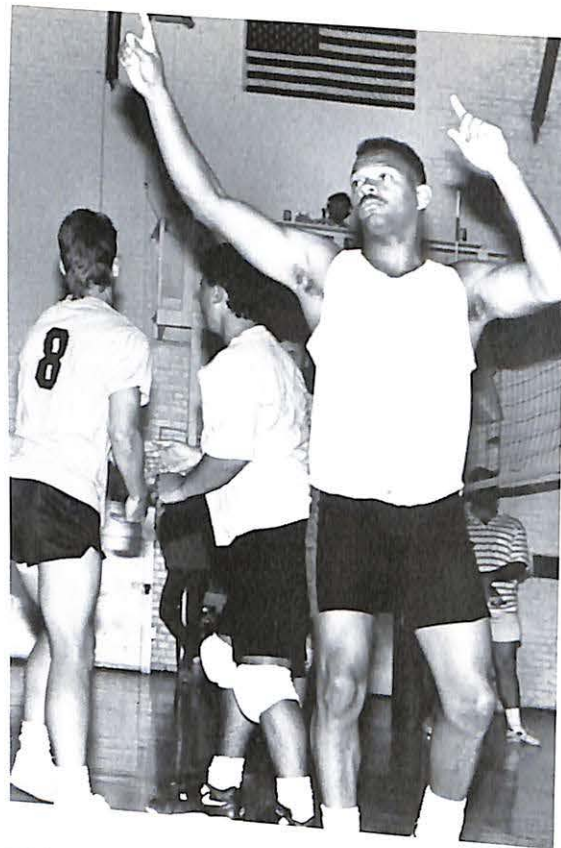

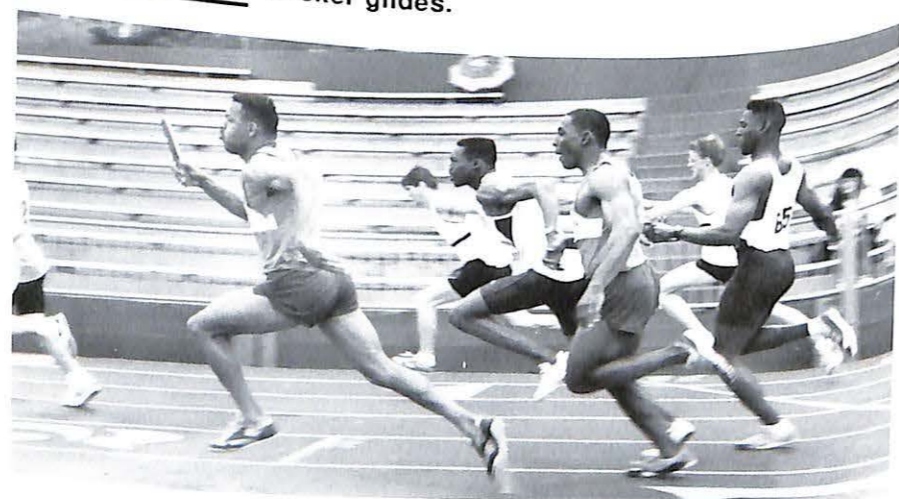


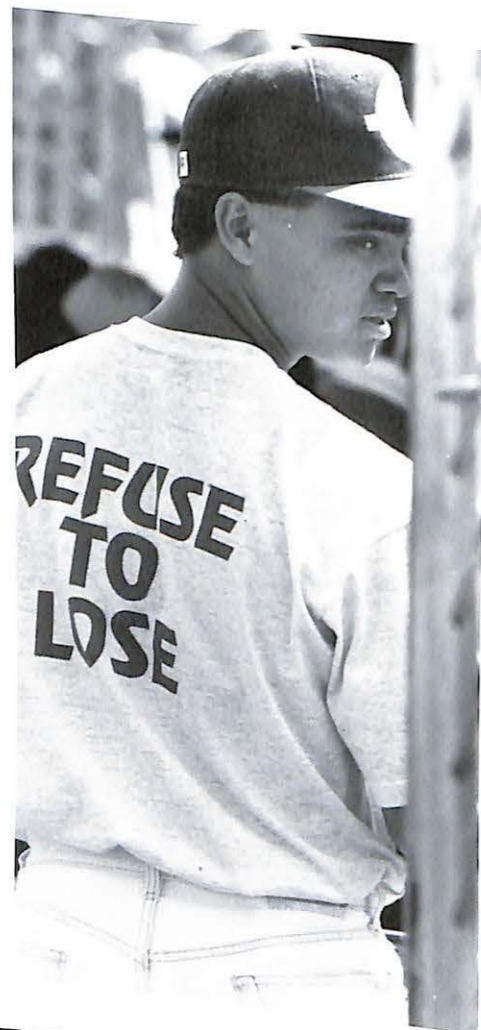

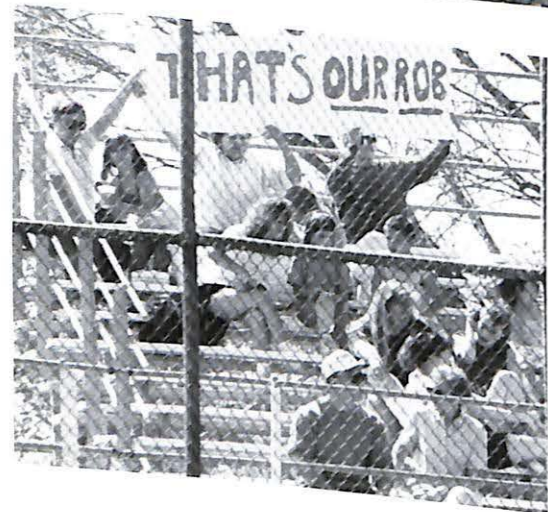

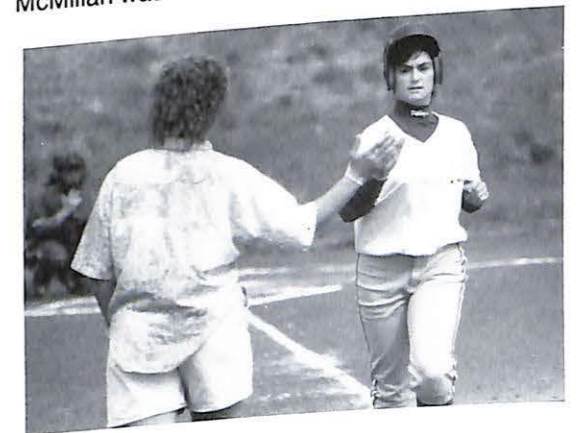

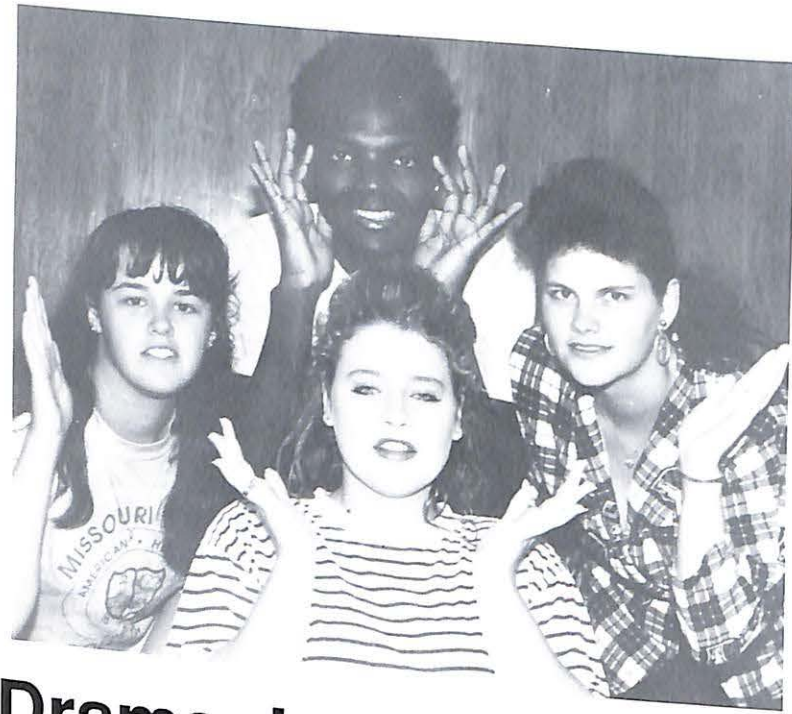

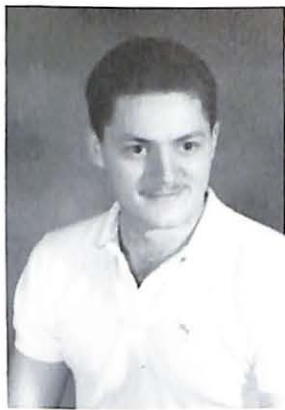

The final coming together



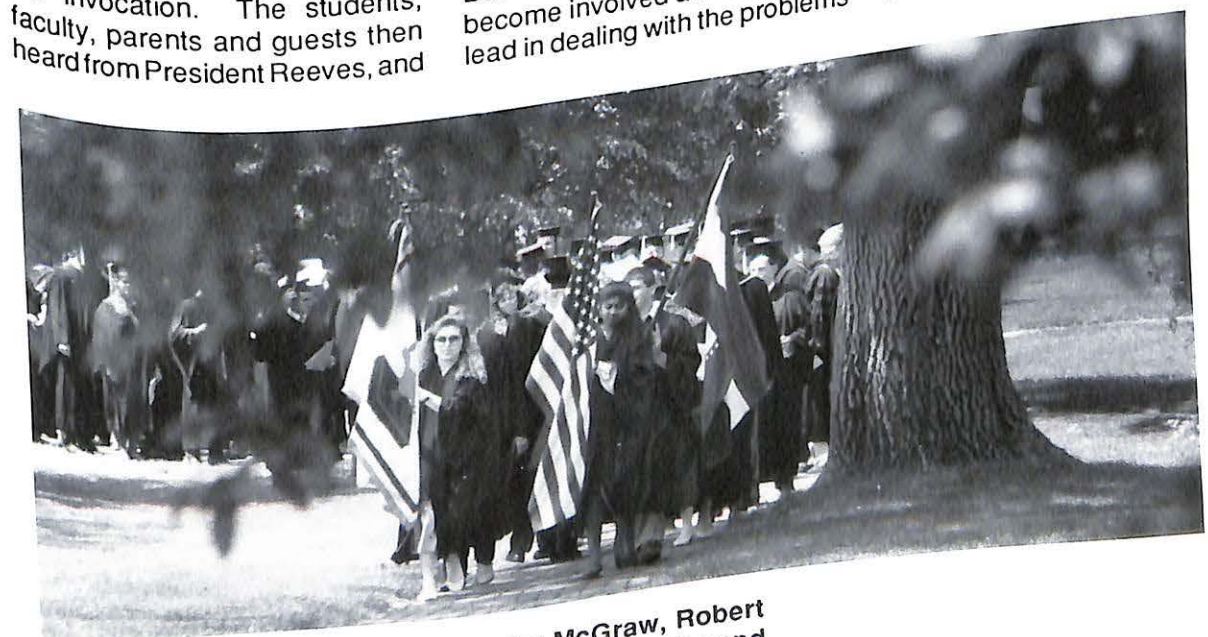
The first 113 graduates of MVC's second century walked across a sun-splashed stage to receive their degrees Sunday, May 13, ending one life and beginning another.

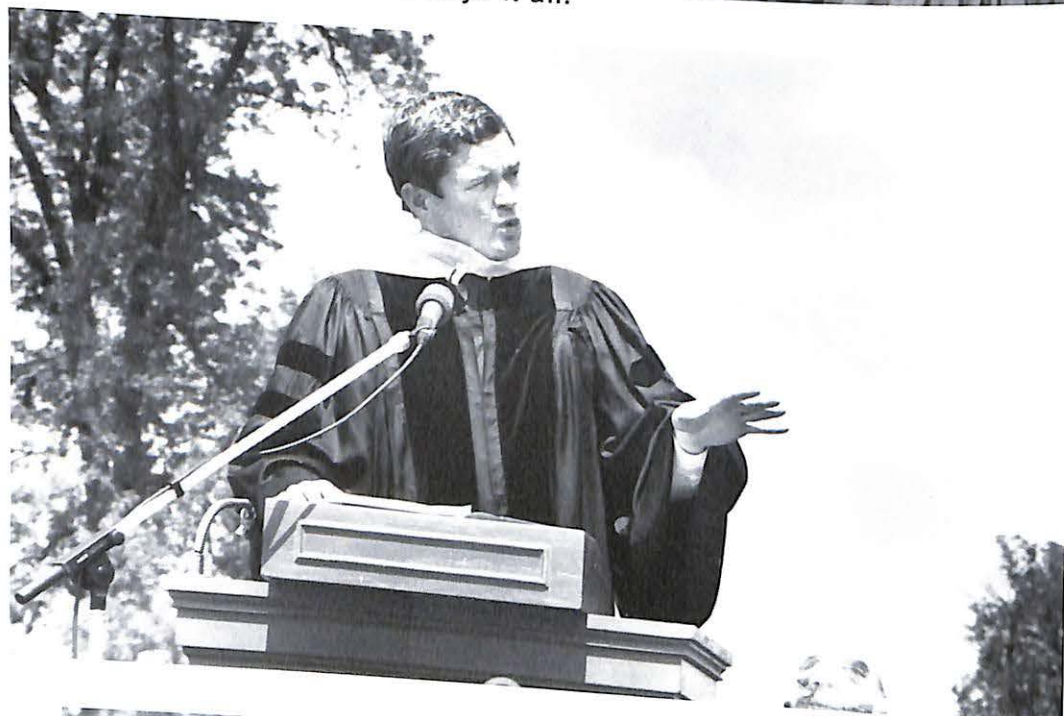
